The couple have been in business for more than four years serving from their truck.

Two city commission chairs up for election

■ Potential candidates can file starting Jan. 28.

While governor-elect Greg Abbott will be taking his oath to run the state of Texas in a week or so, the City of Pampa, as well as other Texas cities, will be holding their city elections on May 9. Locally, this means the citizens of Pampa will have an opportunity to elect two of the five seats on the city commission.

Chris Porter's, of Ward 2, and Karen McLain's, of Ward 4, terms are up and it is still unknown whether or not they will run for re-election.

The commissioners serve a four-year term that works in a staggered format. All commissioner seats are elected on odd-numbered years. Commissioners for Wards 2 and 4 elect in 2015 and 2019; while commissioners for Wards 1 and 3, and the mayor, all elect in 2017 and 2021. The commissioners' terms

are set by city charter.

In order to be a commis-

sioner, a candidate must meet the following criteria: • They must live in the ward they are representing.

· They must hold no other public office.

 They can not be employed by the city.

• They can not be in debt to the city.

The filing period for candidates will run from Jan. 28 until 5 p.m. on Feb. 27. Beginning on Jan. 28, application packets can be picked up at the City of Pampa in the city secretary's office.

Despite having a month to file, Karen Price, city secretary, said the city traditionally doesn't have many people run for office.

"In 2012, Chris Porter ran against John Ferguson Sr., nobody ran against Karen McLain," Price said.

"2012 was the last time we

actually had a race for office.'

It doesn't matter where voters reside to elect the commissioners in a city election. A resident in Ward 1 can vote on both of the commissioner seats up for election.

In the event that the incumbents don't want to run, and noone files to run, a special election will be called.

Gray County conducts the elections for the city, and the election will be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Saturday, May 9, at MK Brown Civic Auditorium. For more information, con-

Senator Seliger files legislation to improve public education

AUSTIN - Today, State Senator Kel Seliger (R-Amarillo) filed two bills to improve public education

standardized and testing in Texas. The State Board

Education (SBOE) is legislatively tasked with adopting curriculum standards for each subject of the required curricu-

lum and those stan-Seliger dards are known as the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS). The number and scope of the

TEKS is currently too broad to be effectively taught within the time constraints of the school year. Senate Bill 313 provides guidelines for use by the SBOE in revising and reducing the number of curriculum standards.

Overcrowded curriculum standards stifle innovative teaching and place disproportionate emphasis on standardized tests. A reduced number of TEKS will allow more classroom time for students to develop a depth of understanding through projects, group discussions and the utilization of critical thinking skills while simultaneously reducing the stress of state-mandated tests on students and teachers.

"One of the most common exceptions to curriculum requirements in Texas is that the Essential Knowledge and Skills that students must learn are too exten-

Teachers tell us that they are required to address an enormous number of subjects but with very little or no depth," Seliger said. "This bill is designed to provide a framework for the SBOE to put into action the work that they have been doing to address this challenge. I look forward to continuing the discussion with State Board members, educators and SELIGER cont. on page 2








"The food and flavors," Nayeli said.



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US fines Southwest \$1.6 million for long flight delays

(AP) — Southwest Airlines is being fined \$1.6 million for not letting passengers get off planes that were stuck on the ground during long delays.

It's a record fine for violating federal rules against long tarmac delays.

The Department of said Transportation Thursday that the fine covered 16 planes that were stuck on the ground for at least three hours after landing at Chicago's Midway Airport. Passengers on two of the planes were stranded for more than four hours.

The government said that during a winter storm on Jan. 2, 2014, Southwest didn't have enough employees to handle baggage, remove snow, deice planes and move the planes to and from gates.

Southwest did not comment immediately. In a consent order, it argued that it couldn't safely allow passengers off the

The civil penalty against Southwest topped a \$1.1 million fine imposed against United Airlines in 2013 for more than a dozen long delays at Chicago's O'Hare Airport. The government said it sought a bigger penalty against Southwest because the delays involved more planes and passengers.



You can delegate authority, but not responsibility

licly point out during the six months U.S. troops have been at war against the Islamic State group in Iraq and Syria that by refusing to even debate the authorization of military force, they are guilty of an "unacceptable abdication" of their "most solemn responsibility" as members of Congress — to declare war.

Kaine, to his credit, reminds the country and Congress that though you may be able to delegate authority, you cannot delegate responsibility, that Congress' cowardly delay in meeting its constitutional obligation to vote on what the perilous mission to which they are committing our troops involves "dishonors the sacrifice of American service members who are risking their lives." Nor should we mostly mute citizens escape censure for our failure to demand that Congress — Democrats and Republicans — respect the Constitution and end the practice of surrendering all its power to the White House under the pretense of not tying the president's hands. Let's be blunt. Presi-

dents, including the current occupant of the Oval Office, much prefer to have carte blanche, without any interference or secondguessing, to employ U.S. military power as they deem necessary. The most recent time Congress voted to declare war was Dec. 8, 1941. But the U.S. especially since 1973, when both the military draft and the era of the citizen-soldier were ended to be replaced by an all-volunteer military — has engaged in military conflicts from Panama to Bosnia and Kosovo to all over the Middle East with Congress occasionally holding headline-seeking hearings but carefully ducking any responsi-

Without the draft and every family's potentially having a son, nephew, cousin or niece who could be put in rather than harm's way by military service, national foreign policy has been less and less a topic at the American dinner table. Citizenship has ceased to involve an individual's responsibilities but emphasized instead our personal rights. Self-sacrifice is out, and self-absorption and self-fulfillment are very much in.

> Without civilians entering the military for a two- or three-year obligation, as was the case under the draft, members of Congress have not heard so often from constituents questioning or criticizing U.S. military engagements. It is easier for a congressman just to issue a press release, to surrender all the authority to the president, and to demonstrate his complete support of the military by fawning on and deferring to generals and admirals.

> When Congress voted in 2002 — after an uninspired debate — to yield the decision to invade Iraq to President George W. Bush, not one of the 435 members of the House of Representatives had a son or daughter in the enlisted ranks of the nation's military.

Sgt. Brooks Johnson of the Army's 101st Airborne Division was the only American enlisted man on active duty who was the son of a member of Congress. His father is Tim Johnson, a Democrat from South Dakota who was then a senator. Congress and the financial, economic, media and intellectual establishment have no

skin in the game. There are two 1 percents in the U.S. today. The richest 1 percent has more than doubled its share of the national income since the Ronald Reagan years. And an entirely different 1 percent does all the fighting, all the suffering and all the dying in the nation's wars. We were a better and stronger nation when national defense was every American family's responsibility.

HealthCare.gov is one such entity that has been claimed, by none other than former White House Press Secretary Jay Carney, Congresswoman Nancy Pelosi, Senator Harry Reid, and countless other architects, members of Congress, advisors, and even the President himself, to "make shopping for insurance as easy as Amazon or Priceline." While on the surface this claim now might be true, a savvy shopper knows better. I can say with full conviction that any individual that believes HealthCare. gov is comparable to Amazon and Priceline is in for a rude awakening. Here is why.

First off, I am a frequent shopper of Amazon, and I wish I was a frequent shopper of Priceline. I am very familiar with both sites. I have been able to search for a particular product, bring up many choices, make a purchasing decision, and actually pay for the product in less than a minute on either website. I did not need any more information than what was provided on the product's individual page. I simply needed one item that I was able to purchase quickly. Airline ticket purchases are slightly more complex, but not much. Using Priceline, you have to input two cities, a couple of dates

if flying round trip, and the number of passengers. Then, you have to determine which flight times will be best, how many layovers each flight has, and most importantly, the price. After determining which flight is best, you will then have to purchase the ticket and provide some basic information in order to retrieve your boarding passes at a later date. Slightly more work than Amazon, but relatively simple nonetheless.

So let's imagine HealthCare.gov is identical to Amazon.com. In this scenario, these would be the steps. First, we would type in the product name on HealthCare.gov's search bar – "health insurance for a 28-yearold male." Then, we would have several options to choose from. We select the plan, and we are taken to a page where we input extremely basic information in order to keep the application like Amazon's. Then, we enter the payment screen, select how we want to be billed, and enroll in the plan. Overall, the process should take a couple of minutes at its maximum. This model is impossible.

So what if HealthCare.gov were slightly more complicated like Priceline? Here is what we would have. First, you type in your age. Then the deductible, co-payments, and prescription coverage you would like, and the date of which you would like the coverage to begin. Then, you are taken to the plan selection screen. After looking through the different options, you decide on a plan, and then you are taken to a screen where you input your basic information and enroll. All in all, you are in and out in less than five minutes. Again, this is unsustainable with the way the law is written today. I would like to add a caveat that a 5 minute HealthCare. gov application is possible if you do zero research.

So why is the claim that Amazon and Priceline are equivalent models impossible to achieve with HealthCare.gov? There are too many variables to consider when selecting a plan, and the application process is too onerous to make any simpler than it currently is and still prevent fraud and misrepresentation. Let's begin with the application process. In order to determine eligibility for a tax credit, you must create an account through the website or over the phone, the government must determine if you are an American citizen

(including naturalized or derived), calculations based on tax return status and household income must be made, and employer coverage must be considered among many other variables. Inputting this information alone creates a difficult process for many people. Once you actually complete the application, you are then taken to the plan selection screen that, at times, looks somewhat similar to Priceline's selection screen. (Put one on the board for the Affordable Care Act). Once you arrive at the plan selection screen, you must determine which plan to go

"Do you elect a plan that has a \$6,000, \$3,000, or \$1,000 deductible? What about if you would like a Health Savings Account? Which plans are those? HMO or PPO? Which plan has my doctor AND my hospital? What's the difference between companies A, B, C, and D? Does this plan cover pediatric dental? If not, do I need dental insurance since it's required for children? This plan says 100 percent coinsurance. Does that means it's free from day

These questions are normal questions that most potential buyers always ask when selecting a plan on HealthCare.gov. The answers are difficult to know unless you spend every working day getting acquainted with the process. How are you supposed to act like HealthCare.gov is Amazon or Priceline when these questions can mean the difference between an insurance company paying most of your bills or paying none

The Affordable Care Act has given millions of Americans access to lowcost health insurance. HealthCare. gov has created an idea that works on its surface. When you break it down to see the actual factors at play when determining which plan is best for an individual or family, you cannot say HealthCare.gov is like Amazon or Priceline. It's more like IRS.gov.

The Dallas Cowboys and Denver Broncos are NFL parity example at it's finest.

The NFL prides itself on being a league of parity. Other than frequent conference championship game fliers New England

and Seattle, the other 10 playoff seeds are always up for grabs.

Two regional teams, the Dallas Cowboys and Denver Broncos, are perfect examples of the parity.

Rewind back to late July. The Denver Broncos appeared to be a superteam whose offense wouldn't miss a beat complimented by a new,

improved defense that would give offensive coordinators nightmares.

Meanwhile, back at Valley Ranch, the Dallas Cowboys were littered with question marks. What is the state of quarterback Tony Romo's back? Linebacker Sean Lee and second-round pick defensive end DeMarcus Lawerence are hurt, who will step up on defense? How could this defense possibly be improved?

The only known factor in Big D was the Big O-line. Romo was not going to take many hits this season.

The Broncos seemed prime for a Super Bowl win while the Dallas Cowboys seemed ready to struggle to even win six or seven games.

What a difference five and a half months make.

As I mentioned earlier, the only known good piece on that team was their offensive line. And they flexed their young muscle.

If this was grade school, the Cowboys offensive line was taking all of the lunch money from opposing defensive lines.

This opened the door for fourth-year running back DeMarco Murray to run for a career high 1,845 yards and 13 touch-

He had 2,261 yards from scrimmage if you add his 416 receiving yards.

With Murray shouldering the load of the offense, it took pressure off Romo and his surgically-repaired back. Romo threw for 3,705 yards, 34 touchdowns and nine interceptions.

He was the compliment to that strong rushing attack.

The Cowboys had to work, even at 13-3 for their division title, their first since 2009.

Two of the teams playing on Championship Sunday were practically dominated by Dallas. Seattle fell to them 30-23 in Week 6. As an unbiased fan, the scoreboard doesn't tell the whole story in that win.

Then just last month Dallas thumped Indianapolis 42-7.

They were a questionable call away from playing Sunday.

So what came out of this surprise season? Dallas has already resigned Jason Garrett, Scott Linehan and Rod Marinelli. But what could be challenging is resigning both Murray and star wideout Dez Bryant.

But one thing is for certain, the Cowboys will be entering the new league year in March with a strong offensive line, a healthier defense, Tony Romo and Jason Garrett. This team could be primed to make another playoff push.

Denver Broncos

Denver started hot, winning five of their first six all off the right arm quarterback Peyton Manning, who broke the legendary Brett Favre's passing touchdown record.

The pundits seemed to have one thing right, Denver was ready to go to the playoffs.

At 7-2 the Broncos traveled to St. Louis, and suddenly that red-hot offense seemed to struggle. They scored one touchdown on a deep pass to wide receiver Emmanuel Sanders. Aside from that, Manning was mediocre at best, going 34-54 for 389 yards a touchdown and two picks. It was also the third straight game Manning had multiple interceptions.

Broncos fans, including myself, said it was a fluke and the Broncos will be fine. Manning will bounce back. He did against a good Miami team going 28-35 for 257 yards and four touchdowns.

Yet the Broncos didn't feel like the same Denver team that broke record after record last season. They weren't.

When the calendar flipped to December, a month that normally gives that Dallas team fits, Manning looked vulnerable. Sure the Broncos went 3-1 down the stretch.

But Manning looked awful, completing 63 percent of his passes, averaging 247 yards a game

with three touchdowns and six picks. The Broncos and, as it was revealed later, Manning were limping into the playoffs.

It didn't end well for the Broncos, losing to the Indianapolis Colts, a team they had just beat four months earlier. Manning only completed 56 percent of his passes, threw for 211 yards and one touchdown.

The Broncos are now in turmoil.

Manning has said he is not sure he will be back next year. Vice president of football personnel

John Elway and head coach John Fox parted ways, the Broncos are looking for a new head coach. The Broncos could enter free agency

with fourth-year (in April) player Brock Osweiler at quarterback and a new coach at the helm.

Not to mention there are 12 free agents on their own team the Broncos need to address

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Century-old baseball cards fetch \$200K in Maine

BIDDEFORD, (AP) — The first batch of century-old baseball cards from the so-called "Portland trove" has fetched about \$200,000 at auction in Maine.

Bidders flew in to Biddeford (BID'-uh-ford) from as far away as California for Wednesday's auction of 212 cards from among the 1,400-card collection.

Troy Thibodeau of Saco River Auction Co. says cards depicting Hall of Famers, including Cy Young and Ty Cobb, went for \$4,000 to \$5,000 apiece.

The cards range in age from 1909 to 1911 and feature color lithographs on the front and a tobacco advertisement on the back. The collection belongs to

Nationals' Ramos wins Conigliaro award

BOSTON (AP) — Washington Nationals catcher Wilson Ramos is the winner of the 25th Tony Conigliaro Award. The honor goes to the player who demonstrated spirit, determination and courage. Ramos survived a kid-

napping in his home country of Venezuela in 2011. Since then, he has come back from a torn anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee, a broken hamate bone in his left hand and repeated hamstring strains.

Ramos hit .267 with 11 homers and 47 RBIs in 88 games for the Nationals last season.

Members of the Conigliaro family will present the award next Thursday at the 76th Boston Baseball Writers' Association of America's annual dinner.

Past winners include Jim Eisenreich, Dickie Thon, Jim Abbott and Jon Lester.
