Today at a glance

County commission decides against enforcing burn ban

The Gray County Commissioner's Court met Wednesday morning in the second floor court room of the Gray County Courthouse, located at 205 N. Russell.

In their second meeting of the month, the judge and commissioners started things off by discussing and approving the agenda items in regards to paying bills and salaries as approved by the county auditor and approving both the treasurer's and county clerk's reports.

The commissioners then approved one budget amendment before approving seven road crossing requests on various county roads. The county received a check for \$4,500 for these crossings from Regency.

The next item on the agenda was in regards to a request for 10-foot signs on County Road 3. Commissioner Gary Willoughby said these will be slow, truck turning signs. Along with this was another agenda item for signs denoting the speed limit on the same county road. Willoughby said traffic has increased on the road, which is between Highway 60 and Highway 152, and putting signs on the road will enable DPS and county officers to enforce the speed limit. Without any signs on county roads, the speed limit is 55, but not everyone is aware of this, so putting speed limit 55 signs up will be beneficial and possibly prevent

major accidents from occurring on the road.

Next, the commissioners approved two transfers of hangar leases at Perry Lefors Airport.

The commissioners then reached the agenda item on which they considered reinstating a burn ban for the county. Judge Richard Peet said that Gray County is currently right on the line between moderate and high danger of wildfires and **COUNTY** cont. on page 2

Severe weather threat today

Multiple rounds expected into the weekend.

Pampa and Gray County are in for a severe weather threat today and through the weekend.

Now is the time to review your safety plans as we are right in the heart of severe weather season and it looks to be ramping up for our area.

Cindy Elfenheimer, meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Amarillo spoke with The Pampa News Wednesday around noon regarding the threat.

She said the main threat will be large hail and damaging winds, but there is an isolated tornado threat.

"The hail has a possibility of being greater than half-dollar size," Elfenheimer said. "The eastern Panhandles look to have the best chances on Thursday. Right now it looks like an isolated supercell event early on, with the possibility that it becomes a linear event later on in the overnight hours."

If the storms merge into a squall line the damaging wind threat will increase. This will be a larger event than we saw on Saturday with just the one isolated storm. There



Senate votes to end renewable energy programs

The Senate on Tuesday approved legislation that would close the book on two programs that helped fuel the state's years-long surge in wind energy production.

With a 21-10 vote, the chamber sent Sen. Troy Fraser's proposal, Senate Bill 931, to House lawmakers. It would end the Renewable Portfolio Standard, which established a state renewable energy goal. It would also close Texas' Competitive Renewable Energy Zone (CREZ) initiative, a power line program that sparked huge investments in wind energy.

The proposal has angered environmentalists and renewable energy industry groups. But Fraser, R-Horseshoe Bay, has said his ef-



That's because Texas long ago surpassed its renewable energy goal, and most of the \$7 billion CREZ program which regulators used to build power lines to connect windy West Texas to large electricity-hungry cities in the east - was completed in December.

Texas manufacturers and free market think tanks are among those who support the legislation, saying the two programs gave renewable energy a leg up that it no longer needs.

But advocates for renewable energy say the changes would shake the industry's confidence in Texas' business climate. Also, with federal climate regulations looming, critics say the legislation would take away an option Texas might tap to meet its proposed carbon goal.

A story by IGN.com notes that GameStop has joined in the market the "systems and accessories that you will be able to trade-in and purchase include the NES, Super NES, SEGA Genesis, PlayStation, N64, and SEGA Dreamcast.

Later on in the article, it says, "you won't be inundated with the sights and sounds of your favorite retro games

when you walk into your local store. Purchases can be made on Game-Stop's website or through its web-instore system."

So this is where local, small-shop owners will have an edge over GameStop. The convenience in buying a game will still be right there in the store, rather than waiting for it to come in.

Local owners still have the upperhand because they also deal, toys, table-top and card games.



Leftists still assailed the court for granting even this tiny exemption. Sen. Elizabeth Warren said she "can't believe we live in a world where we'd even consider letting big corps deny women access to basic care.'

Harry Reid said, "If the Supreme Court will not protect women's access to health care, then Democrats will."

long as they don't collude with competitors, they should be allowed to impose whatever rules they want. Employees aren't trapped. Anyone can quit. Companies that give more generous benefits will attract better employees. That competition protects workers better than government mandates

ever will. Letting government make so many one-size-fits-all decisions creates new problems. Iannaccone argues that religion is more vibrant in the U.S. because the American government has mostly left religion alone. In Europe, governments subsidized religion or set the rules. The state promised protection for all but ended up becoming an enforcer of orthodoxy. That made religion more homogeneous and less appealing. Forty percent of Americans say they go to church every week. In England and France, only 10 percent do. In Denmark, only three percent attend.

"Religion is a market phenomenon like other ones,' Iannaccone says, "and when you make the government the arbiter, the funder, (religion) operates like a typical lazy monopoly. Incentives are lost. The clergy get focused on pleasing politicians rather than the people."

Government ought to leave us alone so we can do as we please, in collaboration with whatever God we believe in.

My wife and I decided to venture to Greece and to spend a couple of weeks on a Rick Steves tour with 24 others exploring this country that dates its history back as early as 7000 to 3000 B.C. It makes the United States look like a "newborn" country when we have not yet celebrated even 240 years of existence!

After experiencing Greece first hand, I have learned many things; one of them is that I have no desire to learn the language. According to our guidebook, there are about 14 million Greek speakers around the world and about 11 million of them live in Greece. Why? Basically, it is a language that is not spoken much outside of the country.

Greece does have a very rich heritage. Ancient Greece has impacted modern day America more than most people recognize. Greece brought the world the first democracy. It brought theater performances and early art. >From Greece came the well known Classical Age philosophers Socrates, Plato, and Aristotle. Hippocrates made medicine a hard

more date back from the "Before Christ" years.

Most American students study 8th century B.C. author Homer's Iliad and the Odyssey. They study Greek Gods such as Zeus, Apollo, Athena, and Aphrodite. They read of Hercules? feats. They learn of the "bad guys," Cyclops, Minotaur, and Medusa. They learn about the Trojan Horse and the Oracle at Delphi.

The popular Spartans mascot comes from Sparta, Greece. The movie "300" tells the story of the 300 Spartans who made an Alamo-like stand before all of them died.

The Olympics are a product of Greece having begun in Olympia in 776 B.C. Marathoners run 42 kilometer (26.2 mile) marathons today because of Pheidippides' 490 B.C. run from Marathon to Athens. Upon arriving in Athens he told the Athenians that they had won the battle against the Persians at Marathon, then he collapsed and died.

In the 4th century B.C. Greek Alexander the Great conquered virtually the entire known world making Greek an international language at the time. Some books of the Bible were written in Greek

The Parthenon on the Acropolis in Athens was built in the 5th century B.C. and has its own 2450 year history. Greece includes Corinth and Thessaloniki, two cities to whom the

mans conquered Greece in 146 B.C., much of Greek culture became incorporated into the Roman culture. The history of Greece includes its land being ruled by Persians, Alexander the Great, Romans, Byzantines, Ottomans, British, German Nazis, and modern day Greece since 1821. We were there on National Day, Greece's Independence Day, and watched the parade in downtown Athens as the citizens proudly waived their blue and white flags

We spent time in Athens then traveled west and south through the Peloponnese.

Greece is a country bordered by beautiful blue water on its south, packed with ruins that are thousands of years old, museums to house some of the ruins, 143 million olive trees, fresh fish, many wines and cheeses, over 1200 islands, snow capped mountains, small villages with many of them on terraces, Greek Orthodox churches, Greek yogurt, red Mediterranean roofs, fields of wild flowers, citrus groves, green hills, warm sunshine, and friendly people who greet you with "Yassas" (Hello) and "Kalimera" (good morning). It is a very beautiful country.

Greece has many tourists from foreign lands. It also has an abundance of stray cats and even some stray dogs.

My one disappointment in Greece was the defacing done by graffiti. We

Greece also has many street signs that to non-Greek speakers are unreadable.

When visiting Greece there are many places a person can stand and try to absorb history that occurred on that very location over the past 3000 years.

For example, standing at the Agora, an area next to the Acropolis, one can imagine 2400 years earlier the philosophers Socrates, Plato, and Aristotle spending much time there. In this location, Greek war victories were celebrated including Athens' victory over Sparta in 425 B.C.

The earliest Greek plays and concerts were performed here in the open air and playwright Aristophanes set scenes at the Agora.

Also at this location in the heart of Athens, Greeks awaited the onslaught of the Persians and greeted the coming of Alexander the Great, the conquering Romans, and the invasions of the Byzantines and Ottomans

In about 49 A.D. when the Apostle Paul visited Athens, Mars Hill at the Agora is where it is believed he spoke about the unknown God written about in Acts 17:17 on his way to Corinth.
