Accident survivor makes miraculous recovery

This weekend marks two months from the day of a horrific car accident on Highway 60 that caused three-year-old Allison Barrett to be life flighted to Amarillo then Lubbock with life-threatening injuries.

The accident was Jan. 15, and some of Allison's injuries from the wreck were a severed left arm that was barely holding on and broken femur. Other injuries to her head required Allison to undergo brain surgery to remove a splinter of part of her skull that had broken off,

and during the surgery, they ended up having

to take out part of Allison's left lobe. While there were no complications, such as a brain bleed, which was a possibility, during the brain surgery, doctors did not expect Allison to be able to walk or talk ever again. After that, she suffered a blood clot in her leg that made doctors concerned about her head injuries, but no additional complications arose

from the clot. In addition to those injuries, doctors were especially concerned about Allison's left hand,

Ruby returned to Lubbock to teach, then spent 22 years on the faculty of South Plains College.


In March of 2000, Ruby entered the ministry after a walk to Emmaus.

As UCLA law professor Eugene Volokh wrote, "racist speech is constitutionally protected, just as is expression of other contemptible ideas; and universities may not discipline students based on their speech." Courts have consistently ruled to doesn't want the government to educate only people with approved

viewpoints. And still, Boren's move appears to be wildly popular in academia. Sigma Alpha Epsilon's headquarters, which quickly began proceedings to expel the University of Oklahoma chapter, issued a statement in support of Boren's ouster of the two supposed ringleaders.

Boren wrote to the two frat boys that he was expelling them because of their "leadership role in leading a racist and exclusionary chant which has created a hostile educational environment for others." "Hostile environment," supporters point out, refers to federal guidelines that mandate equal access to higher education.

In recent years, student activists have used "hostile environment" claims to try to muzzle those whose unwelcome viewpoints might "trigger" feelings that make students feel less safe. (For example, a University of California, Santa Barbara professor told police that anti-abortion activists "triggered" a negative reaction in her that caused her to commit battery against a teenage abortion opponent and steal her poster.) There needs to be a high standard for "hostile environment," Peter Bonilla of the Foundation for Individual Rights in Education told me; conduct has to be severe,



St. Patrick's Day Symbols

St. Patrick's Day is one of the more lively days of the year. Revelers may prefer to indulge in a few adult beverages, but even those who don't imbibe can enjoy the festive atmosphere of St. Patrick's Day, which in many communities involves a parade and maybe even a festival featuring Irish music.

While parades and a pint or two of Guinness might be the first thing many people associate with St. Patrick's Day, there are a host of other symbols that have become synonymous with the holiday as well.

SNAKES are associated with St. Patrick's Day, but that association is rooted more in myth than reality. Legend long had it that St. Patrick once stood atop a hilltop that is now called Croagh Patrick and banished all the snakes from Ireland. In fact, however, the Emerald Isle has never been home to any snakes, and this banishment of the "snakes" is actually just a metaphor for St. Patrick's role in bringing Christianity to Ireland. The "snakes" are believed to be a pagan ideology that the Irish subscribed to prior to St. Patrick's arrival. Within a couple of centuries of St. Patrick's arrival in Ireland, the island had been completely Christianized.

Leprechauns can trace their roots to Celtic folklore, where they were referred to as "lobaircin," which meant "small-bodied fellow." The leprechaun did not play a prominent role in Celtic folklore, but they were known for trickery they used to protect their treasures. Though leprechauns have today become a symbol many associate with St. Patrick's Day, they actually have no legitimate connection to the holiday. Their association with St. Patrick's Day can likely be traced to the 1959 Disney film "Darby O'Gill & the Little People," which popularized the image many people now have of leprechauns.

SHAMROCKS. In ancient Ireland, the shamrock was considered a sacred plant that symbolized the rebirth of spring. Over time, the shamrock would become even more meaningful to the Irish people, eventually becoming a symbol of the pride they felt with regard to their Irish heritage and a symbol of their displeasure with English rule.

THE COLOR GREEN is another symbol of St. Patrick's Day, though many historians note the color St. Patrick wore was blue and not green. But wearing green on St. Patrick's Day is a way those of Irish descent show pride in their heritage. Green was likely adopted because of the lush green landscape of Ireland, which thanks to ample yearly rainfall, is green year-round.

CORNED BEEF is a symbol of St. Patrick's Day that does not trace its roots to Ireland but most likely to New York City. Corned beef and cabbage is a dish enjoyed by millions on St. Patrick's Day, but while cabbage can be traced to Ireland, corned beef was likely substituted for Irish bacon by Irish immigrants living in New York City. Irish bacon was too expensive for many of these Irish immigrants, who

found corned beef a much more affordable

alternative.

March Madness is here.

Perhaps the biggest sporting event aside from the Super Bowl is now upon us.

That is March Madness. Everyone will fill out their office pools for fun.

When I was in college my friends and I made brackets and we had a bracket wall in our apartment where we had about 20 brackets taped to the wall.

To me, March Madness is a lot more fun to watch than college bowls.

A lot of times the bowls are only one game a night for a while and usually a lot of the games are just plain boring because of who is in the bowls.

March Madness pits the top teams with everyone else and on opening weekend, this Thursday through Sunday, there will be a total of 48 games played. The games are broad-

cast for free online and on many cable channels so that you can watch all of the games and as many as you want at one time.

What makes it so exciting? The parity.

In recent years there has been more and more parity with the mid-major teams winning games they weren't supposed to.

So how in the world do you fill out a perfect bracket? The answer is you don't, but I will give you some tips on how to have better success in your pool.

Don't pick any first-year coaches or first-year tournament coaches. Only two times have rookie coaches made the Final Four.

Seven of the last 10 national champions have been number one seeds.

Another reminder is that no number 16 seed has ever won a game.

Only six times has the total number of the seeds in the Final Four exceeded 14. The average sum of seeds to advanced to the Final Four since 2005 is 13.2. What does that mean?

Don't pick a lot of seeds higher than five to make it there. Three out of those six times have occured in the past four years though.

Don't pick all number one seeds to make the Final Four. The only time that ever happened was

The 12 seed over the five seed has been a popular choice of an upset. Since 1985, 44 times the 12 has beaten the five. Last year, three 12 seeds beat five seeds.

The story is almost the same for the 11 over the six seed, but be careful because two of the 11 seeds have to play in the play-in games tonight and tomorrow.

Kentucky is hoping to become the first undefeated team since 1976. The first team to have an undefeated season through the tournament and not just the regular season.

Another thing to look at

is how far teams are playing from home or if a team has a home advantage.

For example Kentucky gets to play in Louisville in their first two games.

An example on the other side of the spectrum is Oklahoma has to travel to Columbus, Ohio.

Don't pick a team that relies on the three ball to go far. Hot shooting doesn't always last and/or travel

Do pick a team with a great defensive game and a balanced offense. Defense comes up big in the tournament especially in the opening rounds when there is nerves on both sides.

A good rule of thumb is to pick one, but probably not more than that, upset in the two through four range. Usually there is one or two teams that sneak up on someone. Look at the tourna-

ment history by teams

and coaches when you are picking teams. There are quite a few teams that have made the tournaments many years in a row but never made it past the first or second round. Last season was the eighth straight Final Four

in which all four teams combined to average at least 1.10 points per possession. Last season was the fourth straight Final Four

that one team averaged

at least 0.34 blocks per person foul. Only four Final Four teams recorded more turn-

overs than assists. Only three Final Four teams have made less than 600 free throws and converted less than 67 percent

of those.

Only two Final Four teams over the last decade were outrebounded during the season.

Only one Final Four team had a pace under 63.5 possesions per game.

No teams have advanced

to the Final Four over the last five years while averaging 68 or more possesions per 40 minutes. During that stretch, 85 percent of Final Four teams average 64.5-67.5 possessions per game and the average pace of play has dropped by 3.94 percent from the previous five season.
