# **Governor Abbott** receives briefing on tropical system

AUSTIN – Governor Greg Abbott today visited the Texas State Operations Center (SOC) to receive a briefing on state resources being dispatched to areas impacted by inclement weather. The Governor's visit follows Monday's elevated activation of the SOC, and his decision to stage resources for the rapid deployment to assist local officials as Tropical Storm Bill made landfall in Texas. Additional resources may be activated as the situation develops.

"I want to express my deepest gratitude for the first responders across the State of Texas who have done a tremendous job in the face of this challenge," said Governor Abbott. "Because of their swift response in dealing with the challenges that have quickly arisen, we've done a very effective job of saving lives, and we will continue to do the very best we can to reduce any kind of damage to property. I urge all Texans to closely monitor the changing weather conditions in their area and heed warnings from local and state officials.'

During the briefing, Governor Abbott was informed of the latest developments in the state's coordinated response to this tropical disturbance including local cleanup efforts, power/utility issue resolution and providing resources to local officials amidst ongoing recovery efforts.

### **USDA** opens enrollment period for agriculture risk coverage

WASHINGTON - U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Secretary Tom Vilsack today announced that eligible producers may now formally enroll in the Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) and Price Loss Coverage (PLC) programs for 2014 and 2015. The enrollment period begins June 17, 2015, and will end

Sept. 30, 2015. 'The extensive outreach campaign conducted by USDA since the 2014 Farm Bill was enacted, along with extending deadlines, is central to achieving an expected high level of participation," said Vilsack. "We worked with universities to simplify these complex programs by providing online tools so producers could explore how program election options would affect their operation in different market conditions; these tools were presented to almost 3,000 organizations across the country. The Farm Service Agency also sent more than 5 million educational notices to producers nationwide and participated in over 4,880 educational events with more than 447,000 attendees. I am proud of the many committed USDA employees who worked hard over the last several months to provide producers support to help them make these important decisions."

The new programs, established by the 2014 Farm Bill, trigger financial protections for agricultural producers when market forces cause substantial drops in crop prices or revenues.






### Charles R. Tanner

# No wonder Obama won't let us read TPP

the Republican leadership and the big-donor claque, but Speaker Boehner plans to give Congress another chance this week to make this dangerous mistake.

The Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) would turn over to globalists the power to issue regulations about U.S. trade, immigration, the environment, labor and commerce. It's called a "living agreement," which means the globalists can amend and change the text of the so-called agreement after it has gone into effect.

That reminds me of our supremacist judges who invented the term of a "living" Constitution, which they can rewrite to comport with their own updated ideology. The globalists claim this "living" document (TPP), now called Obamatrade. has all the powers of a treaty to commit the U.S. to new foreign obligations, although it certainly did not comply with any U.S. constitutional provisions for treaty ratifica-

Sen. Jeff Sessions, R-Ala., has frankly warned about this giveaway of U.S. sovereignty. Not only would Congress give up its powers to negotiate and write the terms of a treaty, but Congress also gives up its powers to debate and amend the deal, to apply a cloture vote in the Senate, and to require a two-thirds vote in the

The secrecy wrapped around TPP is appallingly un-American. Whatever happened to Obama's promise of "transparency"? TPP was negotiated and agreed to by Obama's trade representative and a bunch of foreigners in a secret room, and the American people are not allowed to know

the details until after it's a done deal.

TPP puts us in a new political and economic union before a single private citizen is told about it and with public opinion running five to one against it. Remember when Nancy Pelosi said we had to pass Obamacare in order to find out what is in it?

Rep. Duncan Hunter, R-Calif., warns, "TPP calls for the formation of a permanent political and economic union known as the Trans-Pacific Partnership Commission, which will have power to issue regulations impacting not only trade, but immigration, the environment, labor and commerce. He added, Congress "will have surrendered its legislative prerogatives. Before a word, line, paragraph or page of this plan is made public, Congress will have even agreed to give up its treaty powers.'

Sessions made it even more emphatic, saying that Fast Track "authorizes the president to form a new transnational governance structure. ... It confers the power to both compel and restrict changes to U.S. policy, to commit the U.S. to international obligations, and to cede sovereign authority to a foreign body." This new global body could even add new member countries (such as China).

Sessions continued: "Congress would be pre-clearing a political and economic union before a word of that arrangement has been made available to a single private citizen. This has the earmarks of a nascent European Union," and Americans certainly don't want to belong to a European union (that's why we fought the American Revolution).

Hunter also warns that the new global governance institution would be "authorized to issue policies and regulations affecting our economy, our manufacturers, our workers, our immigration procedures, as well as current labor and environmental practices."

TPP is separating us from the U.S. Constitution and from national sovereignty and replacing both with a global



# Is third world America inevitable?

Thousands of U.S. troops safeguard the border of South Korea.

U.S. warships patrol the South China Sea to stand witness to the territorial claims of Asian allies against China.

U.S. troops move in and out of the Baltic States to signal our willingness to defend the frontiers of these tiny

NATO allies. Yet nothing that happens on these borders imperils America so much as what is happening on our own bleeding border

with Mexico. Over three decades, that border has been a causeway into the USA for millions of illegal immigrants who are changing the face of America – the delight of those who think the country we grew

up in was ugly. All sides of this quarrel have been using the figure of 11 million people here illegally. In her new bestseller, "Adios, America!," Ann Coulter makes a compelling case that the real figure is close to 30 million.

If that is true, and if the next president embraces amnesty and a path to citizenship for illegal immigrants, that will mean the end to America as the Western nation we have been, and the beginning of America's life as what Ann calls, unapologetically, a "Third World hellhole.

Indeed, when we consider the certain conse-

quences of a failure to secure the border for six more years, and amnesty for people already here illegally, igniting a new invasion, we should ask

ourselves: What problem do we Americans confront that will be more easily solved with millions more immigrants?

Between 80 and 90 percent of those coming are from Third World nations. On average, they have higher illegitimacy rates than native-born Americans, higher drug use rates, higher rates of obesity, spousal abuse and child abuse, higher rates of disease, lower test scores and higher dropout rates, and higher crime and incarceration rates.

Children of immigrants are more gang-oriented. And Third World immigrants consume more per capita in social services than they pay in taxes. Hence they contribute to fiscal deficits at every level of government.

Will millions more immigrants help solve our infrastructure crisis?

Undeniably, poor immigrants provide cheap labor for businesses and the rich. But their working- and middle-class American neighbors bear the social costs that they inflict upon communities.

Politically, immigrants from Third World countries, as they rely upon government for food, housing assistance, health care and the education of their children, support the Party of Government.

Mitt Romney lost the two fastest-growing major minorities, Hispanics and Asians, who now

account for more than a fifth of our population and a seventh of our voters, by 40 points. And as their numbers and voting percentages rise, the GOP will find that reaching 270 electoral votes is not only more difficult than in Reagan's day, it has become impossible.

Among the myths or lies drummed into the heads of Americans is that we have always been a "nation of immigrants," and "diversity," i.e., racial, ethnic and religious diversity, "is a strength."

But America in 1970 was a white nation with a black minority of about 10 percent. And, as Coulter writes, "Nearly the entire white population of America from 1600 to 1970 came from a geographic area of the world about twice the size of Texas. The entire black population came from an area of West Africa about the size of Florida.'

Is ethnic, racial and religious diversity truly a "strength"?

Why then has the most diverse region of Europe, the Balkans — with its Serb, Croat, Albanian, Slovenian, Macedonian, Turkic peoples, and Catholic, Orthodox and Islamic religions — had the bloodiest history?

Was it not racial and ethnic diversity that tore the Soviet Union into 15 nations and half a dozen subnations, and is tearing at it still in the Caucasus?

If diversity is a strength, why is Beijing, which worships strength, moving millions of Han Chinese into Tibet and western China to swamp the Tibetan and Uighur

peoples, as they have done to the Mongolian and Manchu peoples? How did diversity work out for Rwanda and Bu-

If diversity is a strength, then why are Iraq, Syria, Libya and Yemen falling apart? Why are Sunni and Shiite. Palestinian and Israeli fighting? Why are Scots, Basques, Catalans, Venetians and Flemish agitating for secession and independence?

Has the addition of tens of millions of Asian and African Muslims strengthened the Old Continent that ruled the world? Or do they imperil its security and survival as the cradle and heartland of the West?

As racial, ethic and religious hatreds pull people apart and create terrorists all over our disintegrating world, why would we make ourselves ever more diverse?

Writes Coulter, "Roe v. Wade can be overturned. Obamacare can be repealed. Amnesty is forever.'

Anyone concerned for the future of this country as one nation and one people should find a candidate who will commit to secure the border, enforce immigration laws against businesses that hire illegal immigrants, and pledge no amnesty for the duration of their presidency.

governance superstructure. TPP has wrapped its audacious global governance plan in the mantle called "free trade," which is a misnomer if there ever was one.

# AT&T hit with \$100M fine for 'unlimited' data plans Existing customers, however, were able to

WASHINGTON (AP) — AT&T Mobility LLC has been slapped with a record \$100 million fine for offering consumers "unlimited" data, but then slowing their Internet speeds after they reached a certain amount

The Federal Communications Commission said Wednesday that the company misled consumers into buying plans they believed would give them unlimited ability to send and receive data, including Web browsing, GPS navigation and streaming videos. But the FCC said that once the consumer hit a certain level, the data on unlimited plans would be slowed down significantly, at speeds lower than advertised.

AT&T said it would "vigorously dispute" the fine, which was the largest proposed in FCC history. If AT&T can provide evidence that the FCC allegations are wrong, the fine could be

reduced

"The FCC has specifically identified this practice as a legitimate and reasonable way to manage network resources for the benefit of all customers, and has known for years that all of the major carriers use it," the company said in a statement released to reporters. "We have been fully transparent with our customers, providing notice in multiple ways and going well beyond the FCC's disclosure requirements."

It's not unusual for phone companies to slow, or "throttle," speeds on a network as a way to manage congestion.

Verizon slows down speeds for its heaviest users, but only on certain smartphones when there is congestion. Once the bottleneck eases, speeds return to normal.

Until this spring, AT&T was slowing speeds

until the customer's next billing cycle, even when there was no congestion.

Both Verizon and AT&T had phased out their unlimited plans after data usage grew following the iPhone's launch in 2007.

# Cardinals stand accused of hacking Astros player database

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Some cybersecurity experts believe professional sports teams have hacked rivals in the past without get-

The St. Louis Cardinals, one of the crown jewel franchises in baseball, now stand accused.

Federal law enforcement authorities are investigating whether the Cardinals illegally accessed a computer database of the Houston Astros. The aim was obtaining information from a front office headed by a former top aide who helped transform St. Louis' scouting operation to a sabermetrics-based system, a person familiar with the situation told The Associated Press on Tuesday.

The person spoke on condition of anonymity because Major League Baseball, law enforcement officials and the two teams were not disclosing details of the investigation. The New York Times first reported that the FBI and Justice Department were investigating whether Cardinals front-office officials were behind the effort to steal information from the Astros' database, called

"It would be irresponsible to assume that this is the first time an incident like this has occurred — more likely, it's just the first time it's been uncovered," said Craig Newman, chairman of the privacy and data security practice of the New York law firm Patterson Belknap Webb & Tyler. Alexander Southwell, a former assistant U.S. attorney for the

Southern District of New York and now a privacy and cybersecurity expert for the law firm Gibson Dunn, said that if the allegation is true, the employee or employees responsible will likely face federal prison time — perhaps up to five years. "Major League Baseball has been aware of and has fully co-

operated with the federal investigation into the illegal breach of a statement. "Once the investigative process has been completed by federal law enforcement officials, we will evaluate the next steps and will make decisions promptly."

Commissioner Rob Manfred said subpoenas have been issued, but did not provide details.

"There are legal problems associated with federal law enforcement officials seeking cooperation from private individuals," Manfred said. "If the federal government wants information from us they would subpoena information and that's what they've

Southwell said the most likely charge would involve violation of the federal Computer Fraud and Abuse Act. The Cardinals would be unlikely to face criminal charges unless it could be proven that the team, and not an employee or group of employees, was behind the act, Southwell said.

"The entity can't be held responsible for the acts of rogue employees," he said.

The FBI office in Houston released a statement that neither confirmed nor denied the investigation, but added, "The FBI aggressively investigates all potential threats to public and private sector systems.

Messages seeking comment from FBI offices in Washington and St. Louis were not returned.

The U.S. attorney in St. Louis, Richard Callahan, said he was unaware of the investigation.

St. Louis manager Mike Matheny said he was logging workout results on his laptop when he was informed of the investigation Tuesday morning. He didn't think the investigation would affect players because they're accustomed to dealing with distractions. "It's part of what we do, it's a big part of what we do," Matheny

said. "We divide them into the controllables and the uncontrollables and this is one of the uncontrollables. We don't have any clue what's going on." The Cardinals are among baseball's most successful franchises

on and off the field. Only the New York Yankees have won more World Series titles than the 11 won by St. Louis, which is among the best-drawing teams in all of sports, with annual attendance topping 3 million every year since 2003. The Astros and Cardinals were rivals in the National League Central until Houston moved to the American League in 2013.

Jeff Luhnow headed the Cardinals scouting and player development department before being hired as Astros general manager in December 2011, and he has helped transform the AL Central leaders from sad sack to contender. It wasn't immediately clear how many Cardinals employees

were under investigation, or whether top front office officials were aware of the activities.

"Then there's the question of who did it?" Manfred told reportthe Houston Astros' baseball operations database," MLB said in ers in Boston. "Who knew about it? Is the organization responsible? Is the individual responsible? There's a whole set of issues that are needed to be sorted through.'

Manfred said MLB's forensics experts were not involved in the case, adding, "This is a federal investigation, not a baseball The Cardinals and Astros said they're cooperating with the in-

vestigation but declined further comment. Astros manager A.J. Hinch said he'd concentrate on his job.

"Obviously from the baseball perspective we'll deal with the baseball, and all other questions will go elsewhere," Hinch said. Luhnow was not made available to reporters in Houston on

Tuesday, but said in June 2014 that the team had been the victim of hackers who accessed servers and published months of internal trade talks on the Internet.

"It was an illegal activity and we're going to pursue it and try and find out who did it and prosecute," Luhnow said at the time, noting that the Astros were working with the FBI and MLB security to determine who was responsible for the breach.

The Astros rely heavily on sabermetrics in their evaluation of players and have been open about the fact that they use an online database to house proprietary information. Last year, the Houston

Manfred downplayed wider security concerns about MLB's digital systems.


"We have a technology company that quite literally is the envy of companies throughout America — not just sports enterprises," the commissioner said. "We routinely make the resources of MLB Advanced Media available to all of the clubs. We have the type of security arrangements that are necessary."

Craig Newman, chairman of the privacy and data security prac-

tice of the New York law firm Patterson Belknap Webb & Tyler, said it wouldn't be surprising that a professional team would be involved in hacking given the amount of money involved.

"Data analytics have become a critical strategic and tactical drive for both professional and collegiate athletics and, unfortunately, the transition from statistical modeling in player evaluation made famous by 'Moneyball' to stealing sensitive information from competitors is a natural progression," Newman said.






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
