

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

Cummings spoke Thursday with the Secret Service director.

"I think that there's absolutely a gap, and it's a very dangerous gap, with regard to our airspace," Cummings said. "I don't want people to get a message that they can just land anywhere. Suppose there was a bomb or an explosive device on that air vehicle? That could have been a major catastrophe." Johnson said the Secret Service passed along the information from the interview with Hughes, who was to appear in court Thursday afternoon, to "all of the appropriate law enforcement agencies." House Minority leader Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., called the incident "stunning." What safeguards can we use? We don't want to be a place where we're saying 'This is an iron-clad Capitol.' And have such restrictions on people having access to it," Pelosi told reporters. "Nonetheless, we have to ensure the safety of those people." The tiny, open-air aircraft landed without injuries to anyone, but the incident raises questions about how someone could be allowed to fly all the way from Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, right up to the Capitol. Hughes has said he was making the flight to publicize his concerns about the corrupting influence of money in politics, and deliver letters to all 535 members of Congress on the topic.

to think of when Barack Obama in 2008 — a freshman senator with an impressive personal story - chose to challenge presumptive nominee Hillary Clinton. She had supported President George W. Bush by voting in 2002 to authorize the use of force in Iraq. By 2008, most Democrats opposed that war.

Rubio seemed especially Obama-esque when he took a swipe at former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush, the erstwhile presumptive GOP front-runner. Like Sen. Ted Cruz, R-Texas, who also is a freshman senator and Cuban-American, Rubio tells an upbeat story of his immigrant parents' embracing of the American dream. "He's an optimistic, positive Republican voice," opined Ruben Barrales of the Latino-GOP group Grow Elect. And: "Republicans need to focus on not being perceived as the party of 'no." In that spirit, Rubio tried to compromise when he got to Washington. He became a member of the Gang of Eight — a rump of four Democrats and four Republicans who collaborated on a big immigration legislative package that included a path to citizenship for many of the 11 million immigrants living in America illegally. The Senate passed an 844page bill in 2013 — but it never made it out of the House, and Rubio had stuck his neck out for nothing. Even before the Senate passed the package with his vote, Rubio had begun to distance himself from it. He felt the heat of tea party conservatives who were angry that the bill of-

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On the other side of the issue, Rubio may be forgiven, as well. Mark Krikorian of the Center for Immigration Studies, which opposed the big immigration bill, thinks the "immigration debacle was damaging for Rubio, but he could overcome it."

After all, Rubio was a rookie in Washington. Besides, enforcement hawks such as Krikorian understand the lay of the land. "I don't trust any of these guys on this issue," he said of the GOP field. "They're all looking for a way to finesse and keep the money people, donors and voters happy."

Rubio has this much going for him: GOP primary voters won't be happy if they pick a nominee who cannot win in November. And they know they need to bump up their share of the Latino vote to get there.

Just the adjectives give it away. Hillary's Twitter launch on April 12 was received with words like "sleek," "savvy," "trending," "electrifying," and "approachable" She was packaged by the press exactly as she wanted it: a humble "champion of everyday Americans."

Compare that to the Ted Cruz launch on March 23. These words framed the introduction: "scary," "dangerous," "slimy," "firebrand," "rigid," "uncompromising," "hardline," "extremist," "flamethrower."

Media elites identify their own ultraliberal

spot on the political spectrum when they choose to ascribe labels to candidates and causes. Most Republicans are routinely identified as "conservative," which is fair, and often presented as radical beyond belief, which is predictable. But Hillary is almost never identified as "liberal." Instead, journalists point out that she's been pressed to sound notes of "fiery populism" (read: socialism) to attract "more progressive" Democrats who admire Elizabeth Warren.

Let's not forget: In the first six months of 2007, the CBS and NBC evening news shows offered zero liberal labels for Barack Obama. ABC mustered one.

How about the issues? While ABC insisted Ted Cruz was extreme, favoring "no abortions, no gun control," there was no mention of Hillary's comparably "rigid" or "hardline" views on those issues. What abortion has Hillary Clinton ever found distasteful? She is no different than Obama

or most Democratic leaders who support any abortion at any time for any reason.

There has been no focus by the networks on Democratic National Committee chair Debbie Wasserman Schultz proclaiming (in response to a Rand Paul dare) that there were zero abortion restrictions she favored. "I support letting women and their doctors make this decision without government getting involved. Period. End of story."

That's exactly where Hillary stands, a 100-percent supporter of the abortion industry.

And like so many pro-aborts they're dishonest. They want government involved paying the bills. She could have kicked off her campaign at Planned Parenthood.

Where's the beef? The pro-Hillary media are also betraying their bias by including almost no mention of her scandals since her announcement. Scandals are presented as merely something the Republicans will try to exploit implying that jour-

nalists have no interest in government ethics or, for that matter, investigative reporting. The Clinton era was marked by the "news" media's refusal to get to the bottom of a single Clinton scandal. Why change now?

They've all promoted her road trip to Iowa as a charming tour to meet those "everyday Americans," never noting that she's failing to grant interviews or hold press conferences. While her opponents subject themselves to hostile interviews with liberal networks, Hillary demonstrates she's still a raging egomaniac seeking to be coronated by stiff-arming any and all questions the press might have.

Instead, the pro-Hillary media explain that all this "humble" activity makes so much sense. As USA Today's Susan Page said on CBS, "Clearly, Hillary Clinton doesn't need to do a big rally in order to get our attention, right. We do nothing but pay attention to Hillary Clinton." 

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PAMPASports Strong first, fourth innings drive Lady Harvesters above .500 in District play

The Pampa Lady Harvesters (9-13, 3-2) finished their sweep of the Dalhart Lady Wolves on Wednesday with a 16-1 win in a game that was delayed from Saturday due to the rain Pampa received that morning.

"I felt like the girls had a goal in mind coming into this game and that was to play errorfree and to play as a team and to back up the pitcher on the mound and make routine plays. I felt like they did that," head coach Bobbi Gill said.

"The run earlier was earned, it was on base hits and they came out swinging and aggressive at the plate, and we shut that down and didn't allow that to happen anymore. We were tuned with our pitches and made sure we didn't put the ball in the middle of the plate."

Trailing 1-0, the Lady Harvesters wasted little time getting on the board, scoring seven runs alone in the bottom of first inning.

Junior Cameron Schaub led the Lady Harvesters off in the frame with a bunt to get on base. Junior Brittney Gonzalez singled on a fly ball to right field to get on base, while Schaub used her speed to score the first run for the Lady Harvesters.


Junior Kassie Jerome doubled to left field, setting Gonzalez up in scoring position at third base, who scored on a throw in play to make it 2-1. After sophomore Kaylee Arzen reached first on an error but Jerome was called out at third, junior Jacie Studebaker hit a fly ball to center field Dalhart couldn't field and first and second were loaded.

After some miscues by Dalhart's pitcher and catcher, Arnzen and Studebaker were situated at second and third respectively. Arnzen scored on a passed ball next, setting Studebaker up at third with a 3-1 lead and junior Shiann Regalado up to bat.

Regalado nailed a ground ball past the

pitcher, plating Studebaker and making the lead 4-1.

Junior Ally Roberson was walked, followed by senior Cheyene Lockhart reaching on error by Dalhart's shortstop. Next up was freshman Gracee Gill, who doubled to left field and scored Roberson and advanced Lockhart to third, increasing the lead to 5-1.

Lockhart advanced to home on an errant throw during Schaub's at-bat which, by the way, was her second at bat of the inning as Pampa had batted around with a 6-1 lead. Schaub ended up being walked, followed by a Gonzalez single to right field, loading the bases with Gill at third, Schaub at second and Gonzalez at first.

Gill advanced to home on a throw to extend the lead to 7-1 during Jerome's at bat. Jerome was struck out to finally end the inning.

"The offensive side of it was putting your mind to what happened," Gill said.

"If they committed an error we were going to make them pay for it by putting the ball in the ground and executing some things like bunt-n-runs, some steals, hit-n-runs, some slap-n-runs and just moving base runners around and being aggressive on the plate and being aggressive on the bases and I felt like that's what we did today."

Both teams went 1-2-3 in the second inning, and Dalhart continued the trend in the top of the third. Gill was the starting pitcher for the game and she went the full five innings of run-rule only allowing one run on two hits, two walks and three strikeouts. Leading 11-1, Arnzen doubled to left field, scoring Gonzalez and placing Jerome at third.

Now leading 12-1, Studebaker grounded out to second base, but this allowed Jerome to score and advanced Arnzen.

Holding a 13-1 lead, Regalado reached on error by the shortstop, which also allowed Arnzen to score.

With a 14-1 lead, Roberson was walked after the Lady Harvesters batted around, fol-

lowed by a Lockhart single to bring home Regalado and take a 15-1 lead to end the frame.

Dalhart went in order in the top of the fourth, and it was the Lady Harvesters' turn to pad their lead.

With two outs and Gonzalez positioned at first, senior Tori Robles reached first on an error. Gonzalez stole third during Arnzen's atbat, and a base hit by Arnzen brought home Gonzalez as the Lady Harvester's last run.

Arnzen played a part in two of Dalhart's final two outs, sending a ground ball to first and fielding a popup fly. Gonzalez was very impressive during the game, fielding two balls in the fourth that got caught in the West Texas wind. Regalado tracked down one in the outfield during the second inning.

"I commend Brittney for walking those two balls down in the outfield and playing the wind the way she did," Gill said. "It was a total team effort, and the offensive side was stellar today."


The win pushes Pampa to 3-2 in district play heading into a game Saturday at Perryton.

Junior Colton Thompson tried to sacrifice bunt, but he reached first on the hits sacrifice attempt. Harden came home on the play.

Keown singled to left to score Furgasright field wall to get the scoring going on. Hooper singled to second to score Thompson and Keown.

Woelfle walked and Engle singled to

In all, eight runs were scored for Pampa in the inning.

After three, Pampa led 11-2.

Denver Broncos probably waiting for Dallas Cowboys on DT signing.

Late in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, the Denver Broncos selected Georgia Tech's wide receiver Demaryius



Thomas at No. 22 while the Dallas Cowboys selected controversial wide receiver Dez Bryant out of Oklahoma State at No. 24. In my opinion, the two are somewhat linked and could easily be argued at 1-2 as the best wide receivers in the league. The Broncos likely

passed on Bryant because of the controversy of Bryant

eating dinner with Hall-of-Fame corner Deion Sanders. Bryant has also shown to have trouble with attitude as well.

With Bryant being the best remaining wide receiver available in the draft, the Cowboys selected him and the rest, is of course, history.

Both players were scheduled to be free agents this summer, and both got slapped with the franchise tag, which they haven't signed (the deadline is not until July 15 at 3 p.m. local time).

Thomas already has, and will continue, to skip offseason workouts in hopes of getting a long-term deal. Thomas has even skipped the annual workouts held by quarterback Peyton Manning at Duke University.

Bryant hasn't said he is skipping workouts, but it wouldn't surprise me if he isn't at Valley Ranch when workouts begin on Monday.

Both players have put up great numbers in their careers. Thomas, who was riddled with injuries his first two seasons, and played in an offense with quarterback wanna-be Tim Tebow in 2011, has played in 69 games with 351 receptions, 5,317 yards and 41 touchdowns.

Bryant, who has only missed five games in his career, has played in 75 games, 381 receptions, 5,424 yards and 56 touchdowns.

So what's taking so long to sign these two stud wideouts. They both make even the most average quarterbacks look like all-pros. Again, look at what Thomas did with Tim Tebow at quarterback (11 games, 551 yards and four touchdowns).

Bryant has had to play with Cowboys fill-ins Brandon Weeden, Kyle Orton and Jon Kitna at quarterback.

As of March, Cowboys owner Jerry Jones has said that Dez will be playing for the Cowboys in September, whether he is tagged or a long-term deal is reached.

I think a deal is reached because the Cowboys are doing what they can to free up the cap space for him, not Adrian Peterson like many talking heads believe. Broncos president of football operations and Hall-of-Fame quarterback John Elway has said he believes a long-term deal will get done for Thomas, the question is when.


Historically for the Broncos, the past two players to get tagged, linemen Ryan Clady and kicker Matt Prater, signed long-term deals before the next training camp opens. I bet thats what the Broncos do.

I imagine they are waiting to see what Dallas does with Bryant and see what they pay him, and then they will make a deal with Thomas.

But wouldn't it just be nice if one of these guys just said, "I don't care what the other guy is going to make, I will take substantially less. I am just grateful to be able to play."


Unfortunately, even the most humble, quiet and least arrogant athletes have a hint of greed.

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
