A year later, Dr. Robert Riza continues to elevate Clarendon College

■ With 13 months under his belt, Dr. Riza is excited about upcoming future for CC.

When Dr. Robert Riza took over as president of Clarendon College in late 2013, there we some needed changes at both campuses.

Dr. Riza was born and raised in Cleburne, outside of the Dallas-Fort Worth, and graduated high school in 1986 and went to Texas Tech.

"But I didn't take care of business. I returned to Hill College (in Cleburne). I am a product of community college," Dr. Riza said. "Just like so many of our other students who go off and have a little too much fun their first year out of school and return to us. I found a caring faculty, and smaller numbers in the classroom with more interaction and more attention. That's the same thing we have here."

Zach Thomas selected to College Football Hall of Fame

DALLAS (AP) — Former Texas Tech linebacker, and Pampa native, Zach Thomas along with Ohio State coach Jim Tressel and Kansas State coach Bill Snyder has been selected for induction to the College Football Hall of Fame.

The National Football Foundation announced the latest Hall of Fame class of 15 players and two

Heisman Trophy winner Ricky Williams of Texas and Oklahoma linebacker Brian Bosworth were also selected.

Tressel was 106-22 in 10 seasons as coach of Ohio State, including a national championship in 2002. He was forced to resign after the 2010 season after he withheld information from the school and NCAA about possible violations by some of his players, who traded memorabilia and equipment for tattoos. The NCAA imposed a five-year show cause order on Tressel that would open up a school to possible sanctions

if it hired him as a coach. That order ends September 2016.

"I am forever indebted to the outstanding student-athletes and coaches that have made this moment possible," Tressel said in a statement released through Youngstown State, where he is now the university president.

Tressel's father, who went 155-52-6 at Baldwin-Wallace from 1958-73, was inducted in 1996

"To join the same hall of fame that my father, Dr. Lee J. Tressel, is already a member, is so, so meaningful," Tressel said.

Tressel also coached 15 seasons at Youngstown State, winning four Division I-AA national titles. He is the only coach to win national championship at both levels of Division I. He was named president of Youngstown State on May 9, 2014. Snyder orchestrated one of the

greatest turnarounds in college football history at Kansas State, which had lost more football

games than any program when he took over in 1989. He turned the Wildcats into a Big 12 power and a national title contender with seven double-digit victory seasons in a span of nine years.

He retired after the 2005 season, but returned in 2009 and has not had a losing season since. In 23 seasons with Kansas State, Snyder is 187-94-1. He was eligible for induction while still active because he turned 75 last year.

Williams won the Heisman in 1998 and left Texas as the leading career rusher in FBS with 6,279 yards. He currently ranks second behind Wisconsin's Ron Dayne.

Bosworth was a two-time Butkus Award winner (1985 and 1986) as the nation's best linebacker, helping the Sooners win three straight Big Eight titles and the 1985 national title. He was also one of the most controversial characters in college football history. He billed himself as The Boz, wore his hair







Fidel Castro rumors sweep Internet, but no sign in Cuba

HAVANA (AP) — Social was no sign Friday that the reports were true, even if the 88-year-old former Cuban leader has not been seen in public for months.

Similar speculation has swept across Cuban expatriate communities repeatedly over the decades, particularly after a serious illness forced him to step down from duties as president in 2006, handing over leadership to his younger brother Raul.

The new wave was prompted in part by Fidel Castro's failure to comment after the U.S. and Cuba declared on Dec. 17 that they would move to restore full diplomatic relations broken a half century ago.

The chatter appeared to pick up when some media noted Thursday that Castro had not been seen in public in a year. He last appeared on Jan. 8, Havana, ending nine months for mourning. out of public view.

The most recent official phomedia around the world have tographs of Castro came out of been flooded with rumors of a private meeting with Venezu-Fidel Castro's death, but there elan President Nicolas Maduro on Aug. 21. He was also photographed with the Chinese and Russian presidents in July. Castro was last heard from on Oct. 18, when he published an editorial about Ebola.

> By Friday, Cuba-related Twitter accounts were ablaze with speculation, fueled in large part by reports on news websites such as Diario de Cuba and Diario las Americas that Cuba had scheduled a news conference, possibly to discuss Castro's health.

The rumors were further stoked when respected Italian newspaper Corriere Della Sera reported on its website that Castro had died. It quickly pulled the report back, how-



pampaisd.net). In addition to all of the regular operations of the school district, staff, parents and even students will want to keep up with the activities of the 84th Texas Legislature which is set to begin next Tuesday

(Jan. 13) in Austin. Education figures are sure to be a prominent topic in this session, as members of the Texas Senate and House of Representatives plan for the next biennium. While it is widely speculated that the actual school funding formula will not be examined by the legislature in this session due to an appeal of school finance litigation to the Texas Supreme Court, financial issues such as the instructional materials allotment, the transportation allotment, systemic changes to the Texas Teacher Retirement System may be addressed. Other topics, such as standardized testing in grades 3-8, continued implementation of new graduation requirements, school calendars, accountability system changes and decisions related to the possible expansion of choice options for students and parents will certainly be addressed this session. All of these items will combine to determine the portion of the overall state budget that is dedicated to public education. Many resources are available for tracking legislative activity, but an excellent place to start is www.capitol. state.tx.us.



From 2000 to 2011 it was my home connection to the Internet. I would

open the EarthLink program on my "gumdrop" iMac — an early 2000s model that came in five choices

of yummy colors — I'd hear the tones of the a phone number dialing itself and the screech of my modem as it connected (or sometimes merely attempting to connect) to another modem hundreds of miles away.

I would watch the computer screen in anticipation as my new emails would start downloading. Damn! More spam. I need to set the spam filter higher. Still no response on that 75K-a-year job I applied for as a copy editor at that English-language newspaper in Dubai. Oops. Maybe it went into junk mail because I set the filter too high. Nope. I guess they weren't impressed with my stellar resume and page design

After 14 years of be-

ing a loyal subscriber to EarthLink, my service will end on Jan. 19 or 20. Why pay for a service that seems 10 years behind the times when Gmail is free and better? Plus, also for free with a Google account you get Google Docs, Google Calendar, Google ... whatever.

I nearly canceled EarthLink in 2011 when I moved from Florida to Arizona. I bought an Android phone that needed a Gmail address to operate. I was talked out of nixing EarthLink by a sweetly voiced service rep with an Indian accent. I'm a sucker for women with foreign accents.

She told me if I no longer needed EarthLink for the dial-up service, which cost \$20 a month, I could switch to the webmail-only service for \$5 a

That sounded like a fair deal. And, after agreeing to stay with EarthLink, I realized I would have been hasty in my decision to cancel the service because it was my only way to correspond with a lot of people and/or organizations, such as my Aunt Mary, now deceased, and

the National Bone Marrow Registry.

Canceling EarthLink would have meant canceling them.

However, little by little over the past three years I have replied to emails sent to me through EarthLink from the Gmail account while transferring shopping sites like Amazon and Walmart. com over to Gmail.

Two recent events brought me to my final decision to deorbit Earth-

First, about three months ago they raised the annual subscription fee for web mail from \$5 to \$8. Second, in early December my eBay account got hacked, and, according to a message from eBay, my EarthLink account may have been hacked as well because it was associated with my eBay account. I changed my EarthLink password at the same time I changed the one for eBay.

Eight dollars a month to let hackers get into my email account and sell bogus smartwatches under my name? I don't think so.

Instead of canceling EarthLink in haste, as

I almost did in 2011, I decided to make sure that when the umbilical cord was cut, there was absolutely nothing I would

still need from EarthLink You see, over the years I had used my EarthLink account as a kind of, sort of "cloud" — storing resumes, photos and special, sentimental emails from friends and family.

I would sometimes send emails to myself just so I could store them online.

One by one I forwarded all of these emails to my Gmail account and created a new folder just for them. Now I have all my special emails stored in a safe place.

Along with that, I do have an account on a real cloud service, Dropbox. Clouds are a secure place to store anything from photos, resumes to scans of important documents like car titles and birth certificates.

But I know in my heart the first time I try to log onto EarthLink and nothing happens, I will feel a bit sad. A part of me that existed for 14 years will slip into the cybervoid.



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



NEW YORK (AP) — Need to accept credit cards for your small business? You have more reader options than ever. Online retailers Amazon and Etsy are the latest companies to offer the devices, which plug in to smartphones and tablets and let business owners accept credit cards anywhere. They join established players such as Square and Inuit GoPayment.

The card readers work the same: They take a percentage of each transaction when a card is swiped, usually about 3 percent. They charge more if the card needs to be manually typed in, instead of swiped. Most work on Apple's devices and those that use Google's Android operating system.

Here's a look at some of the players:

Help your home's exterior rebound from harsh winter weather

The seasons can be harsh on homes, and perhaps no season is more taxing on a home's exterior than winter. Harsh winter weather can take a toll on roofs, gutters, landscaping, and just about any other part of the home that must face the cold head-on. The following are a few areas of your home that might need some help rebounding from winter now that spring has finally arrived.

Gutters: Gutters are vulnerable to winter weather, as strong winds may blow debris into the gutters or even blow the gutters off of the house. Gutters should be cleaned prior to and immediately after winter to ensure they're working properly and not backing up to the point that water can build up and damage the roof. Reattach any loose gutters and clear them of any debris left behind by winter winds.

Roof: The roof is another area of your home's exterior that may have been beaten down over the winter. Examine the roof for cracked, missing or deformed shingles that can allow water to enter a home and damage its interior. Some roof damage is visible from the ground, but homeowners who just endured especially harsh winters may want to climb up on their roofs or hire a professional to get a closer look. Another way to determine if the roof was damaged is to go into your attic and check for water damage near roof trusses. Water damage indicates something went awry

Walkways and driveways: Heavy snowfall or significant accumulation of ice over the winter can result in cracked or damaged walkways, driveways and porches. Some of this damage may have resulted from aggressive shoveling or breaking up of ice. Look for any cracks in areas that needed shoveling over the winter, as such cracks can be safety hazards and may even prove to be entry points into your home for water or critters.

· Landscaping: Landscaping also tends to take a hit in areas that experience harsh winters. Winter storms may damage trees, which can put a home right in the line of falling limbs or worse. Walk around your property to inspect for tree damage, removing any fallen limbs or cutting down any limbs that appear dead or that might eventually prove a safety hazard. In addition, check the grass for any dead spots that might have fallen victim to winter freeze, and address those spots when the time comes to revitalize

Appliances: When surveying your property after a long winter, inspect appliances like a central air conditioning unit or even dryer vents to make sure they made it through the winter unscathed. Such appliances may have proven an attractive nesting spot for animals over the winter, but damage can be significant if vermin or other animals seek shelter from winter weather inside appliances.

How to reduce greenhouse gas emissions at home

Greenhouse gases are gases in the atmosphere that absorb and emit radiation. 

If your community sponsors a recycling program, simply separate recyclable items from the rest of your trash and leave them out on the curb on designated pickup days. 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This loophole should be closed

Q: I am a lawyer who is still working. I currently make about \$250,000 per year. My income has always been high, so I will get the maximum Social Security benefit when I turn 66 in a few months. I was married to my first wife for 15 years, but we divorced way back in 1989. I remarried, but that marriage only lasted five years and also ended in divorce. So I am currently unmarried. My first wife remarried a long time ago and has been married to her second husband ever since. She just turned 70. She is a rather successful real estate agent in southern California and makes a six-figure income. After all these years, we are still friendly and talk occasionally. She told me that at age 66, she filed for wife's benefits on her husband's Social Security record. Then last month when she turned 70, she filed for her own retirement benefits and got the bonus everyone talks about. I went to a Social Security maximizing seminar and was told that I can claim divorced husband's ben-



efits on my ex-wife's record and delay my benefits until 70 and also get the bonus? Frankly, this almost seems too good to be true. Can I do this?

A: Yes you can. But if you ask me, it should be too good to be true! In my opinion, your situation is a classic example of what is wrong with the Social Security maximizing rules that allow folks like you and your ex-wife to jump through loopholes in the law that should have been closed a long time ago.

Before I continue my rant, let me explain to some of my possibly confused readers what it is going on in your case. Both you and your exwife are taking advantage of an unintended but totally legal rule that allows people who are at least 66 years old to forego their own retirement benefits and instead collect Social Security spousal benefits from a husband's or wife's (or ex-husband's or exSocial Security

therefore get a delayed retirement bonus of 32 monthly Social Security retirement checks.

As I've written many times in past columns, what I don't like about this rule is that it goes against some of the basic tenets of Social Security. When Congress set up spousal benefits in 1939, they said those benefits should be paid to a financially dependent on the primary wage-earning spouse. They even establishing dependency. Commissioner Brannan lowers maintenance tax rate to start 2015

AUSTIN — Texas Workers' Compensation Commissioner Ryan Brannan has determined, pursuant to Texas Labor Code Section 403.003, that the maintenance tax rate be lowered to 1.533 percent of gross premiums collected by workers' compensation insurance carriers from January 1, 2014, through December 31, 2014.

The maintenance tax supports the operations of the Division of Workers' Compensation and the Office of Injured Employee Counsel. The tax rate has been lowered in four out of the last five years.

"Texas' robust economy and stable workers' compensation system have resulted in significantly lower insurance rates for Texas employers, which encourages employers to purchase workers' compensation coverage for their employees," Commissioner Brannan said. "The Division of Workers' Compensation continues to do its part to keep insurance coverage affordable for employers while ensuring employees receive the benefits they are entitled to under the Texas Workers' Compensation Act."

The maintenance tax rate applies to insurance companies writing workers' compensation policies in Texas, and is capped at two percent of gross premiums collected by those companies. Certified self-insured and group self-insured employers also pay maintenance taxes based on the previous year's claim liabilities and
