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# County Court implement financial agreement with Happy State Bank

The Gray County Commissioners court met on Friday morning on the second floor of the County Courthouse for their second meeting of the month.

The first item on the agenda was the implementation of an agreement with Happy State Bank.

The County first addressed the

agreement at their May 4 meeting, but tabled it so the financial advisors and commissioners could look over it.

County treasurer Scott Hahn told the court he was comfortable with the agreement and that it would be profitable for the county. He also added that he had no safety concerns when it came to Happy State Bank. The Court Approved this motion.

The next item discussed at length was the issues the crew at Perry-Lefors airport is having with their Batwing mower. Manager Paul Loyd stated the airport recently got their mower back after it being under repair for approximately six months. The mower only worked for two and a half hours after be-

ing returned to the airport with the same issue. Loyd asked if the Court could come up with a plan to replace the mower.

Loyd added that the County keeps throwing money into this mower to have it repaired.

Commissioner Gary Willoughby suggested that Loyd calls the re-

## Gas Price Average rises

**SUBMITTED BY AAA TEXAS** COPPELL — Texas drivers are now paying \$2.47 for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is four cents more than last week but 96 cents less per gallon than last year. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in the Lone Star State, drivers in El Paso are paying the most on average at \$2.57 per gallon while drivers in Beaumont are paying the least at \$2.38 per gallon. Texans are paying 21 cents less than the national average which now sits at \$2.68.

Despite the increases at the pumps in recent weeks, relatively lower crude costs continue to translate to significant savings at the pump for drivers. AAA Texas projects travel this Memorial Day will be up nearly 5 percent (3.1 million travelers) compared to last year's holiday weekend, which would be the highest volume in ten years. Gas prices may not change all that much by the holiday weekend, which would result in the cheapest Memorial Day gas prices in at least five years. GAS cont. on page 14










### PAMPA FORECAST

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## **British pollsters** failed in the increasingly difficult struggle to get it right

Projections based on pre-election polls were that Labour would win 35 of these 42 seats. Instead, Conservatives won 34 of them.

Nationally, the preelection polls predicted that Conservatives would win about 280 seats, barely ahead of Labour and far short of a 326-seat majority. The exit poll pegged them at 316. They ended up winning 331.

Something similar happened in 1992, when pre-election polls showed the two parties tied but Conservatives won by a 7.5-point margin. The most common explanation, advanced by Conservative analyst Rob Hayward: "Shy Tories" were unwilling to tell pollsters they favored the Conservative Party.

British pollsters made adjustments then, but as Hayward notes, they didn't work this year. Internal party polls apparently did better. American pollster Stanley Greenberg, working for Labour and using a longer questionnaire, found the party's numbers sagging. Australian consultant Lynton Crosby, running Conservatives' campaign, assured party leaders

And writing just after America's November 2014 off-year elections, Silver concluded that polls tilted toward Democrats. Reviewing the data then, I noted that in seriously contested statewide races, Democrats tended to get percentages of the vote close to their numbers in the polls. But many Republicans, notably in Kansas, Kentucky and Georgia, ran far ahead of the polls. "Shy Republicans," apparently.

Readers may have noticed that all these errors seem to come from one ideological direction. In nations where the dominant media — the New York TV networks here, the BBC in Britain, Haaretz in Israel lean left, opinion on the right has been understated in the polls.

Evidently, some people don't want to identify themselves as troglodytes to telephone interviewers or even on robocalls.

But, as Silver notes, there are other, not necessarily ideological challenges facing pollsters. Current polling techniques were developed in countries with universal landline telephones and populations that answered the phone. Americans, Britons, Israelis and many others no longer live in such countries.

The Pew Research Center reported in 2012 that only 9 percent of its telephone calls resulted in completed interviews. Is that 9 percent an accurate representation of the larger population? Unclear; no poll can tell you the opinion of people who refuse to be polled.

Nor, despite the relative accuracy of Britain's exit poll this year, do exit polls always get it right. In American elections, the Edison/Mitofsky exit poll numbers are massaged by experts from its news organization clients gathered (and deprived of cellphones) in a room in Rockefeller Center

a popular television show, "Gunsmoke" at that time which had a character who limped, named Chester. We noticed early on that the parakeet also had a limp, so he was promptly named Chester. The first thing we noticed was

that Chester quickly started imitating George, and he'd sit on top of George's cage singing at the canary while George gave him dirty looks with his beady black eyes and sang right back at him.

My grandmother taught Chester how to talk, and he had quite a vocabulary. Unfortunately, Chester occasionally mixed up his words which resulted in some pretty funny sentences. He could say, "I love you," "you're sick, sick, sick,"
"you're a blasted buzzar," "Chester's a dirty bird" and "you need a psychiatrist."

One afternoon a telephone repairman was in the house when suddenly a tiny voice said, "I love you!" The repairman gave Gram a strange look, and went on with his work. "I love you, George" made the repairman look up again, and he said, "Ma'am, my name's not George, and I don't think you love me!"

He could hardly believe it when she told him it was a bird. One day, another parakeet turned up in the tree outside our house, and one of us caught it and brought it inside.

It appeared to be a female, but there was little doubt when Chester flew over next to her, put a foot on her foot, and declared, "Chester's a boy! I love you!" One day my oldest brother announced he was bringing his fiancée and her parents over for a visit to meet us.


Before they arrived, Chester was heard to say, in rapid succession, "Chester's a boy, you bazzard, you're sick, you need a psychust!" We were terrified he would try this

line of speech out on my brother's future in-laws, so Chester was caught and unceremoniously put into a covered cage in a back bedroom, where we hoped he'd keep his feathered beak shut. Chester only lived another couple of years, but we had George the canary for several years

George even traveled in the Corvair with Mom and me on Route 66 on our way from California to Illinois. With so many car troubles, poor George, who stayed in the car while it was being serviced, rode up and down in lifts so often he probably thought he was living in an elevator. He lived a year or so after we moved to Illinois, and died a peaceful death in his cage.

I wonder if he and Chester are flying around in bird Heaven, Chester crying out, "I love you, George!"

## Our Next Mideast War — Syria

in on the campaign to drag us into yet another Mideast war — this time to bring down Bashar Assad's regime in Syria.

While few would mourn the passing of the Assad dynasty, there is a problem: If Assad falls, a slaughter of Christians will follow and the battle for control of Damascus will be between the Syrian branch of al-Qaida, the Nusra Front, and the crazed terrorists of the Islamic State.

Victory for either would be a disaster for America.

Where is the evidence of an unholy alliance to bring this about?

Turkey, which turned a blind eye to ISIS volunteers slipping into Syria, has aided the Nusra Front in setting up its own capital in Idlib, near the Turkish border, to rival the ISIS capital of Raqqa.

In the fall of Idlib, said Bashar Assad, "the main factor was the huge sup-

port that came through Turkey; logistic support, and military support, and of course financial support that came through Saudi Arabia and Qatar."

Why would Turks, Saudis and Qataris collude with Sunni jihadists?

Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan detests Assad. The Saudis and Gulf Arabs are terrified of Shiite Iran and see any ally of Tehran, such as Assad, as their mortal enemy.

This also explains the seven weeks of savage Saudi bombing of the Houthi rebels, who dumped over a U.S.-Saudi puppet in the Yemeni capital Sanaa, then seized the second and third cities of Taiz and Aden.

But while the Houthis bear no love for us, they have been fighting al-Qaida in the Arabian Peninsula. Thus, the Saudi bombing has given AQAP, the most dangerous terrorist foe we face, freedom to create sanctuaries and liberate hundreds of fellow terrorists from prison.

The Israelis seem to be in on the game as well. While they have taken in rebels wounded on the Golan Heights and returned them to their units, there are reports of Israel aiding the Nusra Front with intelligence and even air strikes.

This week, an Israeli official bluntly warned that Hezbollah has amassed 100,000 short-range rockets capable of striking northern Israel, thousands of which could hit Tel Aviv. The rockets are said to be hidden in Shiite villages in southern Lebanon.

Israel is preparing, writes The New York Times Isabel Kershner, "for what it sees as an almost inevitable next battle with Hezbollah.' As Hezbollah has been

the most effective fighting ally of Assad, an Israeli war on Hezbollah could help bring Assad down. But, again, who rises if

Assad falls? And who else, besides Christians and Alawites, starts digging their graves? As one might expect,

Sen. Lindsey Graham is all in. Late in April, he declared, "Assad has to go. ... We're going to have to send some of our soldiers back into the Middle East."

Graham is willing to commit 10,000 U.S. ground troops.

"I would integrate our forces within a regional army. There is no other way to defend this nation than some of us being on the ground over there do-

ing the fighting.' Wednesday, The Washington Post laid out the game plan for war on Syria. While we cannot create a NATO with kings, emirs, sheiks, and sultans,

says the Post, "[T]here is a way that Mr. Obama could serve both the U.S. interests and those of the Gulf allies: by attacking the Middle East's most toxic, and destabilizing force, the Bashar al-Assad regime in Syria. Syria's dictatorship is Iran's closest ally in the region, and its barbarity opened the way for the rise of the Islamic State. "If Mr. Obama were to ... create safe zones in northern and southern Syria for the rebels, the balance could be tipped against Damascus and Tehran and U.S. allies would have tangible reason to recommit to U.S. leadership.'

Consider what is being recommended here.

According to the 2013-14 PayScale Salary Survey, which examines salary data for fulltime employees in the United States who possess only bachelor's degrees but no higher degree, petroleum engineering is the most lucrative major with regard to salary potential. Petroleum engineers earned an average annual starting salary of \$103,000, and those salaries ballooned to \$160,000 by mid-career, when typical graduates in the study had 15 years of experience in their fields. Though engineering majors dominated the survey's top 10, second place on the list went to actuarial mathematics majors, whose average starting salaries of \$58,700 were more modest than those of petroleum engineers. However, by mid-career actual mathematics majors closed much of that gap, with average salaries hovering at \$120,000.

AUSTIN (AP) — Testifying in a le-son had the "final" word in calling Mike Holder in early 2014 and it Oklahoma State coach Mike Gundy says his assistant Joe Wickline made a lateral move to join Texas and that his new duties with the Longhorns sound identical to his old ones.

Whether Wickline took a promotion with "play-calling duties" at Texas or just got a title with the same responsibilities he had in Stillwater is at the center of a nearly \$600,000 dispute between Wickline and his former school.

Oklahoma State's breach-of-contract lawsuit contends Texas assistant Shawn Watson is really the play-caller and is seeking damages from Wickline, who has the titles of offensive line coach and offensive coordinator. Wickline insists he and Watson share development of game plans and play-calling duties.

The legal dispute is unusual in that it has drawn Gundy and Texas coach Charlie Strong into giving lengthy sworn statements about play-calling in their programs. Oklahoma State's lawyers have said they may also seek testimony from former Texas players and assistants. Texas has not been named as a defendant.
