New pastor in Pampa here to 'share the Gospel'

When Sergio Urrutia first came to Pampa in June, he was just filling in as a pastor for the church. A few

months later and now he is the head pastor at New Life Assembly of God here in Pampa

and said he feels like this was in God's plan all along. "In June of this year, the first Sunday, we were asked if we

would come here to

help do a service," Urrutia said. "This church didn't have a pastor and we started volunteering our Sundays. During those times we felt like God was calling us to be in Pampa. Our prayer in Amarillo was to be in Dumas. While we were praying, God was opening another door. Once we came here, to fulfill the pulpit those Sundays, my wife and I both believed this is where we needed to

Urrutia's first official service was the first Sunday in July.

Urrutia said that he goal is not to "recruit" members of other congregations, but to get those who are "lost" and do not currently belong to a congregation or are not going to church. "We are not here to be 'recruiting

people,' I don't like that," Urrutia said. "Let them be there, God has a church home for them. We are here to reach the lost, the people not going to church. With 53 churches, I'm

amazed. There are five or six churches just in this square. God has placed people in certain areas for a purpose. All of this work, I do with the Baptist Church. Unity is just one. We can really be a big impact if we just put aside differences, just share the Gos-

pel. "Not doctoring, not your beliefs, just doing what Jesus did, share the Gospel. People are dying while we argue about issues. Some agree and some disagree, that's okay. But let's just share the Gospel and let Jesus change people. It's not about building a mega church, its about building the Kingdom of God."

Before coming to Pampa, Urrutia worked out of First Family Church Assembly of God of God in Amarillo. Before that he did prison ministry.

"I met this guy in Lubbock who worked for Freedom in Jesus Ministry," Urrutia said. "They were coming to Amarillo for a meeting at the prison, so we submitted our forms and paperwork and were approved to go in. That was the beginning of our prison ministry, which I did with my wife for about 10 years."

Urrutia is a native to Santiago, Chile, and moved to the United States in 1977. He first started to study religion in Sept. 1997 when he was spiritually saved in Dumas after going to church while having marriage

"(We were invited to a revival by a friend at work) We went, we didn't see his vehicle, so we started to leave and we ended at the 'Yield' sign,' Urrutia said. "And we both looked at each other and said 'do you want to go back in.' We wrestled it for a little bit but I remember that sign. I believe it spoke to me that we were yielding to God. My wife also remembers God speaking to her saying 'What have you been asking me' because she had been praying to get closer to God and that God will find us a church that he wants us to attend.

The evangelist called non-believers to the front and Urrutia and his wife, Belinda, went.

"I began to weep and repented asking God to forgive me for all the things I have done wrong," Urrutia said. "I started to think of the things I had done wrong in my life. Something in me left and I felt this burden being lifted."

Urrutia started mission work in 2005, including going back his home, Chile, with the International Commission. In 2006-7 he went to Argentina. Besides Chile and Argentina, Urrutia has also missioned in Belize, Mexico and India.

Urrutia plans to bring in a congregation that studies the Gospel. He also hopes to expand the Latino community, as stated in the church's mission statement: "New life Assembly of God is com-

mitted to fulfilling a four-fold mission. Our primary reason for being is to evangelize the lost, worship God, disciple believer and to show compassion.

"To build a multi-ethnic body of believers. New Life commits to reach-

Multiple studies provide insight into drought tolerance of TAM wheat varieties

AMARILLO – Drought is the most important constraint limiting wheat yields in the U.S. Southern High Plains, and the past four years of exceptional drought have provided a tremendous opportunity for research and genetic improvements.

Although wheat yield and drought tolerance have been improved over the years by the Texas A&M Wheat Breeding Program, the physiological mechanisms of drought tolerance among the TAM wheat cultivars have not been well understood, according to Texas A&M AgriLife Research scientists in Amarillo.

Three different AgriLife Research studies in Amarillo have been aimed at determining what traits within the TAM cultivars provide greater or less drought tolerance.

Leading the AgriLife Research efforts from Amarillo are Dr. Qingwu Xue, crop stress physiologist; Dr. Shuyu Liu, small grains geneticist, Dr. Jackie Rudd, wheat breeder; Dr. Srirama Krishna Reddy, assistant research scientist; and Dr. Gautam Pradhan, a former postdoc-

search agronomist.

> Rudd said it is not unusual for hard red winter wheat crops to experience moderate to severe drought stress, especially during the grain filling stage, resulting in significant yield losses.

the highest yielding under drought, they have distinct adaptationmechanisms under water-deficit conditions.

"We know that TAM 111 intermittent drought and TAM 112 tops the trial under long periods of sustained drought," Rudd said. But because the physiolog-

ical and molecular basis of their adaptation remained unknown, Liu and Reddy conducted a greenhouse study to understand the differences in the responses of the two cultivars to water-deficit.

Whole-plant data indicated that TAM 112 produced more biomass and grain yield than TAM 111 under water-deficit during grain filling. Leaflevel data indicated that TAM 112 had higher levels of the plant hormone abscisic acid, which results in partial stomatal closure to conserve water, as compared to TAM 111.

Sustained water-deficit also resulted in more changes in flag leaf metabolisms in TAM 112 than TAM 111. Many genes associated with metabolic processes and dehydration responses were uniquely regulated between cultivars, Reddy said.

"TAM 112 had three times more unique responsive genes than TAM 111," Liu said. "This could be a reason that TAM 112 performed better under longer periods of drought stress.

Studies under the supervision of Xue were conducted in the research field near Bushland. The canopy temperature depression study researched the difference between air and canopy temperatures, which has been suggested as a trait for identifying drought-tolerant geno-

The objective of this study was to investigate whether a cooler canopy temperature is

The data indicates that TAM 112 has an active response to drought and conserves water during drought periods, whereas TAM 111 is not as sensitive to environmental stimuli and will continue to grow and use water ture death, he said.

"This explains our past observations that TAM 112 is relatively better under a sustained drought and TAM 111 is best under intermittent drought," Rudd said. "I am proud to be part of this outstanding research team, and I have no doubts that these studies have greatly increased our breeding efficiency to develop TAM wheat with even higher yield and better drought tolerance."

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

Use a forward-facing seat for as long as is recommended by the manufacturer.

 From four years old to eight years old and more than 40 pounds: Use a booster seat.

Failure to secure your child in an appropriate child car seat in Texas can result in a fine of up to \$25 for the first offense and up to \$250 for subsequent offenses.

So, please put your child in a car seat and if possible they should be placed in the back seat instead of the front. Children are such a beautiful blessing, and we should do everything we can to protect

Four hours later, after allowing a large number of foursomes to play through, I finally finished my nine holes, and Mom and I, exhausted, retrieved all the equipment left behind and went home. I did fairly well that summer and ended up as the player with the most-improved average. I really didn't enjoy playing in a golf league, since we had to play in any weather. Summers in northern Illinois are typically hot and humid, and mosquitoes were the bane of my existence on the golf course, so I only played one more year.


Many years later, a neighbor asked if my husband, Ron, would like her dad's golf clubs since he had passed

boardwalk, the beach resort is familiar to Americans from the popular game of Monopoly, the Miss America pageant and the Democratic Convention that nominated Lyndon B. Johnson for president. Almost 40 years

But casino revenues have fallen steadily to where they were 25 years ago, and this year four of Atlantic City's 11 casinos closed their doors, with a fifth expected to follow soon. The closed casinos have

rate was already twice the national average, and the assessed value of the unoccupied properties will have to be sharply reduced. And no property was bigger or fell harder than the gargantuan Revel Casino Hotel, which was custom designed for high rollers who never showed up.

What can be done with a 57-story, hermetically sealed glass building with 1,400 hotel rooms and 10 swimming pools occupying 20 acres on the boardwalk? When it filed for bankruptcy a second time last month, the owners declared the value of the property was worth less than 20 percent of what it cost, telling the bankruptcy judge that the casino is "a melting ice cube."

The \$2.4 billion it cost to construct that nowuseless "glass elephant" was greater than the taxes New Jersey collected from all the other casinos in the past eight years. New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie had the chance to pull the plug on the project four years ago, but instead he doubled down, committing \$261 million of state funds to see it through to completion.

Atlantic City parallels what happened in Alton, Illinois, where my husband and I lived for 44 years raising our six children. A riverboat casino was touted as the new "services" economy to replace the manufacturing plants that once supported over 10,000 families there.

After the politically connected original investors cashed in their chips a decade ago, Alton's casino steadily declined to about half of its original revenue. Along the way, a local family-owned business was devastated when a trusted employee embezzled over \$100,000 to support her gambling losses "on the boat," as people still say although the so-called boat never leaves the dock anymore.

While Christie was bailing out the soon-to-col-

committed New Jersey to enter the untested field of Internet gambling, which enables people to lose their life's savings in one fit of depression, without even leaving their office or home. Internet betting preys on the compulsive gambler because it invites him to feed his habit in secret, without criticism by family or friends.

Gambling over the Internet was deemed illegal based on a 1961 law called the Wire Act. As recently as 2007, the FBI was warning Americans that it is against the law to gamble over the Internet, and the operators of online virtual casinos were prosecuted.

But in another example of the Obama administration changing a law without congressional approval, its Department of Justice surprisingly announced just before Christmas 2011 that many forms of Internet gambling are legal after all. Obama's

lapse Revel Casino, he also DOJ declared that the Wire Act prohibited sports betting, but implied that other forms of gambling (such as online poker) may not be considered illegal under the Wire Act.

> At that time — nearly three years ago — the size of online gambling was estimated to be already immense, between \$6 billion to \$100 billion a year. Chris Christie obviously salivated at the prospect of collecting a share of that money for New Jersey, projecting \$180 million the first year — almost as much as the state now takes in from casinos.

> But the state's actual revenue from Internet gambling this year was only a little over \$9 million, which is 95 percent less than Christie expected. Meanwhile, more conservative states (such as Texas) have held the line against gambling expan-

The lesson of New Jersey should not be lost on Republicans who are vetting potential presidential candidates for 2016. Some of the Republican "donor class" may be considering Chris Christie, who is not a conservative, as someone who could control the federal budget after eight years of Obama's deficit spending.

Like the liberal Repub-

licans who are currently running for governor of two other blue states, California and Illinois, Christie offers himself as a non-ideological pragmatist who can manage the state's finances. The catastrophe of Christie's bad bet on gambling, both virtual and bricks-and-mortar, proves yet again that there simply

5,186 people were killed in fighting between Muslims and Christians, based on a count of bodies and numbers gathered from survivors, priests, imams and aid workers in more than 50 of the hardest-hit communities. That's more than double the death toll of at least 2,000 cited by the United Nations in April, when it approved the mission. There has been no official count since.
