City Commission to meet Monday

The Pampa City Commission will meet Monday afternoon with a number of agenda items on which to discuss and consider taking action:

• Consider approving the minutes of the Sept. 23 regular commission meeting and the Sept. 22 and 26 special commission meetings as presented.

• Consider adopting on second and final reading setting a tax rate of \$0.621027 on each \$100.00 valuation of property for the 2014-2015 fiscal year and levying an Ad Valorem Tax rate on all property subject to taxation within the City of Pampa. This tax rate will raise more taxes for maintenance and operations than last year's tax rate. the

Statewide gas price average drops two cents

IRVING – Gas prices continue their fall in the Lone Star State. The average price for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel in Texas is now \$3.15, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That is two cents less than one week ago and seven cents less than one year ago. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in Texas, drivers in El Paso are paying the most at \$3.19 per gallon while drivers in Beaumont are paying the least at \$3.09 per gallon. The national average pump price is \$3.34 which is 19 cents more than in Texas.

A little more than a week past the start of the seasonal fuel switch in many parts of the country, both the state and national averages continue to decline. This is due to decreased demand, cheaper crude oil and the cost savings associated with producing winter-blend fuel. Winter-blend gasoline is less expensive to produce, which can translate to lower prices at the pump. During the seasonal fuel transition, and barring an unexpected disrup-

prices at the pump. During the seasonal fuel transition, and barring an unexpected disruption to production or distribution, national and state averages often show steady seasonal declarations.

"Along with lower gas prices we typically see reduced prices for hotels and rental cars during the fall which make this time of year ideal for road trips to experience fall foliage and cooler outdoor temperatures," said AAA

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

Air Force sports boss: Not enough focus on respect

The department is emphasizing programs to address character issues, and administrators are working with coaches to identify and avoid recruiting athletes with character problems, Athletic Director Hans Mueh said Thursday.



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The return of king dollar

Maybe the U.S. economy, a weakling for the last six years, is finally

been paying attention, the greenback is in the midst of a rally not seen since the 1990s. It's racing past the euro, the yen and other currencies. Investors worldwide are buying the equivalent of stock in America, Inc.

If the rise in the dollar's valuation is sustainable, it's welcome news for the stock market, for fighting inflation and for U.S. growth prospects. Ronald Reagan said it best: A strong dollar is a sign of a strong America.

This has been a long time coming. And it's still too early to tell whether the trend will continue. But the dollar has rallied significantly in recent months. According to the Wall Street Journal, "the resurgent dollar has logged its longest winning streak in 17 years, rising against a broad basket of currencies for nine straight weeks.'

One immediate impact of dollar strength is that it increases the demand for U.S. stocks and bonds. But the dollar rally is also a restraint against inflation, as well as a market signal of U.S. competitiveness relative to rival nations. It's a hopeful sign that Janet Yellen and the Fed may be more effective inflation hawks in deeds — though not in rhetoric — than commonly expected.

QE ends next month. And the Fed is expected to raise its target interest rate in 2015 and beyond. In any case, most of the Fed's balance-sheet expansion went into excess bank reserves instead of circulating throughout the economy. In other words, Fed policy was never as loose as people feared.

Naturally, some will write off the bull market for dollars as merely a sign that the greenback is the least rotten apple in the barrel. But that's not giving the dollar its due. It has been gaining strength against gold, which is the best measure of dollar value. At just above \$1,200, gold has fallen back to early-January levels. And remember, gold peaked around

\$1,900 in mid-2011.

We think one key explanation for dollar strength is the amazing efficiency revolution in American business that's taken place over the last five years. U.S. companies have become the best run in the world as they've ruthlessly cut costs.

Credit also the drilling bonanza in oil and gas, which is driving down energy costs for American producers of everything from steel to auto parts to microchips to chemicals to corn.

King Dollar also is a capital magnet. We're already seeing this as foreigners flock to U.S. assets. The historical relationship is unmistakable. Periods of sustained economic growth and rising living standards are associated with a strong dollar. That was clearly true in the prosperous 1960s, 1980s and 1990s.

And while the strong dollar restrains commodity prices, it acts as a tax cut for American consumers and businesses. Gasoline, for example, is down to \$3.35 from nearly \$4. The CPI is up only 1.7 percent over the past 12 months.

A strong dollar increases the purchasing power of the greenback. So the money in your wallets and purses buys more goods and services.

Conversely, when the dollar crashed in the 1970s — especially relative to gold — the economy collapsed into a crippling stagflation. From 1999 to 2009, the dollar index dropped by almost 40 percent, with only a brief surge between 2004 and 2006. The economy and wages were sluggish at best.

The relationship between a strong currency and prosperity is lost on the many nations that adhere to the mercantilist model whereby a devalued currency supposedly gives a country a competitive edge by making exports cheaper. Japan is the classic example of this failed paradigm. Its economy has crashed in recent months thanks to higher taxes and a yen intentionally weakened to boost exports. The Japanese seem to think that the way to grow the economy is to make their citizens poorer.

Of course, numerous policy blunders Obamacare, high corporate taxes, carbon regulations, Dodd-Frank — are restraining U.S. growth and could

Bouncin' Around Wildlife in the Texas Panhandle

One evening recently I took my daily walk around the "tree streets" here in Pampa. I was walking east on 23rd street, just past Chestnut,

and saw some dark objects ahead that appeared to be going back and forth across 23rd. As I got closer, I could see that a small herd of cows had gotten out of their pasture and they were galloping across 23rd, while a few humans were trying to get the

animals back where they belonged. Just as it seemed the errant cows were going to be corralled, they turned and ran back across the street. After a few more round-ups, the cattle were finally back safely in their own field. I shared this experience with friends on Facebook, and one reply really made me appreciate the "wildlife" we can see here in our Texas Panhandle. This particular friend lives in New York City and the only "wildlife" she sees is her cat when she comes home at the end of her work day, and the pigeons that bedevil her cat through the window.

Here in the Texas Panhandle we have a nearly unobstructed view in all four directions of the compass. We can watch glorious sunrises and sunsets, and we can see storms approaching for miles. In New York City my friend sees...buildings, and maybe the occasional tree. As I've

often mentioned here, I grew up in southern California, near Los Angeles. The only "wildlife" I ever saw was the Wilson Brothers (aka The Beach Boys) and the blue heron that waddled into our yard one day, its wings too coated with oil to fly. I saw my first cows when my

grade school classes took field trips to the Pomona Fair. While living in northern Illinois I learned how to drive carefully early in the morning and late in the evening to avoid deer crossing the roads. That's about as wild an animal that ever crossed my path there outside of the zoo. In Indiana, we saw our first turkey vultures. An opossum took up residence under our neighbor's garden shed and would wander across the back yard occasionally. We could hear covotes vipping at night but rarely saw one. Most of the small animals we saw were the victims of motor vehicles.

During our short stay in Georgia, the most prolific non-human there was the insect population. There were fire ants, scorpions, carpenter bees (which look like bumble bees but are vicious little critters) and the disgusting palmetto bugs. Those bugs make the common cockroach look like a gnat. The first one I saw was the size of a Buick, and came crawling out of a rock wall as we were sitting outside eating ice cream at an ice cream shop. One of its cousins had the nerve to find its way into our house and stomped across

our hearth. I went out the next day and bought out Walmart's supply of roach traps.

And here we are in Texas, where, yes, there are some awful insects but there are also some more interesting critters. I was amazed to see a fox in our back yard one evening. I watched the antics of some meadowlarks as they hovered like little helicopters and pounced on grasshoppers in the yard. I am amazed by the Longhorn cattle, and all the different breeds of horses and cattle here. I've seen bison and either emus or ostriches. We have hawks that circle our neighborhood, and blue jays that torment our cat, Boris, when he's on the patio. This evening as I walked, a big brown tarantula skittered across my path.

The one big surprise, though, that pleases me the most is the sight of eagles here. One afternoon as we drove north on Price Road, an eagle flew across the road into a field. I just kept saying, "An eagle! It was an EAGLE!" But the most awesome sight of all was on the evening of Sept. 11 as we sat at the Pampa football field watching our grandson play football. I looked up to see not one, but two eagles soaring and circling overhead. I thought it was quite a tribute to the day, and that's something you don't see in New York City.

"Once war is forced upon us, there is no other alternative than to apply

every available means to bring it to a swift end. "War's very object is victory, not prolonged indecision."

So said

Gen. MacArthur in some of the wisest counsel the old soldier ever gave his coun-

trymen. Yet, "prolonged indecision" would seem the essence of the war the president has begun to "degrade and ultimately destroy" the Islamic State.

For, following only one night of bombing in Syria, Gen. Bill Mayville, director of operations for the Joint Chiefs, asked to estimate how long this new war would last, replied: "I would think of it in terms of years.'

Years," the general said. Yet, though we are already heavily into bombing, the president has no congressional authorization for this war in Syria.

Even Republicans are leery of voting for a war in Syria before the November elections. A third of the House GOP voted no to arming and training the

Syrian rebels. The Democrats are even more wary.

And how are we going to "destroy" ISIS when Obama has ruled out U.S. combat troops and not one NATO or Arab ally has offered to send combat troops?

Consider Turkey. With its 400,000-man army, 1,000 planes, 3,600 tanks, 3,000 artillery pieces and self-propelled guns, the Turks, the largest military power in the Middle East, could make hash of the Islamic State.

Why have they not done so?

Because Turkish President Erdogan detests President Assad of Syria and has looked the other way as volunteers, including Turks, have crossed his border into Syria to join

Up until now, this NATO ally has been a silent partner of ISIS. And, even now, Ankara has not volunteered to fight the Islamic State.

For Turkey is predominantly Sunni, and many Sunni see the Islamic State as a ruthless but effective ally against a Shia threat represented by Tehran, Baghdad, Damascus and Hezbollah.

If the Turkish army is not going to intervene in Syria against ISIS, and if Obama has ruled out U.S. boots on the ground in Iraq or Syria, where will the soldiers come from to dislodge the Islamic State from the Indiana-sized territory it

has seized? The Kurds can hold Erbil with U.S. air support. Iraq's regime, backed by its Shia militias, can hold Baghdad. But can the Iraqi army retake Fallujah, Mosul or Anbar, from which

they so recently ran away? Who are the major fighting forces in Syria who have for years been holding the line against ISIS? Answer: the Syrian army, Hezbollah troops from Lebanon, and Iranians,

backed by Putin's Russia. Denouncing the Islamic State for its beheadings of the two Americans and one British aid worker, Obama declared at the U.N.:

"There can be no reasoning — no negotiation with this brand of evil. The only language understood by killers like this is the language of force. So the United States of America will work with a broad coalition to dismantle this network of death."

Strong words, some of the strongest our Nobel Peace Prize-winning president has used in six years.

Yet, for three years, it has been NATO ally Turkey and Arab allies like Saudi Arabia and Qatar who have been clandestinely aiding this "network of death." And it has been Assad, Hezbollah, Iran and Russia that have been resisting this "network of

death.' A year ago, the American people rose up to demand that Obama and John Kerry keep us out of Syria's civil war, specifically, that they not carry out their threats to bomb the army

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





It may not surprise you to learn that a vast majority of the respondents picked the Martian. In other words, young people back in the 1970s thought it was more likely that they would encounter little green men from outer space than a little green government check with their name on

Well guess what? Those folks (who are still alive) are now all in their 60s. Not a one of them has ever seen a Martian, but almost all of them see a little green government check each month. (Well, they see a notice from their bank indicating that a Social Security check has been deposited into their account.)

I am reminded of that survey almost every day because almost every day I hear some young person tell me that they are convinced Social Security will not be there for them when they get old. I've been hearing these gloom and doom predictions for 40 years now.







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Palestinian leader in new UN bid to end occupation

estinian leader Mahmoud Abbas accused Israel on Friday of conducting a "war of genocide" and a "series of absolute war crimes" during the 50-day summer conflict in Gaza, but stopped short of saying he will pursue war crime charges against the Jewish state at the International Criminal Court.

In his speech at the U.N. General Assembly, Abbas also said he will seek a U.N. resolution to set a deadline for Israel to pull out of Palestinian lands captured in the 1967 war but did not include a threeyear deadline as his aides had

"This last war against Gaza was a series of absolute war crimes carried out before the eyes and ears of the entire world, moment by moment," Abbas said. The devastation unleashed, he said, "is unmatched in modern times."

An official in the Israeli Prime Minister's office described Abbas' statements as "a speech of incitement that is filled with lies. This is not how someone who wants peace speaks," said the official, speaking on condition of ano-

nymity in line with protocol. Israel launched thousands of airstrikes against what it said

NEW YORK (AP) — Pal- fired several thousand rockets at Israel. More than 2,100 Palestinians were killed, a large majority civilians, and some 18,000 homes were destroyed, according to U.N. figures. Sixty-six soldiers and six civilians were killed on the Israeli side.

The devastating war has weakened Abbas domestically, with his Hamas rivals enjoying a surge of popularity among Palestinians for fighting Israel.

He is under pressure at home to come up with a new political strategy after his repeated but failed attempts to establish a Palestinian state through U.S.-mediated negotiations with Israel.

His aides had said he would he would launch a new bid for a U.N. Security Council resolution to set a three-year timetable for Israel to pull out of Palestinian lands captured in the 1967 war. They added that a U.N. rejection of the Palestinian request would prompt Abbas to seek membership in international agencies, including the ICC.

That would open the door to war crimes charges against Israel for its military actions in Gaza and Jewish settlement construction on West Bank were Hamas-linked targets in land the Palestinians want for Gaza, while Gaza militants a future state



February's disaster.

While it was a loss, there was very little the Broncos could take away as a positive, despite what the

The Broncos are on a bye this week, but the offense is going to have to get clicking and quickly. They get the Arizona Cardinals after the bye and it's in Phoenix. The Cardinals have one of the more impressive secondaries in the league and also play very physical football.

For fans it's even worse, we have to live with the taste of losing to the Seahawks in our mouths for two weeks. If we did for six months, we can for eight more days.

The Broncos, as I have said before, are not the same team as they are last year, they may be a more complete team this year.

Only time will tell, but the offense needs to click badly.

isn't time yet for a family discussion because your son may be too fragile. Also, I think professional ethics prevent your son's therapist from discussing this with you. Issues like this can be complicated, and the facts may never be known.

What is most important now is for you to show your son that you love him and care about his emotional health, and while you respect his privacy, it is vital that he help himself move forward. The past cannot be changed, but it is important for his future that he find a professional with whom he CAN talk, if the therapist he has been seeing isn't helping him. Table any family discussion about this until your son is stronger.
