PRMC to introduce new telestroke program

When a patient has a stroke, emergency staff has a matter of minutes to give the patient the proper medicine to minimize the damage from the stroke. Pampa Regional Medical Center CEO, Brad Morse, wanted to help bring a teleneurology program to the hospital with the telestroke program robot.

"I talked to Northwest Texas Hospital and they said they were going to do it, too, because they want their patients to see a neurologist as soon as they can," Morse said. "Sometimes it takes a neurologist to get to patients. Sometimes there are not even neurologists available to come to the emergency room and our emer-

gency room doctors are giving thrombalytics without a neurologist's input."

Thrombalytics are the clot-busting drugs given to stroke patients. But it is a very powerful drug which can harm the patient more than help them. It can even cause a patient to bleed out.

To help remedy the shortage of neurologists, PRMC now has a robotics program which will help stroke patients and their emergency staff communicate with a neurologist.

They sit behind a computer all day long and wait for telephone calls from one of the hospitals that they serve," Morse said. Through the robot, they look at the patient

Cruz, Perry Tied in National Poll

WASHINGTON — The two Texans running for president are tied in a new national poll.

U.S. Sen. Ted Cruz and former Texas Gov. Rick Perry each had the support of 4 percent of registered voters who identified themselves as Republicans in a new Washington Post/ABC News poll.

At first blush, 4 percent appears to be an insignificant number. But both men will make the cut if Fox News takes this poll into account when deciding which 10 Republican

presidential candidates appear in the upcoming Aug. 6 presidential debate.

Cruz had a slight leg up over Perry in the survey when all self-identified Republican respondents were polled — not just registered voters. In that group, Cruz got 4 percent while Perry got 3 percent.

The numbers in this latest poll showed a decline for Cruz since his late-March announcement. Meanwhile, the survey reflected a sharp rise for billionaire Donald Trump, who appeared to be taking support away from Texas' junior senator. Perry, CRUZ cont. on page 2

From Pampa to Childress

On July 15, 1932, Olin E. Hinkle, then managing editor of the Pampa Daily News, wrote that the scenery from Pampa to Childress was picturesque to passengers traveling on the

new Fort Worth and Denver line. When leaving Pampa, travelers could see level wheat fields where recently "the song of the combine harmonized with the symphony of rail-laying crews" was played.

Near Lefors trains traveled swiftly over

ravines that gave travelers "the illusion of looking down on a carpet of green patterns studded with hundreds of oil derricks." From the forest of derricks, smoke from carbon black plants rose lazily at intervals, and occasionally white steam puffed from exhaust pipes of gasoline plants and booster stations. In the sandy soil of central Gray County, trees were more abundant, cattle ranged the rolling hills and oil derricks continued plentiful.

Continuing southward to Childress, travelers could see farms increasing in number, new towns springing up, cotton fields in abundance, row crops in luxuriant growth, cotton gins instead of oil industries, smartly appointed towns older and prouder, and lazy streams with little water.


Probably no one was more pleased than Mel B. Davis to have the Fort Worth and Denver come through Lefors. Davis and J. M. Shaw had developed the town site of Lefors and adjacent lands after the discovery of oil and gas. Doubtless Davis had an important part in obtaining the railroad since a stop was named Meldavis, and he may have been responsible for giving everyone a free ride to Childress and back on the first train.

An article in Focus, Summer 1987 relates experiences of several Lefors residents in regard to the Fort Worth and Denver. Charles Lisenbee and his father and brother, who lived at Quanah, began working with the FD&W track at Childress. They returned to Quanah when work on the railroad ended, but Charles came back while working on the highway. He liked this part of the Panhandle and got a job with the Texas Company that lasted the remainder of his

Herman Cates, who worked at the Saunders Ranch headquarters near the Texas Company Picnic Grounds, said that the ranch crew plowed the road bed and used fresnos (big scoops) to build the grade. The ranch boss loaned Herman to drive a truck during the building of the Shamrock Gasoline plant when an open line was laid from the main track. F. C. Jones,"Jonesy," was a riveter who riveted all the steel together to build the tanks at the station. Herman used a winch to unload the tank iron from the railroad cars after track was laid to the station. Bobby Thacker hauled water to Childress from Lefors and Shamrock. He and several other contractors raked the lava rock from the railroad and hauled it for local driveways and also driveways in

After the termination of rail service, a sawmill was set up in Lefors

A Mideast Game of Thrones

As President Obama's nuclear deal with Iran is compared to Richard Nixon's opening to China, Bibi Netanyahu must know how Chiang Kai-shek felt as he watched his old

friend Nixon toasting Mao in Peking. The Iran nuclear

deal is not on the same geostrategic level. Yet both moves, seen as betrayals by old U.S. allies, were born of a cold assessment in Washington of a need to shift policy to reflect new threats and new op-

portunities.

Several events contributed to the

U.S. move toward Tehran. First was the stunning victory in June 2013 of President Hassan Rouhani, who rode to power on the votes of the Green Revolution that had sought unsuccessfully to oust

Mahmoud Ahmadinejad in 2009. Rouhani then won the Ayatollah's authorization to negotiate a cutting and curtailing of Iran's nuclear program, in return for a U.S.-U.N. lifting of sanctions. As preventing an Iranian bomb had long been a U.S. objective, the Americans could not spurn such an offer.

Came then the Islamic State's seizure of Raqqa in Syria, and Mosul and Anbar in Iraq. Viciously anti-Shiite as well as anti-American, ISIS made the U.S. and Iran de facto allies in preventing the fall of

But as U.S. and Iranian interests converged, those of the U.S. and its old allies — Saudi Arabia, Israel and Turkey — were diverging.

Turkey, as it sees Bashar Assad's alliance with Iran as the greater threat, and fears anti-ISIS Kurds in Syria will carve out a second Kurdistan, has been abetting ISIS.

Saudi Arabia sees Shiite Iran as a geostrategic rival in the Gulf, allied with Hezbollah in Lebanon, Assad in Damascus, the Shiite regime in Iraq and the Houthis in Yemen. It

also sees Iran as a subversive threat in Bahrain and the heavily Shiite oil fields of Saudi Arabia itself.

Indeed, Riyadh, with the Sunni challenge of ISIS rising, and the Shiite challenge of Iran growing, and its border states already on fire, does indeed face an existential threat. And, so, too, do the Gulf Arabs.

Uneasy lies the head that wears a

crown in the Middle East today. The Israelis, too, see Iran as their great enemy and indispensable pillar of Hezbollah. For Bibi, any U.S.-Iran rapprochement is a diplomatic

Which brings us to a fundamental question of the Middle East.

Is the U.S.-Iran nuclear deal and our de facto alliance against ISIS a temporary collaboration? Or is it the beginning of a detente between these ideological enemies of 35 years?

Is an historic "reversal of alliances" in the Mideast at hand?

Clearly the United States and Iran have overlapping interests. Neither wants all-out war with the

For the Americans, such a war

would set the Gulf ablaze, halt the flow of oil, and cause a recession in the West. For Iran, war with the USA could see their country smashed and splintered like Saddam's Iraq, and the loss of an historic opportunity to achieve hegemony in the Gulf.

Also, both Iran and the United States would like to see ISIS not only degraded and defeated, but annihilated. Both thus have a vested interest in preventing a collapse of either the Shiite regime in Baghdad or Assad's regime in Syria.

And, thus, Syria is probably where the next collision is going to come between the United States and its old

For Turkey, Saudi Arabia and Israel all want the Assad regime brought down to break up Iran's Shiite Crescent and inflict a strategic defeat on Tehran. But the United States believes the fall of Assad means the rise of ISIS and al-Qaida, a massacre of Christians, and the coming to power of a Sunni terrorist

state implacably hostile to us. Look for the Saudis and Israelis, their agents and lobbies, their think tanks and op-ed writers, to begin beating the drums for the United States to bring down Assad, who has been "killing his own people."

The case will be made that this is the way for America to rejoin its old allies, removing the principal obstacle to our getting together and going after ISIS. Once Assad is gone, the line is already being moved, then we can all go after ISIS. But, first,

What is wrong with this scenario? A U.S. no-fly zone, for example, to stop Assad's barrel bombs, would entail attacks on Syrian airfields and antiaircraft missiles and guns. These would be acts of war, which would put us into a de facto alliance with the al-Qaida Nusra Front and ISIS, and invite retaliations against Americans by Hezbollah in Beirut, and the

Shiite militia in Baghdad. Any U.S.-Iran rapprochement would be dead, and we will have been sucked into a war to achieve the strategic goals of allies that are in conflict with the national interests of the United States. And our interests

Some messes just can't be cleaned up?

Bible scholar and theologian, W. Graham Scroggie, once wrote concerning the life of Judah's King Manasseh: "Sins, repented of, will be forgiven, but the consequences cannot

be stayed." How true that observation is and especially with King Manasseh.

Manasseh's genetics were a mixed bag. He had a fine great-grandpa (Jotham), a horrible grandpa (Ahaz) and a fabulous dad (Hezekiah). One would have hoped that 2 out of 3 would have carried

the day, but such was not the case. The excellent qualities of Jotham and Hezekiah skipped Manasseh's DNA, while every evil trait of grandpa Ahaz built a nest in his heart.

Manasseh's story begins in 2 Kings 21 and 2 Chronicles 33. In about the year 696 BC, at age 12, Manasseh became King of Judah and he reigned for 55 years. Within a decade he not only ripped out all of the good that his father, Hezekiah, had inspired, but he re-poisoned the people of Judah with the idolatrous arsenic that grandpa Ahaz had sown into the nation. The depth of his evil was darkest when he offered his son as a burnt offering to Asherah and when he seduced the people of Judah to "do more evil than the nations whom the Lord destroyed before the sons of Israel.'

Then according to Babylonian records, in approximately 681 BC. God used Assurbanipal's army to capture Manasseh and tow him back to Babylon with hooks through his nose. In agony and torment Manasseh came to his senses, entreated the Lord and humbled himself greatly before God. Nothing touches God's heart like a broken spirit who cries out to Him for help. So Jehovah restored Manasseh to his position as king in Jerusalem because he "knew that the Lord was God." Manasseh's repentance was genuine at that time in Babylon and continued when he returned to Judah.

If these dates are close to correct,

then Manasseh spent about 15 years poisoning God's people with idolatry and wickedness. After his return (depending on how long he was captive) he ruled for another 35-40 years. 2 Chr. 33:15-16 give the details of the fruits of his repentance. "He got rid of the foreign gods and removed the image from the temple of the Lord, as well as all the altars he had built on the temple hill and in Jerusalem; and he threw them out of the city. Then he restored the altar of the Lord and sacrificed fellowship offerings and thank offerings on it, and told Judah to serve the Lord, the God of Israel." Now that is what true repentance looks like.

So for Manasseh, the story couldn't have ended better. He saw his sin, repented of that sin and spent the remainder of his life trying to undo all the evil ways he had sown. So what was the end result? Did God's people get back on track and return to the righteous ways of Hezekiah?

2 Chr. 33:17 "The people, however, continued to sacrifice at the high places, but only to the Lord their God." At first glance this sounds good, but what it really means is best stated in The Message version of verse 17. "But the people didn't take him seriously—they used the name "God" but kept on going to the old pagan neighborhood shrines and doing the same old things."

The mess that Manasseh had led God's people into during his first 15 years as king couldn't be cleaned up in his final 35 years.

What a lesson for us all. The easiest way to clean up a mess? Don't make

the mess in the first place. God bless. Mike

Dozens of environmentally friendly mayors from around the world are meeting at the Vatican Tuesday to bask in the star power of eco-Pope Francis and commit to reducing global warming and helping the urban poor deal with its

It's the latest — and perhaps most important — Vatican initiative to keep the momentum alive after Francis re-

VATICAN CITY (AP) — One city banned Styrofoam. leased his landmark environment encyclical and as governments head into crucial climate negotiations in Paris in December.

> Already, the Vatican has engaged Nobel science laureates, global faith leaders, the U.N. leadership, eco-friendly businesses and even the self-described "secular Jewish feminist" and environmental advocate Naomi Klein to promote Francis' message that caring for the Earth — and humanity — is an urgent moral imperative.

> Now, the pope is turning to mayors, some 60 of whom signed up to attend the two-day meeting at the Vatican. Several belong to the new Carbon Neutral Cities Alliance, whose members have committed to reducing greenhouse gas emissions by at least 80 percent by 2050 or sooner.

Attending is Gov. Jerry Brown of California, which has enacted the toughest greenhouse gas emissions standards in North America, as well as the mayors of New York City, Boston, Oslo, Vancouver and Boulder, Colorado.

When trains stopped for water, some of the school students would scoot under or between the cars, and there were two boys who would climb into the caboose. After they received repeated warnings to stay away from the train, which they ignored, teacher Ardelle Briggs spanked them. When they reminded her

of this at a class reunion 31 years later, she said that she wished she had gone with the boys because she had always wondered what the inside of a caboose looked like.







Remain faithful even if it brings trouble

Being faithful to Christ and His Word is never an easy task. The Gospel of Mark (6:14-29) reminds us of this in a very stark way. This is the account of John the Baptizer being beheaded because he spoke out against Herod. What did John speak the truth about? MAR-

RIAGE! Yes, that's right, marriage. The prophet was imprisoned, persecuted, and killed because he spoke out that Herod's marriage to Herodias was not according to the law of God. John was right in doing so, and it cost him his life.

Will this be the church today? Well, at least the churches that remain

faithful to God's holy Word that marriage is the God given holy estate between one man and one woman. Those of us who believe this and practice this may come under some hard times in the months and years to come, since now the law of our land is that marriage is not what God says it is. Judges, lawyers, politicians, and even powerful dictators can say whatever they like when it comes to marriage, but their word never trumps God's Word. His

Word is the truth. Those faithful to Christ believe that marriage is between one man and one woman.

If some hard times and/or persecution befalls the churches that remain faithful to the Lord God, then that is what we will have to endure. None of us are looking forward to this and we all hope that we will be able to practice the Faith according to our beliefs. If things do get bad (losing tax exemption/considerable fines/jail time for clergy), this will test many of our parishioners. For when times get tough there will be those who don't want any fuss over this stuff and they will head down the street to a church that goes along with the culture and society and they won't be bothered.

I guess John the Baptizer should have smartened up. He should have just been quiet and let Herod do what he wanted and he would have been fine. Just keep quiet and go along with everyone and it will be fine. But it is not fine and it shows no courage or faithfulness to the

My prayer is for strength to resist the temptation to just go along with the world and for courage to speak the truth of God's Word. We need to proclaim repentance to those around and to ourselves. For the Church has not always

upheld marriage as we should. Divorce is much too common. Cohabitation before marriage is all too normal. We have not modeled the importance of marriage to our children and we must repent. That is why I pray that we remain faithful, to all of Scriptures and to our Lord and Savior. It is so easy to let things go that are wrong because you know that the road is difficult and the grief will be heavy upon you. When we find ourselves there we can only find comfort in the unending forgiveness of

This forgiveness of Christ does not negate the call to be faithful. Christians in the second and third centuries didn't have the majority or a high standing in the community. They were often mocked and persecuted for not participating in the pagan feasts and sacrifices of their city. They were called names for their faithfulness to the Lord in their daily lives. Some caved when the persecution became fierce, but others remained steadfast and even lost their lives confessing Jesus. They would not deny Him. They would not give in to the pagans' torments. I have great admiration and respect for these men and

Whenever I have read and studied these accounts of the martyrs and saints it helps me want to stay the course with

Christ. Their example of faith and courage in speaking the truth to a world that hates them makes me see how easy I have had it in my life.

Those days may be coming to an end, so the things of God I receive will be all the more precious to me to remain faithful in my calling. God's Word, the Liturgy, hymns, the catechism, the blessed Sacraments—they all point to me to Jesus. I can't rely on my strength but the Holy Spirit will keep me in the one true Faith. Jesus' suffering and death forgives us and helps us make it through our suffering and death. Thanks be to God He gives us what we need.

Christians who believe what God says about marriage don't lose heart. Remain faithful and speak the truth in love. If bad days are coming our way and we must suffer for Christ, if we can do it with joy and love, this will speak volumes to those around us. It may even bring those lost in this twisted world to come join us (like many did in the early days of the Church) because we have something they don't have: hope, eternal life, freedom in Christ. God is faithful and He has given forgiveness and peace in His Son Jesus. By the grace of God this is all we need.

Jordanians question Chattanooga shooter's family in Mideast

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) — Jordanian offiity out of concern it would have business recials are questioning relatives of the shooter in last week's killing of five U.S. servicemen in Tennessee at a military recruiting office and a Navy-Marine operations center, a Jordanian official said Tuesday.

Meanwhile, authorities in Qatar say Kuwait-born Muhammad Youssef Abdulazeez, who killed four Marines and one sailor in the Chattanooga attack, transited through the Gulf nation on his way back from a 2014 visit to Jordan but never set foot outside the airport.

Jordanian authorities have been questioning relatives of Abdulazeez as part of an investigation into the time he spent in the kingdom last year, a government official said Tuesday.

The official, who would not elaborate on the probe, spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to discuss details of the case with journalists.

A person close to Abdulazeez's family has told the AP that he spent several months in Jordan last year under a mutual agreement with his parents to help him get away from drugs, alcohol and a group of friends whom his relatives considered a bad influence.

The person spoke on condition of anonym-

Jordan is one of the most Westernized countries in the Middle East, with alcohol sold openly. However, the kingdom has also seen the spread of Islamic militant ideas in recent years, especially following the Arab Spring uprisings of 2011.

The Jordanian government official declined comment when asked whether the investigation of Abdulazeez also include possible ties

Media reports have suggested Abdulazeez also visited the small, energy-rich nation of Qatar on the 2014 trip. But Qatar's government insisted his time in the country was limited to its gleaming international airport.

"At no time did Mr. Abdulazeez enter the State of Qatar. Statements suggesting Mr. Abdulazeez entered the State of Qatar are false," Qatar's government media office said in a statement responding to questions from The Associated Press

It said Abdulazeez changed planes at Doha's Hamad International Airport on his way from Amman, Jordan in November en route to the
