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Board approves stadium ADA renovations, delays intermediate school design planning

Architecture plans on intermediate school delayed until after bond election on May 9.

The Pampa Independent School District board of trustees regular monthly meeting was held on Monday night at the Pampa ISD administration building.

Following the spotlight on excellence segment of the meeting where the Board honored the Pampa High School state debate qualifiers, the Pampa High School DECA students, the PHS swim team and the PHS wrestling team, the Board approved the hiring of new principals at Lamar Elementary, Pampa Junior High and Pampa High School. The Board hired Nathan Maxwell to be principal at Lamar, Diana Warner at PJHS and Hugh Piatt for Pampa High School. Look for a story on the new hires in future editions of The Pampa News.

The first item discussed at length at the board meeting was the scope of work at Harvester Stadium. All of the work at Harvester Stadium is meant to make the stadium compliant with the American Disability Act. Making the stadium compliant includes improvements to the restrooms, both home and visitor bleachers and the press box. The improvements also include both the home and visitor parking.

Stantec, the architectural firm in charge of renovations at Harvester Stadium, presented the Board with options that included extending the current restrooms with conventional construction, building modular restrooms or renting/buying portable restrooms. The Board asked Stantec several questions concerning the restrooms. These questions

ranged from the allotment of facilities allowed for men to women, as well as the possible allotment of facilities between the home and visitor sides. There was also some discussion as to whether or not the concession stand could be moved. Stantec added that there will be ramps added to the home side of bleachers, as well as the bathrooms for each side. Visitor side bleachers will have some seating removed to add wheelchair seating from 10 to 17 seats. This action item, however, was simply the scope of the work, not so much on the details.

The other part of the item included the renovations to the press box. The most important aspect of the press box renovations was the addition of an elevator. The elevator is projected to be on the west end of the press







against Indiana's newly passed Religious Freedom Restoration Act. It matters not to the corporate big shot that President Bill Clinton signed a federal Religious Freedom Restoration Act in 1993 (which current House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi supported) or that then-Illinois state Sen. Barack Obama voted for a similar law in 1998.

It was one thing for Democrats to support religious freedom when tolerance a two-way there was no downside to standing up for the devout. Today there could be a cost. An Indiana baker might refuse to sell a wedding cake to a samesex couple and cite the new law if the couple were to sue him or her. Cook believes that such discrimination would be "bad for business." I agree. Cook also believes that the baker wouldn't have the right to say no. I do not agree with that.

When Obama first ran for the White House, he supported a ban on same-sex marriage. If Cook had a problem with Obama's stand. he kept it to himself. Years later, Obama announced that his position had evolved and he had come to support same-sex marriage. Voila: Now anyone who disagrees with same-sex marriage is a bigot and thus has no

Except religious dissenters do have rights. Last year, the U.S. Supreme Court recognized that familyowned corporations have religious rights. In the 5-4 Hobby Lobby decision, the big bench recognized CEO David Green's right to get around an Affordable Care Act mandate that his employer-sponsored health plan offer employees contraceptives that, Green argued, "risk killing an em-

bryo." Last year, federal court rulings legal-

ized same-sex marriage in Indiana. In a more tolerant world, the court rulings would leave gay couples free to marry and religious dissenters free to not cater same-sex weddings. Each side would win the right to be true to itself.

Indiana Gov. Mike Pence, a Republican, was no profile in courage when he appeared Sunday on ABC's "This Week." Host George Stephanopoulos repeatedly asked Pence whether the law he signed last week would allow a florist to refuse to serve a gay couple at their wedding. "Yes or no?" Stephanopoulos asked. Pence would not give a simple answer that a florist could use the new law if a gay couple were to sue

Pence did ask, "Is street or not?" The answer from corporate boardrooms appears to be "not."

Pence — who may be thinking of running for the White House himself — obviously sees powerful forces aligned against him. Angie's List announced it was stopping a major project in Indianapolis. Salesforce.com CEO Marc Benioff tweeted, "We are canceling all programs that require our customers/employees to travel to Indiana to face discrimination." (The Federalist's Mollie Hemingway was amused that Benioff stood up to Indiana while doing business with China, a bastion of human rights abuses.)

"Opposing discrimination takes courage," Cook wrote. He has the Democratic Party, some Republicans, Hollywood and CEO-dom on his side — and they completely outgun true believers who oppose same-sex marriage. They're not standing up to China; they're standing up to Hoosier Christian florists. They think they're brave when they're rank bullies for whom it's not enough to win; they have to make dissenters buckle.

Charles Goodnight

formal schooling. Late in 1845 he accompanied his family on the 800-mile trek south to a site in Milam County, Texas, near Nashville-on-the-Brazos, riding bareback on a white-faced mare named Blaze. He later took pride in the fact that he was born at the same time as the Republic of Texas and that he "joined" Texas the year it joined the Union. Growing up in the Brazos bottoms, the boy learned to hunt and track from an old Indian named Caddo Jake. At age eleven Charles began hiring out to neighboring farms, and at fifteen he rode as a jockey for a racing outfit at Port Sullivan. Not

satisfied with that occupation, he

returned to his widowed mother and younger siblings, continued at various farm and plantation jobs, including supervision of black slave crews, and for two years freighted with ox teams.

In 1853 his mother married Rev. Adam Sheek, a Methodist preacher; that led to the formation of the partnership three years later between Charles and his step-brother, John Wesley Sheek. Although they considered going to California, they were dissuaded by Sheek's brother-in-law, Claiborne Varner, who induced them to run about 400 head of cattle on shares along the Brazos valley for a ten-year period. In 1857 the young partners trailed their herd up the Brazos to the Keechi valley in Palo Pinto County. At Black Springs they built a log cabin with stone chimneys, to which they brought their parents in 1858.

Goodnight continued freighting cotton and provisions to Houston and back for a time until Wes Sheek married, then assumed the bulk of responsibility of looking after the growing herd of scrawny, wild Texas cattle. With his acquired hunting and trailing skills, he quickly mastered the modes of survival in the wilderness. During this time he became acquainted with Oliver Loving, who was also running cattle in the Western Cross Timbers. When the gold rush to Colorado began. Goodnight helped Loving send a herd through the Indian Territory and Kansas to the Rocky Mountain mining camps.

As Indian troubles in Northwest Texas increased, concurrent with heated conflict over the reservations on the upper Brazos and Clear Fork, Goodnight and his neighbors joined forces with Capt. Jack (J. J.) Cureton's rangers, with whom he served as a scout and guide. It was Goodnight who found the trail leading to Peta Nocona's Comanche encampment on the Pease River in December 1860 and brought word of it back to Cureton and Capt. Lawrence Sullivan Ross. He guided the rangers to the Indian camp and took part in the attack on Dec. 18 in which Cynthia Ann Parker was recaptured.

Screen time and kids part 2

Deep and meaningful relationships

In last week's column I shared some research that revealed the average American adult watches three hours of television per night. I also shared with you research that says the average American kid, age eight to 18, spends seven hours per day in front

of a screen. The conclusion I came to is less about the content being consumed (Although that is a conversation that needs to be had) and more about the lack of real world, human interactions for our kids.

If adults are in front of a screen for three hours and if kids are in front of a screen for seven hours, when are

they interacting with each other? Not often may be an overstatement.

I began researching this information for several reasons but there is a major reason that stands out. Several months ago I was sitting on the couch with my smartphone in hand and I was listening to the TV. During that time, my middle child came up to me and asked a question about going outside to play. "I said sure, so ahead." Without even thinking about the question or the answer that I gave.

A few moments later when I came to out of my screen time coma I realized no one was in the house. I went looking and found all three of my children in the front yard They are never supposed to play in the front yard without their mother or I there. I immediately went to my middle daughter, because I vaguely remembered her coming to me with a question, and asked her why they were in the front yard. Her answer opened my eyes to the reality of my deep connection to a screen. She said, "Dad, I asked you if we could and you said yes. I always come and ask you when you are on your phone because you never listen and you always say yes."

The best lessons are always learned the hard way. At least that is how I learn mine. So needless to say I will never forget what she said that day and I will never forget why she said it.

I set out to find a solution that would break me from the screen time addiction and help me to connect in a deep and meaningful way with my kids. That search helped me to find the information I shared with you last week. But I also came across some great suggestions on how to deal with a screen addiction. These suggestions apply to both adults and kids.

I would like to share some of those ideas with you because if statistics hold true then you are spending more time with a screen in the evening than you are spending with your kids. And your kids are spending more time with a screen then they are with you. To grow deep and meaningful relationships with our kids we must find an active way to cut back on the amount of time we interact with screens. I want to share three ideas with you today.

Become Aware - I mean this in two ways. First, become aware of how much time you and your family spend on screens. When you plop down at night and pick up the remote or pick up your smartphone ask the question, "What lasting impact is this going to have on my family?" It could be a positive or a negative impact. If it is positive then go ahead with the action. If not, stop right there.

Second, become aware of the content that your kids are consuming by asking questions about the content. Ask questions

What factual data is my child learning from consuming this content?

What kind of character traits is this content promoting?

How does this content show the roles of family members? e.g. Content that makes dads look wimpy. Or content that makes the kids look like the boss.

Is the content being consumed consistent with our family values?

By asking these questions you will find that most of the content that your child is consuming will not be in line with what you believe as a family. This will cause you to limit the time on screens. Aware-

Commit to a digital-free zone - In our household all the kids bedrooms are digital-free zones. There are no televisions and no tablets in their rooms. Why? Because there are times I am not with them in their rooms and I have no control over what they are consuming. It is my job to control what my children see and hear. I am the guardian of the hearts and minds at this point in their lives.

You may not want to do that. But make sure you have areas of your home where no screens are allowed. Another great place to cut out screen time would be at the dinner table. Turn those screens off and look your kids in the eyes and ask them how their day was. Allow them to do the same to you. It won't be easy but you will find that your relationship grows deeper and stronger with your kids.

Creating digital-free zones provides boundaries for everyone in the family. This is a must when trying to build deep and meaningful relationships in your home.

Write a Screen Time Family Pledge – A family pledge is a set of guidelines for the kids that establishes when they can be on the screens and when they cannot. It also establishes guidelines for the content the kids can consume.

You and your spouse should write this pledge and then have the whole family commit to it. Be sure and clearly state the consequences up front so your kids know what happens if they break the pledge.

I hope these three ideas help you as you seek to lower the amount of time you spend in front of a screen and increase the amount of time you spend with your kids If you are like me you don't want to realize in eight to 10 years that your kids are out of the home and you have no lasting relationship with them. Make changes now to build lasting relationship with your kids.

I once heard it said, "The best time to plant a tree was 10 years ago. The second best time is today." Come up with a plan and start it today!

There are things that I wish I didn't know, especially about people who have been one of my heroes. I re-

member the night that I watched the movie '61 and had to face the real truth about how Mickey Mantle lived most of his life. I purposefully had never tried to find out before that night. Oh, I could have, but to be truthful I didn't want to know. The truth ended up being that

Mantle was a horrible womanizing husband, a totally neglectful father and a lifelong drunk. I do rejoice that before he died he surrendered to Jesus Christ as his Lord. But he isn't one of my heroes anymore.

Today I had a similar experience with another one of my heroes – Paul Harvey. I've never really checked out his life before, just admired his voice and his broadcasts. So many of his programs were full of stories that I loved. But a series of events today made me look a little closer and part of me wishes I hadn't.

In June 1972, Paul Harvey shared the story of his baptism at a church in Arizona while he and his wife were vacationing. The Guidepost article was entitled "Submitting To God." Everything you would want a person to say about that Christian experience is in that article. To be honest I wish I didn't know any more about his faith. Everything on those pages support Harvey as a real deal Christian.

However, on March 7 and again on May 16 of 1998 (about 10 years before his death) Paul Harvey broadcast one of his most famous programs entitled: "A Letter From God." I actually hadn't heard about it until this morning. Again part of me wishes I hadn't listened to it.

In that letter he makes God out to be an endorser of Darwinian evolution,

not the Creator God of Genesis 1.

He portrays God as having many special children on par with Jesus, like Buddha, Mohammed, Krishna and others. In fact God even says that they all live in the same special place, in the heart of God.

In this letter God disassociates Himself from all of the sacred writings in all of the religions, including the Bible. God says that He never wrote anything and that He made sure that all of the bibles of all of the religions were full of mistakes so that we wouldn't trust in any of them as His word.

He has God endorse every religion equally; saying that Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism and Christianity all lead to the same place just in different ways.

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
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Greetings in the name of our and red shirts. Red seemed to Lord Jesus Christ,

Over the years other colors have taken the place of red on my chart of favorites. Blue seems to have taken over as one of my favorite colors. Blue shirts and blue jeans are my favorite (just had to throw that in). Green is a color that provides me with much peace. It just seems to calm me

But in recent years and especially recent days, red has started to rise once again on my list of favorite colors. In some respects it has once again risen to the top. I suppose that is where I had 'just a thought' and need to explain it just a little more fully.

This past Sunday was Palm Sunday and we are now moving towards Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and the beginning of Passover and Easter. What a wonderful time for reflection and worship as we go through this time. I

believe this time of year holds one of the greatest opportunities for private worship in Christendom. This time just points us to worship in our hearts and lives.

But when you stop and think about this time you can't help but think about the blood

With skin hanging from his body and blood flowing from the open wounds, Jesus made His way to Golgotha. It was there that He was placed on the cross. They spread His hands and nailed them to the beam and the blood continued to flow. Then they stretched out His legs, drove the nail through them and the blood again flowed.

As the blood flowed from His emaciated body, life began to slip away. Scripture tells us that 'THE LIFE OF THE FLESH IS IN THE BLOOD..' (see Leviticus 17:11) As the blood flowed from His body. the cross was stained a crimson red. When the soldiers came to break the legs of the three, Jesus was already dead, His work done. So they pierced His side with a spear and the water and blood came gushing out. (see John 19:32-34).

Red, crimson red blood was



He spent time alone with His Father after performing miracles (Mark 1:35), in times of grief (Matthew 14:13), before choosing the apostles (Luke 6:12-13), in His distress in Gethsemane (Luke 22:39-44). Solitude was a consistent practice in our Lord's life.

Learn to be alone with God. Here you will build strength to walk with Him in the crowd.




