PPD busts TC Gameroom for illegal gaming



■ 53 machines, cash and contraband seized as evidence.

Thursday morning The Pampa Police Department busted TC Gameroom, located at 220 N. Hobart, for illegal gaming.

For those who may not know, the game rooms in town are only in the realm of legality if they are giving out cash prizes of a maximum of \$5 or if prizes given away are worth less than 10 times the dollar amount put in for them.

After receiving anonymous tips and sending

in undercover officers and informants to check out the legitimacy of TC Gameroom, action was taken on Thursday to empty the building of its 53 machines and all cash and other contraband found was seized as evidence for the investigation as well.

Detective Jason Collier with the Pampa Pos-

Detective Jason Collier with the Pampa Police Department said each machine must be treated as a piece of computer evidence. Code enforcement and representatives from the Potter County Attorney's Office helped out with the extraction of these machines on Thursday as well

Collier said Potter County came to help out since this is Pampa's first game room bust and they have handled a few in Amarillo. They

The concert is bringing multiple bands to a stage at Browning Street, on the north end of Cuyler street, which will be closed to traffic between there and Kingsmill, and will provide hours of music to please all generations, various service organizations and others lining the street with a panoply of booths serving foods, selling crafts and providing a variety of interesting notions.

The CJ Cody Band is head-lining the event. "CJ served in Iraq with the Thunderbird Battalion," Goheen informed. "We are also bringing Paula DaNell, a White Deer native, Bailey Westberry, the 2013-14 National FFA Talent Event winner, and the Blaine Gillespie Band."

"This is just a Hometown USA event, where people can bring their lawn chairs and kids to relax and sit out in the street, dance, sing, listen to the music, stroll the booths, visit the stores, just smile for the day and be happy we have folks looking out for us. And there will be moments to honor and remember those

DPS trooper seizes more than \$330,000 in marijuana

AMARILLO – The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) conducted a traffic stop Wednesday on Interstate 40, yielding 54 pounds of marijuana valued at more than \$330,000.

At approximately 11:25 a.m., a DPS trooper conducted a traffic stop on a 2006 Honda Civic traveling eastbound on I-40, for a traffic violation, near Groom in

Carson County.

The driver of the Civic was identified as Adolfo Megia-Hernandez, 34, of Kennewick, Wash.

Blue Bell expands recall from Broken Arrow plant

FROM BLUE BELL CREAMERIES
BRENHAM, Texas, April 7,
2015 – Blue Bell Creameries is
expanding its recall of products
that were produced in the Broken
Arrow, Okla., plant to include
Banana Pudding Ice Cream pints
which tested positive for Listeria
monocytogenes, and additional
products manufactured on the
same line. These items have the

potential to be contaminated with Listeria monocytogenes, an organism which can cause serious and sometimes fatal infections in young children, frail or elderly people, and others with weakened immune systems. Although healthy individuals may suffer only short-term symptoms such as high fever, severe headache, stiffness, nausea, abdominal pain and

diarrhea, Listeria monocytogenes infection can cause miscarriages and stillbirths among pregnant women.

The products being recalled are distributed to retail outlets, including food service accounts, convenience stores and supermarkets in Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Illi-

nois, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky,

Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Nevada, New Mexico, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia and Wyoming.

No illnesses have been confirmed to date.

• It's best to track caches in pairs or groups some may require help to get to, two sets of eyes are better than one, and there is safety in numbers. Not that I am saying www.gpsgames.org and it's a dangerous sport, but www.atlasquest.com.

I wouldn't advise anyone to go into the wilderness alone nor would I advise anyone to go geo tracking alone.

• Most geocaches have some kind of container of silly little treasures. The rule is it's a one for one trade, so if you take a treasure replace it with one of your own. The rule of thumb is nothing bigger that a book of matches. Personally, I carry interesting patches I pick up at truck stops on road trips, hatpins, stickers, little toys, small survival gear tools, bracelets, etc.

• One big rule is do NOT put food in the caches since it maybe months before someone else finds it, but also because it could cause animals to get into them and ruin the cache

 There is always a log book in a cache or on it for you to sign to show you found it along with a website sign in sheet.

• Do not move the cache. If you find one damaged report it to the website. They are officially track and usually someone will come out and replace or repair them.

As a funeral director, I often point out to people, when they are taking undue risk with their lives. Gener-

ally, I will walk up to them and hand them my business card. I will ask them to put my card in their purse or wallet, as I am sure they will need my services in their very near future. Until this week, however, I had never thought about what I would do if

I, or a member of my family, were ever involved in such risky busi-

Last week, my husband was involved in an incident that had the potential to be fatal. The news of the incident came by phone. I don't mind telling you, although I was assured that he was without injury; the fact that the incident had occurred was devastating. My knees went weak, my breathing became uncontrollable, and I had difficulties processing the information. I was as nervous as a cat, until he was back home, healthy and beside me.

Of course, such a serious incident is cause for reflection. Was the active extremely cautious man, so his

ity he was involved in, so important that he should continue his participation? Does this activity bring such joy that the risk factors make it worthwhile? Is the vast investment into this activity reason enough to continue with it, or might we be able to reclaim our money without too great a loss? Would my husband be willing to forgo this activity, or would it break his spirit to give it

Although these questions are reasonable, they do not address the emotions that plagued me after receiving the news that my husband had been fairly close to a situation that could have potentially caused his death. I have battled with myself all week over it. My husband has participated in this activity for nearly half of his life, and although this has not been the first incident to cause alarm, it has been the most serious. This past week he finally achieved his long time goal of acquiring his dream equipment. I was so happy for him, happy for us actually. Meeting a twenty-five year goal is reason to celebrate; potentially losing your husband is not.

My husband is a reasonable and

activities in this sport have never caused me great concern. Last week, however, has changed that for me. My concern is now high on the rector scale, and so I must determine, is it just because he came so close to meeting death straight in the face, or is it time to reevaluate our participation in what we love so much.

Fortunately, my husband has taken care of the situation. Before he was home, he announced he would be selling his dream. You see, the activity in which we participate is uncommonly safe, and our participation in it is recreational. The new piece of equipment, however, is designed for sport rather than recreation and there in lies the issue. Even though this sweet piece of equipment was a lifelong dream, my husband realized immediately that it was not designed for our needs. He therefore promptly decided to sell it and get something a little more conservative.

Obama's Iran deal: Someday the world will cry, "why?!"

Barack Obama is a young man. By the time he leaves office, he will be in

his mid-50s. Based on life expectancy, he could live for another 40 years or so. So he will be around to see the full

consequences of his disastrous Iran

nuclear "framework." The deal is done. No matter what Republicans do, Europeans fully intend to let sanctions expire. They just needed an excuse to do so, an excuse that Obama provided. Someday, nations will ask why the world's superpower ignored chants of "death to America" and "death to Israel" and allowed Iran to slow-walk toward getting nuclear weapons.

A little recent history. Under the watchful eye of the International Atomic Energy Agency, North Korea became a nuclear power — despite having signed a nuclear nonproliferation treaty. For 25 years, as it developed its nuclear bomb, North Korea insisted it had no such plans. Then-President Clinton dispatched former President Jimmy Carter to dissuade the North Koreans. Carter was convinced of North Korea's sincerity. Carter said: "The world in 1994 was marching toward

a war that was neither wanted nor necessary. ... I hoped that Kim Il-Sung was looking for a way to resolve the crisis peacefully. ... My expectations proved to be correct. Kim Il-Sung wanted to deal, and he and I negotiated an agreement.'

Carter triumphantly announced on CNN the terms of the deal he brokered to get North Korea, he said, that got them to end their nuclear program. North Korea took the economic assistance and continued its nuclear program. Shortly after Carter's visit, North Korea became an acknowledged nuclear power. These "successful" talks led, in part, to Carter's receiving the Nobel Peace Prize in 2002. Unfortunately, days after the announcement of Carter's Peace Prize, North Korea publicly admitted that it never ended its nuclear program — and that the country intended to continue it.

Obama, as a candidate, called a nuclear-armed Iran "unacceptable." Well, was anyone listening when National Intelligence Director James Clapper said Iran could make nuclear weapons "right now"? "It's a political decision for them," Clapper said to PBS's Charlie Rose, "not that they don't have the technical wherewithal, the technical competence, because they do." Clapper

said Iran's supreme leader

simply has not made the "political decision" to make the weapon!

Immediately after the announced framework, Iran disputed the White House's characterization on major issues. No, said Iran, the sanctions are to be lifted right away. No, said Iran, we are not rolling back any of our nuclear facilities. And no, said Iran, we have not consented to "no notice" inspections, the only way to give real assurance that Iran won't cheat as easily

as it has already. Military experts say it's too late for Israel to take military action. Iran is now too far gone, too prepared, having dispersed sleeper cells to strike on cue. At least one of Iran's nuclear facilities is underground and difficult to bomb. Why the need for an underground facility if it is for 'peaceful purposes''?

The world will someday ask how a nation that funded and founded the terror group Hezbollah could be allowed to get a bomb. The leader of Hezbollah stated that he hopes all the Jews do return to Israel — that way they can be eliminated in one fell swoop. So much for the notion that the problem in the Middle East is Israel. Hezbollah leader Hassan Nasrallah wants to hunt down and kill Jews outside of Israel.

Days after last week's "historic" nuclear deal, CBS reported that in

Iranian mosques, worshipers still chanted "death to America." But, CBS hopefully tells us, they're doing this out of "more habit than conviction." Iran has lied from the beginning, has always lied and is lying now. If, after all, this deal is about inspiring confidence, why wasn't the recognition of Israel — as a Jewish state — a nonnegotiable part of the deal? But Obama dismissed it out of hand: "The notion ... (of) Iran recognizing Israel ... is, I think, a fundamen-

tal misjudgment." Finally, what makes Obama and the Democrats believe that ISIS, al-Qaida and the assorted related groups have only regional aspirations? The goal of jihad, as stated by the current head of al-Qaida, is to eventually ignite a battle between the West and the Muslim world. And, at the climactic moment, Allah is expected to appear and shift the balance of victory to the Muslim warriors.

Sound crazy? Insane? This is exactly why such people should never acquire nuclear weapons. Obama will someday have to answer the question, "How could you allow that to happen?"

could ignore us or declare itself no longer bound to the concessions it has already made.

If Iran then began to restore its nuclear program to where it was 18 months ago, we would have one option left to stop it: war.

But Obama is not going to war with Iran. Hence, goaded by the neocons, GOP candidates would spend 2015 and 2016 assuring the nation that war with Iran is still "on the table" should they win the White House.

Is this a winning platform?

Yet this is the path Bibi and the neocons would put America on.

John Bolton, a possible presidential candidate, has already come out for bombing Iran. John Mc-Cain urges Israel to "go rogue," prodding Bibi to launch a strike on Iran and drag us into his war.

Lindsey Graham supports "an authorization for the use of military force" against Iran and said in 2010 that we should launch an air war so massive that

Iran would be unable to defend itself.

Sheldon Adelson, casino oligarch and Daddy Warbucks who put \$100 million behind the party in 2012 and promises more this time, has advocated a nuclear strike to warn Iran to stop enriching and a follow-up nuclear strike on its capital if Iran defies us.

"Kill the Deal" is the headline on Bill Kristol's editorial in the Weekly Standard. Writes neocon Joshua Muravchik, war is "our only option." Gov. Scott Walker has declared that his first act as president would be to kill the nuclear deal. President Walker would

thus put us, alone, without allies, on a road to war to strip Iran of weapons of mass destruction it does not have.

Is this what America can look forward to if it votes Republican?

A new Middle East war with a nation three times the size of Iraq, and with Dover receiving again the coffins and Walter Reed the casualties?

Which brings us to Bob Corker, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, who declined to sign Tom Cotton's letter to Ayatollah Khamenei and a bomb program? is best positioned to plumb the depths of this nuclear deal to determine whether Iran's concessions are real.

Iran has agreed to cut back its operating centrifuges to 5,000, to reconfigure its Arak reactor so it does not produce plutonium, to stop enriching underground at Fordow, to dilute all of its 20-percent enriched uranium, and to allow in more inspectors and inspections.

If true, the deal appears to do what Obama says it does: close off every known avenue to an Iranian bomb.

My own sense is that Iran decided some time ago not to test a nuclear device because it believes, as do we, this could mean the spread of nukes to Egypt, Turkey and Saudi Arabia — which Iran does not want any more than we do.

Corker should schedule testimony from National Intelligence Director Adm. James Clapper and the directors of the CIA and DIA.

The critical questions: Does the U.S. intelligence community stand by its declaration of three years ago that Iran does not have

How long would it take Iran, if it decided to go for a bomb, to build and test one? How long would it take us to discover a breakout?

Does Iran have an ICBM that can hit the United States, as Bibi claims? Is Iran testing intercontinen-

tal ballistic missiles? The GOP should raise every legitimate question, but if the deal seems to do what Obama claims it does, let it go into effect.

Then, if Iran cheats, the nation will turn to the GOP. But if Iran abides by the deal and the deal accomplishes what Obama promises, the GOP can say: We did our due diligence. We did our duty.

Should the deal collapse, Republicans will be far better off if the Iranian Revolutionary Guard Corps or some new ayatollah sabotaged it than if Congress is seen as the perpetrator.

DPS rescues at-risk, endangered children in 2014 SUBMITTED been responsible for uncovering AUSTIN – The Texas Department crimes affecting children and ar-

of Public Safety (DPS) announced today that DPS officers - with the support of the DPS Interdiction for the Protection of Children (IPC) program - rescued 48 missing or exploited children in 2014.

"When a child goes missing, that boy or girl becomes exponentially more vulnerable to being abused, exploited or harmed in other ways by the deplorable predators who seek them out," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "DPS is committed to pursuing the criminals who participate in the trafficking and sexual exploitation of children, and this premier interdiction program has been crucial to our efforts to detect and rescue endangered children."

Launched in 2009, the IPC program is designed to teach troopers and other law enforcement officers how to recognize indicators of endangered children who do not exhibit obvious signs of abuse. This program offers invaluable and so-



phisticated training created to assist law enforcement officers in identifying and recovering missing or exploited children, and arresting suspects for sexual offenses against children.

As a result of this training, DPS has initiated more than 50 criminal investigations, and recovered 160 missing and exploited children since the program's inception. In 2014 alone, 48 children were recovered by DPS in Texas. Throughout the years, the IPC program has other high-risk threats to children.
