School board approves order of a bond election

General trustee election ordered also.

The Pampa Board of Trustees met on Thursday night in their monthly meeting at the Pampa Independent School District administration building at 1233 N. Hobart in Pampa.

The School Board approved the calling of a general trustee election. Three seats on the Board are up for election. As of Friday morning, there were only two incumbents and a new person filed to fill the positions. The Board approved the order of a general trustee election.

tion. Should there be no other applicants, the Board will cancel the trustee portion of the election.

The meeting was continued with a public comment from Lewis Nava, father of Pampa High School swimmer Elaine Nava. Nava mentioned to the School Board that this was the first year under new swimming head coach Colby Dennis and that came with a learning curve on its own. Then the team's swimming pool stopped working and they were forced to find other facilities.

Those facilities came in the form of Frank Phillip's College allow-

ing the team to use their facilities.

Nava was surprised at how well the college received the swim team and worked with them.

Nava simply recommended the

The next topic of discussion was

the calling of a special bond election. As mentioned at the January meeting, the four biggest priorities formed by the Pampa ISD Stakeholder Committee was too alleviate the overcrowding at Pampa Junior High School and the elementary schools, make Harvester Stadium ADA Compliant, improve

Pampa High Schools Career and Technology Education facilities and to make permanent facilities for Pampa Learning Center.

Pampa ISD superintendent Dr. David Young presented the board with the proposal of calling a special bond election to take care of two of those priorities.

The first part the special bond election would be for the District to build an intermediate school. The intermediate school will house fifth and sixth grades at roughly 800 students and be about 104,000 square feet. The second issue the bond election address were the improvements of the career and tech-

Dr. Grabato celebrates 37 years in Pampa

Dr. Rene P. Grabato has been practicing urology in Pampa since 1978. His office is located at 2931 Perryton Parkway, across the street from Pampa Regional Medical Center.

Pampa Regional Medical Center has undergone numerous changes since the construction of the building in 1981.

There is one member of the staff who has been there since the beginning, and that is urologist Dr. Rene P. Grabato, MD.

Dr. Rene Grabato has been in Pampa since 1978, and since beginning to practice here, he has not left.

Originally from the Philippines, Grabato came to the U.S., finished his education in New York and trained there for six years at the top of one of the World Trade Centers. He had his plans all set to move to Dallas to begin his career as a urologist, when things were altered.

Those plans all changed when the oil industry was bringing more and more people to the Texas Panhandle and there was a demand for specialists to come to Pampa, which brought Grabato here.

In 1982, Grabato built the office where his practice still exists today at 2931 Perryton Parkway.

A typical day for Grabato includes working closely with PRMC for emergencies in the mornings as well as working in his own office in the afternoons. He also travels to Borger a few times a month to help out there and does what he can to help out other sur-

Fund set up Pampa man injured on drilling rig

Joey Slagle is a mechanic with Stokes Radiator Service in Pampa. Joey was injured during an otherwise normal workday on the drilling rig he was working. After his crushed hand healed, he found he was unable to continue working in the oil industry and lost his health insurance.

Joey began having some painful physical symptoms soon after losing his mom, just before Thanksgiving. After many tests, Renal Cell Carcinoma was diagnosed as the mass which has invaded his left kidney.

Despite of his painful condition, Joey continues to work at his job as much as he is able in order to provide for his family.

Joey and Michele have two children, ages 12 and 15, and recently

have taken legal custody of three nephews, ages, six, three and 15 months. The nephews would have otherwise become wards of the state.

So far, Joey's extended family has been able to pay for doctors' vis-

its as well as radiologists, anesthesiologists and similar professionals (also day surgery and all other tests, which have been numerous). But

Thanks to a partnership between Pampa Regional Medical and Texas Tech University, the city of Pampa will have benefit from a outreach clinic in Pampa featuring Dr. Rakhshanda Rahman, the area's only fellowship trained breast

The clinic in Pampa, a monthly 1Ž2 day clinic, will be attended by Dr. Rahman and her breast fellow. The senior family medicine resident physician will be in Pampa 36 weeks a year. One resident physician at a time rotates to Pampa.

The partnership was started when PRMC CEO Brad Morse and Dr. Richard M. Jordan, M.D., regional dean of the Texas Tech School of Medicine in Ama-

nical education facilities.

This would add two new programs: Health and pre-Engineering. The bond will also renovate the facilities to improve the home economic department to a culinary arts program, make health science facilities and improve the look of the CTE facilities, among other improvements.

The total for the bond, which will build a new intermediate school and improve the Career and Technology Education program, is \$30,340,000. The new intermediate school is \$25.68 million and the improvement to the CTE program and facilities is \$4.66 million. The other two needs,

making Harvester Stadium ADA compliant and making permanent facilities for Pampa Learning Center will be addressed at a later time and with different funding.

Just for information, the work that Harvester Sta-

dium requires is roughly \$1.85 million. This work includes expanding the bathrooms to make them ADA compliant, making walkways to all of the facilities, making the homeall ADA accessible, which factually. will include an elevator to the press box.

Board president Lee Porter asked if the CTE facilities will be flexible to multiple programs. Dr. Young explained that many of facilities will be in lab format, which will allow for multiple programs.

Board member Dana Terry asked if the cosmetology program can be conducted in conjunction with Clarendon College. Dr. Young answered explaining that the program is doing that now and is more advantageous financially to do it that way.

Board vice president Cay Warner commended the stakeholder committee for the way its members presented the Board with what they felt is the District's priorities. Warner said that the bond will affect every student in the District in some way.

In conjunction with approving the special bond election, the Board approved Underwood Law Firm as bond counsel, an election agreement with Gray County and a joint City of Pampa. All of these items are routine when calling a regular election or special bond election.

The only difference between this year's bond election and previous elections is that early voting will be held at the Pampa ISD administration building.

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
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

rillo, discussed the involvement of Texas Tech and Pampa in the government grant program of Delivery System Reform Incentive Payment

PRMC will benefit from having a primary care physician trainee regularly rotating through the hospital and increasing the likelihood of a well-trained primary resident physician also extending the medical work force of Pampa while rotating here.

"Dr. Rahman's Outreach Breast Clinic provides expert, up to date breast cancer screening and care to low income and underserved women in the Pampa Area that otherwise might not receive timely, live-saving medical attention," Dr. Jordan said.

"Dr. Rahman also does surgery in Pampa, bringing the latest breast surgery techniques to the Pampa hospital. At some point in the future one of the breast fellowship trained surgeons in Dr. Rahman's program may locate to the Pampa area. The breast fellowship was started by Dr. Rahman in 2011."

Texas Tech will benefit by Pampa funding part of a residency physician position and this allows Texas Tech to produce more family medicine physicians.

" It also allows an excellent rural training experience. Training more primary care physicians by Texas Tech benefits the region and the entire state of Texas," Dr. Jordan said. "Approximately onethird of Texas Tech primary care residency graduates practice in the Panhandle and a total 65 percent stay in Texas."



Bouncin' Around My favorite actresses

The Oscars have been awarded for another year. Did your favorite actor or actress receive an award?

I know there are quite a few talented performers today, but I was blessed to have grown up during the era of some pretty awesome movie stars. My all-time favorite was Ingrid Bergman, one of the most Oscar-awarded actresses, second only to Katharine Hepburn (whom I will mention later.) I've seen almost every American

movie Ingrid Bergman made, from 'Casablanca," to "Notorious," "Gaslight," "Intermezzo," "Spellbound" and "Anastasia." Some of her last movies were made for television, "A Woman Called Golda" where she did a stunning job of portraying Golda Meir and "Murder on the Orient Express," where she played a mentally challenged former nanny. Even with the makeup designed to age her in those two movies, her natural beauty shone through.

My next favorite actress was Lauren Bacall, who passed away just last year at the age of 89. Her first movie, made when she was only 20

years old, was "To Have and Have Not" in which she starred with the man who would later become her husband, Humphrey Bogart. "Dark Passage," "Key Largo," "Blood Alley," "The Big Sleep" are only a few of her many dramatic roles, but I absolutely loved her role as Schatze in "How to Marry a Millionaire." She, too, had a natural beauty that didn't require tons of makeup to make her look better. Her deep, husky voice came across more sultry than masculine. She, too, appeared in "Murder on the Orient Express" as well as many TV movies and variety shows. Audrey Hepburn, with her big,

expressive eyes and her elfin appearance, was another favorite of mine. She possessed a quiet grace and a quick wit that shone through in such movies as "Sabrina," "Funny Face,"
"Breakfast at Tiffany's," "Charade" and of course, "My Fair Lady." We recently watched "Green Mansions," a movie in which Hepburn starred as "Rima," a young girl living in the forests of Venezuela with her grandfather. It's not one of her betterknown movies, but a very good one.

Katharine Hepburn (no relation to Audrey) makes my list with such movies as "The Philadelphia Story," "Adam's Rib," "The African Queen," "Guess Who's Coming to Dinner," "The Lion in Winter," "Rooster Cogburn," "The Glass Menagerie," "Bringing Up Baby" (in which she starred with Cary Grant and a leopard) and, of course, "On Golden Pond." All of these women were strong but very feminine, even though Katharine Hepburn was once criticized for wearing slacks and no makeup during the 1930's. None of them had cosmetic surgery, and they all aged gracefully. Of the three women, only Audrey Hepburn was active in any kind of charitable

In her later years, she put all her energy into UNICEF, supporting the starving children of the world. She herself was one of those children during World War II, and knew what suffering was.

His latest firing made it even more difficult for him to find a new job, which is why he landed in McFarland, Calif., one of the country's poorest cities. The movie takes place in 1987, and when White and his blonde-haired wife and two daughters arrive in McFarland, they are shocked by what they are faced with.

The White family appears to be the city's only white family, as it is populated primarily with Hispanics.

White quickly learns that the McFarland school system is not like those in other



towns he has worked in before.

He accepts a position at the high school as a life science teacher, P.E. teacher and head football coach. After the first football game, White is released from his position as head coach but not fired from the school.

He then focuses more on his P.E. class, in which the students generally lack any sort of motivation. He has them run laps and begins to see how fast some of the students are, and from there, the wheels start turning.

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Master Marketer program celebrates 20 years

Producers find value in the risk management training.

AMARILLO - When a Master Marketer class is offered by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, seats fill up fast. That's because the program, celebrating its 20th anniversary, is making a difference in farm operators' bottom line, according to attendees and coor-

Dr. Steve Amosson, AgriLife Extension economist in Amarillo, initiated the first training in 1996 and hosted the 27th training in Amarillo this year. Graduation of the 62 class members is March 3.

During the past 20 years, the program has offered agricultural producers a way to develop better risk management skills to deal with price volatility year in and year out, Amosson said. It has been conducted around the state in a format of a 64-hour curriculum covered in four two-day sessions held two weeks apart.

The format was suggested by a producer focus group and has worked quite well over the years, he said. While the content remains the same, the commodity emphasis of each program changes to fit the area of the state where it is being held.

AgriLife faculty provide a majority of course instruction, however, their efforts are complemented by a number of outside experts brought in from around the country to give their perspectives and guidance, Amos-

"We wanted to provide participants with the opportunity to hear from professionals they may have only read about, in an effort to provide them the best educational experience possible," he said.

Producers and industry have embraced the program because it is making a difference, confirmed by the repeated attendance by individuals and the requests for the award-winning training, Amosson said. More than a dozen of the current participants are past graduates. Also, other states are now conducting similar programs patterned after the Master Marketer program.

Janet Tregellas, a producer from Booker who attended the first training and has repeated it three times, said, 'We acquired the tools to prosper in the transitional environment that unfortunately has eliminated the unin-

"Dr. Amosson and the team continue to address the isupcoming leaner years. Producers must stay up to date to remain profitable as margins narrow."

In addition to Amosson, the original AgriLife Extension training team consisted of economists Dr. Mark Waller of College Station; Stan Bevers of Vernon; and Dr. Jackie Smith of Lubbock. Currently, Dr. Mark Welch, AgriLife Extension economist in grain market-





director of the program.

Annual program sponsors and underwriters include sues that will define success in Texas agriculture for the the Texas Corn Producers Board, Texas Wheat Producers Board, Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, the Cotton State Support Committee, Texas Farm Bureau, the Risk Management Agency and AgriLife Extension. In addition, several agribusinesses serve as local sponsors to help defray costs of the program.

The program team received the Superior Service Award from AgriLife Extension in 1997, the Vice Chaning and policy in College Station serves as the statewide cellor's Award of Excellence from Texas A&M Univer-



sity in 1998, and the Group Honor Award for Excellence from the U.S. Department of Agriculture in 2000 for "creating innovative programming to raise agricultural producers' management skills."

Locations of trainings over the years have included six in Amarillo, five in Vernon, four in Lubbock, two in Waco, and one each in El Campo, Plainview, San Angelo, Gainesville, Victoria, Wharton, Weslaco, Kingsville, Uvalde and Abilene.

The results have been overwhelming with capacity audiences in most locations of 40 to 60 producers, the economists said. Master Marketer has graduated more than 1,150 attendees from the 27 trainings.

In post-graduation surveys conducted two and half years after the training, graduates indicated they have increased their returns by an average of \$30,000 to \$35,000 annually, said Welch.

"What is important to realize is that the techniques learned in this program can be applied year after year in developing a producer's risk management plan," Welch

"The program not only has the potential to dramatically impact the bottom line of Master Marketers, but their communities as a whole," said Waller, Texas A&M associate department head for agricultural economics.

"Increased producer income translates into more money for goods and services, multiplying throughout the local economy, over and over again," Waller said.

Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in the Lone Star State, drivers in Dallas and Fort Worth are paying the most on average at \$2.22 per gallon while drivers in San Antonio are paying the least at \$2.12 per gallon. "HB 4 will hopefully provide the incentive for school districts to not only choose to invest in early childhood education, but to also ensure that our students are receiving high quality pre-K classes," said Rep. King. "If we put the emphasis on these children those guidelines. That's how I feel when my players or people that I care about call me coach. I'm proud of what I do. I really feel like coaches have some of the greatest opportunities to make a meaningful impact on students' lives.

Yesterday I had the opportunity to talk to a young man who was going through a hard time in his life. He said he didn't feel like he had anyone to talk to, but he knew he could talk to me because I was his coach. I don't know how much I helped him.

But I do know how much it meant to me that he would give me the chance. I thank God often for putting me in a job that I look forward to coming to every day.

Of course coaching has its negative side. There is a lot of pressure

There is always going to be fans that question a call you make or a decision you make. When we do make a mistake it's seen by hundreds, sometimes thousands of people.

But I promise you I wouldn't trade what I do for anything. I love Pampa and I especially love being a coach in Pampa.
