State gas price average down 8 cents

"It now costs Gas Watch the average price about \$26 to fill up a typifor a gallon of regular unleaded fuel in the Lone Star State is now \$1.87. That's this time last year." 8 cents less than last week and \$1.24 less than one year as, drivers in Corpus Christi are paying the most at \$1.95 per gallon while drivers in Amarillo and Fort Worth are paying the least at \$1.79 per gallon. Drivers in Texas are paying 21 cents less per gallon that the national average of \$2.08. Both national and statewide averages continue to test lows not seen since May 2009. Barring any major increases in the global price of crude oil, AAA analysts expect the national and statewide average prices for a gallon of regular unleaded gasoline to remain below \$3.00 per gallon in 2015. Currently Texas has one of the top ten least expensive statewide gas price averages in the country,"

This decline in the price of oil has been the result of weak demand combined with abundant supply. While lower gas prices are certainly a welcome relief for consumers, the broad impact of sustained low oil prices are front of mind for many industry stakeholders In countries like the United States where the cost of oil extraction is more expensive, producers may be forced to reassess their plans to factor in profit margins that are sharply lower or even reversed as markets continue to register multi-year lows. 

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



I knew the words to all the songs, especially those sung by the Kingston Trio. My girlfriend and I used to sing "MTA Charlie" and play along on our guitars.

The lyrics include such inspiring words as, "Oh did he ever return? No he never returned, and his fate is still unlearned. He may ride forever 'neath the streets of Boston, he's the man who never

"Hang Down Your Head Tom Dooley," which was the tale of a gruesome post-Civil War murder. The guys in the trio were cleancut, neatly-dressed young men, something fairly unusual in the early "Hippie" days.

Folk music has been around for thousands of years, as many of the songs, or ballads, were how stories were passed from people to people before the age of books.

Some of the songs were just pure fun, like Peter, Paul and Mary's "Puff, the Magic Dragon." But during the 60's, and in the age of anti-war protests against the Vietnam War, songs like "Blowin' in the Wind" and "Where Have All the Flowers Gone?" "If I Had a Hammer," "Which Side Are You On?" and others were more politicallyoriented.

Pete Seeger, Joan Baez, Janis Ian, and Odetta had popular "strife" songs at this time. I sang along with the radio when Harry Belafonte sang "Banana Boat Song" ("Day-O"), "Jamaica Farewell," "Mary's Boy Child," and "Make an Ugly Woman Your Wife." My favorite singer at this time, though, was Jimmie Rodgers. "Honeycomb" and "Bimbombey" challenged my guitarplaying skills.

At the height of his career, Rodgers was brutally beaten in Los Angeles, and left for dead in his car.


After several brain surgeries and years of recovery, his career has recently re-started, and I look forward to seeing him perform again. The 1970's pretty much saw the end of folk music's popularity.

The Vietnam era was over, and rock 'n' roll reigned supreme. Often today when I mention folk music to younger people, they think I'm talking about country music.

I have nothing against country music and the people who perform it. To me, though, it just doesn't have the same character as traditional folk music.

Today's youth are growing up with gangster rap and heavy metal. My grandchildren do prefer to listen to Christian rock, so I have hope for the young generation, but I feel bad that they never met Puff, the Magic Dragon.



Vals' list brings to mind another quote of Voltaire's, "To learn who rules over you, simply find out who you are not allowed to criticize."

Why did Vals not include slanders against Catholicism and Islam, the world's largest religions, both of which have been repeatedly insulted by Charlie Hebdo? In the banlieues north of Paris, they wish to know.

Pope Francis himself said yesterday, "You cannot provoke. You cannot insult the faith of others. ... If my good friend Dr. Gasparri says a curse word against my mother, he can expect a punch."

Is our new Pope offering preemptive dispensations to Catholics who sock those who mock their faith? That's pre-Vatican II thinking.

Back to Vals' list. Who decides what is "anti-Semitism" and what is "racism"? In America, these terms are tossed around with abandon.

As for the "glorification of terrorist acts," Israel's Menachem Begin, the ANC's Nelson Mandela, and the PLO's Yasser Arafat were all credibly charged with acts of terrorism in their liberation struggles.

And all three won the Nobel Prize for Peace. Millions of Algerians

reside in France. Is it impermissible for them to celebrate the FLN in Algeria and the oftenterrible deeds that won their independence? Algerians did not fight the French in stand-up

battles, but rather with bombs in cafes and movie theaters.

Did not the maquisards and French Resistance, during and after the Nazi occupation, exact savage reprisals, of which some in France are today ashamed?

Who decides which historical events are offlimits for debate?

Even before the Paris march, Vals had declared "war against terrorism, against jihadism, against radical Islam, against everything that is aimed at breaking fraternity, freedom, solidarity."

But does not the renewed publication of cartoons that insult the Prophet undermine the fraternity and solidarity of French Muslims, Christians and secularists in Val's war on terrorism?

Has Charlie Hebdo really helped to unite the West and the Islamic world in the "war ... against jihadism, against radical Islam"? Or has it divided us?

Egyptian President Abdel-Fattah el-Sissi, our ally who ousted the Muslim Brotherhood, killed hundreds, and imprisoned thousands, just issued a decree allowing him to ban foreign publications offensive to Islam.

Why might President Sissi regard Charlie Hebdo as toxic?

According to a 2013 Pew Poll, 80 percent of Egyptians favor the stoning of adulterers and 88 percent the death penalty for apostates.

The figures are comparable for Afghanistan, Pakistan, Jordan and the Palestinian territories. Across the Middle East,

majorities favor the adoption of sharia law. Many support beheads ings, stonings, the lash and amputations of limbs i for lesser offenses. What does these polls

tell us? First, if we insist that freedom of the press means standing behind the blasphemies of Charlie Hebdo, we should anticipate the hatred and hostility of majorities in the Islamic world to whom faith and family are everything — and our First Amendment is nothing.

Second, the idea that, by sending armies of Americans into that part of the world for a decade or two, we could convert these peoples, steeped in a 1,500-year-old faith, to share our embrace of religious, cultural and moral pluralism and secularism was utopian madness.

Third, as Islamic peoples grow in number and militancy, while the peoples of Europe age and pass on, and the migrants continue to come from the Maghreb and Middle East, Europe will have to adapt to Muslim demands or face endless civil and cultural conflict on the Old Continent.

The moral befuddlement in France mirrors that of the West.

In welcoming the return to the newsstands of Charlie Hebdo, with a cartoon mocking the Prophet on its cover, President Hollande said, "You can murder men and women, but you can never kill their ideas."

True. And anti-Islamism is an idea. As is the "radical Islam" against which France has declared war.

And which of the two ideas appears today to have more adherents willing not only to march for it on Sundays, but to die for it?

A: I guess what they say is true: Men really do worry about the size of things whereas women usually don't. In the 17 years I've been writing this column, I have probably heard from a thousand men worried that they won't get the maximum Social Security benefit. But I have never once heard from a woman with the same concerns.

Every year, the Social Security Administration announces the so-called "maximum" Social Security retirement benefit. There is nothing special about it. The agency's press office puts out the number only because the media cries for it. I guess that little snippet of information makes for a good news story.

That maximum benefit is \$2,663 in 2015. That



means that if someone is turning age 66 this year and has paid taxes on maximum Social Securitycovered earnings for each of the last 35 years, he or she will get \$2,663 effective with age 66.

But there is nothing special about getting that maximum benefit. It's not like you get a bonus from the government if you pay the maximum Social Security tax each year. Your retirement benefit will be based on your highest 35 years of earnings. And as I just said, if you have 35 years of maximum earnings, you will get a maximum Social Security benefit. If you don't, you won't quite get the maximum, but so what?

If you have a few years of less than maximum earnings, you'll get something darn close to that maximum rate. Your Social Security check might not be as big as the one paid to guy next door who had maximum



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

The Pampa Lady Harvesters (13-10, 1-1) took the court Friday night to take on the Perryton Rangerettes in their second district game of the season. The Lady Harvesters held off a late rally from the Rangerettes to win 48-46, including a defensive stand with six seconds left in the game. Perryton hit a trey with under a minute to play and Brown went 1-2 from the line to make it a seven point game. Perryton went a perfect 4-4 from the charity stripe, however, to make it 16-13.




Photo by Zachary Green Ty'Randa Johnson shoots a three late in the game Friday. Johnson had five points in the game.





Of course the media is out with their easy headlines: "Choker". But that's not fair, really.

If you look at Schwartzel's driving accuracy statistics on the PGA Tour, he ranks 121st. He hit the fairway less than 60% of the time.

So at the best of times, he's not accurate off the tee (by PGA Tour standards), and now we add a little pressure.

What many coaches talk about is a "go-to shot",

especially for the times when you're not playing well or playing under pressure. It might be a high fade.

Some Pros play a shortened backswing and hit a lower draw off the tee.

Rarely, though, will it be a straight shot. That only ever leaves them with half the fairway to play with, whereas playing a fade means they can aim down the very left and play with the whole width of the fairway.

On the range, is there a tee shot shape you can replicate, and control, easier than any other?

It might not even be with the Driver, but try and make sure you have a club and shot you feel confident in playing for the time you find yourself four ahead with five to play.
