#### County Commissioner's address acoustic issues

The Gray County Commissioner's Court met on Friday for their bi-monthly meeting. County Judge Richard Peet mentioned that in previous meetings the Court took proposals to address the acoustical issues in the Gray County Courthouse District Courtroom.

Those proposals had to be approved by the historical commission.

The first action the Court took was to rescind approving the bid of \$92,350 that was for the spray-on insulation.

That was rejected by the historical com-

The Court also rescinded the proposal for an audio system update in the courtroom. After both of those things took place the court approved the bid from Amarillo Media Systems of \$16,727 to install flat panels in the courtroom to adress the acoustical problem.

Peet laid out the numbers and with the spray-on insulation, carpet and sound system the total came to \$121,496. With the flat planels, sound and carpet it came to







#### Bouncin' Around

## On a clear day, you can see forever

"On a clear day, you can see forever..." These are the opening words of one of my favorite songs, origi-

nally written by Allan Lerner, and recorded by such greats as Robert Goulet and Barbra Streisand. I think it perfectly describes the views here on the high plains of the Texas Panhandle.

I was born and raised in the Los Angeles area of Cali-

fornia, where clear days were rare. When there actually was a clear day, it usually meant we were going to get some rain. If we were lucky, we could see the San Gabriel Mountains then, as the smog was blown out of the L.A. basin. Most of the time, however, about all we could see from the various towns where we lived was palm trees and concrete.

My mother was born and raised in Iowa, and lived at times in Wisconsin and Illinois. She left the Midwest with her parents, my grandparents, in the 1930s for California. She didn't return to her roots for another 30 years, and at that time she was so happy to see "so much green" (as she expressed it) and so many trees.

When I moved to Illinois in 1965, my first impression of the state was

miles and miles of cornfields. When I farther. saw Lake Michigan for the first time, it looked a lot like the Pacific Ocean, minus the big waves. One nice thing about living in northern Illinois was that we could usually tell what kind of weather was coming—thunderstorms darkened the western sky and snowstorms darkened the eastern sky. Early in 2000, my husband and I

moved to central Indiana, and a different view of the horizons. Connersville, where we lived, was located in the Whitewater River basin, so our view of the horizon was limited to the times we went out into the countryside. Thunderstorms would sneak up on us before we were aware they were coming. We did see some spectacular sunsets when our daughter lived out on a country road, and one evening we even got to see the Northern Lights, a rare occurrence in the Midwest. Our year in Georgia, north of Atlanta, gave us a pretty good view of towering pines, and that was about it.

So here we are in the Texas Panhandle, where we really do seem to be able to see forever. The sun rises and sets with very little to obscure the view. You can hear From far and near A word you've never, never heard



#### It's no hoot: Oregon city to post signs about attacking owl

SALEM, Ore. (AP) — MSNBC host Rachel Mada park where four runners reported attacks from an angry owl likely defending its nest against perceived threats.



## Where to get Medicare advice

Regular readers of my column know that I rarely tread into the murky Medicare waters because I am not an expert on that program. Many people mistakenly assume that Social Security and Medicare are essentially two parts of the same government program. So because I spent 32 years working for the Social Security Administration, they think I should know all about Medicare.

In truth, Social Security and Medicare are two entirely separate government programs administered by two entirely separate federal government agencies. Social Security is managed by the Social Security Administration – my former employer. But Medicare is run by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services.

There are a couple reasons why people think that SSA manages the Medicare program. One is that the payroll taxes for both programs used to be linked. Up until about 1983, there was just one payroll deduction that covered both Social Security and Medicare taxes. But for the past 30 years or

In other words, your 2015 premium is based on your 2013 income. Assuming your income went back down to normal levels in 2014, your Part B premium will go back down to normal levels in 2016. ## Gas price averages rises nine cents

COPPELL — Drivers in Texas saw another increase at the fuel pumps over the last week. The average price for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel in the Lone Star State is now \$2.07, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That's nine cents more than last week but \$1.06 less than last year. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in Texas, drivers in Dallas and Fort Worth are paying the most on average at \$2.14 per gallon while drivers in San Antonio are paying the least at \$2.00 per gallon. The statewide average is 16 cents less than the national average of \$2.23, which is eight cents more than one this week because approximately 5,200

"While gas prices have moved higher recently, the statewide and national averages remain significantly less expensive than one year ago," said AAA Texas/ New Mexico Representative Doug Shupe. "February typically marks the start of the seasonal refinery maintenance in preparation for the busy summer driving season. Refineries usually schedule maintenance during the first several months of the year when demand is relatively low, which can lead to decreased production and supplies."

have walked off their jobs at refineries and chemical plants responsible for processing more than 10 percent of U.S. petroleum products. While this is the first nationwide strike at U.S. oil refineries since 1980, the work stoppage is not expected to have a significant impact on production in the short-term because refineries continue to operate. While news of the strike has reportedly led to higher wholesale gasoline prices, abundant petroleum supplies may provide both refiners and unions with a chance to reach an agreement before there is a larger impact on consumers.

### Texas A&M flagship campus to get \$352M in renovations


COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — Texas A&M University System regents have approved \$352 million in renovations to the flagship campus in College Station.

The upgrades endorsed Thursday include a \$168 million expansion and upgrade of the Zachry Engineering Center. The more than 40-year-old building will become the Engineering Education Complex. The upgrades should be completed in late 2017.

The Eagle newspaper reports the Corps of Cadets dormitories, starting in March, will get a \$135 million expansion and overhaul.

A&M's Commons Building is set for \$49 million worth of improvements.

Regents also added a \$25 million infrastructure improvement project at Tarleton State University in Stephenville to a capital improvement plan. Specifics on proposed construction have not yet








So let's start now with that winning tradition and help our girls basketball team get a gold ball Tuesday night in Littlefield. Go Harvester basketball and Go Green!!







#### TO THE CLASS OF:

All persons and entities and the heirs, legatees, beneficiaries, assignees, and successors of such persons or entities who, between February 1, 1995 and the present date, own or owned royalty interests under leases located in the state of Texas where Phillips Petroleum Company [now ConocoPhillips Company] is the lessee and whose royalty is paid pursuant to a Gas Royalty Agreement. The GRA Settlement Class is composed of the following subclasses, all of which are included in the GRA Settlement Class

a. Royalty owners whose interests in Texas wells are or were subject to Gas Royalty Agreement Form BP, which states royalty is calculated based on sales of gas delivered in Hutchinson, Carson, Gray and Wheeler Counties, Texas (the "GRA Settlement Subclass BP");

b. Royalty owners whose interests in Texas wells are or were subject to Gas Royalty Agreement Form MH, which states royalty is calculated based on sales of gas delivered in Moore, Hartley, Sherman and Hansford Counties, Texas and Texas County, Oklahoma (the "GRA Settle-

c. Royalty owners whose interests in Texas wells are or were subject to Gas Royalty Agreement Form H, which states royalty is calculated based on sales of gas delivered in Texas County, Oklahoma and Sherman and Hansford Counties, Texas (the "GRA Settlement Subclass").

Excluded from the GRA Settlement Class are agencies, departments or instrumentalities of the United States of America and persons or entities whom all of Class Counsel are prohibited from representing under Rule 1.06 of the Texas Rules of Professional Conduct, including all of the following: ConocoPhillips, ConocoPhillips Company, ConocoPhillips Gas Company, ConocoPhillips Holding Company, Phillips Petroleum Company, Phillips Oil Company, Phillips Gas Co LP, GPM Gas Trading Company, GPM Panhandle Gathering Company, Duke Energy Field Services, LLC, Duke Energy Field Services, LP, COnoco Inc., DCP Midstream, LP, DCP Midstream Marketing, LLC, Phillips 66.

The Gas Royalty Agreements (GRAs) are agreements that amend oil and gas leases and provide that, notwithstanding the lease terms, royalty is to be paid based on a weighted average price of certain third party sales multiplied by MCF's (thousand cubic feet) of gas produced.

In 2008, as part of this lawsuit, the Texas Supreme Court determined the method by which royalty must be calculated under the GRAs and said they "require royalties to be paid based on the volume of natural gas metered at the wells multiplied by a price averaged from sales to third parties, before liquid products are extracted or processed." Bonden v. Phillips Petroleum Company, 247 S.W.3d 690. 707 (Tex. 2008). Since the Texas Supreme Court's 2008 opinion, the parties have researched what the amount of past GRA royalty would be using that formula. ConocoPhillips has advised the Court that its research shows that, for some wells covered by GRAs, applying that formula shows a significant overpayment of royalty. This notice is given pursuant to the Order of the 268th District Court, Fort Bend County, Texas (the "Court"), pursuant to Texas Rule of Civil Procedure 42. The purpose of this Notice is to advise you:

This lawsuit has been certified for settlement as a class action by the Court.

The Class Representatives and ConocoPhillips have entered into a Settlement Agreement which shall become effective, if at all, upon a Court Order approving the settlement becoming final and unappealable.

The Settlement Agreement provides that ConocoPhillips shall pay the sum of \$590,000 to the GRA Settlement Subclasses BP and MH.

Further, ConocoPhillips will release its claims for recovery of substantial overpayments against the members of GRA Settlement Subclass H.

The amounts shown above are gross amounts before deduction of fees and expenses. See section V below for a description of fees and expenses to be deducted and actual distribution to class members.

The cash consideration paid to the members of GRA Settlement Subclasses BP and MH will be paid according to the method descin the Settlement Agreement. ConocoPhillips has had no role in distributing the allocations made or in making said allocations. (c) The Court, which has direct control over the settlement process, will conduct a hearing to determine whether to approve the Settlement Agreement between Plaintiffs and ConocoPhillips (the "Settlement Fairness Hearing").

As a putative Class Member you have the right to exclude yourself from the Class or object to the proposed Class Settlement and/or Class el's requested fees and litigation expenses.

I. SUMMARY OF THE CLASS ACTION LITIGATION CLAIMS

This lawsuit has been pending since 1999. The Class Representatives for the GRA Settlement Class are Royce Yarbrough, Craig Fuller, and Robert Price Brent, III, each of whom asserts that they are a ConocoPhillips royalty owner with one or more oil and gas leases amended by GRAs. In general, the Class Representatives claim that ConocoPhillips has been for a number of years incorrectly calculating and paying royalty called for by GRAs. ConocoPhillips denies that it has incorrectly calculated GRA royalty.

The Class Representatives' claims about GRAs have already been the subject of an opinion by the Texas Supreme Court. That opinion is published in its entirety in the law reports available in many libraries and lawyers' offices as Bowden v. Phillips Petroleum Co., 247 S.W.3d 690 (Tex. 2008). The opinion is also available on the Texas Supreme Court's website, www.supreme.courts.tx.us, under Orders and Opinions for February 15, 2008, Opinion No. 03-0824. There are other subjects covered by the Supreme Court's opinion that are not pertinent to this Notice. The parts of the opinion that are pertinent to this Notice are the parts under the headings "I. Factual and Procedural Background," "III. Res Judicata," and The Texas Supreme Court held that the GRAs "require royalties to be paid based on the volume of natural gas metered at the wells multiplied by a

price averaged from sales to third parties, before liquid products are extracted or processed." The issue remaining in this lawsuit that may affect you is whether ConocoPhillips has paid royalty calculated in the manner the Texas Supreme Court has prescribed. ConocoPhillips has advised the Court that its research shows that for wells located in some counties in the Texas Panhandle, it has overpaid GRA royalty calculated as the Texas Supreme Court has prescribed. These alleged overpayments have occurred during many of the months pertinent to this lawsuit. The Class Representatives disagree that ConocoPhillips has overpaid royalties. However, as one of ConocoPhillips' defenses in this lawsuit, it may seek to subtract the amounts of any overpayments from any amounts that were underpaid. This could reduce, or possibly negate entirely, any recovery of damages in this lawsuit. The Court cannot advise you at this time as to how this question will ultimately be decided for your particular lease, or anyone else's. By giving this notice, the Court is not expressing any opinion regarding the merits of either the GRA Settlement Class' or ConocoPhillips's claims

or defenses. Nothing contained in this notice should be construed as suggesting the Court's view as to which side might prevail should this matter

After being notified of the parties' settlement agreement and hearing the terms of that agreement, the Court entered an Order preliminarily approving, for settlement purposes only, the formation of the class defined above. Farabough, 112 West 8th Avenue, Suite 1000, Eagle Centre Building, Amarillo, Texas 79101-2314; (c) James R. Lovell, Lovell & Lyle, P.C., P.O. Box 477, Dumas, Texas 79029; and (d) Russell C. Jones, the Holoway Jones Law Firm, PLLC, 407 Julie Rivers Drive, Sugar Land, TX 77478.

IV. THE PROPOSED CLASS SETTLEMENT
After a thorough analysis of all claims and defenses, the Class Representatives and ConocoPhillips have agreed to settle the Class Claims against ConocoPhillips, including any claims associated with ConocoPhillips's Affiliates and Predecessor Entities as well as other working interest owners as they relate to the Class Claims, on the terms described below, subject to final approval by the Court. The Court has preliminarily approved the

settlement for the purpose of giving this notice and setting a Settlement Fairness Hearing.

The basic terms of the Settlement Agreement between the GRA Settlement Class and ConocoPhillips that the Court is being asked to approve are

ConocoPhillips will pay the sum of \$590,000 to the GRA Settlement Subclasses BP and MH (the "Settlement Proceeds"). Further, Con ocoPhillips will release its claims for recovery of substantial overpayments, which ConocoPhillips alleges exceed \$2 million, against the members of GRA Settlement Subclass H. ConocoPhillips and the Class Representatives for GRA Settlement Subclasses BP and MH agree that the Settlement Proceeds shall be for the

benefit of GRA Settlement Subclasses BP and MH subject only to the claims of Class Counsel for attorneys' fees and litigation expenses.

3. Ultimate allocation and distribution of the Settlement Proceeds to members of the GRA Settlement Subclasses BP and MH and/or Class

Counsel shall be in accordance with the Plan of Allocation and Distribution attached to the Settlement Agreement and approved by the Court. Upon the date that a Court Order approving the settlement between ConocoPhillips and the GRA Settlement Class, and specifically approv

ing the terms of the Settlement Agreement, becomes final and unappealable and upon the Class Representatives mailing out Distribution Checks to Class Members and paying fees and expenses from the Settlement Proceeds, the GRA Settlement Class, the Class Representatives and Class Counsel shall be deemed to have, and by operation of the Court Order approving the settlement shall have, fully, finally and forever released, relinquished and Released Parties for the Released Claims, as these terms are specifically defined in the Settlement Agreement. Generally, the Released Parties are ConocoPhillips Company, formerly known as Phillips Petroleum Company, a Delaware corporation ("ConocoPhillips"), and Affiliates and Predecessor Entities and the working interest owners for which ConocoPhillips marketed their oil, gas and other hydrocarbons under the same

terms as ConocoPhillips' gas.

V. <u>LITIGATION COSTS, INCENTIVE AWARD TO CLASS REPRESENTATIVE YARBROUGH, AND DISTRIBUTION OF NET</u>

Class Counsel has requested that the Court award Class Counsel an attorneys' fee of \$46,000; and reimburse Class Counsel for expert and consulting fees and litigation expenses in the amount of \$186,500. Class Counsel has also requested that Class Representative Royce Yarbrough be awarded an incentive award for her prosecution of the class action lawsuit for approximately 15 years in the amount of \$3,500. If the Court approves this request, said amounts will be deducted before distribution to the Class

Generally, the allocation of the Net Common Fund Proceeds (Cor Yarbrough incentive award) shall be proportionately allocated

The distribution described above to Class Members is based on the following assumptions: (a) that very few sales of royalty interests have occurred during the claim period, (b) that where sales did occur, the parties intended for the buyer to receive payment for past claims, and (c) that where royalty interests passed through inheritance, devise or interfamily transfers, it was the intent that the heir, devisee or transferee receive payment for past claims. To the extent these assumptions are not correct in relation to particular transfers of interests, the Court has ordered that the Class Member who receives payment shall in turn make payment to the proper party.
