Movoto.com ranks Pampa No. 6 best place to live in Texas

Pampa has graced another list. Real estate website, movoto.com, ranked Pampa as the No. 6 best place to live in Texas.

The description says, "Located just about as north as you can get in North Texas, it may not be

surprising that this city of nearly 19,000 ranked well for a low summer temperature, averaging at 75 degrees, and clear skies, with an air quality score of 21 (the lower the better). What may be surprising, though was that this city ranked as the very highest in our

analysis for quality of life.

With plenty to do, and clear weather to do it in, it's almost a shame that almost 96 percent of residents are busy at work every day-as this city's unemployment rate was just 5.5 percent. At least with a short average commute

time of 18 minutes, there's a chance for residents to get home early to enjoy that North Texas weather."

DPS traffic stop leads to cash seizure

AMARILLO - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) on June 13 conducted a traffic stop on Interstate 40, yielding more than \$37,000 in U.S. currency.

At approximately 5 p.m., a DPS trooper conducted a traffic stop on a 2009 Nissan Sentra traveling westbound on I-40, near Vega in Oldham County. During the traffic stop, the trooper discovered the cash in the trunk.

The occupants of the Sentra were identified as Juan Rios III, 20, of Victorville, Calif., and Johnny Araujo Garibay, 26, of Hesperia, Calif.

Rios and Garibay were arrested for money laundering, a third-degree felony, and booked into the Oldham County Jail. The cash was allegedly being transported from Amarillo to Victorville, Calif.



"We see this scam pop up frequently," said Kiehl. "If someone

calls claiming to be with a certain company, the only way to know they are who they say they are is to hang up and call the company from a number you look up," says Kiehl. A statement on Microsoft's website states, "We do not send unsolicited e-mail or make unsolicited phone calls to request personal or financial information or fix your computer."

Grandchildren calling for help? Not likely.

Random calls hoping to steal money from grandparents continue to affect the area. The scam artists trick you into giving them



room, where the nukes are. You have to familiarize yourself with the forward end of the boat as well. It's interesting to see all aspects of how a submarine works and how all of the systems tie together."

Cree's job title is going to be the electrical operator, so he will be handling the electrical distribution system for the submarine.

"Keeping the lights on essentially," Cree said. "When the lights go out on a submarine it can get a little dark. Every other system we have runs off electricity as well."

Cree said the submarine force is increasing and says submarines are very important for the defense of the United States.

"They always tell us we are the tip of the spear," Cree said.

Cree said choosing to go into the nuclear program in the Navy is challenging in itself because it's a two-year training program. While engineering is mentally challenging enough, Cree said being away from family, his wife, Kristina, his son Halen, 2, and daughter, Harper, 2 months, was the hardest part of the training.

"At the time whenever I was training, I would wake up before Halen was up and come home after he was asleep," Cree said.





persuasive case for the 2003 U.S. invasion of Iraq, Colin Powell was a young Army officer who had served two combat tours in Vietnam. There he had held in his arms a young American soldier who had been blown apart by a land mine while fighting a war that powerful men in Washington had declared necessary to stop international communism. He knew firsthand the pain of writing a personal note to parents of a soldier under his command who would be coming home in a casket. Powell pledged, he would later write, that if the time ever came when he was making policy, he "would not quietly acquiesce in halfhearted warfare for half-baked reasons that the American people could not understand or support." In 1991, while serving as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff under President George H.W. Bush, Gen. Colin Powell kept his word. In what would come to be known as the Powell Doctrine, he argued that the United States should only send its men and women into combat as a last resort and only after all other nonviolent policy options have been tried. Just as important were these preconditions for war: when the vital national security interest of the nation is threatened by the intended opponent, when the U.S. forces are overwhelming and disproportionate to the forces of the opponent, when the U.S. action and mission are fully understood and strongly supported by the American people, when the U.S. mission has authentic international backing, and when there is a coherent exit strategy for the U.S. troops.

Remember the Gulf War? Saddam had state, gave invaded Iraq's oil-rich neighbor Kuwait. Presidescription dent George H.W. Bush had a clear and limited of Saddam objective, to drive Iraq out of Kuwait. With both the House and the Senate controlled by the opposition party, and made a Bush 41 still won Congress' support for U.S. action. In addition, Bush got the United Nations Security Council to endorse nations' using all means necessary if Iraq refused to withdraw. Bush and his secretary of state, Jim Baker, forged a military coalition of 34 nations and then persuaded Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, Germany and Japan, collectively, to pay more than 86 percent of the total cost of \$61 billion. The United States deployed approximately 540,000 troops to the war and suffered 294 fatalities. The war lasted 42 days. Let it be noted that while faithfully following the Powell Doctrine, Bush 41, in the Gulf War, won the only clear-cut American military victory in the 70 years since the end of World War II. Powell later would publicly confess that the misleading case he made so effectively for the tragic 2003 U.S. invasion and occupation of Iraq will always be a blot on his record. It was not the Powell Doctrine that failed in the Iraq War. (It was, stupidly, ignored.) It was the failure of powerful men named Cheney, Bush, Rumsfeld and, yes, Powell. Now we are, nearly 25 years after that winning Gulf War, in another presidential campaign full of our demands for leaders with "new ideas." President George H.W. Bush had a pretty great old idea in 1990 that we called the Powell Doctrine, which made a helluva lot more sense than anything I've heard since.

liott. Fort Elliott had been established in June, 1875 as one of the last strong-holds set up by Texas and the U.S. Army for protecting pioneers from the Indians. Originally, known

as the "Cantonment of Sweetwater," Fort

Elliott was erected half a mile south of the head of Sweetwater Creek. Good water was sacred to the early pioneers who settled the Panhandle of Texas. It meant the difference between survival and non-survival... success and failure. Mobeetie formally organized on April 12, 1879, and has been called the Mother City of the Panhandle.

The town of Mobeetie (Hi-

detown) was first established in

C.W. King, his wife Mary Ann, and children, Allen, Martha Elizabeth (Mattie), and Jim, settled in Mobeetie in the winter of 1907. C.W. preceded his wife and family to Mobeetie. He purchased the hotel from Mr. Grigsby. According to Mrs. Sally Harris, author of Hidetown - In The Texas Panhandle-100 Years in Wheeler County, Mr. King met Mrs. King and the children in Shamrock at the Rock Island train station. Mr. King arrived with "a fine set up in the hack. There was a coal stove with a pipe to take the smoke out of the inside and it was all fired up with coal this freezing winter day to keep them warm on the road to Mobeetie.'

C.W. later sold the hotel to move into the "Old Rock House"

on Sweetwater Creek. The Old Rock House is now the site of a Texas Historical Marker. According to Mattie, daughter of C.W. and Mary Ann King, her father was the one who broke the land out for the first time on the flat top at the north side of the section and planted cotton. She said that her father had many fine cotton crops for several years. They were still farming the land in 1913 when Mr. King became post master at Mobeetie and served in that capacity for five years until they moved to Hansford County. Mr. Witherspoon was appointed to postmaster of Mobeetie on Aug. 5, 1918. Mr. King was a businessman in Spearman and served as Hansford County Judge from 1925-1932

The King family

Mary Ann (Klinglesmith) King, wife of C.W. is noted in many of the early historical accounts of Garvin and Cleveland counties of Oklahoma. From Bluestem to Golden Trend notes that she taught the first class of the Noble Academy which opened in 1890. She was the daughter of Louis P. and Elizabeth Klinglesmith of Hardin County, Ky. This branch of the Klinglesmith family left their home outside of Elizabethtown, Ky. in 1876. Many homes in the south were burned down by the Union General Tecumseh Sherman. This home has been restored and is now the site of a Kentucky Historical Marker.

After their home was burned, life was hard in the post-civil war south. Circa 1876, Louis and Elizabeth Klinglesmith and their children left Kentucky and initially relocated in the Pottsborough/Fort Johnson area of Texas. Around 1887, they moved from this area to Pauls Valley, Indian Territory, just south of the present day Noble and Norman, Oklahoma. Mary Ann Klinglesmith, daughter of Louis and Elizabeth Klinglesmith married C.W. King on May 3, 1896.

Louis Allen King, the eldest son of C.W. and Mary Ann attended West Texas State Normal College in Canyon. He was a member of the Sons of Liberty Club at the college. He was also a member of the intercollegiate debate team composed of Grady and Emmett Hazelwood, Lester Hill, A.D. Payne, and Virgil Dodson. He graduated from West Texas State Normal College in Canyon during the Twelfth Commencement on June 3, 1922. He married Grace Perriman on May 27, 1923.

Martha Elizabeth (Mattie) King, the eldest daughter married J.W. Davis of Spearman on Sept. 4, 1924. She was active in many civic and church organizations in Spearman.

James William (Jim) King, the youngest son, married Wanda Johnson on Sept. 8,1928.

This family lineage has been documented and traced to time Shipleys of Maryland who first came to Anne Arundel County, Md. in the 1600's.

Do not waste resources

I have been reading the story of Louis Zamperini in the book "Unbroken: A World War II Story of Survival, Resilience, and Redemption" by Laura Hillenbrand. As you may know it is a powerful story about a man who survived through many difficulties with his strong will and determination. The movie version was released in theaters last year. I have not watched



the movie yet because I want to finish

the book first (Yes I am that guy). In the book, there are so many stories that stand out to me. His life was a powerful story about survival and strong will power. It was also an amazing story that showed how God's hand was upon Mr. Zamperini throughout his life. I could pick several different details of the book that

HAWTHORNE impacted me. There was one story that the author of "Unbroken" shares that most people probably read right past, but it stuck out to me.

In the book Hillenbrand tells about the life vests that all of the airplanes were equipped with that flew during WWII. She says that the life vests consisted of two chambers that were inflated to keep the airmen above water in case of a crash. She gives an interesting description of how they are designed and how they work.

She explains how the life vests were designed with two CO2 cartridges, one in each chamber of the life vest. These cartridges were used to inflate the chambers in case of a crash. This allowed the airmen to pull a cord and inflate the life vest instead of trying to manually blow air into the chambers to inflate them. It was a great design. This life vest design saved many lives during WWII.

Here is the interesting point that stood out to me.

Hilenbrand says that when it was time to use the life vest many of the CO2 cartridges were missing. Why were they missing? The airmen were taking them out. How would you feel, in the midst of your plane going down in the water, when you realized there was no way to inflate your life vest? It would be scary to say the least.

You see as the airmen were stationed in many remote locations across the Pacific during the war they did not always have access to the necessities of life. So some of the airmen would take the CO2 cartridges out of the vests and use them to make carbonated beverages. Most thought that they would never need to use the vests. Some found out they really did need those cartridges. It was self-sabotage.

As I read this story I was struck by the thought, "This is how some people live their lives." They always seem to use up the resources provided them now and do not have them when needed in the future. This can take on many different forms. If you spend all of your paycheck now and do not save for the future. If you spend all your time on one thing and do not give time to other important areas and relationships. The list goes on and on.

One area that I think of specifically is the area of talent. You have been given a talent or two or three that no other person has. Have you used it well or have you squandered it only to find a time that you really needed it. There you find yourself wishing you had taken the time to develop the talent.

I write this as a challenge to you. I challenge you not to waste the resources that you have been given but to preserve and develop some of them with the thought in mind, "I may need to use this someday."

Vehicle that polygamist leader rode in during arrest is sold

riding in when he was arrested nearly a decade ago.

Willie Jessop paid \$30,000 for the 2007 red Cadillac Escalade and \$50,000 for the belongings in the vehicle at a public auction Monday in St. George, Utah, the Spectrum newspaper reports (http://bit.ly/1GII0TW).

Jessop, who left the polygamous sect several years ago, said he plans to display the car at a sprawling compound built for Jeffs that Jessop converted into a bed-andbreakfast in a town on the Utah-Arizona border where the polygamous sect is headquartered.

"It brings a lot of closure for a lot of people that actually want to have the experience I did, which is to try to understand what he did, and it really sheds a real insight into the double life he was leading at the expense of a lot of people," Jessop said.

Jeffs is imprisoned in Texas, where he is serving a life term for sexually assaulting underage girls he considered brides.

Jessop, who left in 2011, opened the bedand-breakfast at the compound and tore down part of the massive wall around last year as part of an ongoing effort to show the divided community that there is life after Jeffs

Jeffs was in the vehicle in August 2006 with his brother and one of his wives just strictly prohibits it today.

GEORGE, Utah (AP) — Warren outside Las Vegas when police encountered Jeffs' former bodyguard has purchased the him during a routine traffic stop - af-SUV the imprisoned polygamist leader was ter more than a year on the run and three months FBI's Most Wanted List. Police found wigs, 15 cellphones and \$54,000 in cash inside the car.

He gave the Nevada highway patrolman an alias, but later conceded he was Warren Jeffs when an FBI agent arrived.

After he was convicted in a southern Utah court, Jeffs was moved to Arizona to face separate charges. He was there in 2008 when investigators began building the Texas case against him began that would ultimately lead to a life prison sentence.

It's unclear which items from the vehicle would be handed over to Jessop as part of the purchase. Jessop's attorney, Mark James, said that must be discussed with the FBI

Jeffs still rules the sect, known as the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, or FLDS, through letters and phone calls from prison. One of his brothers, Lyle Jeffs, lives in the community and makes sure Jeffs' commandments are carried out.

The sect is a radical offshoot of mainstream Mormonism whose members believe polygamy brings exaltation in heaven. Polygamy is a legacy of the early teachings of the mainstream Mormon church, but the faith abandoned the practice in 1890 and

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

LeBron will go down as an all-time great and Curry could be headed that direction, but there are a few aspects of their games that are concerning to me as a high school basketball coach.

· LeBron is the poster child for the noncalled traveling violation — If you watch his game closely he will travel on almost every possession. Whether it's on the downhill attack or just shooting a turnaround jumpshot, his pivot foot changes like the West Texas weather. That becomes a struggle for our young players when they emulate these moves and are called for a travel in their games.

 LeBron argues with the officials too much instead of getting back on defense — One of the biggest struggles with our youth is them letting one mistake turn into two. When

the game transitions from offense to defense it is imperative that all five players sprint back on defense to locate their man and protect the rim. LeBron begs and pleads for a foul on misses rather than sprinting back.

• Curry shoots the step back three better than anyone in the history of the game. It makes for some great entertainment watching him fall away off one foot from 30 feet. However, the rest of the world, especially high school kids, are not as effective with this shot. I have seen a lot of young kids shoot this shot in games and they always fall short of the rim.

· Curry throws some incredible passes that not very many players can throw. He throws passes off the live dribble with one hand, he throws jump passes and the worst one the kids try to copy is the no look behind the back pass. Even Curry has been known to turn the ball over with these passes, and if he does, you can only imagine how this results at the grade school levels.

Although there are some flaws, you can't help but enjoy the best players in the world fighting it out for the ultimate prize, an NBA Title. This series has been as good as it can be. Cleveland steals home court advantage, Golden State steals it back, and now each team has a chance to hold serve at home. A true testament to why the regular season is important.
