Dr. Mohannad Bisharat comes to Pampa after spending time in several different regions of the country during his graduate school program.

He started his training in internal medicine in Newark, N.J. in 2005.

"That was a great experience with the cultural diversity in the Tri-State Area," Dr. Bisharat said. "I was 10 minutes away from New York City, that was another aspect of the cultural experience. I met my wife there, who is a pediatrician."

Then Dr. Bisharat and his wife traveled to New Orleans and Tulane University, where he went to pursue his cardiology degree.

"New Orleans a heck of an adventure," Dr. Bisharat said. "With all of the festive activities: Mardi Gras the French Quarter and all of those fun things to do."

Being in New Orleans created a different medical atmosphere for Dr. Bisharat.

more heart disease in the south. Science tells us it's related to diets. New Orleans is known for their food. It was a little bit different to notice the proportionately more heart disease in the south

compared to the northeast."

Being able to practice on his own, Dr. Bisharat moved to Bluefield, Va., in 2005

"It was a very successful time of my career," Dr. Bisharat said.

"Nevertheless, the weather was a limiting factor since I was living in the 'tallest city of Virginia' (city nickname). The winters at

House passes bills to make EPA more transparent and accountable

WASHINGTON - U.S. Congressman Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) voted this week in support of two bills to rein in overly-aggressive regulations from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) by making the agency more transparent and accountable. Both bills passed with bipartisan support in the House.

"People are sick and tired of regulations that hurt jobs and our economy, but what is more upsetting is that those regulations are often based on science and research that is never made available to the public," said Rep. Thornberry. "These two bills seek to make the EPA more transparent and the bureaucrats who create these regulations more accountable to the American people. All of this is consistent with the transparency policy this President claims his administration operates on."

The "Secret Science Reform Act" (H.R. 1030), which passed by a vote of 241-175 Thursday, requires the EPA to base its regulations on the best available science that is publicly available. Currently, the EPA can create regulations based on science and research that is not made publicly available.

"Many Americans are unaware that some of the EPA's most expensive and burdensome regulations, such as its proposed ozone rules,

Lawmakers hope to steer self-driving car bills to Abbott's desk

As self-driving cars move from futuristic concept to plausible technology, the Texas Legislature is looking to become a magnet for the

fast-developing industry.

Three lawmakers have filed bills aimed at encouraging the use of the technology in Texas while allowing for some government oversight.

"It's the kind of futuristic thinking you easily associate with California, New York," state Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, said. "Texas ought to not be behind the curve. We ought to be ahead of the curve."

Last week, Ellis filed Senate Bill 1167, which would create a pilot program aimed at both monitoring and encouraging autonomous vehicle testing in the state. Under the bill, the Department of Public Safety would create minimum safety requirements for autonomous vehicles. Companies building or working with self-driving cars would have to notify DPS before they could drive them on public roadways. Any such vehicles in use would need a "driver" with an "autonomous motor vehicle operation designation" on his or her driver's license awarded



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Tips, Tricks and Advice

There are lots of ways to cut utility bills, and in this economy, everyone

could use a little savings. Here are some things you should consider doing to help lower your utility costs.

shopping for new appliances look for the ones that have the blue energy star stickers on them or state that they are energy star approved. Energy star indicates that the appliance has passed the energy efficient guidelines. • Find out when the

peak hours of usage are from your utility company and refrain from using appliances like dishwashers or doing laundry during this time, because it will cost more. It is also the cause of power outages due to circuit overloads during peak usage times.

 Change your faucet heads to a higher aeratedtype head. The usage numbers are generally wrote on the side of the head. Most kitchens use between 2.5-4.0, but you can use as low as 1.5. Bathroom faucets use between 2.0-2.5 but can be replaced with as low as .5. These type of heads use more air and less water.

 Switching from regular light bulbs to fluorescent or CFL bulbs helps save money. They do cost more but the payoff is worth it.

· Lower water heater

temperature settings to save energy. The higher settings requires the heater to run more which in turn raises the utility

· Consider investing in electrical outlet insulation. It's a small piece of material cut to go behind the plastic outlet cover and cut to go around the actual outlet. They are inexpensive and simple to install.

 Whenever possible use ceiling fans instead of a/c units.

• Clean out the lint traps and dryer vent that lead outside. This should be done every few months.

 Another thing you might consider is having your utility company replace your old meter with a smart meter. Some companies will pay for signing up for these type of meters, while others will show you your daily usage. Knowing your daily usage helps you see when you are using and how much, it also helps you to see the best times to use since rates go up and down.

• Clean your refrigerator coils. This saves energy along with improving efficiency, it is recommended to be done every

 Check your refrigerator door seal by simply placing a dollar in the door as you close it. If it falls out the seal should

• Set refrigerator temperatures between 35-38 degrees while freezers should be between 0-5 degrees.



Media's email hysteria: Why are Republicans exempt?

It is almost eerie how closely Hillary Clinton's current email scandal parallels

the beginnings of the Whitewater fiasco that ensnared her and her husband almost 20 years ago. Both began with tendentious,

inaccurate stories published by The New York Times; both relied upon highly exaggerated suspicions of wrongdoing; both were seized upon by Republican partisans whose own records were altogether worse; and both resulted in shrill explosions of outrage among reporters who couldn't be bothered to learn actual facts

Fortunately for Secretary Clinton, she won't be subjected to investigation by less-than-independent counsel like Kenneth Starr — and the likelihood that the email flap will damage her nascent presidential campaign seems very small, according to the latest polling data.

Yet the reaction of the Washington media to these allegations renews the same old questions about press fairness to the Clintons, and how the media treats them in contrast with other politicians. In this instance, the behavior of Republican officials whose use of private email accounts closely resembles what Secretary Clinton did at the State Department has been largely ignored — even though some of those officials might also seek the presidency.

Jeb Bush released a large

volume of emails from the personal — i.e., non-government — email account that he used as Florida governor, and praised his own transparency with typical extravagance. The problem is that those emails represent only 10 percent of those he wrote. The rest he has withheld, without any public review under Florida open records laws. When Scott Walker served as Milwaukee county executive, before he was elected Wisconsin governor, he and his staff used a secret email system for illegal campaign work, which emerged as part of an investigation that ultimately sent one of his aides to prison (another was immunized by prosecutors). Louisiana Governor Bobby Jindal has used a personal email account for government business, as has Texas Governor Rick Perry. So have Florida Senator Marco Rubio, and various Congress members who have been heard to spout about Clinton's emails, such as Utah Rep. Jason Chaffetz.

Hypocritical as they may seem, none of those examples compare with the truly monumental email scandal of the Bush years, when millions of emails went missing from White House servers — and many more were never archived on those servers, as required since 1978 by the Presidential Records Act, because dozens of Bush White House staff were using private email accounts provided by the Republican National Committee. Notably, those RNC email clients included top Bush adviser Karl Rove, who used committee accounts for

an estimated 95 percent of

his electronic messaging, and

by his staff. Among many other dubious activities, Rove aide Susan Ralston used her private RNC email to discuss Interior Department appointments with the office of crooked lobbyist Jack Abramoff, who wanted to influence the department on behalf of gambling interests. She told Abramoff's associate that "it is better not to put this stuff in their email system because it might actually limit what they can do to help us, especially since there could be lawsuits, etc. ..." While Rove was forced to surrender some emails involving his notorious exposure of CIA agent Valerie Plame, he retained the capacity to delete thousands of emails.

Various investigations and lawsuits eventually uncovered the astonishing breadth of the Bush White House email fiasco, such as the "recycling" of back-up tapes for all of its archived emails between Inauguration Day 2001 and sometime in 2003. This meant, for instance, messages pertaining to the 9/11 terrorist attack went missing of course — along with whatever Rove and his aides might have communicated on that topic, or weapons of mass destruction in Iraq, or countless other topics of public concern.

And former Secretary of State Colin Powell, whose office was also involved in both the Plame and WMD scandals, admitted recently that he used private emails in office — but that he turned over and retained none of them — zero. By contrast, Clinton has turned over tens of thousands of her emails to

the department. Thanks to a federal lawsuit filed by two nonprofit watchdog groups, the National Security Archive at George Washington University and Citizens for Responsibility and Ethics in Washington, a small proportion of the missing Bush White House emails were eventually restored — but only when the Obama administration finally settled the case in 2009. Those strict Obama rules for preserving emails (which Clinton stands accused of ignoring) resulted directly from the new administration's determination to avoid the mess engendered by the deceptive and unlawful preservation practices of the Bush White House.

So if Hillary Clinton's use of a private email account is so shocking to the Beltway media, why did they barely notice (and care even less) when millions of emails disappeared during the Bush

The current hysteria may reflect the intense press prejudice against Clinton that several well-placed Washington journalists confessed during a brief moment of introspection following the disgraceful coverage of her 2008 campaign. And it should serve to warn voters that what Gene Lyons famously called "the Clinton rules" — which encouraged all varieties of inaccuracy, bias journalistic failure in the 1990s — simply never went away.

What also makes arena football fun to watch is all of the scoring. The field is literally 50 yards so it's not uncommon to see a 75-60 final score.


The Amarillo Venom's home opener is this weekend against the Wichita Force. Tickets range from \$10 to \$30, but they usually have some great specials going on.
