## Pampa clipped by severe storm Saturday

 Saturday morning, residents were awakened by thunderstorms bringing some good rainfall to Pampa. Later that night, a severe storm with a tornado warning on it came marching towards Pampa from the Fritch area. The rotation

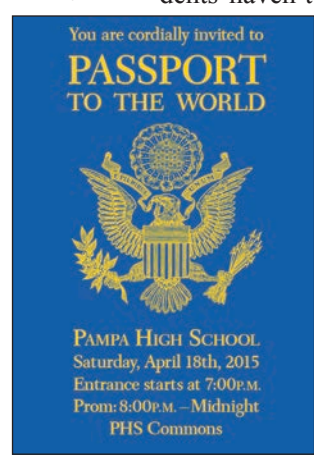
took a right turn at Skellytown and missed Pampa. The total amount of rainfall Pampa received Saturday morning through Monday morning was well over an inch, although there are no official reports as to how much. Pampa did suffer a little bit of hail. Ken Schneider, meteorologist

with the National Weather Service in Amarillo, said that Pampa received hail to the size of about an inch and three quarters at 8:10 p.m. Saturday. He also said there was two inch hail five miles south of Kingsmill. "We haven't heard any reports of damage or a confirmed tornado," Schneider said. "There is possible

severe weather later in the week, especially Wednesday night into Thursday. I think that is the better chance for severe weather." Schneider also said it is too early to tell right now (Monday morning) as to whether this will be a widespread event.

# Arboristing for nature, for history

Once again, arboristing time is upon me. From springtime into mid summer, I work for an arborist. I've done this post retirement work since 2009. You can put the dictionary back in the bookshelf, for 'arboristing' is another one of my made up words. In my blogging, writing and when friends have asked what I have

been up to, I like to reply, "Arboristing!"

Arborists are tree doctors. Like your family physician cares for the well being of you and yours, arborists care for the well being of your trees and shrubbery. I love arboristing because I'm a nature freak. My entire life I have loved the outdoors. Arboristing is simply for me a natural extension of what is going on with me and Mother Nature. Regarding trees,

many life forms (human included) would be in dire straights were there not any.

On flora and fauna, drought the past nine years has been the hardest since the Dust Bowl days. Our Panhandle trees have taken quite the hit. Throw in those devastatingly immense 2006 prairie fires and pestilence to boot, many a tree has fallen victim. In the matter of water, once a tree is weakened due to the lack of, it becomes a beacon for insects it otherwise could have fended off.

Because of the ONGOING drought, the Panhandle has lost many trees. In other words, if you like trees and desire them for your landscape plan, you must WATER them. Arboristing cannot fix the results of lack of water...

On the flip side of trees water needs, study our area's climate and plant trees that are drought resistant and require only minimal watering. Like an apple a day keeps the doctor away, a

healthy tree keeps the arborist away. What part of ONGOING drought do you not understand? It all starts with the right tree and proper watering.

Another reason I love arboristing is many a tree planted here in the Panhandle has quite a historical significance. Before Manifest Destiny, the only trees in this part of the Great American Desert were the ones dropped by fauna or blown in by the wind. When arboristing finds me out and about caring for trees on Panhandle ranches, some very historic ranches at that, I'm a very happy and contented person.

Ranchers are stewards of the land, and we've some area ranches where that stewardship shows in some pretty massive trees that are 100 to 200 years old. Some are on ranches a mere rock toss from Pampa. I wish I could tell you these ranches names and locations, but for the sake of

## Tougher sanctions necessary to force Iran to change its terrorist ways

If recent news accounts are to be believed, the framework of agreement between the U.S. and Iran is on the rocks. Iran's top officials, Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei and President Hassan Rouhani, are saying economic sanctions must end immediately and that U.N. inspectors will not be granted unfettered access to military installations and nuclear construction sites.

But this may be nothing more than Iranian domestic political spin. And as long as there's a potential deal, a critical point needs to be made: There is no provision for, or even discussion of, putting political restraints on Iran. That is, there is nothing in this deal that would force Iran to change its terrorist ways. Iran will continue to be the No. 1 state sponsor of terrorism in the Middle East, no matter what the deal.

How can this be? Writing in the Wall Street Journal, Henry Kissinger and George P. Shultz make a crucial point: "Absent the linkage between nuclear and political restraint, America's traditional allies will conclude that the U.S. has traded temporary nuclear cooperation for acquiescence to Iranian hegemony." (Italics mine.)

Put another way, there could be a U.S.-Iran deal that postpones Iran's nuclear weaponization for 10 or more years. But tomorrow, and the day after, and the day after that, Iran will continue to sponsor its terrorist proxies, like Hamas in Gaza and Hezbollah in Lebanon, keep proxy troops in Syria, continue its efforts to take over Iraq, further its designs on Yemen and confront Sunni Saudi Arabia. And don't forget, the U.S. has labeled Iran's own Quds Force and Revolutionary Guard as terrorists.

Kissinger and Shultz write, "Iranian or Iranian client forces are now the pre-eminent military or political element in multiple Arab countries. ... With the recent addition of Yemen as a battlefield, Tehran occupies posi-

tions along all of the Middle East's strategic waterways and encircles archrival Saudi Arabia, an American ally."

No one doubts these facts. Iran wants to dominate the Middle East. And it will not acknowledge the rights of the sovereign state of Israel. So the question is: Why is the U.S. not including political- and terrorist-restraint clauses in any Iran deal?

This is why economic sanctions are crucial. Western-nation sanctions are slowly but surely smashing the Iranian economy. We have effectively stopped the flow of money and oil for Iran. The Iranian budget, which dominates the state-run economy, needs \$130 a barrel. Today's \$50 price is an economic killer.

So why doesn't Team Obama directly link a removal of economic sanctions with a clear pullback of Iran's terrorist activities and march to Middle East dominance? That's a daily linkage — one that is observable. And since we know Iran won't agree to this, why aren't President Obama and Secretary of State John Kerry working to tighten sanctions on Iran rather than push through a bad nuclear deal?

Make no mistake, the nanosecond sanctions are lifted U.S. and Western investment will pour into Iran. Looser financial sanctions will put an estimated \$50 billion into Iran's economy. And a number of European oil companies will jump to develop the world's fourth-largest proven oil reserve and second-biggest national-gas reserve.

Italy's Eni, Royal Dutch Shell, France's Total, Norway's Statoil, Germany's Siemens and French car companies Peugeot and Citroen are ready to move. It's reported that Boeing is looking to do business in Iran. HP and Google have been exploring contracts and licenses in Iran. Other major U.S. and European Internet companies have been approached by Iranian officials. And financial-service and credit card companies will move in quickly.

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## 'The Other White Album' is the best of The Beatles

A few months ago, I undoubtedly caused a shockwave in the classical music world when I proclaimed in one of my weekly columns that Beethoven's greatest

symphony is not the Fifth but rather the much-less-known Third, which happens to be my personal favorite. But I wasn't trying to be a know-it-all or intentionally trying to offend anyone with delicate sensibilities. I believe I had a well-reasoned case on why Beethoven's Third, the Eroica, is not only the greatest of Beethoven's symphonic works, but the greatest symphony of all time. So there.

Fasten your seatbelts, boys and girls, ladies and gentlemen, because I am going to do the same thing today with my favorite Beatles' album.

I know there are a lot of Baby Boomers in Roswell, and probably within that population are a lot of Beatles fans. So I'm hoping there won't be any threats of violence come Monday morning from any rogue Beatles fans.

Perhaps when this column goes out on the Internet, my revelation will be so shocking that a crack will appear in the front window of the headquarters of Apple

Records. That is, if Apple Records still has a headquarters.

For decades, rock music pundits have lauded "Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band" as the band's very best album.

I love "Sgt. Pepper's" and the other later Beatles albums like "Abbey Road" and "Magical Mystery Tour." Along with the Fab Four's songwriting, the brilliance of Beatles producer and audio engineer George Martin shines through most on these albums, with prime examples being the odd circus-music tape loops on "For the Benefit of Mister Kite" and merging two very different tracks in two different keys on "Strawberry Fields Forever" into the final take.

But in all that "sonic sophistication" and "superlative production values," something seems lost, and to me that is the simplicity and raw emotion of the earlier Beatles albums.

The Beatles stopped performing around 1966, not just because they got tired of obsessed fans screaming so loudly they couldn't hear themselves play, but also because as their music got more and more sophisticated it became almost impossible for them to perform live with just three guitars, three Vox amplifiers and a drum kit.

For many years, the album referred to as "The White Album" — which lacked the slick produc-

tion values of the band's other late-career albums — was my favorite. But when I listen to it now, the double album from 1968 sounds a bit disjointed and drugged-out.

So what is my favorite Beatles album? I call it "The Other Beatles White Album" — "Revolver."

Following "Revolver" as a close second is "Rubber Soul."

"Rubber Soul" was recorded in 1965 and "Revolver" in 1966. To me, this is the mid-career of the Beatles.

They still had that sound of four blokes jamming together in the studio, while introducing the experimentalism that was to follow in the later albums like backwards tape loops, Indian classical music (sitar and tabla drums, thanks to George Harrison) and psychedelic meanderings (thanks to John Lennon).

Even the album covers stood out as something completely different. Instead of happy-go-lucky smiles, we see the boys gazing at the camera with frowns on "Rubber Soul." And then there's "Revolver," the first Beatles album to not have a group photo on the front.

Instead, four sets of blood-shot eyes peer through stark black-and-white sketches of their faces with a collage of smaller black-and-white sketches and photos to fill in the remaining space. The artwork looks like it could have been

produced by eccentric Spanish artist Salvador Dali.

According to one music critic, and I completely agree, "Revolver" marks the first time that the Beatles deliberately incorporated the studio into the conception of the recordings they made, rather than using it merely as a tool to capture their performances.

My favorite Beatles song, "Eleanor Rigby," is on "Revolver." I get goosebumps every time I hear it. It has to be the saddest song ever written, and by someone so young. At age 24, it would seem that Paul McCartney would have been too young to empathize with the old and the lonely. The vocals are brilliantly accompanied by a string octet, which is a string quartet with each instrument doubled.

Another song I adore is "Here, There and Everywhere." Among the dozens of love songs the Beatles wrote, this has to be the best one musically. The best classical choir in the world could not even come close reproducing the layers of shimmering vocal tracks, which are underscored with an absolutely bare-bones accompaniment that finishes with horns playing at the final cadence. To borrow a phrase from Leonard Bernstein, "Simplicity made manifest."

has cottonwoods. If you are a history buff, why not drive around to some the Panhandle's smaller communities? Doing so you will see some very old and historic trees. There is always someone around who knows the history of those trees or they may be marked accordingly, like that little historical marker on Highway 60 between Panhandle and Amarillo. If there is one thing that embodies life more than a human being, it's a tree. Please take care of your trees. Water

them, nourish them. If you notice your tree(s) is in distress and you want to keep them, for after all they do add value to your real estate, call your friendly arborist for some arboristing!

Then there are Lennon's drug-induced excursions with the trance-like "Tomorrow Never Knows" and enigmatic "She Said, She Said." "Tomorrow Never Knows" drones on a single chord with a drum pattern that repeats from beginning to end. The backward tape loops of guitar leads seem like they'd make sense musically, if only played forward. Quite unsettling. Lennon's lyrics were inspired by from Timothy Leary's "The Psychedelic Experience: A Manual Based on the Tibetan Book of the Dead." Creepy indeed. Though no one seems to know for sure, the consensus among Beatles experts is that Lennon wrote "She Said, She Said" after George Harrison had had a bad LSD experience at a party in the Hollywood Hills. Peter Fonda was at the party, and to bring

George out of his funk, Peter got in his face and kept saying, "I know what it's like to be dead. I know what it's like to be dead." What was Peter thinking? If someone did that to me, even without the drugs, I'd probably run out of the house kicking and screaming. I read once that Lennon intentionally changed the pronoun in the title from "he" to "she" to make the meaning of the song even more cryptic. On "Rubber Soul," my two favorites are "Drive My Car" and "In My Life." "Drive My Car" could very well be the first rock song to feature the cowbell so prominently. As any respected music scholar will tell you, by the mid-70s nearly every hard-rock song on the radio had cowbell. (More cowbell! Go Ringo!). The lyrics of "In My Life," much like "Eleanor Rigby," reveals incredible depth and maturity for musicians so young. Another seminal rock album from this era, the

mid-60s, is "Pet Sounds" by the Beach Boys. Many consider to be more of a Brian Wilson solo album than a true Beach Boys record. I never liked the Beach Boys until I heard "Pet Sounds," always believing they were nothing more than a corny, three-chord pop band. And then I heard "Pet Sounds." Whoa! Brian Wilson gave George Martin a run for his money with the magic he worked in the studio with his own symphonic arrangements and layers of vocal harmonies, coupled with sound effects such as bicycle bells, dog whistles and trains. While the album had a lukewarm response in the States, across The Pond it was declared the "most progressive pop album ever." The story goes that Brian Wilson and The Beatles were in a game of one-upmanship during the mid-60s. After hearing "Rubber Soul," the obsessive and compulsive Brian Wilson became even more obsessive and compulsive,

dropping out of touring with his bandmates and devoting every waking moment to producing "Pet Sounds" in 1966. Then, after the hearing "Pet Sounds," The Beatles tried to take it up a notch by releasing "Sgt. Pepper's" in 1967. The grand achievement in these three albums, "Rubber Soul," "Revolver" and "Pet Sounds," is that The Beatles and Brian Wilson produced records in which every song on the album was good. Until then, the mindset for rock albums was to have maybe three or four good tracks scattered throughout the record with "filler songs" in between. These three albums changed the course of rock music, which was not much more than a decade old. And much to the chagrin of classical and jazz snobs, these albums elevated rock from "just a passing fad" and/or "dance music" to a true art form.

treaty violations can be countered by a "snap-back," they'd better think again. These complex sanctions, which took so long to put together, will never be effectively revived. Gen. Jack Keane believes President Obama

## Volatile start to year in markets could help bank profits

NEW YORK (AP) — Wild swings in the stock, bond and currency markets in the first three months of the year are likely to translate into bigger profits for big U.S. banks, analysts say. Investors will get quarterly results from the nation's major banks in the next two weeks, including Bank of America, Citigroup, Goldman Sachs, JPMorgan Chase, Morgan Stanley and Wells Fargo. Profits at the nation's six largest banks are expected to be around \$22 billion for the first quarter of 2015, a jump from

\$17.71 billion in the same period a year ago, according to FactSet. Part of the reason for the sharp increase is because Bank of America took a \$6 billion charge last year for legal expenses. Market volatility may make average investors nervous, but it can be good for investment banks. As trading volume rises, banks earn more in commissions. It also allows traders to take advantage of swings in markets to make a profit. "The investment banks need volatility and volume to really profit. They got both," said

Nancy Bush, an independent banking industry financial analyst with NAB Research. Two of the places where volatility has been most noticeable last quarter have been in the currency and commodities markets. The dollar has gained more than 10 percent against the euro just this year, a significant move. Other currencies have also been volatile. The European Central Bank started its own bond-buying program this year, which has pushed the euro lower against other major currencies.

The Swiss franc had its biggest one-day move in history in January after the Swiss National Bank announced it would allow the franc to appreciate against the euro. Niche indexes that track volatility in currency markets, like the Deutsche Bank Currency Volatility index, are up 40 percent year-over-year. Commodities markets have been just as volatile. The price of oil has plunged by 50 percent over the past year and has had many days of huge swings. Not all banks are ex-

pected to benefit equally. Banks with sizable trading desks, including Goldman Sachs, Morgan Stanley, JPMorgan and Citigroup, have more exposure to these markets. The "custodial" banks, which hold large amounts of assets in trust for other investors, like State Street and Bank of New York Mellon, are also likely beneficiaries, analysts say. The consumer-focused banks like Bank of America and Wells Fargo are more likely to report less impressive results, due to weakness in the economy and extremely low

interest rates. When economic times are good, banks are typically able to earn more money from the higher interest they charge borrowers. Since the Federal Reserve has kept interest rates near zero and U.S. Treasury yields have gone down from a year ago, there is little opportunity for banks to lend at higher rates. "The fundamental backdrop for these commercial banks is pretty challenging at the moment," said Fred Cannon, director of research at Keefe, Bruyette & Woods.

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**Illinois group says concussions lawsuit 'threatens' football**

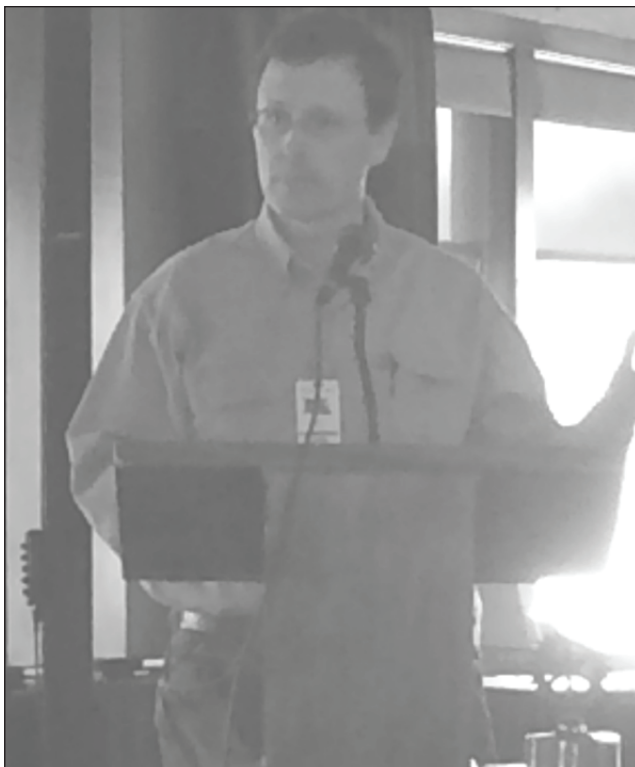
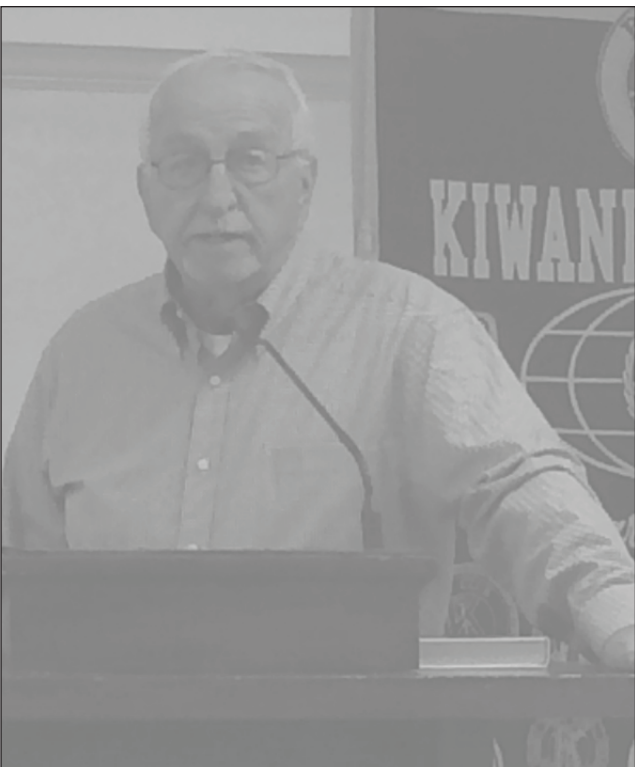
CHICAGO (AP) — The nation's first prep sports governing body to face a class-action concussions lawsuit wants an Illinois judge to dismiss the suit, saying it could kill football programs statewide. The Illinois High School Association says in a filing with Cook County Circuit Court that it's already doing what it can to improve head-injury management. It says the lawsuit "threatens high school football." The filing is a first full response to the November lawsuit that seeks court supervision over how high schools manage head injuries. The IHSA filed the response late Friday and provided a copy to The Associated Press. The plaintiff's attorney has said improving safety should help football survive, not lead to its demise. The IHSA says mandates that the lawsuit seeks would be financially crippling.

## Official: 1 dead in shooting at North Carolina college

GOLDSBORO, N.C. (AP) — An official says one person is dead and a community college campus is on lockdown as authorities search for a man with a gun. Kim Best, spokeswoman for the city of Goldsboro, says there is one victim in Monday's campus shooting at Wayne County Community College in Goldsboro. She says that person is dead but did not give any other details. Best says the shooter is not in custody. She would not say whether the shooter was still on campus. Wayne County assistant operations manager Daniel Wiggins says 911 received a call about 8 a.m. of an active shooter on campus. Authorities are searching the area for a white male, about 5 foot, 11 inches tall with a goatee and a tattoo over his eye. Wiggins says he doesn't know what type of firearm is involved.

## US stock market gains in early trading

NEW YORK (AP) — The U.S. stock market edged higher Monday as investors looked ahead to a busy week for corporate earnings. Markets in Asia surged after a run of weak economic reports lifted hopes for stimulus in China. **KEEPING SCORE:** The Dow Jones industrial average rose 43 points, or 0.2 percent, to 18,099 as of 10:09 a.m. Monday. The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose four points, or 0.2 percent, to 2,106, while the Nasdaq composite increased 23 points, or 0.5 percent, to 5,019. The market is coming off a second weekly gain in a row. It hasn't had a three-week winning streak since late February. **DEAL:** Builders First-Source said it's buying Pro-Build, a supplier of building

materials, for roughly \$1.6 billion in a move to expand its geographic reach. Pro-Build Holdings, a private company, runs lumberyards and retail stores across 40 states. The deal is expected to close in the second half of the year. Builders First-Source soared \$4, or 58 percent, to \$10.90 in morning trading. **ENERGY:** Benchmark U.S. crude rose 57 cents to \$52.22 per barrel on the New York Mercantile Exchange. **LOW BAR:** Investors are braced for a tough earnings season, a result of the stronger dollar and low oil prices squeezing revenues. Analysts forecast that companies will report first-quarter earnings shrank 3 percent compared with the same quarter of last year, according to S&P Capital IQ. If those forecasts come true, it would

be the first drop in quarterly profits since 2009. **EUROPE:** Major stock markets in Europe were mixed. Germany's DAX was flat, while France's CAC 40 was up 0.3 percent. Britain's FTSE 100 was down 0.2 percent. A broader measure of European shares, the Stoxx 600, was at record highs, edging up 0.1 percent from a record close set on Friday. **CHINA'S STIMULUS HOPES:** Markets in China jumped on expectations that Beijing will launch additional stimulus to spur economic growth. Imports fell 12 percent in March from a year earlier and exports declined 15 percent. That added to signs that growth in the first three months of the year, due to be reported Wednesday, might decline further from the previous quarter's 7 per-

cent. **ASIA'S DAY:** Major indexes in China reached seven-year highs. Hong Kong's Hang Seng gained 2.7 percent, closing at its highest level since December 2007. The Shanghai Composite Index surged 2.1 percent, hitting its highest level since March 2008. In South Korea, the Kospi rose 0.5 percent. India's Sensex added 0.3 percent and Australia's S&P ASX 200 edged up 0.1 percent. In Japan, the Nikkei 225 closed the day nearly unchanged. **BONDS, CURRENCIES:** Prices for U.S. government bonds didn't move much. The yield on the 10-year Treasury note held steady at 1.95 percent. The dollar rose to 120.69 yen from Friday's 120.18 yen. The euro slipped to \$1.0530 from the previous session's \$1.0586.

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## John Legend launches campaign to end mass incarceration

NEW YORK (AP) — John Legend has launched a campaign to end mass incarceration.

The Grammy-winning singer announced the multiyear initiative, FREE AMERICA, on Monday. He will visit and perform at a correctional facility on Thursday in Austin, where he also will be part of a press conference with state legislators to discuss Texas' criminal justice system.

"We have a serious problem with incarceration in this country," Legend said in an interview. "It's destroying families, it's destroying communities and we're the most incarcerated country in the world, and when you look deeper and look at the reasons we got to this place, we as a society made some choices politically and legislatively, culturally to deal with poverty,

deal with mental illness in a certain way and that way usually involves using incarceration."

Legend, 36, will also visit a California state prison and co-host a criminal justice event with Politico in Washington, D.C., later this month. The campaign will include help from other artists — to be announced — and organizations committed to ending mass incarceration.

"I'm just trying to create some more awareness to this issue and trying to make some real change legislatively," he said. "And we're not the only ones. There are senators that are looking at this, like Rand Paul and Cory Booker, there are other nonprofits that are looking at this, and I just wanted to add my voice to that."

Legend's speech at the Academy

Awards this year struck a chord when he spoke about mass incarceration. He won the Oscar for best original song with rapper Common for "Glory" from the film "Selma."

The singer said an early victory for his campaign was the approval of Proposition 47 in California in November, which calls for treating shoplifting, forgery, fraud, petty theft and possession of small amounts of drugs — including cocaine, heroin and methamphetamines — as misdemeanors instead of felonies.

"Once you have that tag of a felony on your name, it's hard for you to do anything," Legend said. "Getting those reduced to misdemeanors really impacted a lot of lives and we hope to launch more initiatives like that around the country."

mind they will do great things," Embry said.

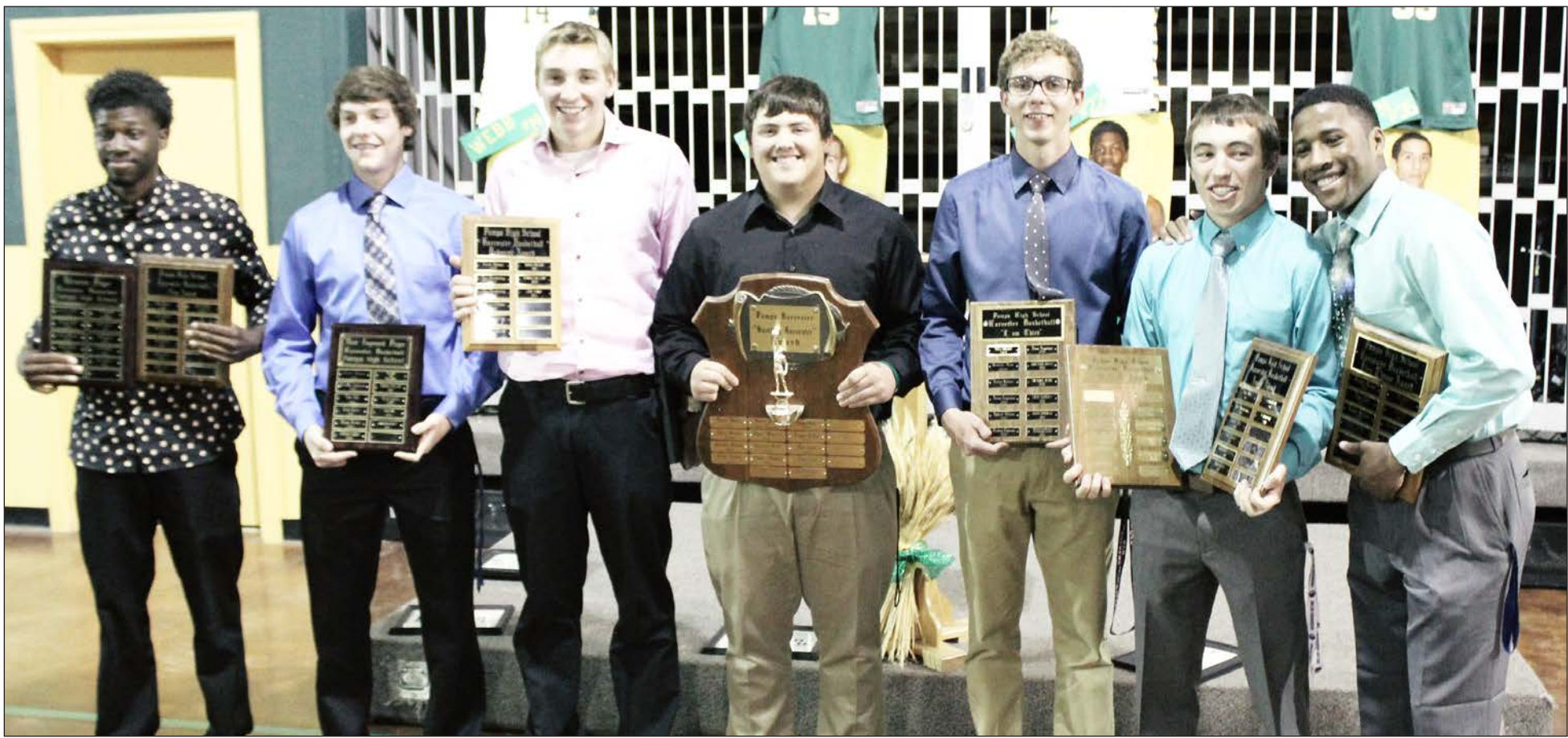

## Offense remains in deep freeze during MLB season's 1st week

Batters stayed stuck in the deep freeze in the sport's offensive ice age during the first week of the new major league season, with scoring remaining near its lowest level in more than two decades.

There was an average of 8.34 runs per game through Sunday, according to STATS, down from 8.38 through the first eight days of last season and the second-lowest since 1992.

Back in 2006, teams averaged 10.51 runs a game over a similar span.

"Pitching is so good now that it's just gotten tougher and tougher and tougher on these hitters," said Bruce Bochy, manager of the World Series champion San Francisco Giants. "The game's changed. The velocity on these pitchers has gone up quite a bit, particularly in the bullpen."

Houston's Evan Gattis is 0 for 20 with 12 strikeouts. Boston's Mike Napoli was 0 for 18 before an eighth-inning single Sunday night.

"This game is about rhythm and being in there a lot," Napoli said. "I'm pretty sure that once everyone gets into rhythm it's going to be good times."

The .241 big league batting average is down from .246 in the first week last year and the second-lowest

in 24 years, ahead of only 2012. Before hitters had a good day at the plate Sunday, the average was .236 — the lowest since 1972.

Home runs are up slightly to 1.81 from last year's 1.70, the smallest average since 1993.

There were shutouts on each of the first seven days of the season for the first time since 2002.

The 20 total blankings equaled two years ago for the most over the first eight days since 1972, STATS said.

"People overanalyze everything," Oakland outfielder Josh Reddick said. "We're what, six games in right now? It's just nothing."

Still, sometimes early trends do hold up. Last year's final big league batting average of .251 was the lowest since 1972. Only 12 players had 100 or more RBIs, down from a record 59 in 1999.

Texas slugger Prince Fielder points to the increase in pitchers' velocity. These days, miles per hour is scrutinized as much as ERA.

"You don't have too many guys just throwing 86, 88 no more," he said. "They're throwing 93, 95 with the same kind of movement as a guy throwing 86. You've got to tip your cap. Guys

are good."

And it's not just power pitching. Throw in tougher testing for steroids and defensive shifts suggested by computer programs, and the sport looks far more like the era of Sandy Koufax, Don Drysdale and Bob Gibson in the 1960s than the big bopper days of Mark McGwire, Sammy Sosa and Barry Bonds in the late 1990s and early 2000s.

"I think a better drug-testing policy has something to do with it," Chicago Cubs manager Joe Maddon said.

"Beyond all that I think it's all the advanced information, it just slants to pitching and defense. There's really nothing out there that helps a hitter right now."

Texas rookie manager Jeff Bannister says the onus is on batters to change their ways.

"Teams play shifts because hitters are unwilling to move the ball around the yard, hit the other way," he said. "Be a hitter. Put a foot down and be a hitter. Let slugging happen."

Miguel Montero, the Cubs' All-Star catcher, thought about his vantage point from behind the plate. At least he gets to appreciate the pitching prosperity.

"It's fun to catch those guys," he said. "I know hitting isn't that fun."

## Alex Ross scores 2 TDs in Oklahoma spring game

NORMAN, Okla. (AP) — Alex Ross scored two touchdowns to help the Red team beat the White team 20-7 in Oklahoma's spring game Saturday.

It was the first time the crowd of 42,807 saw new offensive coordinator Lincoln Riley's Air Raid offense.

The fans also got a closer look at the quarterback battle. Baker Mayfield, the transfer from Texas Tech who sat out last season, completed 10 of 13 passes for 176 yards and a touchdown, with two interceptions. Trevor Knight, last year's starter, was 6 of 13 for 78 yards and an interception and ran for a score. Coach Bob Stoops has said he expects the competition to continue into the fall.

Cody Thomas completed 5 of 12 passes for 83 yards with an interception, and Justice Hansen completed all five of his passes for 70 yards.

Jeffery Mead caught three passes for 93 yards and Mark Andrews had two receptions for 56 yards. The highlight of the day was Mead's 48-yard catch from Mayfield, which he snagged with just his left hand, in traffic.

Mayfield threw a 25-yard touchdown pass to Ross in the third quarter, and Ross scored on a 3-yard run in the fourth quarter.

Ross ran for 62 yards and a touchdown on 17 carries. Daniel Brooks led the way with 154 yards on 21 carries, and he caught three passes for 40 yards.

The shortened game lasted about an hour and 40 minutes.

PLAYING IT SAFE: Samaje Perine, the reigning Big 12 Freshman of the Year, barely played and was not allowed to be tackled. Highly touted running back Joe Mixon, who was suspended last season, did not play. Sterling Shepard, last year's top receiver, also was not allowed to be tackled.

MAYFIELD MISTAKES: Last year, Mayfield went 9 for 9 for 125 yards and two touchdowns in the spring game. This year, after completing his first six passes, he threw interceptions on two of his next three to end the first half.

BIG PLAY RECEIVERS: Newcomer Dede Westbrook had a 27-yard catch and run from Knight that led to Knight's touchdown run, and Andrews hauled in a 47-yard catch from Hansen that led to a field goal. The receiver spots were a problem for the Sooners after Shepard was injured midway through last season, but Stoops has been high on these two throughout the spring.

GETTING DEFENSIVE: Hatari Byrd, Ahmad Thomas, Will Johnson and Jordan Thomas each intercepted a pass. Hansen was the only quarterback who didn't throw a pick.

NEW KICKER: Nick Hodgson made a 20-yard field goal in the first quarter and a 47-yard field goal as time expired in the end of the first half.

He missed a 50-yard field goal in the fourth quarter. He will compete with incoming Austin Seibert for the job now that career scoring leader Michael Hunnicutt is gone.

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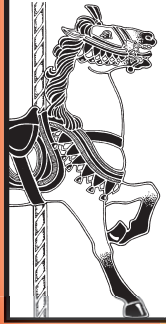
