Bullying is often dismissed as part of growing up. Unfortunately, those who are bullied often find themselves struggling in school, broken down mentally and sometimes even try to take their own lives.

Candice Plunk heard about a situation happening nearby in Fritch and decided to see what she can do to help raise awareness for this in-school plague that is bullying.

"Everyone came together after that and I think family-friend (of the bullying victim)

who decided to start a Facebook page called 'Stop bullying in our schools," Plunk said. "There idea was to get as much awareness



out about bullying as possible. Then I started talking to the administrators of the page and came up with a T-shirt idea."

So Plunk decided to put the idea on Facebook in Pampa

and see what kind of feedback she could get.

The feedback was overwhelming

"I had a ton of responses," Plunk said. "People were inboxing me, messaging me, asking me, 'Where' can I donate? Where can I get the shirts?""

Plunk's husband has a friend who owns Powerhouse Screening in Borger who is very anti-bullying and anti-child abuse.

He is going to help with the costs of the t-shirts to help the fund-

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Throughout this month, social workers across the country have been celebrating National Social Work Month.

The purpose is to celebrate the many roles of social workers.

"It's nice for the community to know that we're out there and we have such diverse roles," Danna Jackson, a licensed social worker for Golden Phoenix, said. "From medical social worker to working with Adult Protective Services and Child Protective Services. Everyone that works with APS and CPS aren't licensed social workers but they are still in that diverse role.'

Jackson added there are even social workers who work in schools. Social workers at Golden Phoenix primarily deal with geriatric cases.

"In the role that I played we worked with death,

The various professions and roles is what makes social workers important. Social workers have improved the rights of women, African-Americans and other ethnic minorities. They have also pushed to strengthen the social safety through programs such as Medicaid, Medicare and the Affordable Care Act, and have advocated for social justice initiatives such as the Voting Rights Act and the Community Mental Health Act.

"For example they work in schools helping students to overcome obstacles in their education,"

Texas homebuyers and sellers report

SUBMITTED BY PAMPA BOARD OF REALTORS, INC. The 2015 Texas Homebuyers and Sellers report shows that Texas continues to be a national leader in median household income growth and new home sales.

Increased restrictions in lending standards and rising home prices in certain local markets continue to stifle the growth of first-time homebuyers in Texas. The percentage



of first-time homebuyers in Texas decreased four percent to 29 percent of all Texas homebuyers between July 2013 and June 2014. Nationally, the percentage of firsttime homebuyers decreased five percent to 33 percent of all U.S. homebuyers during the same time frame.


As a result, Texas homebuyers are older and more likely to be married couples. From July 2013 to June 2014, the typical Texas homebuyer was 45 years old, an increase of two years from the previous time frame. The percentage



Mr. Kemph has retired many times, but the last retirement was from Moody Farms, where he worked for 25 vears.



Property Owners Sent Appraisal Notices for Tax Year 2015

State law requires appraisal districts to notify property owners about changes in their property's value. In May, The Gray County Appraisal District will be mailing property owners notices showing their 2014 proposed appraised value.

Tyson Paronto, Chief Appraiser of the district, reminds property owners that the notice of appraised value is not a tax bill. "Please do not pay - - this is not a tax bill,"

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Mr. Paronto emphasized the importance of this notice and the key information that it contains. "A property owner has the right to appeal to the Appraisal Review Board on any disagreement with the property's value, exemptions, ownership and other areas."

The Appraisal Review Board, more commonly called the "ARB", is an independent panel of citizens responsible for hearing and settling protests from property owners who disagree with some action by the appraisal district. The notice includes instructions on how and when to file a protest and a protest form.

What should a property owner carefully review? "Look at the proposed value." "The notice states the land's value and any improvement value for the property for the current year. "An improvement is a building, structure, or any other type of fixture to the land",

The appraisal notice also includes current year information on exemptions granted on the property. It provides last year's value, too.

Homeowners that qualify for property tax homestead exemptions have a limitation on their homes' appraised value, beginning with the second year that they qualify their home for homestead exemptions. The appraisal district may not increase the taxable value of their home by more than 10 percent for each year since the last reappraisal year. A homeowner's notice states both the appraised market value for the home and the limited home value (capped value).

Notices also will include "estimated" taxes. These "estimated" taxes are based on the new taxable value and last year's tax rates. Taxing units will set final 2015 tax rates in August and September. Final tax amounts may vary from these "estimated" amounts.

The Chief Appraiser asks property owners to check the legal description and mailing address to be sure that there are no mistakes. "If the notice has an old address, please let the appraisal district know. The post office forwards mail to a new address for a short time, and tax bills do not go out until October."

A property owner is responsible for informing the appraisal district of the correct mailing address. A property owner is liable for additional penalties and interest on a tax bill that is not paid on time.

If you do not get a notice and want information about your property, please call the Appraisal District at (806) 665-0791. The general deadline for protesting to the ARB is before June 1 or 30 days from the mailing of this notice.

I do not want to be understood as mocking a serious candidate at an undoubtedly serious moment in national affairs. The point is: Would he be volunteering to save us if the feeling weren't so widespread that we need saving, and fast?

Cinematically, as well as Mike Huckabee, maybe John Kasich, maybe Bobby Jindal, etc., etc.

Amid this cavalry detachment, Cruz, for all his brains and vigor, will struggle for advantage.

Someone posted a picture of an outhouse on Facebook recently, with the caption "Do you know

what this is?" Yes, I can honestly say I do know what it is, and have had occasion to use one. My Aunt Kitty lived on a farm in Bettendorf, Iowa. She lived on that

farm most of her adult life, but it was only in the last few

of her 90-something years that she was able to enjoy indoor plumbing. The first time I visited Aunt Kitty on her farm, I was a 20-year-old young woman who hadn't been away from the concrete of Los Angeles very long, and I had never even seen a farm before.

I'd heard stories that my mom told of life on the farm, including the one where Mom got dropped down the "grown-up hole" by her younger brother. My grandfather had to pull Mom out by her curly blond hair and rinse her off under the pump.

So on my first visit to the "biffy" (and, yes, it did sport a crescent moon carved into the door!) I sat down gently. I was gratified to see regular tissue in the little room, as opposed to a Sears catalog. I did my business, and walked back up to the house, feeling pretty smug.

That smugness lasted until 7 a.m. the next morning when I had to return. It was a chilly morning, and the frost crunched under my feet as I made my

way to this outdoor, non-heated bathroom. I figured it would be a quick trip, but shortly after I settled myself on the bench, I heard the sound of someone approaching with a rather heavy footstep. I called out "I'm in here, be out shortly" but the footsteps got closer, and there was a heavy breathing just outside the door. It only took a few seconds before the door was abruptly pushed open... by a horse! I was halfway back to the house before my heart started beating normally again.

Remembering more stories that Mom used to tell, I decided that I needed to shampoo my hair under the fresh water of the old pump in the farmyard. I trudged out to the pump with my shampoo and towel in hand, got the handle going and the water flowing, and stuck my head under the stream of VERY ICY water!! I went ahead and bravely sudsed and rinsed my hair and turned to see the laughing faces of Mom and Aunt Kitty in the kitchen window. I think it took about three days for my head to thaw out. Talk about brain freeze!

Later that day we were invited to look through some of the junk accumulated in Aunt Kitty's old barn and while looking through a box of assorted buttons and trinkets, I found a dirty old necklace. After returning home to Illinois, I cleaned the pendant and chain and found to my great surprise a lovely cameo set in a 14-K gold setting. Aunt Kitty said she didn't ever remember seeing it before, told me to keep it, and I have it and wear it still.

Years later, I returned to the farm with my husband and young daughter for what would be the last time I saw Aunt Kitty. Catherine (named for this aunt) was given a room in the house in a nice big soft warm bed, while Ron and I went out to the "guest house" and bedded down. That night a cold front blew in, and as the little cottage was unheated, we ended up sleeping in all our clothes and coats.

Shortly before our visit, there had been a tornado that blew through the area, picking up Aunt Kitty's outhouse and depositing it in a neighboring farm field. The only way to get it back to her property was on the back of a friend's pickup along local roads, and Aunt Kitty was embarrassed that the whole town knew her bathroom had flown away. But family and neighbors came together, as folks do in Iowa when there's a need, and built Aunt Kitty an indoor bathroom with the latest plumbing.

The outhouse was still there when we visited, but we all chose to use the indoor facilities. After one more chilly night in the cottage, the next day turned out warm and pleasant, and we enjoyed a cookout with cousins our daughter had never met. She learned to climb a tree, enjoyed exploring a "real" farm and picked grocery bags full of fresh asparagus, and we returned home to our life in the city and our modern facilities.

Cruz's appeal, as his

Cruz's emergence as a rootin'-tootin' presidential candidate — almost in the sagebrush-saga mold indicates just how lousy things have gotten: divisions over police shootings, anger over presidential executive orders, fears over larger if less competent government, anxiety over breakdowns in schooling and family structure. The day of Cruz's announcement, The New York Times' lead story proclaimed: "Out of Yemen, U.S. Is Hobbled in Terror Fight/ Advisers Are Evacuated/ Militants in Region Are Seen as Major Threat to Americans.

We haven't glimpsed so much fed-upness and woe in America since the late '70s, when inflation, the energy crisis and the Iran hostage crisis came near to causing national psychological breakdown. We yearned for John Wayne, or someone, to come boiling over the hill — bugles blowing "Charge" — and sort things out once and for all. By no coincidence, perhaps, the voters hired a pal of Big John's, Ronald Reagan, who proceeded, with growing cooperation on Congress' part, to restore American prosperity and thwart the Soviet threat. Our bad national mood went away.

Now it's back which explains, more or less, the stampede of Republicans hoping to pull off a Reagan-like rescue of America: Chris Christie, Rand Paul, Scott Walker, Jeb Bush, Marco Rubio, Rick Perry, Ben Carson,

books, only that's not likely to happen soon. Paul, who plans to announce his own candidacy in early April, has a constituency of his own, focused on personal liberty questions and a non-interventionist foreign policy. Walker talks of how he already has cleaned out swollen Big Daddy government at the state level. Bush will tout knowledge, knowhow and personal outreach to some of the same Hispanics Cruz and Rubio want to reach.

Can Cruz — my own senator - bag the Republican nomination? Given the competition, I would advise no one to wager his 401(k) on such an outcome. Is Cruz wasting our time and money, therefore? In a John Wayne moment such as this one, the only reasonable answer is no.

Whatever his political liabilities — his slim record of political achievement, his reputation as a doggoned dogmatist -Cruz brings to this John Wayne moment ideas and emphases that voters may like. He brings not least the realization that this is such a moment: fretful, anxious, hungry for different leadership.

We will want to give an ear to the sounds pouring from his bugle.

Understanding this mission, my reflection this week turned to the Scout Law which states that a scout is trustworthy, loyal, helpful, friendly, cour-



Texas city to switch from fossil fuels to solar, wind

GEORGETOWN A Central Texas city will be among the first in the U.S. to get its electricity exclusively from solar and wind energy.

SunEdison, which makes solar panels and develops power plants, said Wednesday that it's building a 150-megawatt solar farm in West Texas to serve the municipal utility of Georgetown, about 30 miles north of Austin.

That's enough to supply about half the city's residents, and the rest of the electricity will come from wind.

The project will boost the

(AP) megawatts, enough to power about 74,000 homes.

SunEdison plans to begin construction by the end of the second quarter and finish in about six months. Georgetown agreed to buy all the output over 25 years.

Georgetown also has partnered with the neighboring city of Garland in a 20-year agreement for wind power from a farm west of Amarillo.

"The calculus is, not only does it bring power prices down, but it sharply decreases our water usage and is not subject to environmental regulation on greenhouse gasstate's installed solar capac- es," said Jim Briggs, general ity by about a third to 490 manager for the city's utility.

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Sometimes trying to maximize will minimize your Social Security

I thought I was done, at least for a while, writing columns about Social Security maximizing strategies. But as I've pointed out in past columns, probably 80 percent of the emails I get from my readers have to do with this topic de jour of the baby boomer crowd. So, obviously, there is still a lot of interest, and even more so, a lot of confusion.

Before I get into the email that prompted today's column, I'm going to once again give a quick primer on the two primary strategies: "file and suspend" and "file and restrict." The first term is commonplace. The second is sometimes called "restrict the scope of an application."

And to understand the strategies, you first need to grasp some basic program policies. (These rules do not apply to widows and widowers.) The first policy says that any Social Security claim filed before age 66 is an unrestricted application. In other words, you must file for any and all benefits you are potentially due, both on your record and on a spouse's account. This usually means that you cannot file for reduced benefits on a spouse's Social Security record and then later file for full benefits on your own record. Conversely, you cannot file for reduced retireown record and later switch to full benefits on a spouse's record unless your spouse is not yet getting Social Security at the time you apply for your own reduced retirement.

The second basic Social Security policy says that if you wait until your full-retirement age (66 for most plan to wait until 70 to people retiring now and in the near future), the first policy explained in the prior paragraph goes out the window. In other words, at age 66, you can file for one benefit and later — usually at age 70 — switch to higher benefits.

How you accomplish this almost always involves employing one of the aforementioned strategies: file and suspend or file and restrict. And that phrase, "employ one of the strategies," is one key to understanding the main point of this column: you can use one or the other strategy. You cannot use both.

The phrase "file and suspend" means that you file for benefits at age 66 and then immediately suspend your payments. You would do that for one of two reasons. The most common is when you have a spouse who is due little or no benefits on his or her own Social Security record. Your spouse can then file on your account and get monthly benefits even though your own payments are in suspense. Then at 70, you would unsuspend your benefits and get a ment benefits on your 32 percent bonus added



to your full monthly retirement rate.

If a spouse isn't in the picture but you get the bonus, you can still file at age 66 and suspend your benefits. You would do that just in case something happens between age 66 and 70 and you decide to start your benefits before your 70th birthday. You would then have the choice of getting a prorated bonus added to your monthly checks, or claiming retroactive benefits to age 66 at the full-retirement rate.

The "file and restrict" strategy is used when you have a spouse already getting benefits. At age 66, you can file for benefits on your spouse's record (that's called restricting the scope of your application) and collect those benefits until age 70 when you would switch to 132 percent of your retirement rate.

PROPERTY TAX PROTEST AND APPEALS PROCEDURES

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeals procedures if you have a concern about:

- *the values placed on your property
- *any exemptions that may apply to you
- *the cancellation of an agricultural exemption
- *the taxable status of your property
- *the local governments which should be taxing your property
- *any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affects you

Informal Review

The first option a taxpayer may use to protest a value is to visit with the chief appraiser or a staff member. Records on individual properties are available for review by every taxpayer. This informal review is to the benefit of the taxpayer, as many protests are resolved at this level.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you cannot resolve your problem with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the Appraisal Review Board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You will receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make a decision based on the presented evidence.

NOTE: You should not try to contact ARB members prior to the meeting. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they have not discussed your case prior to the ARB meeting.

Review by District Court

After the ARB decides your case you will be sent a copy of its order by certified mail. If you are not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's decision.

Pampa - More than 400 first graders at 10 schools in Pampa, Lefors, Miami, Mobeetie, and White Deer recently received free prevent tooth decay kits through the Fantastic Teeth Fan Club. Members of Pampa Masonic Lodge, Top O'Texas Masonic Lodge, and Miami Masonic Lodge, led by Gordon Fore, assembled and delivered kits to the schools.

The Fantastic Teeth Fan Club project focuses on preventing suffering from toothaches, reducing missed school days due to dental problems, and cutting costs for dental treatment.

Prevent tooth decay kits contain: a toothbrush, toothpaste, dental floss, healthy teeth sticker, two-minute timer (optimal brushing time), Tips for Healthy Teeth educational info for parents in both Spanish and English, and a summary of MHS services.

According to Oral Health In America: A Report of the Surgeon General, tooth decay is the single most common chronic childhood disease-five times more com-

mon than asthma and seven times more common than hay fever. COPPELL — Drivers in Texas are now paying \$2.22 for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That's one penny less than last week and \$1.14 less than last year. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in the Lone Star State, drivers in Dallas are paying the most on average at \$2.26 per gallon while drivers in Amarillo are paying the least at \$2.15 per gallon. Across the nation drivers are paying an average of \$2.42, which is the same as one week ago and 20 cents more than the statewide average.
