Baker joins Harvesters as new head soccer coach

Joel Baker comes to Pampa as the new head soccer coach at Pampa High School, as well as the special teams coordinator and linebacker coach for the football team. Baker was an assistant at Farwell last year, but saw the openings at Pampa as an opportunity.

"A big reason why (I came here) was a move for our family to give our kids more oppurtunities to participate in a lot of different activites that we have here in Pampa," he said. "We're going from a school of less than 200 to this size. So, for our family it was a great oppurtunity. It was also about a program that was having a fresh start. I'm excited about being a part of what's happening here and the fresh start in football and me as the head soccer coach, basically resetting the entire soccer program."

Baker comes to Pampa with a long list of coaching experience. He was the head football coach and athletic directer at Olton for four seasons. He has been the head soccer coach at Borger, Odessa Permian and Ennis, a town south of Dallas. He was also the special team coordinater for the football teams during his time at Borger and Permian.

Discipline and organization is very important to Baker. "We've got to be disciplined about what we're doing, and we have to do what we're doing with enthusiasm," he said. "In both cases, we have to be smarter than who we're playing, because you may be faster than an opponent. You may be stronger than your opponent, but that's not always true. One thing that I think we'll pride ourselves on is our team playing smart where the intelle-

gent play gives you an advantage over your opponents."
As for formations in soccer, Baker says he will use which ever formation best suits the players he has.



Thornberry halts EPA regulatory overreach

WASHINGTON, D.C. – As part of the ongoing effort to halt EPA regulatory overreach, the House passed a bill that would prevent the agency and the Army Corps of Engineers from greatly expanding federal juris-

diction and waters covered under the Clean Water Act. Congressman Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) is an original co-sponsor of the measure aimed at protecting farmers, ranchers, businesses, and landowners from further federal restrictions on their private property. "The Waters of the United States Regulatory Overreach Protection Act (H.R. 5078)" was approved by a bipartisan vote of 262 to 152.
"Personal property and water rights are

"Personal property and water rights are fundamental to the American way of life, a family's business, and many people's livelihoods," said Thornberry. "No landowner should have to worry whether the federal government will get in the way of their business because of the bar ditch behind their house. That is why our bill to restrict the power of the EPA and ensure a transparent

regulatory process is so important," he continued.

In March 2014, the Environment Protection Agency (EPA) and the Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) proposed a rule that would expand regulation of the agriculture community, businesses, and other landowners under the Clean Water Act. According to the rule, only 56 specified activities would receive exemption from permitting requirements under the Clean Water Act, leaving in question the status of all other activities being subject to further EPA regulation. Many of the activities in question are normal functions of daily farming and ranching routines. In order to protect business, H.R. 5078 would invalidate the rule as well as prohibit the EPA from exerting more federal control over waters in the United States.

The bill also requires the EPA and the Corps to seek state and local officials' recommendations in developing regulatory proposals in the future. The Secretary of the Army and Administrator of the EPA must submit a report to Congress defining the waters under federal and state jurisdiction, according to the recommendations from state and local officials.

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cally significant and sustained increase in stratospheric ozone, which shields us from solar radiation that causes skin cancer, crop damage and other problems.

From 2000 to 2013, ozone levels went up 4 percent in the key midnorthern latitudes at about 30 miles high, said NASA scientist Paul A. Newman. He co-chaired every-four-years ozone assessment by 300 scientists, released at the

United Nations.

"It's a victory for diplomacy and for science and for the fact that we were able to work together," said chemist Mario Molina. In 1974, Molina and F. Sherwood Rowland wrote a scientific study forecasting the ozone depletion problem. They won the 1995 Nobel Prize in chemistry

for their work. The ozone layer had been thinning since the late 1970s. Man-made chlorofluorocarbons, called CFCs, released chlorine and bromine, which destroyed ozone molecules high in the air. After scientists raised the alarm, countries around the world agreed to a treaty in 1987 that phased out CFCs. Levels of those chemicals between 30 and 50 miles up are decreasing.

reminds us that so much of life is a roll of the dice over which even the most self-satisfied of "self-made men" (you know, the type Disraeli identified as "very much in love with his creator") have next to no

We all acknowledge that none of us chooses our race, nationality, gender or parents. To have been born a white, American male between 1929-1945 was, believe me, to win the lottery. Scholars even have a name for my generation. They called us the "Lucky Few." Because of the low birthrate during the Great Depression and World War II, we were the first American generation smaller than the one before it, which, of course, was the deservedly heralded 'Greatest Generation.'

Because of the Depression, which led many educated males seeking work into the classrooms, and because of unenlightened social attitudes that essentially limited the professional opportunities of the nation's smartest women to either nursing or teaching, we, as children, were taught by remarkably talented and accomplished public school teachers. Because the GI Bill enabling returning WWII veterans to go to college, universities expanded to meet the increased demand. This meant that by the time the vets had graduated and our smaller generation finished high school, the colleges were almost begging for enrollees. A 1950s male

high school grad — who wasn't under indictment or detox — was all but guaranteed college admission.

The share of the male population of the Lucky Few generation, who graduated from college, doubled over the national rate. This is not, let me emphasize, because we were smarter or more conscientious than those who had preceded us. No — it is only because we just happened to be at the right Jack Benny's one-liner place at the right time. Let it also be noted the enormous good fortune my generation had by being born into and growing up in time of the most stable, intact, two-parent families the country has known.

Yes, we did have the obligation of military service through the draft, which resulted in the great majority of my generation's males serving. But unlike the Greatest Generation before us, we did not suffer the same volume of casualties, because most of our time in uniform was in peacetime.

By the time school and service were completed and we went looking for work, the U.S. economy was booming in a post-war economic expansion and employers were hiring. But because the demand for workers was so strong, and because we were so few, wages went up and in many cases included pensions with defined benefits .By 1969, nearly 95 percent of the males in my generation held a paying job. That remains the highest employment rate ever for any generation in the entire century.

So when any of us geezers in my crowd gets a little too smug or self-congratulatory about all he's accomplished, do all of us a favor and remind everyone what lucky SOB's we were to have been born in the USA between 1929-1945.

As someone whose profession practically requires me to be a fan of Apple, I am simply not.

I enjoy operating my Mac computer at the office and my Mac laptop; but I personally hate iPhone, iTunes and iPod.

But the Apple Live Event is annually an intriguing event because, to their credit, Apple does tend to be innovative.

Tuesday they announced both the Apple Watch and the iPhone 6.

The Apple Watch, coming in 2015 but available for pre-order on Sept. 12, will cost around \$349.

The Apple Watch requires users to have an iPhone (overly attached Apple here?) but has several neat

features. It has workout and activity utilities, has notifications for Facebook and Twitter just as its phone counterpart, several different watch editions (sport, edition and basic Apple Watch).

It comes with six, easy to change straps. It has a digital crown on the side of the device which also services as a home button.

Apple also introduced Apple Pay,

but they are still working some kinks out with it and gave limited information. So stay tuned for the lowdown on that. Apple also introduced their iPhone

6 and iPhone 6 Plus, with the latter being considerably bigger than the former. The iPhone 6 starts at \$199 with the Plus starting at \$299. Each starts with 16-gigs of storage.

Each phone will have iOS8. The phones also supposedly have improved battery life, which I am sure leaves smart phones users with the "I'll believe it when I see it" mental-


One feature is really interesting, when you receive a text, you can click the notification and type directly into the window instead of having to open up your messages.

Mourning Sept. 11

Sadly, we face another 9/11 anniversary this week. Has it really been 13 years since Amer-

ica was attacked? To me it seems as though it were last week. That day, Sept. 11, will forever be imprinted into my

brain. I can remember exactly what I was doing at the very instant the breaking news flash appeared on my television screen. It was a horrific loss, frozen in time.

This past week, my husband and I were at our dentist's office for our annual check-ups. We needed additional appointments, so the receptionist proceeded to engage us into booking the necessary follow-up visits. As I finished booking my follow-up, she turned her attention to my husband. As I walked out into the lobby, I heard her suggest Sept. 11 as the day he should return. My husband hesitated for a moment, and then called out to me, asking if that would

be a satisfactory date.

I, as my husband, was taken aback. Although both the dentist and her receptionist are young adults, I know they are both old enough to have witnessed Sept. 11. I found my voice quickly and gave a definitive "No that will not do. We will observe and mourn the loss of innocent life suffered on that tragic day. Sept. 11 will not be a routine day for us. It never

will be ever again.' As we left the dental office, I was lost in thought. I saw the expression on the receptionist's face when she realized that I was offended down to my core at her suggestion. I was disturbed that many in our nation look at Sept. 11 as just another day. I felt sorrow in my heart for the families that lost so much on that horrific and dread-

When a loved one has been lost, grief is a powerful emotion to overcome. When a loved one has been viciously lost, grief is complicated and can become almost impossible to overcome. I do not think 13 years is too long to ask a nation to remember a

tragic attack on its citizens. I do not think 313 years is too long to ask a nation to remember a tragic attack on its citizens. Forgetting

this tragedy invites it to happen again.

Remember 9/11. Remember the tragedy so many suffered with the loss of their loved ones. Reengage with your family and express your love and commitment for each other. Doing so will improve the quality of your life and your happiness. Remember, none of us knows the day of our death and one day, someone we love will be gone. Make your moments count be creating memories and strengthening your bonds together. Do it because one day, may just be too late.

Frequent ailments

Many bereaved individuals experience more frequent occurrences of ailments. Common complaints are additional colds, lingering flu, headaches, stomach upset, back and neck pain, indigestion, insomnia and flare-ups of pre-existing conditions. This is normal during the phases of grief. It is recommended that survivors notify their physician if these ailments become intolerable.

Special days

Holidays, birthdays, anniversaries and especially the yearly loss anniversary, are extremely stressful for survivors of loss. ■ The Dallas Cowboys: Perhaps it's time to hit 'reset?'

Before I get accused of being called a bandwagoner,

even worse a "hater," let me just say there has always been a special place in my heart for the Dallas Cowboys.

I liked them before I became a Denver Broncos fan, they are my wife's favorite team and (Heaven forbid) my son could grow up liking them instead of his father's beloved team.

That being said, a couple of reports came out Tuesday evening and Wednesday morning which made me say "Only the Dallas Cowboys have this kind of luck." The reports I am referring to are Cowboys CEO/GM Jerry Jones getting sued by an exotic dancer from an incident five years ago and linebacker Justin Durant expected to miss three to four weeks with a groin injury.

How do fans of this storied franchise have the patience to continue to fill the stadium? That's right, they don't sell their season tickets to San Francisco 49ers fans, making it essentially a home game for one of their non-divisional rivals

But the issues with the Cowboys go deeper than even these blows. The trickle down effect starts from the top and moves down. Jones as a GM is a horrible decision. He has already admitted to almost drafting Texas A&M star Johnny Manziel, who is holding the clipboard for Browns' quarterback Brian Hoyer. Cowboys fans need to be sending Stephen Jones a gift basket for Christmas.

Then he extends the contracts of either washed up players or unproven talent.

Extending Tony Romo (although I do have a couple of issues with that contract) and working on extending wide receiver Dez Bryant are the first smart moves (outside of rebuilding his offensive line) I have seen from Jones since cutting Terrell

Owens. I have often said owners own and GMs/coaches do football stuff. Look at the Oakland Raiders during the last 10 years of legendary owner Al Davis' life to see what happens when owners do too much. Davis passed away almost three years ago and the Raid-

ers are just now mediocre again.

Moving on to the coaching staff, I sternly believe Jones only keeps Garrett around cause Garrett won't challenge him. He and Wade Phillips are the only two coaches since Bill Parcells and I think there is a reason for that. I think Garrett was a great offensive coordinator and probably will be after the Cowboys, but he is a horrible head coach.

There is no logic in calling three pass plays at the goal line when DeMarco Murray is running well. At least run it on first and goal.

Garrett supposedly isn't calling plays anymore, that's Bill Callahan, but this is reflective of a Garrett-run coaching staff.

In a game where pundits. including myself, expected the Cowboys' defense to be awful, it did have several stops in Sunday's game. But it's a little early to feel relieved about the defense as this could have also been the fact San Francisco was playing with a lead and let off the gas pedal.

So couple all of these issues with the Romocoaster and rough luck with injuries to stars and perhaps the Cowboys should consider themselves lucky to go 8-8 three straight years.

So what needs to change? Several things. Sometimes a complete sweep of a coaching staff, defense and other components to a team can turn a team around. Look at the Denver Broncos, Arizona Cardinals and San Francisco 49ers. All of these teams went from a losing record to a winning record/ playoff berth and, in the case of the 49ers, three straight NFC Championship game appearances.

If this Cowboys franchise is going to improve, they should refresh the coaching staff, followed by the defense.
