Pending tax increase takes center stage in City Commish meeting

The Pampa City Commission will hold a special meeting this afternoon in which members of the public can come and voice their opinions on the pending 17.5 percent tax increase proposed by the city.

The meeting will be held at 4 p.m. at City Hall, located at 200 W. Foster.

Commissioner Robert Dixon encourages members of the community to be in attendance at this meeting to speak out either in favor or opposition of this proposed increase, which would make Pampa's tax rate the highest in the Texas Panhandle.

"This increase will hurt our community considerably. It will affect everybody, particularly home owners under the age of 65. Home owners 65 and older, if they have other property, it will be taxed at the 17.5 per-

Texas schools get military gear via federal program

Texas school districts dominate the list of those receiving military equipment — including firearms and armored vehicles — through a federal initiative, according to a letter sent by a coalition of civil rights and education advocacy groups to the U.S. Department of Defense on Monday.

Led by Texas Appleseed and the NAACP's Legal Defense and Educational Fund, the

While most teenage girls may be interested in music, movies, books and even athletics, Carolyn Golleher is into dog showmanship.

Carolyn has been showing dogs since she was seven years old, and says it stems from not being interested in what her siblings did.

"Well I have two older siblings, my sister rodeoed and my brother played the guitar," Carolyn said. "I didn't find interest in either one of those and I've loved dogs ever since I was very little and my mother showed dogs. So I decided, 'Maybe I should try this out,' so I am doing it seven years later."

Carolyn has two dogs she shows: a smooth fox terrier, Diesel, and a basset hound, Harvey. An interesting nominal fact about these dogs is that, just as in horse racing where the competitors have interesting names, so do these dogs. Diesel's registered name is Diesel Osage Full Throttle, while Harvey's is Harvey High on the Hog.

Some names stem from the kennel they belong to. The kennel might be the first part of the name, so let's use Amarillo for an example, and then a name interest or family name. So if my (John Lee's) dogs were showed,

my dog Bruce may have the name Amarillo Bruce Wayne. Because he is from Amarillo and I like Batman.

But in Diesel's and Harvey's case, it's based on interests the owners might have.

American Kennel Club (AKC) dog shows have several categories. Carolyn and her hounds compete in owner handling, regular breed and junior showmanship. To do so, however, has taken a lot of time and practice.

"When I first started showing, I was little and I didn't have much homework. There is a lady by the name of Amy Booth, she shows smooth fox terriers and is my role model," Carolyn said.

"I tried to train my dog to be like hers, and he is doing what I want him to do. But it took a long time, probably about six months. But nowadays, I am in eighth grade and there is a lot more homework, so I find time on the weekends and Friday nights to train."

Carolyn said perfecting each breed is her favorite part of the competition.

"(My favorite part of the competition) would have to be doing the best for the breeds," Carolyn said. "Perfecting the breed's stock to improve the breed against the standard. To keep the ability of the breed to cooperate."

coalition is urging the defense department to end school districts' participation in what is known as the 1033 Program, which allows the federal government to transfer military equipment including firearms and vehicles to state agencies. It is also asking for a "comprehensive accounting" of school districts taking part in the program that indicates the type of equipment received and its intended use.

"Adding the presence of military-grade weapons to school climates that have become increasingly hostile due to their overreliance on police to handle

routine student discipline can only exacerbate existing tensions, intensifying overly punitive atmospheres that criminalize and stigmatize students of color," according to the letter, which was signed by 22 state and national organizations, including the Education Law Center, the Legal Aid Justice Center and the Texas Criminal Justice Coalition.

Though the full scope of school district participation in the program is difficult to determine because of discrepancies in public disclosures at the federal and state levels, Texas Appleseed identified at least 10 Texas school districts that have received armored plating, tactical vests and military vehicles. Together they also received a total of 18

M-14 rifles, 25 automatic pistols and 4,500 rounds of ammunition.

A nonprofit that advocates for juvenile justice reforms, Texas Appleseed has targeted a number of practices in Texas schools related to police presence and student discipline. In February 2013, the group filed a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education's Office for Civil Rights against the Bryan Independent School District over disciplinary policies it said disproportionately harmed black students. Last September, the federal government opened an investigation into the group's allegations.

In June of last year, Appleseed filed a complaint with the U.S. Department of Justice against four Dallas-area school dis-

tricts and a Dallas County court for allegedly violating students' civil rights in the process of prosecuting truancy.

Because of concern over school district police forces' involvement in student discipline, the 2013 Legislature passed a law preventing officers from issuing Class C misdemeanor charges for misbehavior like disrupting class or foul language. Referred to as "student ticketing," the practice drew criticism for unnecessarily criminalizing student infractions that could be as minor as chewing gum on campus. That law did not address truancy, which made up more than 113,000 Class C misdemeanor cases against children ages 12 to 17 in fiscal year 2012.

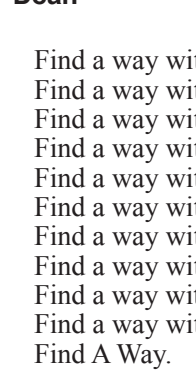
Larry Allen Dean

Republican reaction to Obama speech reveals much — about them

Minutes after President Barack Obama concluded his strong and sensible address explaining how he intends to destroy the terrorist organization the Islamic State, Republicans popped up on television like political snipers. He should have kept a "residual force" in Iraq, complained Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., and he is to blame for the Islamic State's advances. He sounds just like George W. Bush, gloated former House Speaker Newt Gingrich, and he is reluctantly enacting the advice of Dick Cheney.

None of those remarks was accurate, but the falsehoods revealed once more the irrepressible Republican impulse to slur a Democratic president — even when the nation faces a serious security threat. In this instance, as the president attempts to unite us and bring together a broad coalition of allies, their behavior is worse than inappropriate. Indeed, were the roles reversed, the Republicans would surely describe such conduct as unpatriotic.

When the roles actually were reversed, as the anniversary of 9/11 might remind us, Democrats rallied immediately behind President Bush and his plan to attack the Taliban and al-Qaida. Even while Republicans scurried to lay blame on former President Bill Clinton, the loyal Democratic opposition stifled obvious questions about why the Bush White House had done so little to thwart those who had just attacked the World Trade Center and the Pentagon. As American troops went into Afghanistan, those questions would, years later, await the 9/11 Commission (which Bush and Cheney furtively attempted to derail).

Dissent is always to be valued and protected in America, but the instant Republican attacks on Obama's speech scarcely qualify as principled criticism. After all, the president is already hitting the Islamic State with airstrikes, as most Americans now believe he must, and has vowed to extirpate that barbaric and blasphemous gang. Unless the Republicans

want to urge a wholesale reinvasion of Iraq — which they know would be politically suicidal — there isn't much for them to dispute in the president's announced strategy.

Substantive debate over tactics and strategy isn't what Republicans want anymore. Rather than contribute constructively to the policy process, they blather on and on about mistakes and gaffes that can be marked against the president. Some of those alleged errors, such as his decision against arming the Syrian opposition, are matters for serious argument. Others — such as McCain's contention that we should have left a "residual force" in Iraq, preventing the rise of the Islamic State — are not.

As noted here months ago — when the Arizona Republican made the same claim — both the Iraqi government and the American public clearly wanted U.S. troops out of that country. Nouri al-Maliki, the divisive Shiite sectarian then leading Iraq, refused to provide legal immunity to U.S. troops. That triggered the status of forces agreement signed by President Bush in December 2008, which required a complete withdrawal by Jan. 1, 2012.

Would a remnant force of U.S. troops have stopped the rise of a new Sunni insurgency, led by jihadi, under the divisive al-Maliki regime? That seems a doubtful assertion, no matter how often or how angrily McCain says so. What seems considerably less arguable, however, is a simpler thesis: Without the invasion of Iraq, the Islamic State would never have been spawned.

The neoconservatives who promoted that ruinous adventure have loftily advised us all not to reargue the decision to overthrow Saddam Hussein and occupy Iraq. Their desire to avoid accountability for a historic blunder — still costing so many lives and so much treasure — is understandable, if not quite honorable. But if they want amnesty for themselves, they might stop trying to frame President Obama for the awful consequences of their misconduct.

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A tribute to Beethoven's greatest symphony

I love classical music. My favorite classical composer is Ludwig von Beethoven, followed by French composer Claude Debussy for a close second place.

The backgrounds of the two composers are worlds apart. Beethoven was born in Bonn, Germany, in 1770, and died in March 1827. Debussy was born in 1862 and died in 1918. Beethoven is regarded by music historians as a crucial figure in the transition from the Classical to Romantic eras, while Debussy, along with his contemporary Maurice Ravel, composed music during the French Impressionism period that produced notable painters Claude Monet and Pierre-Auguste Renoir.

What Beethoven and Debussy do have in common is they were iconoclasts — musical rebels who, during their respective careers, refused to conform to convention and pushed the envelope as far as it would go.

Debussy, for instance, once competed in a composition contest in which he performed one of his piano pieces. Debussy won first place, but after the judges reviewed his score rescinded the award because his composition

"lacked form."

The problem wasn't that his piece didn't have form. The problem was the judges didn't understand Debussy's form because the composer was light years ahead of them.

Ah, and then there is Beethoven, "The Big Guy," as I like to call him.

To illustrate my point, allow me to kneel at the altar of Beethoven's greatest composition, the third symphony. No, that is not a typo because the fifth symphony — although the composer's most well known piece — was not his best.

Nothing wrong with the fifth, except that it has been trivialized so much in pop culture, from Chuck Berry to disco.

I proclaim that Beethoven's third is the greatest symphony of all time. And, if you disagree, as a gentleman I will have to ask you to step outside. I like the third so much that I bought from Amazon.com a second CD just for my car in case I need a "Beethoven fix."

It was Beethoven's Symphony No. 3 in E-flat Major, in my humble opinion, that ushered in the Romantic Era, where composers discarded the musical templates that guided them for decades and were now validated to unleash intense emotions.

The third is so macho, so German ... so Beethoven. The first movement of the third symphony was composed within the

boundaries of sonata-allegro form that was the staple of Classical Era. In a nutshell, the form consisted of first theme, second theme in the dominant key — a development, or middle section — that expounded upon ideas from the first two themes and a recapitulation that repeated the first and second themes, with the latter this time in the tonic key. The form could also include an introduction and a coda, or ending.

Beethoven, however, shattered convention when he opened the first movement with two crashing E-flat major chords. This isn't radical at all by 21st century standards, but in the polite Viennese society of Beethoven's time it was going where no composer had boldly gone before. It was as if Beethoven was rudely screaming to barons and baronesses in the concert hall, "Shut up and listen!"

Speaking of barons and baronesses (and kings and queens and princes and princesses, too), Beethoven loathed royalty and was looked upon as politically subversive by the Viennese government.

Classical music fans know that Beethoven originally dedicated his third symphony to Napoleon Bonaparte, whom he believed embodied the democratic and anti-monarchical ideals (liberty, equality and fraternity) of the French Revolution. He called the symphony the "Eroica,"

which is the German word for hero.

But when Napoleon declared himself Emperor of France, Beethoven in a fit of rage crossed out his dedication to Napoleon on the cover page. In Beethoven's mind, the only thing worse than a king was an emperor.

These were Beethoven's harsh words for the self-proclaimed emperor: "So he is no more than a common mortal! Now, too, he will tread under foot all the rights of Man, indulge only his ambition; now he will think himself superior to all men, become a tyrant!"

Like the fifth symphony, with its catchy "da-da-dadum" motif, the third, too, has a distinctive motif, or "riff," to use a term from rock and jazz.

The motif is so simple that it almost sounds like the "Jeopardy" melody. (It wouldn't surprise me if the TV game show stole the idea from Beethoven.)

But instead of repeating it over and over again void of any variation or emotional expression, Beethoven uses the motif as a springboard for his infinite imagination — twisting and turning that singular idea in hundreds of different ways. The late-great Leonard Bernstein said it best: "Simplicity itself made manifest."

Ah, Lenny. We miss you.

Vikings reinstate Peterson despite abuse charge

EDEN PRAIRIE, Minn. (AP) — Adrian Peterson is coming back to the Minnesota Vikings two days after he was charged with child abuse for using a wooden switch to spank his 4-year-old son, and the star running back said Monday he is not a child abuser and wants "everyone to understand how sorry I feel about the hurt I have brought to my child."

Peterson, considered one of the best running backs in the NFL, was benched for Sunday's 30-7 home loss to the New England and he had not commented publicly since news broke on Friday that he had lashed the boy with the switch earlier this summer, causing an unspecified injury.

"I am not a perfect son. I am not a perfect husband. I am not a perfect parent, but I am, without a doubt, not a child abuser," Peterson said in a nearly 500-word statement issued through his agency. "I am someone that disciplined his child and did not intend to cause him any injury."

"No one can understand the hurt that I feel for my son and for the harm I caused him. My goal is always to teach my son right from wrong and that's what I tried to do that day."

Vikings owners Zygi and Mark Wilf said they had decided to bring back Peterson for practices and Sunday's game at New Orleans "after significant thought, discussion and consideration." The Wilfs said they want to let the legal process play out before making any more definitive decisions on Peterson's future with the only NFL team he has ever played for.

"To be clear, we take very seriously any matter that involves the welfare of a child," the Wilfs said. "At this time, however, we believe this is a matter of due process and we should allow the legal system to proceed so we can come to the most effective conclusions and then determine the appropriate course of action. This is a difficult path to navigate, and our focus is on doing the right thing."

Texas fatal occupational injuries decrease in 2013

AUSTIN - In 2013, there were 493 fatal occupational injuries in Texas, an eight percent decrease from 536 in 2012, according to preliminary data released today from the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), Census of Fatal Occupational Injuries (CFOI). Nationally, there were a total of 4,405 fatal occupational injuries.

The rate of fatal occupational injuries in Texas was 4.4 per 100,000 full-time employees in 2012, the lat-

est year state fatality rates are available. Fatal occupational injury rates for 2013 at the state level will not be available until spring, 2015, when the final CFOI data are released.

Incidence rates for non-fatal injuries and illnesses by industry for 2013 will be released in October 2014. In 2012, the Texas incidence rate for nonfatal occupational injuries and illnesses was 2.7 per 100 full-time employees, while the national rate was 3.4 per 100 full-time employees. The Texas non-fatal incidence rate has been below

the national rate since data collection began in 1990.

The Texas Department of Insurance, Division of Workers' Compensation (DWC) compiles detailed information on all occupational fatalities occurring in Texas for the CFOI, a program jointly administered with the BLS. The DWC annually releases total fatal injury counts and descriptive data in an effort to provide information to assist employers, safety professionals, and policymakers in identifying occupational safety and health issues in the state.

The DWC provides various safety and health services to assist employers in providing safe and healthy workplaces, including resources to help prevent transportation-related incidents on its Driving Safety website at <http://www.tdi.texas.gov/wc/safety/drivesafe.html>.

Resources by industry and occupation can be found on the TDI website at <http://www.tdi.texas.gov/wc/safety/videoresources/targetareas.html>. Other services include free safety and health consultations on Occupa-

tional Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) regulations; regional and onsite safety training; free safety training DVD loans; the Safety Violations Hotline; and free safety and health publications. In addition, employers that carry workers' compensation insurance in Texas can obtain accident prevention services from their insurance companies at no additional charge.

Key Findings

- In Texas, transportation incidents continued as the leading cause of fatal occupational injuries and accounted for the majority of the total decrease in fatal occupational injuries in 2013, declining by 49 incidents from 2012. Specifically, roadway incidents involving a motorized land vehicle decreased from 193 to 154 incidents.

- At the state level, transportation incidents involving the support activities for mining industry decreased from 30 incidents in 2012 to 25 in

2013. In the truck transportation industry, these incidents decreased from 66 to 53 incidents. Wholesale trade experienced 18 transportation incidents, up from 12 in 2012.

- Contact with objects surpassed falls as the second leading cause of fatal occupational injuries, up from 65 in 2012 to 76 in 2013.

Of these, 72 percent involved being struck by an object or equipment (55 incidents), an increase of 17 percent from 2012 (47 incidents). Eighteen percent involved employees being caught in or compressed by equipment or objects (14 incidents), an increase from 5 incidents in 2012.

- The industry subsectors in Texas experiencing the highest number of fatal occupational injuries were truck transportation (64 incidents), specialty trade contractors (64 incidents), support activities for mining (47 incidents), heavy and civil engineering construction (37 incidents), and justice, public order, and safety activities (36 incidents).

- In Texas in 2013, the occupation experiencing the

most fatalities was heavy and tractor-trailer truck drivers, with 104 incidents. This was a 14 percent decrease in fatal injuries from the 121 incidents in 2012. Construction trade workers followed with 78 fatal injuries in 2013 compared to 82 incidents in 2012. Within the construction trade occupations, construction laborers accounted for 34 of the total fatal injuries.

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Around The Globe

Islamic State group's war chest is growing daily

WASHINGTON (AP) — Islamic State militants, who once relied on wealthy Persian Gulf donors for money, have become a self-sustaining financial juggernaut, earning more than \$3 million a day from oil smuggling, human trafficking, theft and extortion, according to U.S. intelligence officials and private experts.

The extremist group's resources exceed that "of any other terrorist group in history," said a U.S. intelligence official who, like others interviewed, spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss classified assessments. Such riches are one reason that American officials are so concerned about the group even while acknowledging they have no evidence it is plotting attacks against the United States.

The Islamic State group has taken over large sections of Syria and Iraq, and controls as many as 11 oil fields in both countries, analysts say. It is selling oil

and other goods through generations-old smuggling networks under the noses of some of the same governments it is fighting: Kurdish-controlled northern Iraq, Turkey and Jordan.

While U.S. intelligence does not assess that those governments are complicit in the smuggling, the Obama administration is pressing them to do more to crack down. The illicit oil is generally transported on tanker trucks, analysts said.

"There's a lot of money to be made," said Denise Natali, who worked in Kurdistan as an American aid official and is now a senior research fellow at National Defense University. "The Kurds say they have made an attempt to close it down, but you pay off a border guard you pay off somebody else and you get stuff through."

The price the Islamic State group fetches for its smuggled oil is discounted — \$25 to \$60 for a barrel

of oil that normally sells for more than \$100 — but its total profits from oil are exceeding \$3 million a day, said Luay al-Khatteeb, a visiting fellow at the Brookings Institution's Doha Center in Qatar.

The group also has earned hundreds of millions of dollars from smuggling antiquities out of Iraq to be sold in Turkey, al-Khatteeb said, and millions more from human trafficking by selling women and children as sex slaves.

Other revenue comes from extortion payments, ransom from kidnapped hostages, and outright theft of all manner of materials from the towns the Islamic State group has seized, analysts say.

"It's cash-raising activities resemble those of a mafia-like organization," a second U.S. intelligence official said, reflecting the assessment of his agency. "They are well-organized, systematic and enforced through intimidation and

violence."

Even prior to seizing Mosul in June, for example, the group began to impose "taxes" on nearly every facet of economic activity, threatening death for those unwilling to pay, U.S. intelligence officials say. An analysis by the Council on Foreign Relations estimated the group was reaping \$8 million a month from extortion in Mosul alone.

Once the group took over Mosul, in northern Iraq, and other areas, it grabbed millions of dollars in cash from banks, though not the hundreds of millions initially reported, U.S. intelligence officials say.

This spring, four French and two Spanish journalists held hostage by Islamic State extremists were freed after their governments paid multimillion-dollar ransoms through intermediaries.

The Islamic State group "has managed to successfully translate territorial control in northern Syria

and portions of Iraq into a means of revenue generation," said a third U.S. intelligence official.

Analysts say the group is relying on the fact that the area along the border between Iraq and Turkey has long been a smugglers haven, and was made more so by the fall of Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein in 2003. Generations of families have illicitly moved goods through the region.

The Islamic State is the successor to al-Qaida in Iraq, which was founded by Jordanian Abu Musab al-Zarqawi. For a time, the group was allied with the Nusra Front, the al-Qaida affiliate that is a key player among the rebels battling Syrian President Bashar Assad. The Islamic State group has since broken with the Nusra Front and al-Qaida.

In the early days of the Syrian civil war, the Islamic State group was funded in large part by donations from wealthy residents of Gulf States, including Ku-

wait and Qatar, American officials have said.

"A number of fundraisers operating in more permissive jurisdictions — particularly in Kuwait and Qatar — are soliciting donations to fund al-Qaida's Syrian affiliate, the Nusra Front, and the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant (ISIL)," David Cohen, the Treasury department's top counterterrorism official, said in a speech in March. ISIL is an alternative acronym for the Islamic State group.

That stream of funding has diminished in recent months as the group's violent tactics have drawn worldwide attention, U.S. intelligence officials say.

The group's reliance on oil as its main source of revenue could easily be disrupted by American airstrikes, officials say. But so far, no decision has been made to target Iraqi or Syrian oil infrastructure, which is serviced by civilian workers who may have been conscripted.

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Exhibition looks at genius of carousel inventor

NEW YORK (AP) — Coney Island's historic B&B Carousell is among several vintage attractions still thrilling visitors at the famous amusement park today.

What parkgoers may not know is that William Mangels designed and built it.

Mangels was a mechanical and creative genius who enthralled the masses with his carousels, shooting ranges and rides like the Whip and Tickler during the early part of the 20th century. He's the subject of an exhibition at Brooklyn's historic Green-Wood Cemetery where he's buried — just miles from Coney Island where he lived and worked.

"William F. Mangels: Amusing the Masses on Coney Island and Beyond" runs through Oct. 26 at the cemetery's chapel.

The show's quaint vintage artifacts and carousel music easily transport visitors to a bygone era when rides were simpler but no less thrilling.

From 1890 until his death in 1958, Mangels patented

over 50 inventions, including the mechanism that's still used today to get carousel horses jumping up and down. He also wrote a book about the amusement park industry and founded the American Museum of Public Recreation near his W.F. Mangels Company.

"The Mangels factory made Coney Island the amusement center of the universe at the turn of the last century, attracting craftsman and artisans from all over the world," said Charles Denson, executive director of the Coney Island History Project.

Some of his rides still operate at amusement parks across the country, like the B&B Carousell whose wooden horses were carved by Charles Carmel. It returned to Coney Island's boardwalk after a \$2 million restoration last year as part of the new Steeplechase Plaza and revitalization of the famous Brooklyn playground.

Other Mangels-built carousels are still in use in Fresh Meadows Park, Queens, Congress Park in

upstate Saratoga Springs, and Portland, Oregon.

Mangels came to the United States from Germany in 1883 when he was 16. He opened his factory seven years later because he believed "human beings have a natural craving for fun." His first invention was the Razzle Dazzle, a large hand-powered swing. Other rides soon followed, including the Whip. The 3-seater cars operate on a turn-table platform that force the rider to one side as the car whips around the corner.

"It became his most popular and sensational ride," said Jeff Richman, Green-Wood's historian who owns the two Whip cars in the show. "He sold 500 as franchises throughout the world," including Paris, London and New Zealand. Playland in suburban Rye has two Whip rides and a Mangels carousel.

"He was the biggest manufacturer of amusement park rides, carousels and shooting galleries in America in the first quarter of the 20th century," he

added.

The exhibition also has the original plans for another Mangels' classic — the Tickler — which carried barrel-like cars by steam engine up a wooden incline and then sent them down bumping and spinning through a pinball machine-like maze.

Other artifacts include the original B&B Carousell ticket booth and cash box and a steel cast bulls-eye shooting gallery complete with the gears, chains, belts and electric motor that drove it. Patents, blueprints and other archival material round out the story of Mangels' passion.

Exhibition docent Edward Damato fondly recalled another from his childhood: Mangels' Human Roulette Wheel.

"You would sit on it and it turns and by centrifugal force it pushes you off," he said. He and his friends "laughed hysterically" all through the ride. But then his friend vomited.

"We laughed even harder," he said.

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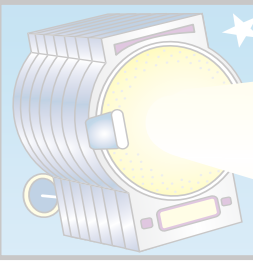
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Apple: Record 4M orders of iPhones on first day

NEW YORK (AP) — Apple had more than 4 million advance orders of its new, larger iPhones in the first 24 hours, exceeding its initial supply, the company said Monday.

The iPhone 6 and iPhone 6 Plus will be delivered to customers starting Friday and throughout September, but many won't be delivered until October, Apple said. Phones will still be available Friday on a walk-in basis at Apple retail stores and from various wireless carriers and authorized Apple resellers.

Apple's website had intermittent outages last Friday because of heavy traffic as orders began online. The company said the 4 million orders set a

new 24-hour record, beating the 2 million orders in 2012. That was for the iPhone 5, the previous time Apple increased the iPhone's screen size.

Last year, Apple sold 9 million iPhone 5s and iPhone 5c phones in the first three days they were on sale, but the company didn't say how many came in the first 24 hours of advance orders.

The iPhone 5, 5s and 5c have screens measuring 4 inches diagonally. The iPhone 6 is 4.7 inches, and the iPhone 6 Plus is 5.5 inches.

Besides larger screens, the new phones announced last week offer faster performance and a wireless chip for making credit card

payments at retail stores by holding the phone near the payment terminal. The phones start at \$199 with a two-year service contract.

The new phones will initially be available in the U.S., Australia, Canada, France, Germany, Hong Kong, Japan, Puerto Rico, Singapore and the U.K. Availability will expand to more than 20 additional countries a week later.

A free update to Apple's iOS software for mobile devices will be available to existing users on Wednesday. The new phones will come with the update, known as iOS 8.

Apple's stock rose 30 cents to \$101.96 in midday trading Monday.

Miss America: More to worry about than red cup

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — The new Miss America says there are more important things for people to worry about than her little red cup.

That was the message Monday from Kira Kazantsev of New York as many social media users continued to pan her use of a plastic cup during the talent portion of Sunday night's pageant finale in Atlantic City.

Kazantsev tells The Associated Press she realizes everything she does now will be scrutinized and commented on. But she says she performed Pharrell Williams' "Happy" while tapping a cup on the floor because that's what she wanted to do, regardless of what anyone else might think.

"There are so many more important issues in this world that people should be worried about than my plastic cup," she told the AP Monday morning after taking the traditional dip in the Atlantic City surf the morning after winning the crown. "However, as Miss America, everything I do

is scrutinized and I understand that. That's part of the job.

"I hope people understand that's just part of who I am, and I wanted to present myself that way I wanted to," she said.

Her pageant causes include eliminating sexual assaults in the military, and preventing domestic violence. The Hofstra University graduate plans to attend law school with the \$50,000 scholarship she won in the pageant.

Kazantsev said she was inspired by the 2012 movie "Pitch Perfect" in which Anna Kendrick's character auditions for an a cappella group by performing rhythmically with a cup.

This marked the second consecutive year in which social media users unleashed a stream of disapproval toward a newly crowned Miss America. Last year, immediately after Nina Davuluri became the first Indian-American to win the crown, some online users directed racist taunts at her.

Bathed in midmorning sunshine Monday on the Atlantic City beach, Kazantsev filmed a number of video promos in which she asked fans to follow her on social media sites including Twitter, Instagram and Facebook. Yet those

sites continued to send forth disapproval from many users over her choice of material for the talent portion of the competition.

"ATTENTION ALL DRUNK COLLEGE GIRLS: Lower Standards now set for the #MissAmerica Talent Portion! Grab a #RedSoloCup, buy a gown and sign up!" read one of the kinder tweets soon after Kazantsev was crowned Sunday night.

Another read, "A girl with a solo cup sitting on the ground won #MissAmerica..that's what drunk college girls do freshman year after jungle juice."

The backlash continued unabated Monday afternoon with tweets like this one: "Canceling Elizabeth & Haddessa's piano, violin, ballet, & juggling lessons! I already have a RED CUP! Thank you #MissAmerica #savemoremoney"

Kazantsev is not particularly concerned with the online reaction to her performance.

"It's unconventional; and sometimes people aren't as open to change as some would like," she said. "It's just something different and I hope people take it as a positive. If they can appreciate that and be happy with what I did, then that's all I can ask."

Gamers use police hoax to lash out at opponents

DENVER (AP) — The calls to 911 raised an instant alarm: One caller said he shot his co-workers at a Colorado video game company and had hostages. Another in Florida said her father was drunk, wielding a machine gun and threatening their family.

A third caller on New York's Long Island claimed to have killed his mother and threatened to shoot first responders.

In each case, SWAT teams dispatched to the scene found no violent criminals or wounded victims — only video game players sitting at their computers, the startled victims of a hoax known as "swatting."

Authorities say the hoax that initially targeted celebrities has now become a way for players of combat-themed video games to retaliate against opponents while thousands of spectators watch. The perpetrators can watch their hijinks unfold minute by minute in a window that shows a live video image of other players.

"It's like creating your own episode of 'Cops,'" said Dr. John Grohol, a research psychologist who studies online behavior, referring to the long-running reality TV show that follows officers on patrol.

The players, who are often many miles away, look up their opponent's addresses in phone directories, sometimes using services that can find unlisted numbers. They also exploit online programs that trick 911 dispatchers into believing an emergency call is coming from the victim's phone or address. All the while, they conceal their own identities and locations.

Authorities spent an estimated \$100,000 to send more than 60 officers in

April to the hoax in Long Beach, New York. Investigators said the caller was upset over losing a game of Call of Duty when he called police using Skype. SWAT officers found only a teenager wearing headphones.

In Bradenton, Florida, at least 15 officers showed up at the home of a professional video game player on Aug. 31 after a caller posing as his young daughter phoned in a report that he was armed and drunk. Instead, they found him playing Minecraft for a live audience over Twitch.tv, an online network with millions of viewers.

"The officers responding do not know, other than the information they're getting over the radio, exactly what is going on," said Bradenton police Capt. William Fowler.

Less than a week later, police received another bogus call routed through the man's phone that made it appear he had called in a bomb threat to a Bradenton gas station.

A Connecticut man was arrested Sept. 10 on federal charges that he made swatting calls there and in at least four other states. Authorities say Matthew Tollis, 21, belonged to a group that referred to itself as TeAM Crucifix or Die. Other members live in the United Kingdom, according to the FBI, which is still trying to learn their identities.

Swatting captured headlines several years ago, when a series of celebrity homes were targeted in Los Angeles. Police were so concerned about copycat crimes that they stopped releasing any public information when a hoax occurred. Officers made at least one arrest, a juvenile who targeted Justin Bieber and Ashton Kutcher.

"You can literally do it from around the world," said Justin Cappos, assistant professor of computer science at New York University. "It can be very challenging (to solve) depending on the sophistication of the person doing it."

Realizing the difficulty, police in Littleton, Colorado, sought help from FBI agents in Denver who are specially trained to solve cyber-crime.

Grohol, the psychologist, said the prevalence of live game-streaming might be one reason for the trend. As the victim in the Colorado case, Jordan Mathewson, put it to KMGH-TV: "They get to see all this go down right before their eyes and, you know, it's fun to them."

Intensely competitive war games that blur the lines of fantasy and reality could also contribute, said Dr. Kimberly Young, a psychologist who directs the Center for Internet Addiction Recovery in Bradford, Pennsylvania.

"They want to win at all costs, including jeopardizing someone's safety," she said. "Real life becomes almost meaningless because they're so entrenched and involved in these games. Swatting, to them, seems like part of the game."

A video of the Aug. 27 incident in Littleton posted on YouTube shows Mathewson playing Call of Duty when he hears officers approaching.

"I think we're getting swatted," he says, raising his hands as heavily armed officers shout for him to get on the ground. He drops, and officers handcuff and frisk him.

"That's live streaming," Mathewson tells the officers. "I guess a joker thought it would be funny to call you guys in."

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

CANADIAN — The Canadian Wildcats improved to 3-0 on the season Friday night with a 55-21 victory over Perryton on Homecoming night.

On the first possession of the game, Braiden Galla came up with an interception for the Wildcats and returned it to the Perryton 38-yard-line.

A few plays later, Chance Cook gave Canadian the lead with a touchdown run. Benigno Heredia's extra point made the score 7-0.

Perryton was unable to do much on their next drive as Eddie Paz broke up a pass on third down.

Canadian's offense took advantage. Marc Marquez had a 26-yard carry to get the ball to the five-yard-line, then Tanner Schafer finished off the drive with a touchdown pass to Ryan Royce. Heredia's extra point made the score 14-0.

Perryton had another turnover on their next drive, as Branden Carson came up with a fumble recovery.

The Wildcats put together another touchdown drive, as Schafer connected with Cooper Trolinger to make the score 21-0.

Perryton turned the ball over once again, as Sawyer Cook came up with the interception. Canadian turned it into another

touchdown, as Schafer connected with Marquez for a 32-yard-touchdown pass. The Wildcats led 28-0 at the end of the first quarter.

Perryton finally got on the board when they returned a fumble recovery to cut Canadian's lead to 28-7.

Canadian had to punt for the first time, after being called for illegal touching. The punt was a downed at the five-yard-line and the Wildcats' defense made a stop.

Galla returned the punt the opposing 35-yard-line and Heredia kicked a field goal to make the score 31-7.

Perryton put together a drive, but Canadian's defense came up with a stop on fourth down. Shafer connected with Ryan Royce to convert a 3rd and 22. Then Cameron Copley with a 5-yard TD catch on the next play. Canadian led 38-7 at halftime.

Canadian punted on their opening drive of the second half, after penalties put them in a fourth-and-30. However, the Wildcats got the ball back when Copley came up with an interception. Chance Cook finished it off with a seven-yard touchdown run to make the score 45-7.

Perryton turned the ball over once again as Cory Chidester recovered a fumble for Canadian. Schafer threw a touch-

down pass to Galla. The extra point put the Wildcats up 52-7.

Canadian came up with their sixth forced turnover of the game when Sawyer Cook came up with his second interception of the night. Heredia kicked a field goal to give the Wildcats a 55-7 lead at the end of the third quarter.

Perryton broke a couple of big plays for touchdowns in the fourth quarter, but Canadian ultimately won 55-21.

Quarterback Tanner Schafer went 20-32 for 283 yards and five touchdowns. Chance Cook led the team in rushing with nine carries for 50 yards and two touchdowns. Seven different players caught passes for the Wildcats. Braiden Galla had five catches for 40 yards and a touchdown. Holton Hufstедler had 17 combined tackles for Canadian.

The Wildcats play at Childress at 7:30 p.m. on Friday.

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Cowboys start road trip beating Titans 26-10

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — DeMarco Murray is giving the Dallas Cowboys the ability to run over opponents, at least when he holds onto the ball.

Murray fumbled on his third carry of the game and wound up running for 167 yards and a touchdown Sunday, helping the Cowboys beat the Tennessee Titans 26-10 in their home opener.

"I told him that was his third carry and he was going to get about 30, so hold onto the ... ball," Dallas coach Jason Garrett said.

With Murray leading the way, the Cowboys avoided an 0-2 start, and they dominated holding the ball for more than 41 minutes by rushing for 220 yards. Tony Romo was sacked four times but didn't have a turnover a week after being intercepted three times by the 49ers.

"DeMarco is turning straight beast mode," Cowboys receiver Dez Bryant said. "I know he is going to keep doing that. If he runs the ball like that, all the running backs, it just makes our jobs that much easier."

The Titans ran all over Kansas City winning their opener but missed too many tackles against the Cowboys. That cost the Titans (1-1) their first 2-0 start since 2008, the last time the franchise made the playoffs.

"The thing that hurts most is that we did this at home," first-year Titans coach Ken Whisenhunt said. "We're working hard to be a good team for our fans here. I'm really disappointed that we didn't do a better job with that."

Here are some things that stood out Sunday:

Cowboy up: Dallas scored the first 16 points, and the final score could have been worse if the Cowboys didn't have to send Dan Bailey out for

four field goals. He connected from 48, 44, 51 and 48 yards. Dallas finished with a 368-314 edge in total offense with Murray's fumble the only turnover. When the Titans pulled within 16-10 in the third quarter, Romo drove the Cowboys 80 yards and found Bryant for a 3-yard TD.

McClain having fun: Dallas linebacker Rolando McClain made a doozy of an interception, slipping his hand just under the ball in a play that fooled officials into calling it incomplete until Garrett challenged for a review that overturned the call. That cost McClain a touchdown. But the former top 10 draft pick who walked away from the NFL twice in Baltimore also had a sack and led the Cowboys with seven tackles Sunday.

"I told the coaches that all those years of playing tight end at Alabama paid off,"

McClain said. "I knew it was an interception. I just wanted to get into the end zone."

Maligned Dallas D: The Cowboys, last in total defense last season, came up with very key plays in Tennessee. They intercepted two passes, turned into 10 points, and they forced the Titans to turn the ball over on downs in the fourth quarter after having first-and-goal at the 6. The Cowboys also held the Titans to just 68 yards of offense and 8 minutes, 19 seconds of possession in the first half.

McCourty's health: Titans cornerback Jason McCourty, who had two interceptions in the opener, hurt a groin muscle and missed the second half. That left second-year cornerback Blidi Wreh-Wilson and Coty Sensabaugh helping cover Cowboys receiver Dez Bryant. Wreh-Wilson was

flagged for defensive pass interference on Bryant on a key third down, and he was on the Cowboys' receiver when he caught a 3-yard TD pass in the third quarter.

Whisenhunt said he anticipates McCourty will be OK. McCourty said he tried to go but has got to get healthy.

Whose home?: The Titans went 3-5 at home last season, and Whisenhunt wants to reclaim the home-field advantage to help this team reach the playoffs. It didn't go well as the Titans got to hear Dallas fans chanting "Let's go Cowboys" loudly in the fourth quarter.

"It was an atmosphere like I hadn't felt here since I've been here," Locker said. "It's just unfortunate to go out and play like we did ... but we can only hope the people here stick behind us."

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No respite for NFL as injuries strike

(AP) — Actual football games were supposed to provide some respite for the NFL from off-field headlines created by Ray Rice, Adrian Peterson and drug policies.

Instead, there was a rash of injuries to stars grabbing attention.

Robert Griffin III, Jamaal Charles, A.J. Green, Knowshon Moreno and DeSean Jackson were sidelined Sunday, with Griffin's injury appearing the most long-term.

RG3 dislocated his left ankle and receiver Jackson sprained his left shoulder in the first quarter. Luckily for

Washington, Kirk Cousins came in and threw for 250 yards and two touchdowns in a 41-10 romp past Jacksonville.

Griffin was carted to the locker room with his leg in a splint and could be out for two months. The quarterback will undergo X-rays to determine if the ankle is broken.

"It's an excruciating pain," Griffin said. "Anytime you look at your ankle and it's going in a strange direction, you don't want to get up."

Kansas City All-Pro running back Charles left with a left ankle injury in Denver

after being brought down in the first quarter. The Broncos won 24-17.

Green aggravated a right toe problem early in Cincinnati's 24-10 victory over Atlanta. The receiver was blanked for the first time in his three-plus pro seasons.

Moreno hurt his left elbow 11 minutes into Miami's 29-10 loss at Buffalo. The running back didn't return.

That's hardly the kind of weekend the league hoped for after all the negative news generated by the Rice and Peterson cases. Week 2 concludes Monday night with Philadelphia (1-0) at Indianapolis (0-1).

Redskins 41, Jaguars 10
Cousins subbed for Griffin and completed his first 12 passes. Ryan Kerrigan had four of the Redskins' 10 sacks, and Washington's defense didn't allow Jacksonville (0-2) past midfield until the final two minutes of the first half.

Host Washington (1-1) out-gained Jacksonville 449-148. "He's waited patiently," coach Jay Gruden said of Cousins, "and now his time is going to come to really take this thing and run with it."

Broncos 24, Chiefs 17
At Denver, Terrance Knighton batted away Alex Smith's fourth-and-goal pass to Dwayne Bowe with 15 seconds left to move the Broncos to 0-0.

The Chiefs (0-2) converted 11 of 16 third-down opportunities overall, even without Charles.

"He's a great player and you do have a number of plays in for him because of

that," coach Andy Reid said. Peyton Manning was 21 of 26 for 242 yards and three TDs.

Bengals 24, Falcons 10
At Cincinnati, running back Giovani Bernard picked up the depleted offense by running for 90 yards as the Bengals (2-0) won their home opener despite Green's absence.

Cincinnati also lost tight end Alex Smith (left biceps), right guard Kevin Zeitler (right calf), and Pro Bowl linebacker Vontaze Burfict (pinched nerve in his neck).

"I think the sky is the limit with this offense," said rookie running back Jeremy Hill, who ran for 74 yards and a touchdown. "Once we get some of those guys back, it'll be exciting."

Atlanta (1-1) allowed 472 yards.

Bills 29, Dolphins 10
The Clemson connection was decisive in lifting Buffalo (2-0): C.J. Spiller scored on a 102-yard kickoff return, and rookie receiver Sammy Watkins had a 12-yard touchdown catch.

The Bills rode the momentum of a charged-up crowd in a home opener that celebrated the franchise. The Bills paid tribute to late owner Ralph Wilson, who died in March. On Tuesday, Wilson's estate reached a "definitive agreement" to sell the team to Terry and Kim Pegula for an NFL-record \$1.4 billion.

Miami (1-1) allowed four sacks and had two giveaways.

Bears 28, 49ers 20
A downer for the 49ers (1-1) as they made their regular-season debut at Levi's Stadium by blowing a 17-0 lead.

Jay Cutler passed for three fourth-quarter touchdowns after much of Chicago's starting defense went down. The Bears left the game with five key defensive players hurt: cornerbacks Sherrick McManis (quadriceps) and Charles Tillman (triceps), defensive end Trevor Scott (foot), safety Chris Conte (shoulder) and defensive tackle Jeremiah Ratliff (concussion).

Altogether, Cutler threw three TD passes to Brandon Marshall, and also hit Martellus Bennett for the go-ahead score.

Rookie Kyle Fuller made two late interceptions.

Colin Kaepernick threw three interceptions in all and lost a fumble for the Niners (1-1).

Chargers 30, Seahawks 21
At San Diego, Antonio Gates was unstoppable with three touchdown catches. A 21-yarder in the third quarter saw the tight end split two defenders and extend for

Philip Rivers' pass, reaching out with his left hand to gather it in. Flat on his back, made the super catch.

Rivers was 28 of 37 for 284 yards for San Diego (1-1).

Defending Super Bowl champion Seattle (1-1) had the ball for less than 18 minutes.

Cardinals 25, Giants 14
Ted Ginn Jr. ran 71 yards on a punt return for a go-ahead fourth-quarter touchdown for Arizona (2-0), which was without its starting QB.

Playing in a regular-season game for the first time since 2010, Drew Stanton replaced the scratched Carson Palmer and led the Cardinals on three long scoring drives. Arizona won for the ninth time in 11 games.

Jonathan Dwyer scored on a 1-yard run and Chandler Catanzaro kicked four field goals.

Eli Manning threw two touchdowns for the host Giants (0-2), who turned over the ball four times.

Browns 26, Saints 24

At Cleveland, Billy Cundiff kicked a 29-yard field goal with 3 seconds left and the Browns (1-1) snap a nine-game losing streak in home openers.

Rookie coach Mike Pettine's first NFL win was secured when Brian Hoyer drove the Browns 85 yards in 14 plays in the final 2:46.

The Saints (0-2) took the lead on Mark Ingram's 1-yard run with 12:12 left. Drew Brees threw two touchdown passes to Jimmy Graham and moved into fourth place on the NFL's career passing list.

Packers 31, Jets 24

At Green Bay, the Packers (1-1) stormed back from an 18-point hole as Aaron Rodgers threw for three touchdowns. Jordy Nelson had a career-high 209 yards receiving, including an 80-yard TD.

Strangely, New York (1-1) appeared to tie it with about five minutes left on a 37-yard catch by Jeremy Kerley on fourth down. But someone on the sideline had called a timeout just before the snap.

Randall Cobb caught two short scoring strikes and a 2-point conversion for the Pack.

Patriots 30, Vikings 7

At Minneapolis, Tom Brady's former backup, Matt Cassel, was picked off four times. Chandler Jones returned a field goal he blocked for a touchdown right before halftime, too.

Devin McCourty, Darrelle Revis, Logan Ryan and Dominique Easley all had interceptions, setting up 17 points for the Patriots (1-1).

Star RB Peterson was deactivated by the Vikings (1-1) after a charge of child abuse was levied against him Friday in Texas.

Cowboys 26, Titans 10
At Nashville, DeMarco Murray ran for 167 yards and a touchdown and Dan Bailey kicked four field goals to ruin Ken Whisenhunt's home debut as Titans coach.

Even the beleaguered defense contributed for Dallas (1-1) with two sacks and two interceptions.

The Titans (1-1) had the ball for less than 19 minutes and allowed 26 first down while gaining half that many.

Panthers 24, Lions 7
At Charlotte, Cam Newton was back and threw for 281 yards and a touchdown. Newton, who missed the season opener with a rib injury, was 22 of 34 and overcame five sacks for Carolina (2-0).

Carolina's defense, playing without Pro Bowl defensive end Greg Hardy, had three takeaways and held the Lions (1-1) scoreless in the first half one week after Matthew Stafford and company put up 35 points against the Giants. Hardy, convicted on two counts of domestic violence on July 15, was a surprise inactive.

Stafford was sacked four times.

Texans 30, Raiders 14

At Oakland, J.J. Watt caught a 1-yard touchdown pass, Arian Foster ran for 138 yards and a score.

Defensive end Watt made his biggest impact on the opening drive as a tight end. He caught a pass from Ryan Fitzpatrick to get Houston (2-0) going.

After losing their final 14 games in a two-win season in 2013, the Texans have opened strong under new coach Bill O'Brien. And the Raiders are 0-2.

Rams 19, Buccaneers 17
At TAMPA, Greg Zuerlein's fourth field goal, a 38-yarder with 38 seconds remaining, gave the Rams (1-1) a tight win.

Austin Davis completed 22 of 29 passes for 235 yards with no interceptions in his first NFL start. Zac Stacy had a 2-yard touchdown run.

Bobby Rainey rushed for 144 yards and quarterback Josh McCown had two short TD runs for the Bucs (0-2) in a game delayed in the first half by dangerous weather.

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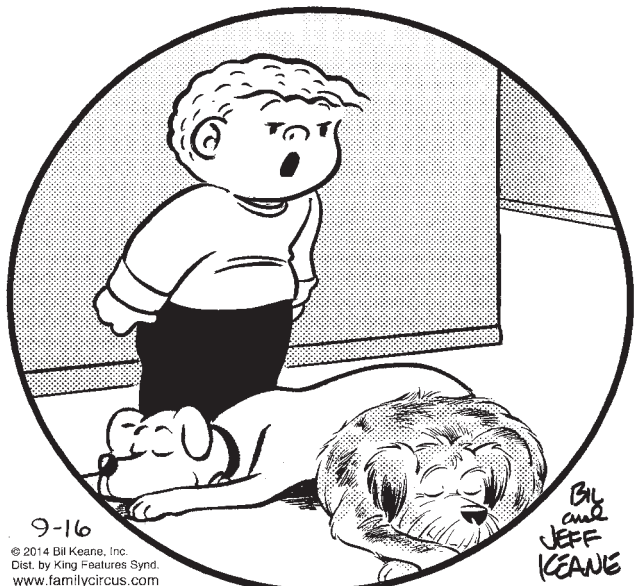
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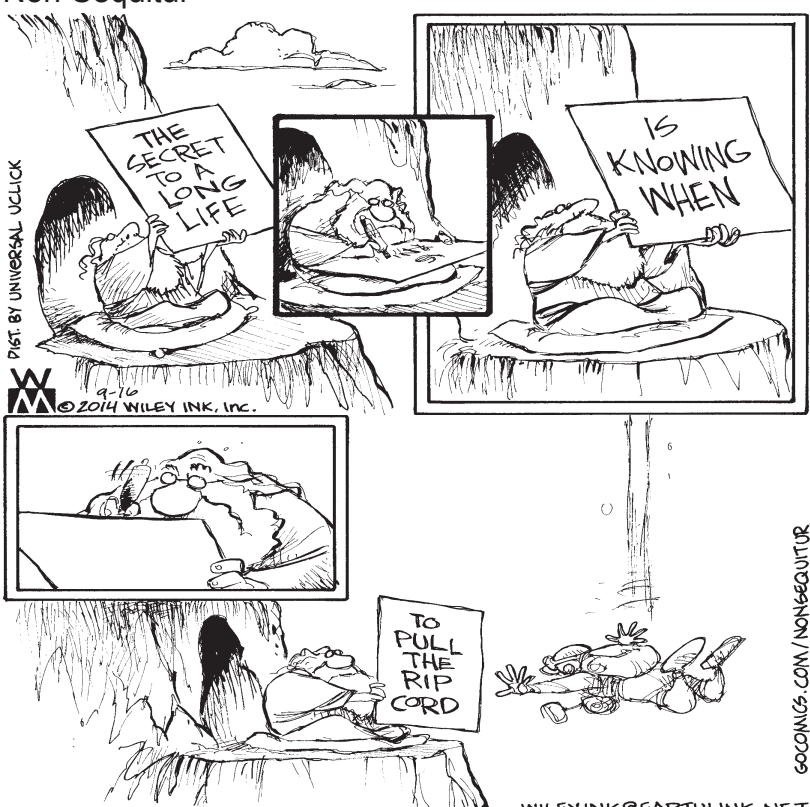

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Oklahoma CB Sanchez keeps making big plays

NORMAN, Okla. (AP) — Teams keep testing Oklahoma cornerback Zack Sanchez. He keeps making them pay. The sophomore has a pick in each of his three games this season, tying for the national lead. His interception of Tennessee quarterback Justin Worley in the end zone was a key play in the fourth-ranked Sooners' 34-10 win over the Volunteers on Saturday night. Sanchez left Oklahoma's previous game against Tul-

sa after taking a helmet to the shoulder, limiting his ability to handle contact against Tennessee. The interception was especially important to him because he felt he missed tackles while dealing with pain. "I had to make up for not being able to tackle tonight," he said. "For me to make a play like that was huge for the momentum of the defense and making up for trying to tackle with one arm. Regardless, I should have made those tackles, so I had to do something to

redeem myself." Sanchez has intercepted five passes in his past six games, and he blocked a field goal in the opener against Louisiana Tech. His run of interceptions started late last season, when he took his first career pick back 74 yards for a touchdown against Kansas State. Two games later, he intercepted Alabama's A.J. McCarron in the Sugar Bowl and returned it 43 yards. He has picks this season against Louisiana Tech, Tulsa and Tennessee.

"Maturing in the defense, maturing as a player on the field," Sanchez said. "Kind of diving into film more than I did last year and understanding route concepts and offenses a little more and how they'll attack me this year. That's the biggest thing, just growing and getting older with experience." Sanchez had two tackles against Tennessee. He got up slowly a few times after contact but fought through it. "He practiced all week,

we just didn't do any tackling drills with him," Oklahoma coach Bob Stoops said. "He's done those so much through the years that he isn't going to forget in a week. He practiced, so he was prepared to play. He will be prepared next week." Sanchez should get plenty of action Saturday when the Sooners play at West Virginia. Mountaineers quarterback Clint Trickett passed for 511 yards in a win over Maryland on Saturday, and his team ranks

fourth nationally in yards passing. Sanchez doesn't mind getting a lot of action. "Last year I didn't want to get beat deep for big plays," he said. "Now, they're kind of trying me a little more. I'm making sure I'm more technically sound against the things they do when they come at me. I feel like I've handled it pretty well. I've just got to continue to get better each week. It's always a growing thing when you're a DB."

Iowa's offense exposed in loss to Iowa State

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP) — Once again, Iowa failed to run the ball as it has in the past. But the Hawkeyes couldn't throw it either. The result was another disheartening loss to rival Iowa State and lingering questions about an offense that can't get untracked. Iowa (2-1) scored just 17 points for the second week in a row on Saturday, losing to the Cyclones by three on Cole Netten's 42-yard field goal with two seconds left. The Hawkeyes gained only 275 yards and were held without a touchdown in the second half. "To me, that seemed to be the story of the game. We did a decent job in the first half. Second half we just never got in the traction. Part of that is self-inflicted and part of that is just good play on their part," Iowa coach Kirk Ferentz said.

Iowa, which traditionally builds its offense around the running game, made a point of trying to establish the run after a pair of so-so efforts in wins over Northern Iowa and Ball State. The Hawkeyes ran on 27 of 40 plays in the first half, mostly on carries for 240-pound senior Mark Weisman and draws for quarterback Jake Rudock. The effort yielded just 70 yards. But a pair of short TD runs by Weisman and Rudock gave Iowa a 14-3 lead. The Hawkeyes rushing attack was marginally better in the second half. But that's when their passing game fell apart. Rudock finished with 146 yards passing — and just 43 in the second half — with no TDs and a pick in what was by far his worst game of the year. "We'll have to see what they were doing different. They gave us some

different looks on certain packages we had," Rudock said. Iowa's inability to scare opponents with its vertical passing game appears to be crippling its entire attack. Defenses seem to believe they load the box to stop the running game without worrying about the Hawkeyes beating them deep. Iowa couldn't make the Cyclones pay for such a strategy. Rudock's 33-yard pass to tight end Ray Hamilton was by far the longest of the day for the Hawkeyes. Rudock only completed three passes that went for more than 10 yards, and starting wideouts Tevaun Smith, Kevonte Martin-Manley and Jacob Hillyer combined for just 59 yards. Iowa now ranks 93rd nationally with 6.2 yards per passing attempt. "To me it was more of a team function, if you will. It seemed like we

were just kind of muddled there and Jake held the ball a little bit longer, and credit goes to Iowa State. They played really good team defense," Ferentz said. What makes Iowa's struggles on offense even more troubling is that, for the most part, it's a veteran group. The Hawkeyes brought back their top three receivers, their top four running backs and most of their line — and Saturday's start was the 16th in a row for Rudock. Iowa next heads to unbeaten Pittsburgh (3-0), which is allowing just 15 points a game. If the Hawkeyes don't fix their offense fast, things could get ugly in a hurry. "We got outplayed in that second half and it doesn't feel very good obviously. We'll go back (Sunday) and see if we can't improve here in the next six days," Ferentz said.

Garman leads Oklahoma St past UTSA 43-13

STILLWATER, Okla. (AP) — Daxx Garman may still be shaking off some of the rust that built up after not playing in a game for five years. Garman completed 16 of 30 passes for 315 yards and two touchdowns to help lead Oklahoma State to a 43-13 victory over Texas-San Antonio Saturday night. Making his first start since his junior year of high school in 2009, Garman was a bit more inconsistent than

he was last week, when he threw for 242 yards and two touchdowns after relieving injured starter J.W. Walsh, but still got the job done with Walsh out indefinitely. "He settled himself down, he was fine," said OSU coach Mike Gundy of Garman. "Offensively, we were kind of flat, not very good for the most part." Desmond Roland returned for Oklahoma State (2-1) after missing the previous game and ran for 95 yards


and two touchdowns on 21 carries. "I'd only played about a half this year and I was anxious to step on the field today," said Roland, who exited the Cowboys' season-opening 37-31 loss to No. 1 Florida State with an undisclosed injury. "Once the game got going, the adrenaline kicked in." For UTSA (1-2), freshman Blake Bogenschutz made his first career appearance, relieving injured

Tucker Carter to start the second half, and threw for 82 yards on 8-of-14 passing. Bogenschutz also scoring the Roadrunners' only touchdown on a 24-yard run. "He did a nice job coming in," said UTSA coach Larry Coker of Bogenschutz. "He threw the ball well, he ran the offense well and he's a true freshman so he's still learning, but he's going to be a special player, I believe."

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
