During the summer there are a number of activities that children can go to and keep themselves busy; usually they are vacation bible schools or athletic

Not many offer the services of both. Texas Rodeo Bible Camp offers

Pampa reminded of **IRS** scam calls

As the calendars have turned to June, the phone scams have not stopped. Unfortunately this also opens the door for scammers to call and try and trick taxpayers into paying more than what they should.



Local residents have received calls impersonating Internal Revenue Service . The phone calls are actually a computer generated message. The message tells you that you owe the IRS but doesn't tell you how much. Then they request that you call 207-291-2911 and pay the amount owed with a credit card.

According to a local accountant, the IRS will contact you by mail if you owe money. If you do not respond in 30 days you will then receive a certified letter. If after an additional 30 days you do not respond then someone from an IRS office will come to your home. The IRS does not contacts someone by phone or require immediate payment with a credit card.

Pampa Police Department is only aware of one IRS call recently, but is aware of multiple scams

in recent months. The first is a Publishers Clearing House scam. On this one, the caller states that they are in town and are ready to deliver your check for several million dollars. They even provide

With the signing of the bill, 'Texas took a small but important step to further protect the religious freedom of clergy in the face of increasing hostility toward people of faith in all walks of life," Paxton said in a statement. "No Pastor, Priest, Rabbi or other religious leader should be forced to perform or recognize a marriage that contradicts his or her sincere religious

held outside the Governor's Man- in the knowledge that religious protecting pastors "who have a strong religious belief " against same-sex marriage.

State Rep. Celia Israel, D-Austin, said in a statement released Thursday that she believes it's possible to support both equality and religious liberty.

"Texans are ready for equality, and if this measure gives pastors a peace of mind, I welcome it becoming law," Israel said.

Critics had argued that Senate Bill 2065 attempts to make it difficult for same-sex couples to marry in Texas, in case the U.S. Supreme Estes has said the bill is about Court legalizes gay marriages.




