The City of Pampa is pleased to launch Pampa Community Pride, the official platform for residents to access their government in a single location. With this new tool, residents can submit, track, and view nearby service requests through their smartphones and online. Residents can also use the app to find information about events, public facilities, events, front yard bulky waste collection

times, and much more.

The mobile app is part of an overall program for the City of Pampa to improve resident communications and service On delivery. the backend, the relevant staff redirects and responds to submitted requests through their customized workflow manage-



City of Pampa also uses the backend system to provide residents real-time status updates and comments on the submitted requests.

The City launched the application in partnership with PublicStuff, an innovative civic software company that helps residents and

Schlieve is new Athletic Director in Lefors

He was hired April 6 of this year and is also the head football coach.

Derek Schlieve came to Lefors ISD as the new head football coach and athletic director on April 6. Schlieve resides in Lefors with his wife Sarah and sons, Camdyn and Xavier.

Before coming to Lefors, Schlieve was the assistant head coach and defensive coordinator at Spring Hill ISD, a class 4A school in Longview.

Schlieve coached at Mayville State University in Mayville, N.D. He was the head football coach there from 2011 to 2013. The program was 13-87 in their previous 100

games before he took over. In the three years he was there, he led them to a seven-win season and a trip to the conference championship game. It was Mayville State's first winning season in more than 23 years. He left the school with the second-highest winning percentage in the program's 109 year history.

He earned his bachelor's degree from Mayville State University. He graduated magna cum laude in 2002 with a major in elementary education and a minor in coaching. He earned his masters' degree in sports

in 2007, also graduating with magna cum laude honors. He was a four-year letter winner in college and twice named Academic All-Conference and once named Academic All-American. He also played in the Nation-



management from St. Cloud State University al All Star Bowl at the linebacker position in Minneapolis, Minn., after his senior season.

Local veterans join forces to improve safety of medical treatments

Improvements to reduce risks for healthcare professionals and patients.

Pampa residents and military and Andy Epps, have joined with a group of physicians to manufacture and market an innovative new product designed to eliminate the spread of infectious disease through exposure to blood in hospital, emergency room and military triage situations.

The spread of infectious disease to healthcare workers was highlighted in 2014 in the United States and worldwide with the outbreak of the Ebola virus disease.

While exposure in a medical setting includes vulnerability to a variety of bodily fluids, contact with a patient's blood products presents the greatest risk, primarily in an

emergent situation.

Of these situations, it is proveterans, Antonio (Tony) Zavala posed that the highest risk of exposure to biological agents is due to unnecessary blood spill during IV manipulation while retrieving the needle from a peripheral intrave-

nous catheter. In technical testing, the device provided consistent ease in inserting a peripheral line without the risk of blood backflow. Additionally, subsequent confidential sharing of the results with medical professionals in both a hospital and a military medical setting has been

overwhelmingly positive. Zavala currently serves as president of Alpha Medical Industry





ing people (and for unions, who for a brief time thought they could beat business at the money game), shook his head sadly. Unilateral disarmament, he asked. When the public doesn't even vote on the issue? And we don't. Every

four years, our government goes up for sale, and a few wealthy individuals and interests spend hundreds of millions of dollars courting the person who will become the most powerful person in the world, and we call it democracy. And as much as I hate the system, the cynicism it produces and the appearance of corruption it creates, I understand Hillary Clinton's announcement that she will not only exploit the Supreme Court's ill-thought decisions destroying the Watergate reforms, but will personally solicit the 'funny" money the Supreme Court now allows.

Barack Obama accepted the funds, but he didn't personally solicit them. Hillary will take the next step. Progress - if you think the sale of government to the highest bidder should command a higher price, because there's no doubt that Hillary will raise more by asking herself. Not to mention that her husband is capable of collecting some spare millions.

Disgusting? Sure. The Republicans will be out there calling Hillary a hypocrite for criticizing a system she is about to be in up to her eyeballs. But compared to what? Unilateral disarmament?

Money is the mother's milk of politics. Having more doesn't guarantee you a win, but having less is always worse than having

more. And the people surrounding you have an insatiable appetite for more — for more polls and focus groups and sophisticated targeting and outreach. not to mention the old standbys of television, radio and mail.

I remember the days when the big costs were phones. No more. Technological superiority doesn't come cheap, and now that both parties — and not just the Republicans are capable of raising hundreds of millions of dollars, the opportunities are endless. And the payoff? Where else does a mere \$10,000 or \$20,000 get you a personal conversation with the person whose decision could mean billions for your business or industry? Will that decision be influenced, even slightly, by something you say? Or might the mere fact that you were there, providing support, perhaps hosting a million-dollar event, be remembered by someone when a decision is to be made?

For all my cynicism, don't think most people in politics are, consciously, for sale. There certainly are easier and more pleasant ways to make money. But it's insidious: If someone has reached out to you, supported you, written you a check for more than your parents ever made in their lifetimes, do you remember their name? Do you take their call? Are you grateful?

And of course we tell ourselves — we all do, everyone does — that we are not that bad, that perhaps they are giving because they already and independently agree with our views, that it isn't buying a vote, but supporting someone you agree with. But why are those people all of a sudden the candidate's best 'friends"? Friends?

But more than friendship is at stake. And if Hillary wants to be president, she has decided she must not only play this game, but play it better than Democrats have in the past. She's probably right, which is the saddest part.



The Silence of the Lambs

Here's how it stands with Western civilization - what's left of it, I mean

insofar as various Westerners are concerned.

You keep your lip buttoned whenever foes, internal as well

as external, jump up and down on you, kick you around, make known their fondest wish is to do you in, ideals and all. You hope for the best while doing nothing.

You follow, that is to say, the counsel of "Jacques," who posted Monday on the New York Times' website, disburdening himself as follows concerning the Sunday shootings at the Mohammed poster contest in Garland, Texas:

"The Far Right is using 'freedom' as a stick to beat and provoke Muslims. Cartoons depicting the Prophet Mohammed do not advance the cause of freedom one iota. It is provocation pure and simple.

Maybe not so "pure," maybe not so "simple," Jacques. The Jacques line of thought is heavily represented in commentary on the shootings of the two men whose apparent goal was to disrupt, with

hot lead, a lightly attended event of which I had been previously unaware: just

19 miles from my home. The American Freedom Defense Initiative, New York-based organizer of the event, is under verbal assault for stirring up the animals (H. L. Mencken's delicious phrase). Why, if the AFDI folk hadn't invited ridicule of the Prophet, all would have been peachy!

I would venture that depends on your definition of peachy. If you mean quiet — well, yeah. Why quiet, nevertheless? Out of general agreement on first principles? Or out of intimidation: the selfsuppression of viewpoints. honestly arrived at but depicted as rotten and shameful by "opinionmakers.'

A shameful viewpoint, in these times of religious flux, is the unassailability of Islam, the religion that millions of migrants are bringing to the capitals of the nominally Christian West and insisting on practicing their own way, without reference to local norms. For instance, the opinion-makers consider it rude and boorish today to insist on the preponderant truth of Christianity, as narrated in the Creeds. Say all that stuff in church, if you must, but don't press

your case outside, lest the

sensibilities of "others" be offended.

When radical Muslim preachers, nevertheless, stir up jihad against the decadent, febrile West, we're counseled not to take with any great alarm the growing presence of such preachers — and the growing fervor of their followers. We're progressive Westerners; we believe in outreach and

understanding. For genuine progressives, such sentiments come naturally. Supernatural religion, contrasted with the religions of this world (e.g., private jets and sex-any-way-youwant-it) doesn't much interest today's elites. They can take it or, better yet, leave it. Can't we all just knock off this truth-claims stuff? Not really, inasmuch as "Truth," by definition, rises superior to competing claims. You see anyway why our progressive elites see no point in disputing or "insulting" Islamic truth claims. Who cares, you know?

Certainly, the elite assure us, no one should "insult" the Prophet (though insulting Jesus, the Second Person of the Trinity, and therefore superior to all prophets, seems no big deal to our taste-makers). Insult the Prophet and, hey, followers of his, the likes of the Garland Two,

got guns! You wouldn't want to see them use those guns, would you? So —

keep it down. That the Garland Two wound up unnecessarily dead — victims of their own mental torments is unfortunate, as I trust anyone would acknowledge. That the American Freedom Defense Initiative pulled the triggers in question is nonsense.

Who got to this new land first, Christians or radical jihadists? Who built the churches and democratic institutions and sunk deep the foundations of Western civilization — of all civilizations the freest and most generous? Who established here the freest. most democratic government in history, for all its latterday mishaps and misjudgments?

It is sad that two who enjoyed the undoubted blessings of a civilization not their own recoiled violently against that civilization. It is sadder yet to see this tale of malice and moral confusion play out 19 miles from the place I call home.

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


The change in the adopted budget is due to the increase in normal operation expenses.



COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Cardale Jones, who came from nowhere to lead Ohio State to the national championship in January, has had a busy 24 hours on Twitter.
