City Commission discuss Pampa Community Pride app

The Pampa City Commission met Monday evening for its first meeting of the month. Before getting to the agenda items, director of public works Donny Hooper gave an update on Pampa Community Pride app, which launched on May 8. The app is a one-stop resource for the residents of Pampa. Hooper said they are still putting the message out about the app, but he is confident that there are about 300 users right now and he has not received any negative comments about the app at this point.

He also said that the comments he has re-

ceived from the public are in regards to how quick the response time is for their requests. Hooper added that each of the departments has made it their goal to keep response times and percentages of closed cases up. Out of 194 requests, 159 of them have been taken care of.

The app is available on both Apple and Android phones.

Those areas that have been most popular include sanitation, ordinances and matters involving the fire marshal.

Mayor Brad Pingel said he has used the app twice now and enjoyed the response time.

During his report, Hooper also touched on

an update with Operation Community Pride as well. They are still having to tell people that it is not an alley clean-up project. Curbside pickups are on Fridays, and whichever ward you live in is the number of the week of your curbside pickup. For instance, those who live in ward three have their day the third Friday of the month.

Next, the mayor and commissioners heard city manager Shane Stokes' report.

Stokes said the budget process has begun. The city has requested lean budgets from all department heads, and is working on scheduling work sessions between now and

Students on 70-Day ride to raise cancer awareness



AUSTIN — On the longest annual charity bicycle ride in the world, the Texas 4000 team rolled through Pampa on Monday, June 8, just 10 days after departing from Austin, Texas on their way to Anchorage, Alaska.

While in Pampa, the 2015 Texas 4000 Team will celebrate and share hope, knowledge and charity with friends and family before continuing on their 70-day journey.

The 72 undergraduate and graduate students from The University of Texas at Austin will brave the rain, sleet, wind, snow, heat and pedal more than 4,000 miles in the fight against cancer. After 18-months of leadership development training, volunteering, fundraising, and cycling, riders are put to the test throughout their summer ride to Alaska. Along their journey,

Appeals court upholds Texas' abortion restrictions

In a blow to the state's abortion providers, federal appeals judges on Tuesday upheld a state law requiring nearly all Texas facilities

that perform the procedure to meet hospital-like standards.

A three-judge panel of the U.S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals ruled that the state's requirement that abortion clinics meet ambulatory

surgical center standards — which include minimum sizes for rooms and doorways, pipelines for anesthesia and other infrastructure — did not impose an undue bur-

September to ensure the budget is as efficient as possible.

The first of these work sessions will be held at 4 p.m. June 22 before the

next City Commission meeting. They will be working through the general fund at this meeting.

“It’s like a jigsaw puzzle trying to put these meetings together,” Stokes said. “But we’re trying to call as few special meetings as possible.”

Stokes also addressed

the high grass and weed complaints and explained the process that comes along with them.

When a complaint is received, a letter is sent out. Grass that is above 12 inches high is considered a violation of city ordinance, so the owner of the property has 10 days between the point of receiving the letter to get the grass cut. From there, if it is not taken care of, a certified letter is sent out, and this process can take anywhere from 30 to 40 days into the process. Ten days after that, the city staff then goes out and mows the property, and the owner is billed.

Stokes said that a lot of the time, the city is not reimbursed for this labor, so they are considering adding the costs onto water bills. This is not something that is set in stone yet, but the city is looking at a variety of options at this time.

He added that the city continues to receive com-

pliments about things looking better and cleaner since the implementation of Operation Community Pride.

Next, the mayor and commissioners began discussion on agenda items.

First, they approved the minutes of the May 26 meeting. Commissioners Karen McLain and Robert Dixon were absent from Monday’s meeting.

Next, they approved a request from Jamal Enterprises, LP to plat the Toot n’ Totum Subdivision Unit No. 102.

The final agenda item for the meeting was another item of platting. This came in the form of a request from Nash Development Company to replat lots 31 through 34, block 1 of the Finley Banks Addition, located at the corner of Highway 60 and Hobart.

The next City Commission meeting will be held at 5:30 p.m. June 22 at City Hall.

they will visit with cancer survivors, patients, caregivers, and communities to make educational presentations about cancer prevention and early detection. They also use this time to offer hope, encouragement and share their personal stories to cancer fighters of all ages and to those who have been affected by the disease. Every encounter is an inspirational story the riders carry with them on their journey and quest to fight cancer.

The people of Pampa and have the opportunity to share their stories about how they pursue this ride in hopes of living in a cancer-free society.”

The 2015 riders, the 12th team since Texas 4000's inception in 2004, began their journey in Austin on May 30, 2015, with a 70-mile community bike ride called the ATLAS Ride from Cedar Park to Lampasas, Texas. From there, the riders separate into three routes, Rockies, Sierra, and Ozarks, as they continue on a ride twice as long as the Tour de France.

“This ride serves as a metaphor for the difficult battle cancer patients wage each day: A long and difficult road, with hard days and easier ones, good days, and not so good days,” said Nicholas Samendinger, a ride director on the Rockies route. “This is a difficult trip for me on many lev-

els, but I have known so many people with cancer who bravely, fiercely and with determination, fought this awful disease. I ride for those people. Thinking of them is what literally gets me up the next hill or mountain.”

Texas 4000 began 12 years ago when Chris Condit, a UT Austin student and cancer survivor, sought a way to share a message of hope, knowledge and charity to those with cancer. Since then, Texas 4000 has sent more than 540 riders on their bicycles, traveling more than two million miles to honor those affected by cancer.

Collectively, these riders have raised more than \$4.5 million in the fight against cancer, funding cancer research projects at MD Anderson Cancer Center, The University of Texas Biomedical Engineering Department, and survi-

vorship programs such as the LIVESTRONG Navigational Services Center. Students have the opportunity to serve on a grantmaking committee upon their return from the summer ride, helping to determine where a portion of their hard-earned fundraising dollars will be contributed.

“If any message should be endorsed, it is that the fight against cancer cannot be won alone,” said Thomas. “A disease this broad that spans so many lives and all ages, ethnicities, races, and genders requires the persistent strength, support, and knowledge of the entire community to overcome.”

Texas 4000 is a non-profit organization dedicated to cultivating student leaders and engaging communities in the fight against cancer. Over the course of their 18-month involvement with Texas 4000, riders train, fundraise and develop as leaders and volunteers in the community. den on a “large faction” of Texas women seeking abortions.

Only a handful of Texas abortion clinics — all in major metropolitan areas — meet those standards, which are costly to implement.

“Once again, women across the state of Texas face the near total elimination of safe and legal options for ending a pregnancy, and the denial of their constitutional rights,” said Nancy Northup, president and CEO of the Center for Reproductive Rights, which filed the lawsuit against 2013's House Bill 2.

In the lawsuit brought against the state, the Center for Reproductive Rights, on behalf of several Texas abortion providers, also asked the court for a reprieve for two clinics from a separate provision of the law that requires doctors who perform abortions to have

admitting privileges at a hospital within 30 miles of an abortion clinic.

One of those clinics, Reproductive Services in El Paso, has since closed. In ruling against exempting the El Paso clinic, the judges found that women in the area did not face a “substantial obstacle” in obtaining an abortion because they could travel to New Mexico for the procedure.

The judges ruled in the provider's favor in regards to Whole Women's Health in McAllen, granting an exemption to the law's most arduous requirements. Since the McAllen clinic stopped performing abortions in late 2013 — and after the closure of a Corpus Christi clinic — women in the Rio Grande Valley must travel more than 200 miles to get an abortion, which the judges said was too far.

But they left in a big caveat: The McAllen clinic is exempt only until there's another Texas abortion clinic closer to the Rio Grande Valley than San Antonio. Texas attorney general

Ken Paxton celebrated the ruling, saying the court had validated the state's “authority to establish safe, common-sense standards of care.”

“HB 2 both protects the unborn and ensures Texas women are not subjected to unsafe and unhealthy conditions,” he said.

But the legal fight is likely to continue. Abortion providers could request that the full 15-member court hear the case or they could attempt to take the matter to the U.S. Supreme Court. The 5th Circuit is considered one of the nation's most conservative federal appellate courts.

NARAL Pro-Choice Texas Executive Director Heather Busby decried the ruling as a “travesty” that would leave open only eight clinics statewide.

“The 5th Circuit has once again put their political ideology above the law and failed to recognize that HB 2 is an undue burden on Texans' access to safe, legal and timely abortion,” she said. “Your zip code should not determine your health care.”

Millions go to SeaWorld to learn more about sea life and get closer to killer whales. But fewer go now because the documentary "Blackfish" exposed what one reporter called "the darker side" of SeaWorld.

The movie, which CNN bought and ran over and over, tells how greedy businessmen take baby whales from their mothers and imprison them in small aquariums, where the frustrated animals are a threat to each other and their trainers.

"All whales in captivity have a bad life," says a biologist in the film. "They're all psychologically traumatized."

"Blackfish" is persuasive. Watching it made me agree with the protesters who shout, "SeaWorld is synonymous with cruelty!"

SeaWorld wouldn't talk to CNN, but they did talk to me. I will be showing their responses on Fox News this weekend.

I asked SeaWorld why they separate whales from their mothers.

"We haven't done that in 35 years," says Kelly Flaherty Clark, SeaWorld head trainer. "We have no plans to do it again, and the film implies that we're doing it yesterday."

SeaWorld says much of "Blackfish" is deceitful. "The things they describe just didn't happen."

"Eighty percent of the whales that we care for were born right here," says head veterinarian Chris Dold.

Green lies

"The key difference between what our whales experience and what killer whales in the wild experience is the fact that ... our trainers work with them every day."

I was most disturbed by a "Blackfish" scene that plays the mournful cry of a mother whale whose baby was taken from her. But it turns out the "baby" was an adult with kids of her own. "Blackfish" faked the scene by adding "sound effects that aren't even appropriate to a killer whale."

Blackfish also claims captive whales' droopy dorsal fins indicate that the whales are miserable. But whale expert Ingrid Visser says killer whales in the wild have collapsed dorsal fins, too.

The director of "Blackfish" and others who appear in the film would not talk to me, but biologist Lori Marino, who'd said that "all whales in captivity have a bad life," did.

I pointed out that life in the wild is rough, too — there's competition for food, sex, life itself. She answered, "these animals evolved over millions of years to be adapted to the challenges of the wild, not with living in a concrete tank. ... They need space ... and a social life."

SeaWorld claims its whales are "happy." But as "Blackfish" points out, "we can't ask the whales."

Dold replied, "While I may not know what my dog is thinking, I certainly know that he's happy and that we have a good relationship."

There have been moments when that human-whale relationship wasn't good. One whale drowned a SeaWorld trainer. But Clark says there's no evi-

dence that the whale's behavior meant that he was frustrated because he lives in a tank.

Finally, "Blackfish" claims that captive whales die young. But Dold points out, "We have a 50-year-old whale living at SeaWorld. ... (O)ur whales' life parameters are the same as whales in the wild." Government research confirms this.

It's romantic to fantasize about freeing whales so that they can frolic in the ocean. That probably wouldn't work out very well. After the movie "Free Willy" ran, the whale depicted in the film was set free. But wild whales wouldn't accept him in their pods. Willy kept returning to shore to be near people. He let children ride on his back. Willy died not long after he was set free.

It's hard to think rationally when animals tug at our heartstrings.

Lori Marino says it's cruel to imprison whales in tanks where they "have to do stupid pet tricks." I see her point, but marine parks and zoos are often the only way people learn about nature, and ticket sales pay for education and conservation efforts. SeaWorld alone has helped rescue 25,000 animals.

I don't presume to know if it's moral to keep animals in captivity. But I do know that the activists distort the truth. I'll give more examples in my "Green Tyranny" TV special Sunday on Fox News at 9 p.m. (EDT).

Dennis Hastert, Nancy Pelosi and America's 'Family values'

Republicans on Capitol Hill keep telling everyone how terribly shocked they are by the tawdry tale of Dennis Hastert, the former speaker of the House indicted last week for violations of federal money-laundering statutes in an effort to cover up alleged sexual abuse of a male high-school student many years ago.

Long upheld as a paragon of Midwestern conservative values, Hastert represented a suburban Illinois district and became his party's longest-serving speaker. Like Newt Gingrich, who preceded him in that post, Hastert avidly prosecuted the impeachment of Bill Clinton for trying to conceal an extramarital affair. Unlike Gingrich, whose own serial adulteries became a national joke, Hastert was evidently never suspected of any such "misconduct," as the indictment described it.

"I don't see how this didn't come up on the radar before," said a former Hastert aide following the release of his indictment. "It's sort of beyond belief."

But is it truly beyond belief, at this very late date, to learn that yet another moralizing politician or preacher was always just a hypocrite?

Not unless you haven't been paying attention for the past two decades or so. Or not you've been mesmerized into believing the propaganda that claims only one party — the GOP — represents "family values."

A decade ago, Hastert was hailed as a partisan symbol of superior virtue, notably in John Micklethwait and Adrian Wooldridge's "The Right Nation: Conservative Power in America," which gleefully predicted endless victories for the Republicans and doom for the Democrats. Written by a pair of British Tories who then held top positions at The Economist magazine, that work invidiously contrasted then-Speaker Hastert with Democratic leader Nancy Pelosi, his counterpart on the other side of the aisle — and described their districts as symbols of red and blue America.

Micklethwait and Wooldridge waxed on lyrically and at great length in praise of Coach Denny and "Hastertland," while they cast a censorious gaze upon Nancy and "Pelosiville," also known as San Francisco or in their words, "the capital of gay America." Their description of Hastert — "a fairly straightforward conservative: antiabortion, anti-gay marriage" — rings with irony today. So does their depiction of Pelosi's urban constituency as "a peculiar mix of blue bloods and gays,

dotcom millionaires and aging hippies," set against the "resolutely 'normal' " people represented by Hastert, who "think of themselves as typical Americans."

Key to understanding the two districts and therefore American politics, according to the authors, were differing attitudes toward "the importance of family life," orthodox religion, and "social disorder." In Hastertland, churches and families were growing, streets were clean, and vagrancy eliminated — and in Pelosiville exactly the reverse, with secularism rampant, bums everywhere and even an outpost of the Church of Satan.

"Looking at 'Pelosiville' and 'Hastertland,'" they concluded, "it is not difficult to see why American politics has shifted to the Right."

As it turned out, "The Right Nation" was mostly wrong, about the fates of the two major parties and much else besides. But what was most wrong was the insinuation that Republicans stand for more elevated values than Democrats, or that conservatives are morally purer than liberals. To take their own example, we now know what we know about Hastert — and we also know that Pelosi, mother of five, grandmother of eight, married more than 50 years to the same husband, advocate of gay marriage and reproductive rights, is today far more credible as

a symbol of "family values" and family life.

None of this should be surprising, with all due respect to the shocked, shocked, shocked Republicans. In 2003, after Hastert already had ascended to third in line from the presidency, I reviewed the endless ranks of right-wing moral mountebanks — the cheating celebrity evangelists, the homophobic gay politicians, the lecherous legislators, and others too raunchy to mention here — in one chapter of a book called "Big Lies." I included many stories about Hastert's House colleagues, partying amid their pursuit of Clinton; some were amusing, some quite depressing. Of course, I didn't know about "Coach Denny" back then.

But with or without his sad story, the conclusion would be the same: Liberals "care about families and children just as much as conservatives do — and that their more tolerant, humane policies do more to help families than the selfish and self-righteous approach of the Republican right."

What should have changed by now, whenever conservatives start to cluck about their rectitude and piety, is whether anybody still listens.

Here is the problem, I think this blending in country music speaks to a

greater cultural issue. We are no longer willing to draw the line and count the costs. We blend things so much that they are no longer recognizable.

At this point in our history you could take any moral or ethical issue and see where we have allowed the blending to occur. Take marriage as one example. The gatekeepers, whoever they are, do not want to offend one segment of the population so they have made an argument for a broader definition of marriage. This broader understanding has blended many different definitions of marriage and left us with what?

It is not marriage and that is for sure. My question, when does it stop? When does this great cultural blending of definitions that we are experiencing stop? It stops the moment you take a stand.

We need people like you and me to stand up and speak clearly on issues. We need people who will say, "This is right and that is wrong." We need people to draw the line in the sand and then hold the line. Very few are willing to do it and we are worse off because of it.

In the book "Roaring Lambs," published in 1993, Bob Briner defines these people who stand and speak on Christian principles as Roaring Lambs. A roaring lamb is a person who is willing to take a stand on issues and fight for those issues no matter the cost.

A roaring lamb is not divisive or argumentative. A roaring lamb is firm in their convictions. They are vocal in sharing the truth. They are loving in the delivery of their message.

How does a roaring lamb live this out? Here are a few ideas:

1. A roaring lamb writes letters to the editor of the local newspaper that builds a strong case on and for Biblical principles.

2. A roaring lamb is active in civic affairs of the community.

3. A roaring lamb supports decent movies by attending wholesome ones and avoiding those that are unwholesome.

4. A roaring lamb considers careers in the arts, journalism, literature, film and television to be important aspects of kingdom work.

5. A roaring lamb talks with non-Christians about their relationship with Jesus Christ.

These are just five examples of how you can speak into the culture as a roaring lamb. There are many other avenues available to us as roaring lambs. The question is, are we willing to draw the line, count the costs and roar?

Top of the first is better

Ty Cobb was one of America's greatest baseball players. He played in 3,033 games

more than any other major league player. He scored more runs (2,244), made more hits (4,191) until Pete Rose came along, stole more bases (892) and finished with a higher life time batting average (.367) than any other major leaguer.

He led the American league in batting 12 times, nine years in a row. Three times his batting average was .400 or better, and it was .300 or more for 23 straight years. But the Ty Cobb record that baseball buffs discuss the most are the 96 bases he stole in 1915, a record that remained until finally broken by Lou Brock.

On July 17, 1961, a pastor came to visit Ty Cobb, shared the gospel of Jesus Christ and told him how to be born again. Ty Cobb looked up from his death bed and said, "You are not telling me that a man can live his whole life in sin and it can be removed by a death bed repentance, are you?" The pastor said, "No, Mr. Cobb, I'm not telling you that death bed repentance can do away with a lifetime of sin, but I am telling you that the blood of

Jesus can!"

At that moment Ty Cobb invited Jesus Christ into his heart. As the preacher was leaving the hospital room, Ty Cobb said, "Now tell all my friends that I am sorry I did this in the bottom of the ninth, I should have done it in the top of the first!" Truth is, some of us never get to the ninth

inning. Paul tells us "Today is the day of salvation." (II Corinthians 6:2). When will you invite Christ into your life?

Romo-led fantasy event in Vegas called off as NFL balks

DALLAS (AP) — A fantasy football-themed event in Las Vegas headlined by Tony Romo was called off after the NFL reiterated a policy banning appearances associated with casinos.

A league spokesman said Saturday the NFL "reminded the players association" of the policy with the National Fantasy Football Convention event scheduled for next month.

Romo, who recently

joined Twitter, wrote that the league canceled the event. The Dallas quarterback said he was "sad for the fans and players."

In a statement on the event's website, organizers said the cancellation was "a direct result of sudden and unexpected opposition taken by the NFL concerning player participation and their perceived association with gambling for an event in Las Vegas." They said they were

rescheduling for next summer in Los Angeles.

Philadelphia running back DeMarco Murray, Romo's former teammate, and Cowboys receiver Dez Bryant were among the stars expected to attend, with autograph sessions and other fantasy-related events planned.

Bryant was critical of the NFL on Twitter, writing "don't understand whenever they make ... money off of us."

In a March news release announcing the event, organizers said it would be held at the Venetian Resort Hotel Casino. It was supposed to be July 10-12.

Ron Reese, a spokesman for Las Vegas Sands Corp., said the event was actually to be held at the Sands Expo, a convention site near the Venetian and a facility without gambling or slot machines.

Earlier this year, the fantasy football wager-

ing website FanDuel announced that it has partnerships with 15 NFL teams.

"The NFL has a credibility gap on this issue the size of the Grand Canyon," Reese said. "Nearly half the teams in the league are partnering with fantasy football wagering websites, but a convention in Las Vegas is a bridge too far? It's about time the NFL comes down from its ivory tower."

Romo's event organizers said they planned to offer refunds or compensation toward next year's event for people who had already registered.

"We could not be more shocked and disappointed by the events of the past few days, and we want to extend our sincerest apologies for any inconveniences, frustrations, and disappointment this will undoubtedly cause," they said.

DT, Antonio Smith miss minicamp for Broncos

ENGLEWOOD, Colo. (AP) — As expected, Broncos wide receiver Demaryius Thomas and defensive end Antonio Smith were absent from Denver's mandatory minicamp Tuesday.

Thomas is boycotting the Broncos' off-season program after the team placed its \$12.8 million franchise tag on him.

He's not subject to a fine because he hasn't signed

his tender. He has said he'll attend training camp with or without a long-term deal.

Smith was absent from minicamp while prosecutors in Texas investigate a criminal complaint against him.

In addition to missing his top receiver, Peyton Manning also was without Ryan Clady, the reliable left tackle who protected his blind side. Clady tore his left ACL two weeks ago and is done for the season. Rookie Ty Sambrailo gets the first chance to win the job.

Report: Taxpayer tab on St. Louis stadium plan reaches \$3M

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The proposed riverfront football stadium in St. Louis already has cost taxpayers \$3 million, according to a newspaper report Tuesday. The St. Louis Post-Dispatch reported that that figure is based on the latest invoices released this week from financing advisers, railroad track engineers, contract attorneys and management. Architectural firm HOK so far has billed more than \$2.2 million, while the stadium's design and construction manager has put in for more than \$190,000 and attorneys nearly \$260,000.

The public St. Louis Regional Convention and Sports Complex Authority — owner and operator of the Edward Jones Dome, the Rams' current home — is paying nearly all the bills, with the state picking up the tab on some financial advice, the Post-Dispatch said. Top executives with the authority have said any spending now may affect that entity's ability to pay off bonds for the Edward Jones Dome. "At some point, we're going to have to get some of this money back from the state," Jim Shrewsbury, the authority's board chairman, told the newspaper. He cautioned that the board has been thoughtful in its spending, calling the expenses necessary to keep the NFL in St. Louis. The Rams are year-to-year on their lease for the Edward Jones Dome and could leave as early as 2016, meaning the upcoming NFL season could be their last in St. Louis. Owners are to hold a special meeting Aug. 11 in Chicago about a potential relocation of a team or teams to Los Angeles.

Westbrook Frames, NBA team up for new luxury frames series

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Westbrook Frames, a company that Thunder All-Star guard Russell Westbrook co-owns, has partnered with the NBA to launch a new series.

The initial release includes frames for seven teams — Cleveland, Boston, Los Angeles Clippers, Miami, New York, Los Angeles Lakers and Brooklyn Nets. They are available on the Westbrook Frames website for \$145.

There are designs for all 30 teams, and eventually, the others will be released, said Marc Beckman, Westbrook Frames co-owner and Westbrook's marketing agent for fashion. "Our goal was to put together a special collection of luxury-tiered eyewear that really caters to the very prevalent upper-echelon sports fan who loves fashion right now," Beckman said. "NBA and basketball

are the leaders when it comes to all sports and fashion." Westbrook's foray into eyewear came after he wore red frames without lenses to postgame interviews during the 2012 playoffs. Beckman, CEO and founder of DMA United, said getting Westbrook into the eyewear market was one of their first goals. They added Selima Optique as a partner to help smooth the process. "Being that Russell was the one who created this eyewear trend in the NBA, it was important for us to give him the opportunity to own an equity position, and to be the first out in the

category out of all the players in the NBA," Beckman said. "We wanted to own that space for Russell."
