DPS arrests 10 from drug smuggling investigation

AMARILLO – The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) today announced the arrests of 10 suspects in connection with a multi-agency investigation targeting drug smuggling organizations in the Texas Panhandle.

These arrests are in addition to 19 other suspects who were arrested in 2013 and 2014 on conspiracy and drug trafficking charges in connection with the investigation that began in 2011. Over the course of the investigation, authorities seized 18 firearms, approximately \$500,000 in cash, more than 37 pounds of methamphetamine and almost 25 pounds of cocaine.

DPS Criminal Investigations Division agents along with the Texas Highway Patrol, Federal Bureau of Investigation, Amarillo Police Department, Randall County Sheriff's Office and the Potter County Sheriff's Office were all involved in the investigation and recent arrests after receiving indictments from the Randall County District Attorney's Office.

Suspects arrested during the investigation and their related charges include:

John Eric Perez, 27, of Amarillo. Engaging in organized criminal activity (first-degree felony).

Applications for conservation programs being accepted at Gray County NRCS Office

USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) District Conservationist Zach Criddle announces applications for funding opportunities with the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) are currently being accepted at the NRCS offices located at 12125 E Frederic Ave, Pampa, TX 79065

NRCS in Texas has received its initial allocation of EQIP funding for 2015 and will begin ranking and obligating contracts after April 17, 2015. All agriculture producers interested in submitting a contract application for 2015 should do so before this ranking deadline.

EQIP — one of the largest programs in the Farm Bill — is a voluntary conservation program that promotes environ-

mental quality and assists producers to meet local, state and federal regulations. "EQIP is a valuable tool to help Gray County's agricultural producers implement conservation practices that provide environmental benefits to help sustain agricultural operations," says Zach Criddle. EQIP is a continuous sign-up programs that allow landowners or operators to apply for financial and technical assistance for the application of specific conservation practices; but the deadline for the first 2015 funding allocation is April 17, 2015. Contracts are offered periodically depending on budgetary allocations.

Applications made after the deadline will be considered in the next funding cycle.

paign. George P. Bush is headlining a fundraiser Thursday in Austin for the super PAC that can collect unlimited amounts of money to support Jeb Bush if he decides to run for president, according to an invitation. Billed as an event for “young professionals” in Austin, the event also features Jeb Bush Jr., the land commissioner’s younger brother.

George P. Bush’s political shop cautioned against reading too much into his involvement in the fundraiser — a no-brainer given its location in the city where he now spends most

his time as as the head of the General Land Office.

“Commissioner Bush is not going to be actively involved in any presidential campaign in 2016,” said Kasey Pipes, a spokesman for the land commissioner. “He is fully engaged at the GLO, and that’s where his entire focus is.”

“However, he clearly supports his father and thinks he will be a great president and will help where he can,” Pipes added. Jim McGrath, a spokesman for George H.W. Bush — George P. Bush’s grandfather — said he sees the fundraiser as a “continuation” of the stumping the land commissioner did for the 2000 and 2004 presidential campaigns of his uncle, George W. Bush. Since then, George P. Bush has carved out his own base

of support — particularly among Hispanic voters in Texas — that he can introduce to his dad.

“So he’s built up his kind of own political identity that kind of carried him to office.

He’s using that appeal now to try and help his father reach an audience he’s been successful with,” McGrath said, adding that he is “not the least bit surprised” George P. Bush is pitching in. “He did it for his uncle, of course he’s going to do it for his father, and by the way, he’s pretty good at it.”

During his first trip to Iowa this past weekend as a potential 2016 candidate, Jeb Bush reportedly said “you might see” his son one day in the first-in-the-country presidential caucus state.

In addition to serving as

a 2016 surrogate, the land commissioner’s prominent pedigree already has vaulted him into conversations about his presidential prospects.

The fundraiser for Right to Rise super PAC is being hosted at the home of Martha and James Dyess, CEO of Austin-based Horizon Bank SSB. The event costs \$50 to attend, \$500 to host, \$2,500 to sponsor and \$5,000 to co-chair, according to the invitation.

George P. Bush made some waves last year for not appearing gung-ho about his dad’s interest in a run for the White House, declining to endorse him if he ran for president.

He later clarified he would support his father if he decided to run and help him out in any way he was asked.

Higher priority will be given to those applications that address national, state and local priorities and provide higher cost efficiency.

EQIP offers technical and financial help to install or implement structural, veg-

etative, and management practices that can benefit the soil, water, air, plants, livestock, and wildlife. Each county in the state is funded yearly to assist producers financially with these land management practices.

Last year, NRCS in Texas funded over 3,400 EQIP contracts with \$82 million to accomplish conservation practices such as irrigation

efficiency, minimum tillage, brush management and more on 1.8 million acres across the entire state.

In addition to helping our environment, Farm Bill conservation program funds support rural communities.

In Texas, it is estimated that each dollar of NRCS and private matching expenditures on NRCS conservation programs gener-

ates an additional \$2.54 in sales of goods and services locally.

Proposal would require top courts to broadcast arguments

AUSTIN (AP) — A Texas lawmaker has proposed asking voters to decide whether the state's highest appeals courts should have to record and post online video of its proceedings, a move that would bring the Lone Star State up to speed with 30 U.S. states.

On Tuesday, a committee will hear the proposal from Democratic Rep. Terry Canales, of Edinburg.

Canales says his Republican peers may support a recording requirement in the name of transparency. But he's less certain that they'll appropriate the cash that Texas' Court of Criminal Appeals would need to record proceedings. The Supreme Court of Texas has broadcast arguments online for years.

The amendment, which would require voter approval, would "allow the

people of Texas to decide if transparency in our high courts is important," said Canales, a civil and criminal lawyer, in a recent interview.

Chief Justice Sharon Keller was not available for a comment.

The Office of Court Administration has estimated that it would cost the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals about \$300,000 initially and \$48,000 annually to implement broadcasting. The chambers, located on the Capitol grounds, would need a new sound system, better lighting and cameras, said David Slayton, the office's executive director.

"We could obviously do it for cheaper," Slayton said. "But if the court is mandated to do it, we feel like there is an obligation for it to be funded."

Most states only have one top appeals court

that handles both civil and criminal cases, but in Texas, the highest courts are operated — and funded — separately.

The Supreme Court has webcast arguments since 2007, but the Court of Criminal Appeals — which rules on appeals including those from inmates on death row — doesn't.

Only eight U.S. states do not broadcast either audio or video of their arguments, according to Canales' office.

In 2005, then-Chief Justice Wallace Jefferson asked the Legislature to pay for webcasting but the state refused. Two years later, St. Mary's School of Law paid to start the system and funded it until 2012, when it could no longer afford to.

Since then, the State Bar of Texas has footed the bill, at about

\$60,000 a year, according to spokesman Lowell Brown. Between 30 and 60 people watch the monthly broadcasts, but as many as 500 viewers have tuned into online arguments for high-profile cases.

The online arguments come in handy for law school professors and students but also benefit Texans, said Reynaldo Valencia, the associate dean for administration and finance for St. Mary's School of Law.

"The more that the public has in terms of operations at the highest courts of Texas, the better the system is," he said.

In fiscal year 2014, the top civil court's budget was \$5.8 million and justices issued 115 opinions. The top criminal court's budget was \$5.5 million and justices issued 457 opinions.

Which leaker is worse, Petraeus or Snowden?

Former four-star general and CIA chief David Petraeus pleaded guilty to one count of retaining classified information for handing over information in personal notebooks to his

biographer girlfriend in 2011. He agreed to pay a \$40,000 fine; prosecutors said they would recommend two years' probation instead of prison, although a judge could decide otherwise. It's a sad close to a government career for the man whose counterinsurgency strategy turned around the war in Iraq. He's an American hero who seemed all that much more upright when he resigned in November 2012 after admitting to an affair that compromised his position — without drama and after quickly owning up to his mistakes.

Except he didn't come completely clean; America now knows — because it's in the official record — Petraeus lied to the FBI. That's a serious offense. But should he go to prison?

On one side, Petraeus supporters, such as Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., argued that Petraeus had done too much for the country to be discarded in a prison cell. In January, Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., said the Department of Justice should not prosecute the former CIA chief, as he had "suffered enough."

Yes, D.C. pols tend to be quick to forgive crimes committed in the cause of self-aggrandizement. No need to wonder why.

On the other side, critics see a fine and probation as special treatment. The Los Angeles Times contrasted the Petraeus plea bargain with those of convicted leakers Stephen Jin-Woo Kim, a former State Department contractor (13 months in prison), and John Kiriakou, a former CIA officer (30 months). "The whiff of a double standard is overwhelming. If anything, a leader at Petraeus' level should be held to a higher standard than lower-level officials or contractors," the paper

editorialized. (Kim's leak risked compromising U.S. intelligence gathering in North Korea. Kiriakou revealed the identity of a covert agent.)

But there are good reasons to spare Petraeus from prison. David Deitch, a former federal prosecutor now in private practice, told me he sees little public interest in sending Petraeus to prison, as his conduct "never really posed" a risk to national security. As for Petraeus' successful military record, Deitch believes it is something judges consider. Looking at a defendant's life is "not a dodge; it's part of the process."

Others contrast Petraeus with leakers on a grand scale — Chelsea Manning, the former Army private now serving a 35-year sentence, and self-proclaimed National Security Agency leaker Edward Snowden, now a fugitive in Moscow. The Chelsea Manning Support Network charged Petraeus with leaking "to his mistress, who was writing his biography, for personal gain," as opposed to Manning, who leaked "for the public good." Rep. Alan Grayson, D-Fla., told U.S. News & World Report that Petraeus broke the law "to impress a girlfriend. Edward Snowden released confidential information in order to bring attention to overwhelming and pervasive constitutional violations."

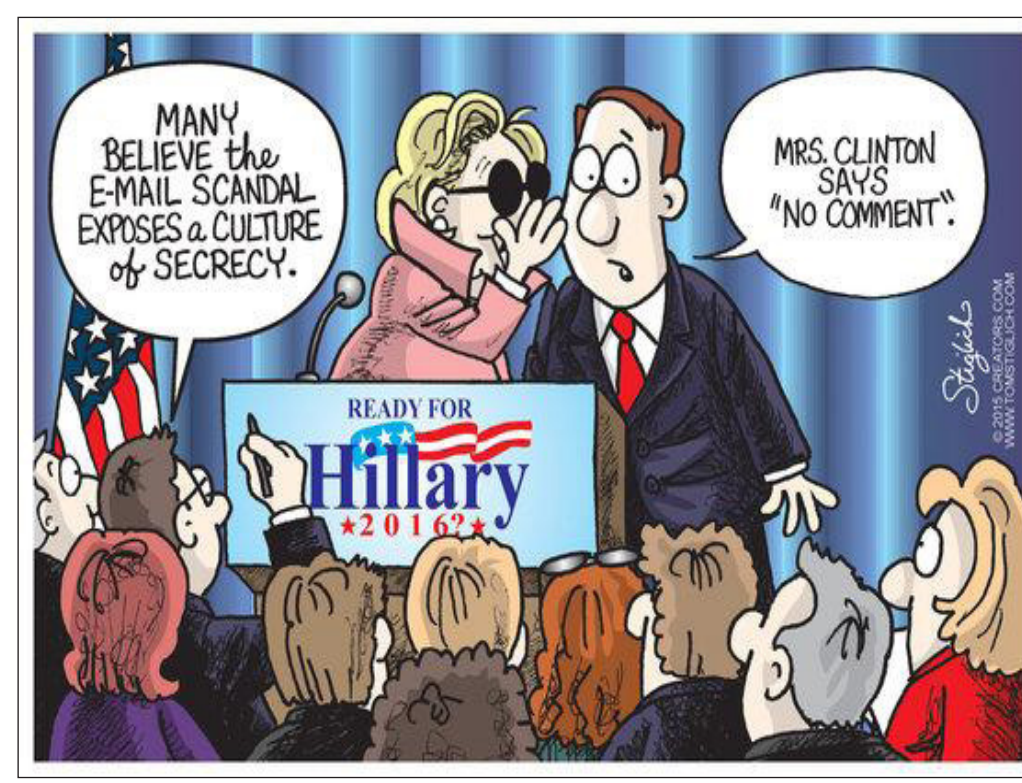
Last weekend, I watched "Citizenfour," the Academy Award-winning Laura Poitras documentary on Snowden. Talk about self-aggrandizement. For almost two hours, I was treated to one-shots of Snowden typing on his laptop on a hotel bed, playing with his hair in a hotel bathroom and discussing how he didn't really want the NSA leak story to be all about him. But we never got answers to the questions that challenge the Snowden hagiography. How did Snowden really end up in Moscow? What does Snowden think of Russia's record on surveillance and treatment of "whistleblowers"?

and even more wrong to hand them over to Paula Broadwell, but that's as far as the information went. As former CIA spokesman Bill Harlow noted, "Petraeus mishandled classified information — but there was no intent to expose secrets or evidence of damage done (except to himself)."

"Snowden intentionally stole enormous amounts of highly classified information and gleefully made it available to America's enemies," quoth Harlow. "Big difference." Unlike Petraeus, Snowden deliberately released sensitive information that informs terrorist organizations that want to kill Americans

on how they can evade detection.

For all his good work, Petraeus had to pay a penalty because he lied to the FBI. But there is no need to send him to prison, because the system can survive his folly and no intelligence asset was hurt. You cannot say that about Manning or Snowden; the system cannot survive rogue actors who decide they have a right to broadcast state secrets. "It seems to be that unless you are willing to aggressively prosecute the classified nature" of U.S. intelligence, Deitch told me, "the whole system collapses on itself."

Yale football staff produces 3 bone marrow donors

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — Finding a match for someone who needs a bone marrow transplant can be like searching for a needle in a haystack — unless you are looking at Yale University.

An unlikely three members of the football staff, who were all roommates, have donated bone marrow along with some two dozen others from Yale, where advocates say they are finding an unusually high match rate.

Chris Gennaro, the school's director of football operations, donated in the fall of 2012. His assistant, Zach Wigmore, was notified that he too was a match for a cancer patient a few months later. Outside linebackers coach Paul Rice soon got a similar call. And a player, center John Oppenheimer, also became a donor that year.

"You could absolutely say that this team saved four lives," said Gennaro, who was in Washington this week, lobbying Congress for more money to fund the national Be the Match registry, which puts volunteers into a database to determine if they might have the same protein markers as someone who needs a donation.

About 12,000 people need transplants each year, and matches are found for just over half of those, according to Chad Ramsey, director of legislative relations for Be the Match. Only about one in 540 people who get their cheeks swabbed to become part of the database end up being linked to a patient.

The odds that four people from the same school would become donors are much worse, and the chance that three people living in the same house would match three different patients, astronomical.

"The doctors were pretty much floored," said Rice, a former Yale captain and linebacker.

Ramsey says colleges are the ideal spot for registration drives, because of the youth and diversity of the population.

Yale is one of the more active campuses for bone marrow registration. Rice first took part as a player in a 2009 registration drive for Mandi Schwartz, a hockey player who never found a match. She died of acute myeloid leukemia in 2011.

"She and her family made such an impact on the Yale community," said head football coach Tony Reno, whose entire team has become part of the registry. "And people who come to Yale want to be involved in something much bigger than themselves. That is really part of the fabric of Yale."

Since that first drive, more than 4,500 people at Yale have registered and more than two dozen of those have ended up donating bone marrow. Another drive is set for April 16.

"Just adding the sheer numbers that they have added to the registry will lead to some matches," Ramsey said. "But the rate of matches there goes beyond science. We've never seen anything like it."

Gennaro, who actually joined the registry while

playing football at the University of Maine, said the donation process takes several hours but is painless.

In most cases, doctors no longer take marrow by sticking a needle into the hip bone. Instead, they use a process in which they take the cells they need directly from a patient's blood as it circulates through a machine.

"It's like donating blood," he said. "It may even be easier."

It costs about \$100 to add a name to the registry, which now includes more than 12½ million names. The federal government provides about \$23 million a year to help add people to the registry, assist patients in navigating the system and fund research. Ramsey said Be the Match officials are hoping to avoid budget

cuts and maybe even get a bump, thanks to the testimony of people such as Gennaro.

He considers what the Yale football team has done to be heroic. Rice said he doesn't.

"To me it just seems that you are lucky enough to be in that position, you owe it to humanity to enter the registry and then, if you have a chance, go donate," he said.

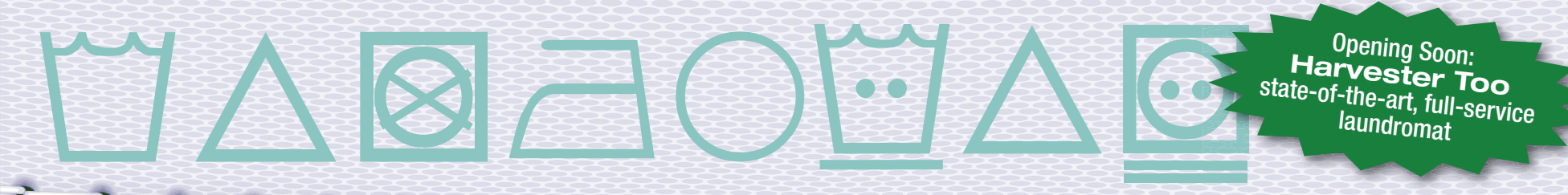



Coalition of Texas activists pushes tighter ethics rules

AUSTIN (AP) — Buoyed by Gov. Greg Abbott fast-tracking tougher ethics rules proposals through the Legislature, a coalition of political and civil groups has unveiled a package of changes they're championing.

The Texas Anti-Corruption Campaign features left-leaning groups including Public Citizen, and conservatives like the state Libertarian Party.

They'd like to strengthen existing but rarely enforced conflict-of-interest rules against lawmakers voting on bills that could profit their outside livelihoods.

The coalition also wants to update campaign disclosure laws to prevent "double dipping," or officials drawing state pensions while still on the job.

Its members stopped short Monday of demanding caps on Texas' unlimited state political donations, since those aren't likely to pass the Legislature.

Abbott made ethics reforms a legislative "emergency item." Bills on the issue by top Republicans and Democrats remain pending.

US stocks edge higher; steadying after Friday's big sell off

NEW YORK (AP) — U.S. stocks opened higher Monday, led by gains for industrial companies and utilities. The market is steadying after a big-sell off on Friday when a strong jobs report boosted expectations that the Federal Reserve would raise interest rates this summer.

GM gained after announcing a \$5 billion stock buyback to appease an activist investor.

KEEPING SCORE: The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose three points, or 0.1 percent, to 2,074 as of 9:49 a.m. Eastern time. The Dow Jones industrial average climbed 58 points, or 0.3 percent, to 17,912 points. The Nasdaq composite was flat at 4,927.

BUYBACK DEAL: General Motors announced that it would buy back \$5 billion of its own stock by the end of the year. The move is part of a deal with Harry Wilson, an activist investor and a former member of the government task force that restructured GM coming out of its 2009 bankruptcy. In exchange, Wilson agreed to withdraw his hostile candidacy for the Detroit automaker's board of directors. GM's stock rose 96 cents, or 2.6 percent, to \$37.50.

APPLE WATCH: Apple CEO Tim Cook is expected

to unveil the company's Apple smartwatch and make the case for why it's a must-have gadget at a San Francisco event later Monday. Apple teased the smartwatch in September but has given few details. Apple's stock rose 83 cents, or 0.7 percent, to \$127.43.

FED TALK DOMINATES: Stocks slumped on Friday after a Labor Department report showed that the U.S. added 295,000 jobs in February. That ratcheted up expectations that Federal Reserve policy makers will raise interest rates as soon as June. The Fed has held interest rates close to zero for more than six years to stimulate growth following the financial crisis and Great Recession.

ECB STARTS QE: The European Central Bank started its 60 billion euro (\$65 billion) per month bond-buying program on Monday. The bank hopes the purchases will stimulate the eurozone economy and get inflation back to the bank's target of just below 2 percent. At present, consumer prices in the 19-country currency bloc are falling at an annual rate of 0.3 percent.

EUROPE'S DAY: France's CAC-40 fell 0.5 percent while Germany's DAX was flat. The FTSE

100 index of leading British shares was 0.6 percent lower.

ENERGY: Benchmark U.S. crude was little changed at \$49.60 a barrel on the New York Mercantile Exchange. Brent crude, used to price international oils, lost 46 cents to \$59.27 per barrel in London.

BONDS AND CURRENCIES: U.S. government bond prices rose. The yield on the 10-year Treasury note fell to 2.20 percent from 2.25 percent on Friday.

The divergence between the Fed and the ECB's monetary policies has pushed the euro lower against the dollar. After falling to its lowest in 12 years against the dollar on Friday, the euro recovered some ground on Monday, trading at \$1.0869. The dollar was flat against the Japanese currency at 120.86 yen.

Chad and Niger troops move to attack Boko Haram

N'DJAMENA, Chad (AP) — Forces from Chad and Niger opened a new front in the regional military fight against the Islamic extremist group Boko Haram, as army vehicles full of soldiers crossed the border into northeast Nigeria, officials and witnesses said Monday.

The escalation in a joint military campaign against the Nigeria-based Boko Haram comes just weeks before Nigerians head to the polls for an election which many fear will turn violent, and after the militants have attacked neighboring countries who have pledged to help Nigeria defeat the extremists.

Chadian Brig. Gen. Zakaria Ngobongue said Monday that his soldiers, alongside troops from Niger, had entered Nigeria. He declined to give details about the ongoing operation. Already Chadian forces had crossed into northeastern Nigeria from Cameroon to fight the jihadists, he said.

Boko Haram has been fighting a nearly 6-year insurgency against the Nigerian government, and on Saturday declared their allegiance to the extremist Islamic State group in the Middle East, raising fears that the conflict could be internationalized with IS fighters from North Africa. Boko Haram has carried out mass kidnappings, including of schoolgirls.

"They are bandits and criminals who have nothing to do with religion," Ngobongue said. He spoke to reporters after the closing ceremony for Flintlock, a training in counter-ter-

rorism tactics that included U.S. special forces and involved 20 countries.

Witnesses in the Niger town of Bosso reported about 200 military vehicles crossing over into Nigeria since Saturday. Adam Boukarna, one resident, said the deployment was followed by loud detonations, signaling heavy combat with Boko Haram.

Describing the stepped-up military activity, Nigerian military spokesman Brig. Gen. Chris Olukolade said Sunday night that "there were some pre-emptive manoeuvres along an axis in the theater. Nigerian forces were also involved."

Military spokesmen from Nigeria and Niger could not immediately be reached for further comment Monday.

Cameroon's minister of defense, Edgard Alain Mebe Ngo'o, said troops from Nigeria and Chad would fight Boko Haram while soldiers from Cameroon and Niger would guard their borders to prevent the militants from escaping. Boko Haram has been using Cameroon as an escape and supply route.

Residents in potential

conflict zones in Cameroon have been asked to leave, the minister said.

Tens of thousands of Nigerians have taken refuge in the area, among 1.6 million people driven from their homes by the insurgency.

International concern has increased along with the casualties. About 10,000 people were killed in Boko Haram's uprising last year, compared to about 2,000 in the four previous years, according to the U.S. Council on Foreign Relations.

The United States, Britain, France and the European Union are backing the formation of a multinational force of 8,750 troops led by Nigeria and Chad with contingents from Cameroon, Niger and Benin. Several other countries also have pledged to help.

On Saturday, Boko Haram leader Abubakar Shekau reportedly pledged his group's allegiance to the Islamic State group, raising fears that the conflict largely restricted to northeast Nigeria and its neighbors' borders could be internationalized.

Univ. of Oklahoma president: Frat members 'disgraceful'

NORMAN, Okla. (AP) — The president of the University of Oklahoma lambasted members of a fraternity on Monday who participated in a racist chant caught on video, calling them disgraceful and their behavior reprehensible, and ordered that their house be vacated by Tuesday night.

President David Boren joined students at a pre-dawn rally on the Norman campus, just hours after Sigma Alpha Epsilon said an investigation confirmed the contents of the online video and announced it was closing the local chapter.

The video shows several people chanting a racial slur and indicating blacks would never be admitted to the fraternity. The chant also references lynching. "These people have acted in a way that's absolutely reprehensible and disgraceful," Boren said. "Real Sooners are not bigots, racists."

The national fraternity released a statement Sunday night saying it was "embarrassed" by the "unacceptable and racist" behavior. Boren later released a statement saying members had until midnight Tuesday to remove their personal belongings

from the fraternity house. A link to the video was posted by OU Unheard, a black student group on campus, after someone anonymously called it to the group's attention, communications director Alexis Hall said Monday. "We immediately needed to share that with the OU student body," said Hall, a junior. "For students to say they're going to lynch an entire group of people. ... It's disgusting."

It's unclear who recorded the video, when it was recorded and who initially posted it online. Hill said a link to the video was sent Sunday afternoon to the student group, which formed in the fall in response to a fatal police shooting in Ferguson, Missouri.

The video appears to have been taken on a charter bus, with at least one of the chanting students wearing a tuxedo. "I was shocked they were just doing it openly on the bus, like they were proud of it," said Jared Scarborough, a junior in construction science. "From the chant you could tell they had done it before. It wasn't a first-time thing. And it was everybody. And the fist-pumping."

A university police cruiser was parked Monday outside the fraternity house, a sprawling two-story, sand-colored brick building on a street lined with Greek houses just west of the center of campus.

The University of Oklahoma, located in the southern Oklahoma City suburb of Norman, has about 27,000 students, about 5 percent of whom are black. The Greek system is largely segregated.

Ahead of a late-morning news conference, Boren said fraternity members had "violated all that we stand for."

"Effective immediately, all ties and affiliations between this University and the local SAE chapter are hereby severed. I direct that the house be closed and that members will remove their personal belongings from the house by midnight tomorrow," he said.

James Patterson launches grant program for libraries

NEW YORK (AP) — Having handed out more than \$1 million to help independent bookstores, James Patterson is now sharing his wealth with some other vital, but often struggling institutions: School libraries.

The best-selling author announced Monday that he was donating \$1.25 million through a grant program administered with Scholastic Reading Club, a division of Scholastic, Inc. Libraries or supporters of libraries can seek donations \$1,000 to \$10,000. Scholastic will match each donation with "Bonus Points" that can be used to purchase classroom materials. According to Patterson, requests can be for anything from fixing a computer system to paying for a school reading project.

"James Patterson is such a champion of books and reading for all children. We are thrilled to work with him to support school libraries, which are essential for thriving school communities," Judy Newman, president of Scholastic Reading Club, said in a statement.

Patterson, who has strong memories of his weekly

visits to libraries as a child, told the Associated Press during a recent interview that he wanted to "shine a light" on the problem of public schools with no libraries or underfunded libraries. In California, for instance there was just one certified school librarian for every 7,784 students in 2012-13. Chicago and Philadelphia are among the other cities that have sharply cut library staffing. More than 8,000 public schools nationwide did not have libraries in 2011-12, according to the National Center for Educational Statistics.

"A lot of schools also don't have as many books as they should have," said Patterson, adding that libraries were especially important for kids in households without books. "There's a myth out there among some people that the kids are reading only digital books now. They're not."

The program will begin with a \$250,000 donation from Patterson, with the remaining \$1 million to be distributed throughout the year and additional funding likely in the future.

It's the latest work of philanthropy for Patterson,

an advocate of literacy for more than a decade through such projects as Read, Kiddo, Read and the James Patterson PageTurner Awards, which offers cash prizes to individuals who helped promote and encourage reading. In 2013, he earned the gratitude of the independent bookselling community by launching a system of grants similar to what he is doing now for libraries.

Patterson's interest in reading begins at home. He remembers pushing his then-8-year-old son Jack to like books, assigning him a reading list one summer and watching him advance so well that he managed a perfect score on his English SAT exam.

"I'm the most emotional and passionate about getting kids reading in late elementary and early middle school reading because if they don't how are they going to get through high school?" he said.

"We just want to keep doing something useful, pushing the rock up the hill. It's a big rock, a big hill."

Director of Allman film pleads guilty in train crash death

JESUP, Ga. (AP) — The director of a movie about musician Gregg Allman pleaded guilty Monday in a train crash that killed a camera assistant and injured six film workers, and prosecutors in exchange dropped charges against his wife and business partner.

The case is a rare example of filmmakers being prosecuted for deaths on their sets. Furthermore, the death of Sarah Jones, 27, galvanized behind-the-scenes film workers nationwide to push for improved safety standards on sets.

As part of the plea deal, Director Randall Miller will spend two years in the county jail and another eight on probation on involuntary manslaughter and criminal trespassing charges. He also will pay a \$20,000 fine.

Miller's wife and business partner, Jody Savin, will no longer face the same charges.

A third defendant, executive producer Jay Sedrish, also pleaded guilty to involuntary manslaughter and criminal trespassing on Monday but avoided jail time. He will be allowed to

serve 10 years of probation from his home in California.

In the crash a year ago, a freight train traveling 55 mph plowed into the director's crew on a Georgia railroad bridge.

CSX Transportation, the railroad company that owns the bridge where the crash occurred, has said it twice denied the filmmakers permission to shoot footage on its tracks in rural southeast Georgia. Under state law, someone can be convicted of involuntary manslaughter for committing a misdemeanor — in this case trespassing — that unintentionally causes another person to be killed.

It was the first day of shooting on "Midnight Rider" when Miller and his crew stepped onto the railroad bridge spanning the Altamaha River on Feb. 20, 2014. Actor William Hurt was on the set in his role as the Allman Brothers Band singer in his later years. A metal-framed bed was pulled across the tracks as a prop. When the train struck, it smashed the bed and hurled metal fragments at the fleeing crew.

The train struck and killed Jones, a young camera assistant from Atlanta who had worked on TV series including "Army Wives" and "The Vampire Diaries."

A sobbing Miller called Jones' parents to tell them she was dead. The director, whose previous films included "Bottle Shock" and "CBGB," testified last May in a related civil case that he had been told only two trains a day crossed the bridge and he only set out with his crew onto the trestle after a pair of trains had passed. Asked if the crew had obtained permission from the railroad to film on its tracks, Miller said that wasn't his job. But he bristled at the suggestion he recklessly put his crew in danger.

"I was in the middle of the track and I almost died," Miller said in civil court May 12.

The "Midnight Rider" movie has been in limbo since the crash. Allman sued Miller to prevent the director from reviving the film. They settled out of court last year, and terms were not disclosed.

Iditarod begins; mushers embark on new route across Alaska

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (AP) — Iditarod mushers began their 1,000-mile trek across Alaska along a new route Monday after poor trail conditions forced organizers to move the race's start farther north and over the Alaska Range.

Canadian rookie Rob Cooke, who hails from Whitehorse, Yukon Territory, was the first musher to leave in Fairbanks in the staggered start.

The Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race usually kicks off 225 miles south in Willow, but officials decided to move it because of a lack of snow in the Alaska Range.

The Iditarod spans two mountain ranges, dangerous wilderness and the wind-whipped Bering Sea coast. This is only the second time Fairbanks has hosted the official start; similar low-snow conditions also moved it there in 2003.

The same weather pattern that repeatedly dumped snow on the East Coast has left Alaska fairly warm and snowless this winter. Even a snowstorm projected to dump up to 9 inches of snow Friday in Anchorage turned into an all-night rain instead.

The lack of snow has made for treacherous conditions south of the Alaska Range, especially in the area of the Dalzell Gorge, considered the roughest patch for mushers and dogs. This is where many mushers were bloodied and bruised in crashes last year.

Officials said this year's conditions are worse. The new route will reduce the number of checkpoints in the early part of the race. But it adds stops at villages that have never been part of the Iditarod — like tiny Huslia, an Athabaskan village of about 300 residents.

Even though the Alaska Range has been eliminated, the race will now be run on about 600 miles of river ice, and that can cause a whole new set of obstacles to overcome. "There's kind of a little bit of holding our breath to see just what the route will actually be like given the persisting warm temperatures," said Mitch Seavey, a two-time champion and the oldest musher to win the race at age 53 two years ago.

This year's Iditarod includes 78 mushers, including 20 rookies and six former champions.

Unlike the festive ceremonial start, which is designed to let fans interact with mushers, the competitive start in Fairbanks is all business for competitors.

Racers leave the starting chute in two-minute intervals. Their goal is to be first musher to drive their dog team to the finish line in the coastal town of Nome.

The winner will pocket \$70,000, which is \$19,600 more than what defending champion Dallas Seavey, Mitch's son and another two-time winner, received last year because of an increased purse.

Musher Aliy Zirkle, who has finished in second place the past three years, said she's just pleased the Iditarod is happening at all this year.

"I'm pretty happy they are going to pull it off," she said last week. "There's been a lot of races that have been canceled."

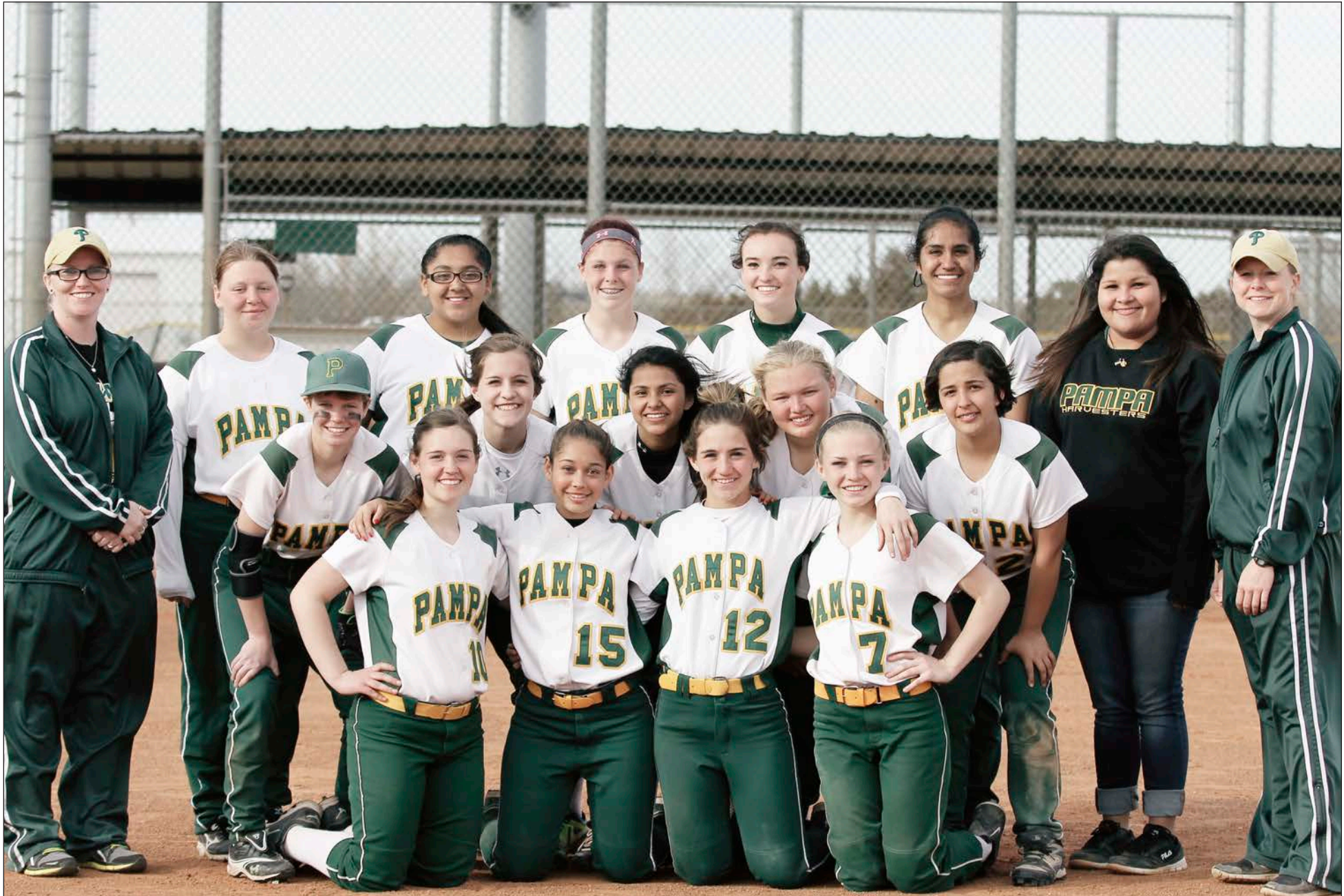

Home surveillance shows Aaron Hernandez on night of killing

FALL RIVER, Mass. (AP) — Home surveillance video in the

murder trial of former New England Patriots player Aaron Hernandez shows him holding what prosecutors say is a gun and leaving his house with two co-defendants hours before the killing.

Hernandez is accused of the June 17, 2013, killing of Odin Lloyd, who was dating the sister of Hernandez's fiancée.

Surveillance video played Monday shows him walking through the living room carrying a black object at about 12:45 a.m. A baby sitter there testified that she didn't see the object.

Video shows Hernandez leaving at 1:09 a.m. with two co-defendants.

Prosecutors say they went to pick up Lloyd, and he was dead by 3:30 a.m.

Earlier Monday, a juror handed the judge a note, and he was questioned at the bench. Trial then resumed.
