

## The Vault: A place for students and fellowship

Finding something for the kids to do after school and after athletic events is often a challenge in communities of all sizes.

When First Baptist Church in Pampa purchased what used to be a Happy State Bank property across from the church, it was originally intended for ensured parking lot use. The building has become the First Baptist Church Pampa Student Ministry Building. In a press release sent to The Pampa News, FBC describes the decision-making process into making "The Vault" out of the Student Ministry building.

"To some, it may have even been a burden, a vacant building for which no one saw the potential. But that all changed several months ago when someone saw the potential for this building to be something great for students," the press release says.

"From there the vision for what could become of this abandoned building took hold with our church and everyone was on board to see the change happen. Given the name The Vault is certainly a play on its former life as a bank, but it also is based on Psalm 119:11, our desire for students, which says 'I hidden Your Word in my heart that I might not sin against You."

Then the FBC staff thought they could use the building for services among other things.

"We are open to the public on Sundays and Wednesdays," minister of students for FBC Richard Hawthorne said. "We have had a few events in here. Some of our women have had an event in here.'

The church also decided it was more convenient for parents when they are picking their children up from

## DPS trooper seizes multiple contraband

AMARILLO - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) conducted a traffic stop Tuesday on Interstate 40, yielding 80 pounds of marijuana valued at over \$354,000 and five pounds of hashish valued at over \$56,000.


At approximately 3:47 p.m., a DPS trooper conducted a traffic stop on a 2013 Chevrolet Impala traveling eastbound on I-40, for a traffic violation, near Conway in Carson County.

The occupants of the Impala were identified as Kenneth Tilman Perkins Jr, 27, and Patrick K. Peters, 28, both of Littlerock, Ark. During the traffic stop, the trooper discovered 69 bundles of marijuana and 40 hashish candy bars.

Both occupants were placed under arrest for possession of a controlled substance, a first-degree felony, and booked into the Carson County Jail. The illegal drugs were allegedly being transported from Los Angeles, to Little Rock, Ark.







## "Bear Hunt" Activity for ages 18-24 months

### **Description:**

This activity has the children explore the Forrest for a bear in the cave.

Setup:

Bring children to group area invite them to go on a bear hunt. Explain to the children to repeat each sentence as you say the chant.

Steps:

Start tapping legs one at a time with the children. Chant:

We're going on a bear hunt. We're going to catch a big one. I'm not scared. Cause I've got my flashlight. (Pretend to hold flashlight)

Do you see what I see? (Shade your eyes with your hand) It's tall, tall tree. Can't go over it, Can't go under it, Can't go through it, I guess we'll have to

climb up it. (Pretend to climb up the tree and come back down)

\*Start over again and go through as many obstacles as you can such as tall grass (rub hands together), river (pretend to put bathing suit on and swim), mud (walk slow). You finally come to a cave. Make is as scary as you like, whisper, walk slowly, and turn on your flashlight. Pretend to see the bear. Scream and run (tap lags quickly). Go backwards through the mud, river, tall grass and up the tree back home where you can close the door and be safe from the bear.

Any semi-plausible 2016 White House candidate knows it would be the kiss of fundraising death to be caught on YouTube uttering such subversively un-American, anti-business sentiments. If you want to understand just how far to the right our politics have moved, you only have to know that the opening lines above are a direct quotation from the first annual message to Congress by our nation's first and greatest Republican president, Abraham Lincoln.

What brought Honest Abe to mind was the Federal Reserve's recent release of its Survey of Consumer Finances, done every three years, which confirmed conclusively what you probably already knew: The rich are getting ever richer, while everybody else is losing ground. Between 2010 and 2013 (remember that the Great Recession officially ended in June 2009), the median income for all American families, which has dropped every year since 2006, fell another \$2,300, down to \$46,700 a year. The only Americans whose incomes did not shrink between 2010 and 2013 were the richest 10 percent. To me, the most disheartening numbers deal with the growing concentration of the national wealth among the economic elite. The richest 3 percent of Americans controlled 44.8 percent of U.S. wealth in 1989 (right after the second term of Republican Ronald Reagan), which increased to 51.8

particular family about two years ago, but in reality, it was only nine months. I received a call during a severe thunderstorm that a friend had died. My husband and I jumped into our older hearse because the weather was question-

LEE able. We had concerns about trees uprooting in the strong winds and thought our newer hearse should stay in the garage for safekeeping. As we turned eastward out of our driveway, we could see the stop sign twisting back and forth, just as it does in the movies when a twister is touching down. As we turned onto the highway going out of town, we saw flashing lights and noticed there was a large pine tree stretching clear across the road, blocking our way.

In true military fashion, my husband refused to let a 60 foot tree across the highway stop his mission, so we drove straight over the top

of it and waved hello to the police officers as they shook their heads in disbelief. As we continued down the highway, I could see bits of trees flying in front of me, and it reminded me of the many "Storm Chaser" episodes I have watched with my children. Before we reached our destination, we passed over three very old and very large trees across the highway, and had to avoid downed power lines as well.

We arrived in safety, even though we were a little bit shaky from the experience. The storm was a strong one, and it was truly frightening. We pulled under the decedent's balcony to try to shield the back end of the hearse from the storm.

We went upstairs into the largest apartment I had ever seen, filled with the biggest and friendliest family I have ever met. They were all there, sisters, aunts, uncles, children, parents and neighbors. I have written other articles about this family because they are amazingly special. I think of all of the people I have met over the years, the parents of this family are the most charitable. They are the type of people you think about and aspire to emulate,

and that transcends down through their posterity.

The decedent's sisters greeted me one by one, giving me hugs and encouragement. The men of the family helped my husband move the decedent from her bed onto our gurney, and then they helped carry her down to the ground floor where our hearse awaited.

As the storm was finally passing over, a few of her other sisters arrived, and I was glad to see them. We decided to meet the following morning to finalize the details of her service.

In the days and events that followed the death of this special woman, I was reminded of the charity this family possesses. Throughout my experiences with them, I have never witnessed a harsh word or frowny face pass between any of them. This tolerance is an amazing feat because this family so large and when someone has died, it becomes particularly difficult to be gracious around so many emotionally charged personalities and opinions.

Recent U.S. surveys show that the U.S. taxpayers' money appropriated to "close the gap" between higher-achieving and lower-achieving students has failed to achieve this goal. Contrary to conventional wisdom, poverty is not the principal cause of the gap, but whether or not children grow up in a family with their own mom and pop compared to kids who lack that advantage.

When the famous French commentator Alexis de Tocqueville traveled the U.S. in the mid-19th century, he wrote: "There is certainly no country in the world where the tie of marriage is more respected than in America, or where conjugal happiness is more highly or worthily appreciated." Our society of nuclear families produced a prosperous middle class that was the envy of the world.

Charles Murray has pointed out that the shocking rate of illegitimate births (now 41 percent) is the most serious social and fiscal problem America faces because it is the factor that drives everything else.

It has caused the dramatic rise in government spending. The nuclear family doesn't need government busybodies to tell them how to raise their children or spend their money, but when mothers have no husband or father of their children to provide for them, they turn to Big Brother Government.

Who is responsible for killing the American family? My new book published by WorldNetDaily this month answers that fundamental question, and you may be surprised at the answer.

The perpetrators of this murder are not just the gays who have gotten so much publicity. Like the famous Agatha Christie mystery "Murder on the Orient Express," the solution was everybody on the train had a motive for killing the victim.

Many groups had a motive for wanting to abolish the American nuclear family. The feminists' rallying cry from the start was "liberation," and they meant liberation from husband, family, and care for children because, they said, taking care of small children is a demeaning occupation for an educated woman.

nuclear family. The scholar child. The liberal establishment defines "village" to include all sorts of government busybodies such as public school officials, hired consultants, psychologists, custody evaluators, women's studies courses and, especially, family court judges.

The New York Times reported that judges routinely decide where the children of divorced parents may attend school and even attend church, whether they may be homeschooled, what medical care they may receive, and even whether they play soccer or take piano lessons. The system of having family court judges make decisions about the raising of children has become so universal that, according to the U.S. Census Bureau, Family Court judges now control the private living arrangements of 46 million Americans and have the power to transfer \$40 bil-

lion between households. The rule that decisions should be made in the best interest of a child came to us from English law and clearly meant that the biological parents of a child were authorized to make decisions in the best interest of their own children. Nobody ever made any convincing scientific argument against that policy.

But now "best interest" is decided by judges. In a court decision this year, a federal appeals court even ruled that the best interest of children requires approval of same-sex marriage.

The best interest rule is totally subjective. Whether

the decision is big such as where to go church or school, or small such as whether to play baseball or soccer, there is no objective way to say which is best.

Judges call on so-called experts to advise them, but there is no scientific evidence to back up the advice that the so-called experts are well paid to give. There is nothing scientific about their advice; you would be better off listening to your grandparents

Political strategists advise candidates to stick to fiscal issues and not talk about social issues, but taxpayers' money is spent on 78 types of taxpayer handouts to deal with social problems, including 12 food programs, 12 social services, 12 educational assistance, 11 housing assistance, nine vocational training, three energy and utility assistance, school lunch and even breakfast and three child-care programs. Nothing but marriage can cut these costs.

We cannot accept what Abe Lincoln called "that eminent tribunal" to redefine our centuries-old marriage law. My book "Who Killed the American Family?" gives you all you need to expose the killers of the American family.

did they keep so many people thrown together under the stress of death from having moments of malice and discontent? They shared their secret with me. It was so simple; I do not know why other families have not thought of it as well. Their secret is so valuable that I asked if I could share it, and they said yes.

They told me that their family was no different from any other. They have little squabbles and disagreements amongst themselves. They are unique however, in that, there is one thing they do that I have never seen before, they designate a "Watcher" among themselves.

When tragedy first strikes, they all agree to treat each other with tolerance, to judge in a favorable attitude the actions of one another, and to practice impartial love in each situation that might call for such virtue. This agreement is remarkable. Secondly, if emotions surface at any event, the "Watcher" comes over and escorts anyone he deems to be near compromising these terms of cooperation off the property, no questions asked. Once they collect themselves, they are free to return, but they have to be able to rededicate themselves to their familial agreement. By the way, this is a blended family, so one expects temper flares at large gatherings.

My friend's service was beautiful and she was laid to rest with peace and tranquility beside

other family members that we have buried in the past. Her services were undisturbed by any poor behavior and were filled with cooperation and love from among her family members. I was overcome with love and respect for them, and they renewed my faith in charity.

If you are called upon to attend services, remember this family and their charity toward each other. If you have ill feelings for someone at a funeral service, hold them back and understand that this is not the proper time or place to express them. Exercise charity and your heart and well-being will grow.







## Navajo to get \$554 million in settlement with US

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz. (AP) - The Navajo Nation is poised to receive \$554 million from the federal government over mismanagement of tribal resources in Almost two-thirds of the the largest settlement of its kind for an American Indian tribe.

Much of the land on the 27,000-square-mile reservation has been leased for things like farming, grazing, oil and gas development, mining and housing.

The leases once were largely overseen by the U.S. government, which mismanaged the revenue and failed to properly invest and account for it, according to the tribe.

U.S. Interior Secretary Sally Jewell is scheduled visit Window Rock on Friday to formally recognize the settlement.


"The historic agreement strengthens the government-to-government relationship between the United States and the Navajo Nation, helps restore a positive working relationship with

The Navajo Reservation is larger than any single American Indian land base, covering sections of Arizona, New Mexico and Utah. 300,000 Navajos live on the reservation that has some of the most iconic landscapes in the Southwest and is rich in natural resources.

Public meetings will be held to ask community members they think the money should be spent, Navajo Nation Council Delegate Lorenzo Curley said. The first meeting is scheduled for October. Already, tribal members have suggested that it be set aside for future generations or used for business development, he said.

Deswood Tome, an adviser to Shelly, said the money could help with housing, water, roads, power line extensions and other infrastructure needs. "There's a critical housing shortage on the Navajo Nation," Tome said.
