F-4 Tornado still fresh in Pampans mind 20 years later

ornado ravages Pampa 20 years ago....

20 years ago yesterday, an F-4 tornado carved through the west side of Pampa damaging more than 250 businesses and homes and causing \$30 million worth of damage. Thankfully, nobody was killed in the event on June 8, 2015.

Monday marked the 20th anniversary of the F-4 tornado that touched down just west of Pampa and eventually hit the city's industrial district and eventually destroyed approximately 250 businesses and homes. According to the National Weather Service in Amarillo, the twister is the costliest and most destructive tornado tallying up a bill of \$30 million in damage.

The 1995 storm season is considered to be one of the roughest seasons by some with more than 600 tornadoes nationwide. There were also tornadoes in Dimmitt six days earlier on June 2 and two in Amarillo on May 7 and later on July 23. The May 7 tornado did have a death with it. Also on June 8, 1995, there were two other tornadoes which touched down near Allison and Kellerville.

As far as cost is concerned, none compare to

the tornado that hit Pampa two decades ago. According to The Pampa News' archived article, the tornado formed around 4:27 p.m. southwest of Pampa and by 4:35 p.m. law enforcement reported the tornado moving northeast toward Alcock and Gwendolyn. The tornado ended up carving a three-mile path through the northwest side of Pampa.

Perry fires back at Clinton on voter ID

Former Gov. Rick Perry announces his intentions to run for president in 2016 on June 4, 2015, at the Addison Airport.

Rick Perry sharply fired back at former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton's criticism of his voter access policies as governor.

"I don't know who she's playing to, but she's not playing to the people of Texas and I don't think she's playing to Americans that believe that the sanctity of the vote is really important and you need to have a photo ID to go vote," he said in an interview that aired on CNN Sunday. "It's that simple."

On Thursday, Clinton accused Perry and other Republican governors of "a crusade

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

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

DPS trooper seizes more than \$554,000 in marijuana SUBMITTED BY TEXAS DPS



AMARILLO - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) conducted a traffic stop Thursday on Interstate 40, yielding over 91 pounds of marijuana valued at more than \$554,000.

At approximately 5:08 p.m., a DPS trooper conducted a traffic stop on a 2014 Chrysler 200 traveling eastbound on I-40, for a traffic violation, near Bushland in Potter County.

The occupants of the Chrysler were identified as Christopher Rodriguez, 25, of Lockhart, Texas, and Simon Castillo Jr., 24, of Kyle, Texas. During the traffic stop, the trooper discovered 81 vacuum sealed bags of marijuana inside duffle bags.

Rodriguez and Castillo were placed under arrest for possession and delivery of marijuana more than 50 pounds but less than 2,000 pounds, a firstdegree felony, and booked into the Potter County Jail. The illegal drugs were allegedly being transported from California to Austin.

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

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Are we in for another high-crime era after the response to Ferguson and Baltimore?

Are we seeing a reversal of the 20-year decline in violent crime

cate and analyst of the policing strategy pioneered by Rudy Giuliani in New York City and copied and adapted throughout the country, she is to be taken seriously. And the statistics she presented in an article in last weekend's Wall Street Journal are truly alarming.

Gun violence is up 60 percent in Baltimore so far this year compared to 2014. Homicides are up 180 percent in Milwaukee, 25 percent in St. Louis, 32 percent in Atlanta and 13 percent in New York in the same period.

Why is this happening? Mac Donald writes, "The most plausible explanation of the current surge in lawlessness is the intense agitation against American police departments over the past nine months.

That's a reference to the reactions to the deaths of Michael Brown in Ferguson. Mo., and Eric Garner in Staten Island, N.Y., last summer, and to the death this spring of Freddie Gray in Balti-

The narrative propagated by mainstream media, the Eric Holder Justice Department and the Barack Obama White House was that unarmed innocent blacks were being slaughtered by racist police. "Black lives matter," read the hashtag, as if most cops believed the opposite.

The facts of these cases, as revealed through competent investigations, did not support the meme. In one case in which video evidence did, in South Carolina, the policeman was quickly charged with murder by local authorities.

But the propagation of the racist-cops narrative was followed by days of rioting in Ferguson last year and Baltimore last month. The (perhaps misspoken) response of Balti-

more Mayor Stephanie Rawlings-Blake: "We also gave those who wished to destroy space to do that as well.'

Another response: Across the country, Mac Donald notes, "offices scale back on proactive policing under the onslaught of anti-cop rhetoric." Proactive "broken windows" policing is being replaced by non-benign neglect. The victims of the increased numbers of homicides are almost all black.

In assessing whether these developments will lead to a reversal in the amazing 20-year drop in violent crime, I want to voice a note of caution and to supply some historical perspective. The reason for caution is that so far the numbers are low. They could turn out to be just statistical noise.

As for historical perspective, I was an intern in the office of Detroit Mayor Jerome Cavanagh in the summer of 1967. Despite his near-unanimous support from blacks, a riot broke out in July after police raided an after-hours liquor joint. It continued for six nights; 43 people, some of them innocent bystanders, were killed. I remember being in the "command center" with the mayor and police commissioner, listening to cops announcing on the police radio that one square mile after another was being abandoned.

Some saw the urban riots of the late 1960s as righteous "rebellions" against racial injustice. And there was real friction: Only 7 percent of police were black in Detroit (population 1.5 million, about 40 percent black).

In comparison, Ferguson (population 21,000) and similar suburbs with rising black populations and mostly white police forces are demographically small potatoes. Baltimore, the scene of the worst recent rioting, has a black mayor and police chief and a nearly 50-percent black police force.

The idea that blacks are systematically and massively oppressed by hostile police, plausible 50 years ago, is risible today. Statistics show that the overwhelming majority of black homi-

ticularly American history, what

the subject means to me, what it

should mean to every American

citizen, especially our children.

We Baby Boomers have a good grasp of what D-Day and the Battle of Normandy meant. 'Twas our fathers', mothers', uncles' and aunts' participation in the invasion. Had they not been successful, things today on the world stage would be quite different and for the matter, my generation would more than likely not exist and even harder to grasp, there would be no Greatest Generation. I have tried to fathom D-Day,

what it must have been like to come ashore on that beach, experience such horror? I cannot. Historically, I do know in wartime battles America has fought, there has never been one matching D-Day's importance. Quite frankly, aided by lesser roles from our Allies, America literally saved the


Including American paratroopers flown inland via gliders and our soldiers who stormed Omaha Beach, on one single day close to 5,000 American lives were lost. Perspective. Counting our British, Canadian and other Allies, on one single day close to 15,000 lives were lost. I didn't include German casualties, but you can well imagine. The Battle of Normandy in it's entirety took 125,847 American lives.

Putting things into greater

perspective, American casualties from the Atlantic/European Theater of War amounted to just fewer than 200,000 lives. The historical significance for Americans of our soldiers sacrifices on June 6, 1944, and the following months thereafter should always be noted, commented on by our commanders in chief, always highlighted by our news media and most importantly, studied in the classroom by our children.

In America today there is a dumbing down occurring. By that statement I feel our educators are intentionally omitting American history from the classroom. Aiding and abetting the dumbing

Every day there are fewer and fewer "old schoolers" around. One

by one they are dying off. I see pictures and read life stories of them almost daily in the newspaper.

cides are perpetrated by other blacks.


And anyone who knows what has happened to Detroit since 1967 understands that delegitimation of policing and elite apologies for violent crime can have terrible consequences, especially for law-abiding black Americans. Violent crime roughly tripled from 1965 to 1975 and plateaued until the middle 1990s, when Giuliani and others adopted effective police tactics.

So when the president and the recently retired attorney general insist

that police misconduct is a major problem, in a tone that seems to excuse rioting, they are playing with fire. The statistics that Mac Donald cites suggest that many cities and suburbs are starting to burn.

We must hope that the fire does not spread, but dies down. Perhaps it will if police resume the tactics that have proved so successful. The alternative, for those of us who have witnessed the past half-century, is terrifying.

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NYC highway melee trial exposes life as undercover detective

NEW YORK (AP) — As or surveillance operations. an undercover detective in New York, Wojciech Braszczok's job was to investigate members of Occupy Wall Street. Going by the name "Al," he hung around the group, blended in and was even arrested as a protester. He didn't carry a gun or a badge or identification bearface, he wasn't a cop.

with the police department, the thousands. except for my handler," he testified this week.

But that all ended when he joined a motorcycle ride on Manhattan's West Side Highway in September 2013 that devolved into pandemonium with an SUV driver beaten bloody in front of his family. Now, the 34-year-old is being tried on charges of gang assault and other crimes for his role in the melee that burned his cover and is shedding an unwanted light on how the nation's largest police department cultivates, supervises and protects the identities of officers assigned to undercover duty in criminal probes

On his day off, Braszczok decided to join in the motorcycle ride, which had nothing to do with Occupy. He texted his handler that it was going to be "mayhem." Prosecutors have suggested Braszczok and the other bikers had made the West Side Highway a personal playground, popping wheelies, slapping car hoods and terrorizing SUV driver Alexian Lien and his wife and toddler, who were head-

ed to New Jersey to shop. Stopped on the road, Lien says he feared for his life so he drove off, running over a biker. Prosecutors say Braszczok barreled after Lien and was among the bikers who forced his Range Rover to a stop on a side street. The detective eventually drove away while Lien was pulled from the car and attacked on the street.

Braszczok testified that he followed Lien because he wanted to "stop the car from running more people over." When he got off his bike, he intended to tell Lien to stop driving, but he heard a bang and saw the SUV window break, and then started to fear for his safety, so he left.

"I should have called 911, but I didn't," he said. He said he regretted the decision, adding he believed the police were on their way.

The handler said Braszczok should have called in right away to report the incident, but he didn't call for two days, and he didn't come clean that he'd been at the scene of the assault until even later — after helmet-camera videos were posted online.

"They are very late to company Audiam shows the game on streaming," Beats Music had just said analyst Van Baker at 303,000 U.S. subscribers the Gartner research firm. But he said Apple can still catch up by making it easy for iPhone owners to use the new service. That's a huge pool of potential customers: Apple sold 61 million iPhones in the last quarter alone.

Aside from music, analysts expect Apple will tout improvements to other services like Apple Pay and Siri, the voice-activated digital assistant for iPhones and iPads. Apple has also hinted it will release programming tools for its new smartwatch.

Most apps available for the Apple Watch are extensions of apps that run on the iPhone. Independent app-builders like Jordan Edelson, CEO of Appetizer Mobile, are hoping Apple will release the code to build apps that interact directly with sensors and controls on the watch.

"That would let us build some really cool experiences," added Edelson, who said it could make the watch more appealing to consumers who aren't sure now if they need one.

Edelson also predicted Apple will introduce software that ties other products more closely together, such as apps that make the iPhone into a controller for television sets and other appliances.

That's a smart strategy, said Forrester Research analyst Frank Gillett. "Once you start organizing your life around Apple products, you're less likely to ditch your iPhone and go over to Android," he said, referring to the competing technology from Apple's rival, Google.
