Hunting class to be offered on Jan. 31

Those hoping to become hunter-safety certified will have an opportunity to come Saturday, Jan. 31.

Game warden for Gray and Roberts County Logan Hudson will be instructing the course.

The new hunter education class is a one-day course between five and six hours long," Hudson said. "It's required for anyone that wants to hunt and is born after Sept. 2, 1971."

A person can hunt up until the age of 17 as long as they are accompanied by someone who is licensed

If they are over the age of 17 they have to complete a hunter's education course regardless of whether or not they are accompanied by a licensed hunter.

The course is designed firearm safety and handling and hunter ethics.

"We would teach people how to look at a situation and decide No. 1 if this is a shot that is safe to take," Hudson said. "And if it's ethical. So there might be an instance where your target is beyond your effective range that you're capable of shooting and we are going to talk about how to make those decisions about whether you're capable of

taking a clean quick shot and to kill in the most effective manner without causing any additional harm. Or if you are going to just wound the animal, we want to avoid those shots."

Hudson said hunters want to take the animals in the most humane way possible because hunters are the one animal population factors that can be controlled.

'They (animals) are controlled by disease, food population and those kind of things," Hudson said. "You add the hunters in there we are able to help control the populations before they get to disease and starvation. Another aspect of HUNTING cont. on page 2

 7 p.m. - 11 p.m. Today - Widespread coverage across the entire Panhandles.

 7 a.m. to Noon Thursday- Snow ending across the Panhandles from the northwest to southeast.

Snow is expected to reach the Highway 60 corridor between Amarillo and Pampa by 5 p.m. today. All of the Panhandle should be covered by 9 p.m.

Lindley said they have a very high confidence in the precipitation chances. They have a high confidence in the timing and precipitation type. They just have a moderate confidence in the snowfall



hunter ethics is what you are doing is legal and is it right as far as trespassing, shooting hours and those gray areas where there might not be a law against it but is it the right thing to do."

Anyone from age nine years old and up can take the course. Hudson said that with someone the age of nine though, they will definitely "have to know what they are doing" to become certified.

The certification is lifetime and is generally honored by all other states.

"We have a portion of the class set for wildlife identification," Hudson said. "It's kind of set with the hunter ethics part, being able to tell the difference of a white-tailed deer and a mule deer. We talk a lot about turkeys and quail. We have a fair number of animals you can hunt right here in the Panhandle. But you may to Colorado or other parts and be able to hunt bear. These are all the things that would affect those areas."

The course is \$15 and Hudson tries to teach the course twice a year, once before and once after hunting season. Those over the age of 17 can take the course online, but Hudson suggests taking it in person to interact with other hunters.

The course is from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., Saturday, Jan. 31 at the Remax office located at 2211 Perryton Parkway next to Chicken Express.



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Why the violent extremists welcome attacks on Islam

Whenever an act of horrific terror enrages the West, a predictable second act

Muslims and their supposed plots to enslave us all under Shariah, urging that we ban the religion, stigmatize its faithful and restore the Judeo-Christian exclusivity of America. Sometimes a few even seek retribution in attacks on mosques, individual Muslims and anyone unfortunate enough to "look Muslim."

Violent or merely loud, these are the useful idiots whose divisive blundering underscores the propaganda of al-Qaida, the Islamic State group and imitators around the

right to speak freely, including when the speech is offensive to religions and even to ethnic groups, without fear of violent responses. We must also protect the rights of religious and ethnic minorities — including the right to protest peacefully against offensive speech. That requires swift action against those who will conspire to maim, murder and terrorize — and the capacity, whenever pos-

sible, to neutralize those criminals before they act. But Americans will need to do much more than surround ourselves with police, armies and intelligence services if we ever hope to overcome our extremist enemies. Effective counterterrorism demands a contrasting narrative of coexistence, respect, fairness and op-

portunity. The elements of that political arsenal exist already — in the stories of Ahmed Merabet, the Muslim policeman who

Museum Musings Charles Wesley Dodd

Charles Wesley Dodd came from Kansas to Pampa in 1908 and went into business with his

son, Chester Charles Dodd. The Dodd Grain and Produce at 403 W. Atchison supplied farmers and ranchers between Amarillo and Canadian.

In 1913, at Wichita, Kan., C.C. Dodd was married to Myo

McSkimming by her father, the Rev. D.D. McSkimming. Since their house in Pampa was not ready for occupancy, they stayed in the Liberty Hotel (owned by M.E. Fletcher), 121 E. Atchison, until their house was completed.

The two-story house at 211 N. Frost (now at 2300 W. Kentucky) was a Sears home built from a kit hauled by train and wagon and erected on the site. It was west of the block where there were hitching posts, a large tank for horses to drink and a place for wagons and carriages to park. The hitching posts were located where the Gray County Courthouse now stands.

Dorothy Dodd Peacock Brown, mother of Ivan Owen, Bob Wesley and Charles D. Peacock, was born in the Dodd home at 211 N. Frost. About 1917-18 the Dodds exchanged property with A.H. Doucette, whose farm was one and a half miles southeast of Pampa.

In 1926 C.C. Dodd started Dodd's Produce and Hatchery at 115 S. Ballard and became known as poultry judge for county fairs. During the Depression of the 1930s, he closed his business in town and managed it from his farm.


A few years later his family

moved to 504 E. Browning and Dodd worked for Pampa Office Supply until the U.S. Army hired him to have control of Army supplies during WW II at the Army Air Base east of Pampa.

In 1953 the Dodds sold the property on Browning Street to the Central Baptist Church and moved to 1418 N. Russell. Dodd was then in charge of supplies for the City of Pampa and helped establish the Pampa City Credit Union. He wrote the "Clearing House" articles for the Pampa News.

Dodd died in 1972 while visiting his daughter, Dorothy, in Burbank, Calif.

They seek to provoke a harsh crackdown on innocent Muslims, especially the young and unemployed, along with expressions of bigotry and discrimination — to highlight the simmering communal conflicts they hope to inflame into a "war of civilizations."

So the extremists can only be grateful when anti-Muslim propaganda, repeated constantly in right-wing publications and broadcasts, casts them as the defenders of Islam rather than its defilers. Every time Islam is publicly defined as a religion of violence, the jihadis gain prestige. Their appeals become more persuasive to oppressed young Muslims — especially if no alternative is apparent.

Yet the narrative of endless conflict and implacable distrust is not only untrue — as we saw last week when Parisians of all faiths rallied together — but deeply destructive to traditional democratic values and strategically stupid.

Yes, we must protect the www.creators.com.

died heroically in Paris, and Lassana Bathily, the young Muslim employee who led Jews in the kosher market to safety; in the undeniable fact that the extremists murder hundreds of innocent civilians, overwhelmingly Muslim, every week; and in the secure, prosperous

existence that millions of ordinary Muslim families have enjoyed in this country for decades, despite outbursts of prejudice and harassment.

We ought to note with pride that Muslims serve in the U.S. military and every branch of government, including two members of Congress, because the Constitution specifically bans any religious test for public office. (Certain figures on the religious right may need to be reminded, too.) Muslims should know that their holy days are routinely celebrated in the White House by presidents of both parties - even as all religions are subject to disbelief, criticism and even jeering satire in a free society.

The consensus among ordinary Muslims is well-known to pollsters of public opinion: By large majorities, here and abroad, they fear and disdain the violent extremists who have defamed their religion. Let's at least stop trying to change their minds.



The Bible study at the bar/pool hall
