Hydrocodone products to become Schedule II controlled substances

AUSTIN – The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is informing Texans that hydrocodone combination products (HCPs) have been moved from the classification of a Schedule III drug to the more-restrictive Schedule II drug, effective on Oct. 6, 2014. The U.S. Drug Enforcement Administra-

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





Leave law enforcement to the pros

AUSTIN - Yesterday, the Associated Press published a story on law enforcement agencies policing the Rio Grande. The takeaway? Law enforcement should be left to the pros. [Associated Press, 9/7/2014]

Communication is difficult enough between the different agencies including the U.S. Border Patrol, National Guard and Texas Department of Public Safety troopers. Civilian militia create an unsafe and unstable environment.

Kevin Oaks, the Border Patrol's chief in the Rio Grande Valley said:

"Sometimes it can be dangerous, because you have all these (non-law enforcement) people out there running around the border. There are cartel members that carry assault weapons and camouflage, and then there's others that may be under the auspices of whatever group, may look very similar, and we have no idea who those people are. My fear is that these things clash and eventually there will be a very bad outcome.'

Texas Democratic Party Communications Director Emmanuel Garcia released the following statement:

"For months, law enforcement officials have been vocal about the dangerous environment created by civilian militias on the border. These vigilantes are wasting the time and energy of trained professionals who are working to keep our communities safe.

"Texas Democrats support our heroes in law enforcement. We continue to wait for Republicans Dan Patrick and Greg Abbott to do the same by denouncing this activity and supporting our law enforcement officials. The border does not need to be more dangerous for those that are protecting us.'



These critics don't understand the real power of private ownership, says Terry Anderson of the Property and Environment Research Center.

"Long before the EPA was a glint in anyone's eye," said Anderson on my TV show, "property rights were dealing with pollution issues."

The worst pollution often happens on land owned by "the people" — by government. Since no one person derives direct benefit from this property, it's often treated carelessly. Some of the worst environmental damage happens on

Property rights and a simple, honest court system — institutions that can exist without big government — solve problems that would be fought about for years by politicians, environmental bureaucrats and the corporations who lobby them.

In fact, it's harder to assess the benefits and damages in environmental disputes when these decisions are taken out of the marketplace and made by bureaucracies that have few objective ways to measure costs. Markets even solve

environmental problems in places where environmentalists assume they cannot, such as oceans and other property that can't be carved up into private parcels. Environmental bureaucrats usually say, to make sure fishermen don't overfish and destroy the stock of fish, we will set a quota for every season. That command-and-control approach has been the standard policy. So bureaucrats regulate the fishing season. They limit the number of boats, their size and how long they may fish. The result: fishing is now America's most dangerous job. Fishermen race out in all kinds of weather to get as many fish as they can in the narrow time window allowed by regulators. They try to game the system to make more money. Sometimes they still deplete the fish stock. But Anderson points out that there is an alternative. "In places like New Zealand and Iceland ... we've created individual fishing quotas, which are tradable, which are bankable, which give people an incentive to invest in their fisheries." Because the fisherman "owns" his fishing quota, he is careful to preserve it. He doesn't overfish because he wants "his" fish to be there next year. The moral of the story: when possible, let markets and property protect nature. That avoids the tragedy of the commons.

Museum Musings The history of the Short family

"Like a nice bird, I sneaked off to my blankets under a cottonwood tree as soon as sure that the 'pizen' was working right: but Henry Taylor represented White Deer throughout the fandango with becoming energy."

17 days before the post office was established at Pampa, the post office at Lefors was established on Oct. 12, 1892 with Henry Thut as postmaster. The post office was in the Thut home. A location paper in the National Archives shows that the name "Vera" was crossed through and the name "Lefors" was substituted. (Vera was the oldest child of Perry and Emma LeFors). The Postal Service-required that "Lefors' should be written with a small "f." J.C. Short was elected the first rural mail carrier and carried the mail from Mobeetie to Lefors. The mail was carried on horseback, and sometimes on buckboard, once a week. Often J.C. would make the long trip in the worst of weather carrying only a postal card.

James Cornelius Short had first come from Cook County to the Panhandle with a herd of cattle in 1889. The following year he added his herd to that of John Stump with the intention of homesteading in this area. His wife, the former Amanda Elizabeth McCarty, came by train to Clarendon where she was met by her husband. With two children they traveled by wagon about 70 miles to join the Stump group, who were living near the present site of Miami.

J.C. looked after his cattle and helped men who had large herds. There were no fences then to keep the cattle confined to one location. The plains were covered with tall grass, and the only trees grew along the banks of the creeks and rivers. In 1891 J.C. and Amanda filed on a homestead quarter section of land about a mile north of present Lefors. The land was bought on a 40-year contract at \$1.50 an acre. The Short family lived in a half dugout for a number of years. The dugout had a huge fireplace in one end, two windows and a door in the other. The dirt floors were covered with wooden boards. A deep well pumped water into a barrel. From there, the water flowed through the milk trough where the milk was kept cool in gallon crocks. The excess water ran into a dirt tank for cattle. A hinged lid covered the trough which was shaded by a large tree. Wild


grapevines climbed the windmill tower.

At that time there were only a few scattered farms in the area. There was plenty of fresh water and grass and an abundance of prairie chickens, quail, deer and antelope. Large lobo wolves caused a great deal of trouble by stealing cattle. Because most of the land was known as open range, settlers began to build fences running north and south to keep the cattle from drifting. The cowboys who were hired to ride and watch these fences were called "line riders." Many disputes between ranchers were held over these drift fences.

A few yards in front of the Short home there was a well traveled trail over which cattle were driven to market at Dodge City. These cattle were of the longhorn variety and came from southern and central Texas. They were driven in herds of about 200 in a division and were kept about two hours apart. Many arrowheads were found in a nearby ravine. This indicated that the site must have been an Indian battlefield

In 1905 J.C. and Amanda built a six-room, two-story house where they spent the rest of their lives. During their long years of service, they did much for the growth and development of Lefors and Gray County. Amanda died on Sept. 26, 1935, and J.C. died on Jan. 26, 1943. Both are buried in Fairview Cemetery in Pampa. Their children were George (who died at birth), Dora, Zella May, Helen Lee, Margaret, Bertie Idella, Alice Etolia, James Michael "Jim," Sophia Anna, Jose-

military bases and gov ernment research facilities, such as the nuclear research site in Hanford, Washington.

Worse things may happen when government indifference combines with the greed of unrestrained businesspeople, like when the U.S. Forest Service lets logging companies cut trees on public land. Private forest owners are careful to replant and take steps to prevent forest fires. Governmentowned forests are not as well managed. They are much more likely to burn.

When it's government land — or any commonly held resource — the incentive is to get in and take what you can, while you can. It's called the "tragedy of the commons.'

"No one washes a rental car," says Ander-son, but "when people own things, they take care of them. And when they have private property rights that they can enforce, other people can't dump gunk onto the property.'

That's why, contrary to what environmentalists often assume, it's really property rights that encourage good stewardship. If you pollute, it's your neighbors who are most likely to complain, not lazy bureaucrats at the EPA.

"Here in Montana, for example, the Anaconda Mining Company, a copper and mining company, ruled the state," says Anderson.

The brag and bless list and the shame and curse list

There is one chapter in the book of Judges that usually gets skipped: Chapter 5. Since it is a song and not additional historical narrative, it suffers the same neglect



that Exodus 15 usually receives. However, Deborah and Barak's song has a special gem hidden in verses 13-23 that deserves our undivided attention.

In those few verses Deborah and Barak record the names of the

brave and faithful tribes who fought against the army of the Canaanite king, Jabin, led by his No. 1 general, Sisera. These verses also contain the names of the cowardly and faithless tribes who let others do all the fighting.

The first tribes on the "brag and bless" list are: Ephraim, Benjamin, Machir (part of Manasseh), Zebulun and Issachar. No specific details are mentioned, but their faithfulness is recorded for all generations to know. There is a lesson for us here: positive reinforcement in a biblical practice; not just for children, but for adults too.

Now just as biblical is the practice of negative criticism. The tribes on the "shame and curse" list who were mentioned BY NAME for their cowardice and unfaithfulness were: Reuben, Gilead (Gad), Dan and Asher. Reuben is specifically condemned for choosing to sit by their fires and tend their sheep rather than cross the Jordan and help their Israelite brethren. Reuben and Gilead/Gad both chose not to get involved in a matter that wasn't really their business because it was on the other side of the Jordan River.

Dan and Asher were no better; choosing to stay with their ships and harbor areas and ignore the call to help. There is also a lesson for us here too: negative criticism is not only appropriate at times, but sanctioned

by God when His people are seriously unfaithful.

And finally there is the "super-brag and bless" list: Zebulun and Naphtali. Their battlefield report can be found in Judges 4:10: "And Barak called out Zebulun and Naphtali to Kedesh. And 10,000 men went up at his heels, and Deborah went up with him." Then Judges 5:18 adds:

"Zebulun is a people who risked their lives to the death; Naphtali, too, on the heights of the field." Verse 18 sounds like what might be read at a modern day medal ceremony for military honor. They not only laid down their lives, but took the high spots on the battlefield; those places with the highest risk. Lesson? Not only is positive reinforcement a biblical action, but giving extra special praise to those who sacrifice more is just as appropriate.

From Judges 5 we are reminded that being positive is a great thing that God totally supports when it is actually true. God didn't make up things to praise His faithful ones about; He praised them concerning something significant which they actually did. So be like God and praise faithfulness wherever you see it.

Also from Judges 5 we learn that pointing out unfaithfulness is just as much like God. We live in a day and time when "negativity" is not only "politically incorrect", but condemned on almost every front. Sad to say it is condemned in many churches as well. Churches and individual believers need to be more like Deborah and Barak. Every time you see sacrificial faithfulness "brag and bless" it. Anytime you see significant unfaithfulness "shame and curse" it. And absolutely every single time to see above and beyond the call faithfulness "super-brag and bless" it. God bless.

One day J.C. was digging post holes for a fence when he discovered that his small daughter was no longer with him. After the family and neighbors searched for some time, they found Dora wedged tight in a post hole. Another time Dora was rocking her baby sister while Amanda was hanging washed clothes on the line. A large animal which looked like a dog

came toward the little girl. Dora, who thought the animal was a dog belonging to the Thut family, said, "Hello, Sport!" The animal, a mountain lion, ran away and was later killed by Jim Williams. Alice, who married John L. Smith at Lefors on June 6, 1943, was well known for her many philantrophies. With Vera Back she started the Alanreed McLean Museum in 1966. She died in McLean on Oct. 3, 1980, and was buried beside her husband and parents in Fairview Cemetery in Pampa. Bertie, who was a single

woman at the time, was elected a school trustee when the present Lefors High School was built in 1928. She married

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Arthur Henry in Amarillo on Feb. 16, 1929. For several years they lived near and in Perryton with their children Patricia Ann and James Arthur. After J.C. Short died in 1943, the Henrys leased and later bought the Short ranch near Lefors. Now, in 1989, Pat Youngblood, the Henrys' daughter, and her two daughters live on the land which Pat's grandparents homesteaded in 1891.



Proposition Number 1 (SJR 1)

SJR 1 would authorize the transfer of certain money from the general revenue fund to the state highway fund and the economic stabilization fund. Money transferred to the state highway fund may be used solely for the construction, maintenance and acquisition of rights-of-way for public roadways.

The proposed amendment will


