Editor's note: This story from The Pampa News was originally published on June 29, 2013. Then sports editor John Lee sat down with Roy "Deck" Woldt for more than an hour at the White Deer Land Museum. Woldt passed away on Dec. 25, 2014. The Pampa News, with permission from Woldt's family, is re-running this article to remember Woldt.

It was the 1950s.

The air is turning warm and sodas and conies are still the top selling products at drive-ins across the country. World War II is a decade in the past and the country is barely flirting with the idea of military engagement with Vietnam. Rock n' roll icon Elvis Presley is swaying his hips and America's movie sweetheart, Marilyn Monroe, is infatuating men across the world. The NFL hadn't become what it is today and NBA had barely started a decade earlier. Baseball was still America's top sport.

1939. Aside from a hiatus during World War II from 1942-1946, the Oilers provided the residents of Pampa with a baseball team from 1939 to 1957, including championship seasons in 1946, 1954 and 1955. Roy "Deck" Woldt, who played on the team from 1950-1955, is the last known Pampa Oiler baseball player alive.

Woldt got his nickname from the glove that his father gave him and he used to wear all the time when we was younger. Woldt played for the Oklahoma City Indians, a AA minor league affiliate of the Cleveland Indians, before coming over to the Pampa Oilers. The Pampa Oilers name, by the way, was chosen in a contest held by the owners of the Oilers and ran in the Pampa newspaper at

Here in Pampa, Texas the boys of summer are hitting the field as the Pampa Oilers, a baseball club started in the time. An elderly lady had chosen the name "Oilers" for the team. Woldt shared some of his knowledge about how the team got started.

#### Danziger's own team

"The team evolved from Danziger Oil Company, who hired players to work for their company," Woldt said. "That was part of their job. They played in kind of a semi-pro league with other teams in their area. That's another thing that has changed. Back before

## Five - and a half - things we won't forget about Rick Perry

When Gov. Rick Perry leaves office next month, he'll wrap up a three-decade stretch in state elective office that concluded with his being the longest-serving governor in



Texas history. Perry's 14-year tenure in the state's highest office

coincided with the evertightening grip of Republican rule, sweeping conservative reforms and more than a few controversies. It was also marked by

unprecedented population growth and an enviable economic expansion in

Texas. The state led the nation in job creation during Perry's reign, and it added more people than any other state between 2000 and 2010 — numbers that continue to grow.

From his first legislative session as governor in 2001, when Perry shocked the political establishment with a record 83 vetoes, to his final days in office, when he used rare emergency powers to send National Guard troops to the state's border with Mexico, the ruggedly handsome farm boy from West Texas signaled early and often that he would cut a unique and flashy trail through the state's political countryside.

Boiling down Perry's legacy into a few bullet points isn't easy and will undoubtedly leave supporters and detractors alike unsatisfied.

But memories fade, and not every event that seems newsworthy today will stand out in the history books or become part of the state's collective political memory. (And there could be a new set of mileposts on a future legacy tour if Perry runs for president again — a move he is currently considerıng.)

With those caveats, here are five — and a half — things people will probably remember years after Perry has left the Texas Governor's Mansion.

#### 1. Longevity

When Perry hands over power to Gov.elect Greg Abbott on Jan. 20, he will have served 5,144 days in office, making the previous records seem puny and insignificant. Gov. Allan Shivers, who took over after Gov. Beauford Jester died in 1949, previously held the distinction as the longest continuously serving governor with a mere seven-and-a-half years in office, back when the terms lasted only two years.

Bill Clements, elected in 1978 as the first Republican governor since Reconstruction, was the first to serve two full fouryear terms, but they were not consecutive. In 1998, George W. Bush became the first governor to win two consecutive four-year terms, but he left for Washington halfway through the second one.

Perry, who had been elected lieutenant governor when Bush won his second term, was sworn into office as the 47th Texas governor on Dec. 21, 2000, and he went on to win three consecutive four-year terms. He has used the longevity to wield power with an increasingly tight fist.

At last count, Perry had made more than 8,000 appointments, allowing him to put his conservative stamp on every corner of state government — all from a perch that the state's founding fathers, suspicious of centralized authority, intentionally weakened.

Perry championed sweeping curbs on lawsuits, some of the most stringent abortion limits in the nation, the strictest voter ID statute in the country, a constitutional ban on gay marriage and steep cuts to programs once seen as sacrosanct, including public education and women's health programs.

People crossed Perry at their peril, whether they were appointees who dared support a political challenger or lawmakers who opposed his legislative program. Jim Henson, a Texas Tribune pollster and director of the Texas Politics Project at the University of Texas at Austin, said Perry expanded the powers of the governor's office "in a way that is certainly not contemplated in the Texas Constitution nor really in the political culture of the state."

"I think Perry really learned how to use the office," he said.

#### 2. The Texas miracle


The most appropriate use of the word "miracle" in relation to Texas is in the eyes of the beholder.

But any governor in America would be happy to boast, as Perry has, about the kind of economic expansion Texas has experienced in the last decade or so.

From 2003 to 2013, Texas produced a third of the net new jobs in America. It has though. been the top exporting state for the last 12 years in a row, and recently Texas surpassed California as the top exporter of technology, according to the TechAmerica Foundation

Under Perry, Texas has been given top honors five times for corporate reloca-

tions by Site Selection magazine, and the governor credits the state's pro-business policies — including millions in tax subsidies used to entice companies such as Toyota to set up its American headquarters here — as a major factor driving the boom.

Detractors note that the cora tiny percentage of the jobs Texas has created and say the state — brimming with shale oil — would rank as a major employment center no matter who was governor.

Don't expect that, or anything else, to stop Perry from bragging about the Texas Miracle anytime soon,



### Two men open fire at Los Angeles police car

Two men opened fire on a police car patrolling a tough part of Los Angeles but the two officers inside were not injured as one returned fire for the second man but he and a suspect was arrested, authorities said Monday.

The shooting occurred amid heightened tensions over attacks on police elsewhere in the country after grand juries decided against indicting officers in the killings of unarmed black men.

Police officials did not say if they had determined a motive for the Sunday night shooting in South Los Angeles — an area plagued by gang violence — but said turned fire as the men fled. there were no indications it

### For Obama, high ambitions, less power to achieve

WASHINGTON (AP) - It minimum wage, universal pre- policy by pundits in Washingwas intended as a joke. "Are you still president?" comedian Stephen Colbert asked Barack Obama earlier this month.

But the question seemed to speak to growing weariness with the president and skepticism that anything will change in Washington during his final two years in office. Democrats already are checking out Obama's potential successors. Emboldened Republicans are trying to push aside his agenda in favor of their own.

At times this year, Obama seemed ready to move on as well. He rebelled against the White House security "bubble," telling his Secret Service detail to give him more space. He chafed at being sidelined by his party during midterm elections and having to adjust his agenda to fit the political interests of vulnerable Democrats who lost anyway.

Yet the election that was a disaster for the president's party may have had a rejuvenating effect on Obama. The morning after the midterms, Obama told senior aides, "If I see you moping, you will answer to me.

People close to Obama say he is energized at not having U.S. back into military conflict to worry about helping — or in the Middle East. The unhurting — Democrats in another congressional election on his watch. He has become more comfortable with his executive powers, moving unilaterally on immigration, Internet neutrality and climate change in the last two months. And he sees legacy-building opportunities on the international stage, from an elusive nuclear deal with Iran to normalizing relations with Cuba after a half-century freeze. "He gained some clarity for the next two years that is liberating," said Jay Carney, Obama's former press secretary Still, pillars of Obama's second-term agenda — gun control, raising the federal about criticism of his foreign

The Yes-We-Can man is entering a twilight of maybes, his presidency still driven by high ambitions but his power to achieve them running out.

Before the midterm election results arrived, Obama's advisers say, the president realized he would finish his presidency with Republicans running Capitol Hill. He concluded the status quo would mean more gridlock.

Indeed, 2014 had been another year of fits and starts for a White House that has struggled to find its footing in Obama's second term.

The feeble HealthCare.gov website stabilized, but scandal enveloped the Veterans Affairs Department. Syria got rid of its chemical weapons, but a violent extremist group pulled the employment rate fell, but so did Obama's approval ratings to the lowest levels of his presidency. Nearly two dozen White House officials, former Obama aides, presidential historians and political analysts discussed Obama's standing as he closes his sixth year in office, some on the condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to publicly discuss their conversations with the president or his top advisers.

Obama is realistically optimistic about what he can get done over the next two years, advisers say. Yet the president is forging ahead as something of an isolated figure. Congressional Democrats are increasingly willing to go against him. And in the West Wing, Obama's

The trio of political gurus who helped direct his presidential campaigns — David Axelrod, Robert Gibbs and David Plouffe — have moved on. And former chief of staff Rahm Emanuel is now the mayor of Chicago. Other longtime aides are eyeing exits. Bringing in fresh talent is getting harder.

Obama is trying to branch out. He started keeping his version of a bucket list: the names of authors, business leaders, innovators and others he wants to bring to the White House for a private lunch or dinner. Those who have visited include inventor and business tycoon Elon Musk, historian Doris Kearns Goodwin and AT&T CEO Randall Stephenson, a major Republican donor.

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

### Rodeo cowboy legend Alvin Nelson dies in Minnesota

WATFORD CITY, N.D. prize money, number of (AP)—Rodeo cowboy legend Alvin Nelson, a member of half a dozen halls of fame and North Dakota's only world champion saddle bronc rider for 24 years, has died. He was 80.

Nelson, of Grassy Butte, died Dec. 23 at a hospital in Rochester, Minnesota, according to Fulkerson Funeral Home. His funeral is scheduled for Wednesday in Watford City, North Dakota. Nelson won the saddle

bronc world championship in 1957 at Madison Square Garden in New York. He qualified for five Wrangler National Finals Rodeos, winning the saddle bronc riding average at the finals in 1961 and 1962, and also the all-around title in 1961 in Dallas.

Nelson told the Minot Daily News in 2004 that he remembered his 1957 title well.


"The rodeo lasted three weeks in September, and at that time, it was the world's largest rodeo according to

spectators and the number of contestants," he said as he was preparing to be inducted into the ProRodeo Hall of Fame.

"There were eight rounds. I split third and fourth on the first horse, won the second round, split first and second in the last two rounds to win \$4,234," he said. "This was the most money ever won in the saddle bronc riding at any one rodeo at the time, and this record stood until 1980."

Nelson was a member of the "six pack," a group of North Dakota bronc and bull riders who dominated the rodeo circuit in the 1950s. He is a member of two national rodeo halls of fame, as well as halls of fame in North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska and Montana. He was a native of Mobridge, South Dakota.

The Army veteran will be buried in Grassy Butte Cemetery with military honors.



### No mailing it in as Cowboys top Redskins 44-17

LANDOVER, Md. (AP) — There was no mailing it in, no resting the starters. This edition of the Dallas Cowboys had worked too hard to end the regular season with another clunker, even if the result had no bearing on the playoff picture.

The Cowboys played to win and did so emphatically, beating the Washington Redskins 44-17 Sunday to cap a 12-4 season that firmly puts to rest the 8-8s of the last three vears.

"I think for a core group of us that kind of took it on the chin for the last three years, we knew we had to go do it," tight end Jason Witten said. "And it wasn't about anybody else but us and going and proving that."

The Cowboys will host the Detroit Lions (11-5) next Sunday in the wild-card round, their first playoff appearance since 2009. There had been a slim chance of a first-round bye had other results on Sunday gone their way, but they'll more than settle for a 4-0 December in which they won every game by double digits

Owner Jerry Jones told a story

from his childhood when asked about his team's recent late-season miseries. He said when he spilled something his father would say: "Jerry, you're going through the clumsy stage" — even if it was only an isolated incident and not any worse than anything he had done previously. It's hard, he concluded, to break a reputation.

"When you get those characteristics of faltering or fading in December, there's not but one way to cure it," Jones said. "It's when you need to grow right before people's eyes. Now this one should be in the vision of a lot of fans and media for a long time to come: Right before peoples' eyes, we have basically torn it up in December.'

Here's more to know about Dallas' biggest win in the Cowboys-Redskins rivalry in 11 years:

RECORDS FOR DeMARCO & DEZ: DeMarco Murray ran for 100 yards and one touchdown on 20 carries to break Emmitt Smith's franchise single-season rushing mark. Murray ends the season with 1,845 yards, bettering Smith's 1,773 in 1995. Murray passed Smith during a 32-yard first-quarter run that included a nice change-of-direction in front of safety Ryan Clark.

It was also Murray's 12th 100-yard game this season, breaking another team mark held by Smith.

Also in the first quarter, Dez Bryant caught scoring passes of 65 and 23 yards to give him 16 touchdown receptions on the season, breaking Terrell Owens' team record of 15 set in 2007. The 65-yarder was a screen in which Bryant juked cornerback David Amerson at the line of scrimmage and took off for the end zone.

ROMO'S MONTH: Tony Romo completed 22 of 34 passes for 299 yards with two touchdowns and one interception. For the month, he completed 75 percent with 12 touchdowns and one interception, and his 114.4 season passer rating is sixth best in NFL history.

SMOOTH ROAD: The Cowboys became the sixth team with an 8-0 regular-season road record since the NFL adopted a 16-game schedule in 1978. Four of the other five advanced to the Super Bowl.

"We all know the history. It's a 0-0 tournament right now," coach John Harbaugh said after Sunday's 20-10 win over Cleveland "We've been on the road plenty of times in the playoffs as a group. We're as dangerous as anybody else, at least."

To qualify, the Ravens (10-6) needed to beat the Browns (7-9) and San Diego had to lose to Kansas City. That is precisely what happened, and now Baltimore is back in the postseason after missing out in 2013.

The Ravens open Saturday night in Pittsburgh.

"It feels good," said quarterback Joe Flacco, whose two fourth-quarter touchdown passes brought the Ravens back from a 10-3 deficit. "I remember sitting at home last year, a week from now, and it didn't feel very good."

The Browns, on the other hand, will have a long offseason to ponder what went wrong follow-ing a promising 7-4 start.

Öwner Jimmy Haslam said coach Mike Pettine and general manager Ray Farmer "absolutely" will return next season. Between now and then, Pettine will have to straighten out some personnel issues, most notably the questionable behavior of rookie quarterback Johnny Manziel,

"Being a rookie quarterback, I knew they were going to pin their ears back and bring some heat," Shaw said. "For the most part, I thought we handled it well. There were just a couple times where it was a coverage sack. When they put us in a third-and-long situation, it puts us in a bad spot."

VOTE OF CONFI-DENCE: Pettine finished his first season at the Browns' helm with a 7-9 mark, and though there are question marks aplenty as heading into another offseason, safety Jim Leonhard thinks Cleveland has found a solution at head coach.

"Mike Pettine is the right coach to lead this team," Leonhard said after the final game of his 10-year NFL career. "Early on, we really turned things around. None of us wanted the season to end like this. Nobody is more upset about this than he is. This is the guy that will make this program get better."

NGATA ON DECK: The four-game suspension of Ravens defensive tackle Haloti Ngata ended Sunday, and Baltimore expects its exceptional run-stopper to start in Pittsburgh.

Ngata was suspended by the NFL for using the amphetamine Adderall without a prescription.

"I'm confident Haloti will be ready to go," Harbaugh said. "That's his job, to be ready to go. I'm confident he'll do it. He has done it before. He has been there; he knows what's at stake. '

Rookie Timmy Jernigan, who replaced Ngata over the past month, hurt his foot Sunday and will have an MRI on Monday rookie cornerback Justin to determine his status for the playoffs. "It's very unfortunate about Timmy Jernigan, but he's young," line-backer Terrell Suggs said. "But it's great to get my brother back, to (get) one of the leaders of this team back. That's huge for us." PLAYING ILL: Though he was cleared to play after a shoulder injury, Browns defensive back Joe Haden battled flu-like symptoms to make three tackles Sunday. 

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
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

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# Police boss urges more dialogue, less rhetoric

more dialogue" to defuse the tension between police officers and the population they protect.

Commissioner William Bratton, speaking on NBC's "Meet The Press" on Sunday, a day after the funeral for one of two police officers gunned down in their patrol car, said the "pent-up frustrations" that have caused people to take to the streets in recent weeks go far beyond policing policies across the nation.

"This is about the continuing poverty rates, the continuing growing disparity between the wealthy and the poor. It's still about unemployment issues. There are so many national issues that have to be addressed that it isn't just policing, as I think we all well know," he said.

Bratton said rank-and-file officers and much of America's police leadership feels under attack, including "from the federal government at the highest levels.

He urged: "See us. See the police. See why they have the anxieties and the perceptions they have."

Bratton also appeared on CBS' "Face the Nation," where he defended Mayor Bill de Blasio, saying it was wrong for hundreds of police officers to turn their backs to a video monitor outside a Queens church as de Blasio spoke at the funeral of Officer Rafael Ramos.

"I certainly don't support that action," he said. "That funeral was held to honor Officer Ramos. And to bring politics, to bring issues into that event, I think, was very inappropriate."

Some police officers blame de Blasio for creating an atmosphere of negativity toward the New York Police Department in the city after a grand jury declined to charge an officer in the police chokehold death of Eric Garner on Staten Island.

Bratton acknowledged that the morale of officers is low and said their actions "unfortunately" reflected the feelings of some toward the mayor.

The gesture at Ramos' funeral came amid contentious contract negotiations with the city. The rankand-file police union did not claim credit for the symbolic protest, and its head, Patrick Lynch, repeatedly dodged reporters' attempts to ask about it after Ramos' funeral.

It was not clear if officers planned to turn their backs on de Blasio again at a service next weekend for Ramos' partner, Officer Wenjian Liu. His funeral is set for Sunday at a Brooklyn funeral home, after a viewing Saturday.

The silent protest was a continuation of the defiance shown at a hospital after the officers' slayings on Dec. 20, when Lynch and others turned their backs on de Blasio. Lynch said the mayor had "blood on his hands.'

Bratton said de Blasio was "totally supportive" of

After Bratton, former Mayor Rudolph Giuliani told the CBS program that it was wrong for officers to turn their backs on de Blasio or to try to blame him for officers' deaths.

But he also said de Blasio should apologize to the police department because he "created an impression with the police that he was on the side of the protesters.'

"Say you're sorry," Giuliani urged.

De Blasio stayed out of sight Sunday, staging no public events and continuing to let Bratton hold center stage in the week since the double murder.

The five city police unions will meet with Bratton

Ramos and his partner, Wenjian Liu, were shot to death as they sat in their patrol car in daylight. After the officers' deaths, the gunman, Ismaaiyl Brinsley killed himself. Police said he was troubled and had shot and wounded an ex-girlfriend in Baltimore earlier that day.

In online posts shortly before the attack, Brinsley referenced the killings of two black men by white police officers.

Bratton said the department had recently investigated more than 50 reports of threats against officers, closing out over half of them with nine arrests, and had warned officers to be alert to potential dangers. More than 20,000 officers attended Ramos' funeral, along with Vice President Joe Biden.



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
