Crashing first into two "wild" cars and then into a local freight which had sought frantically to re-capture the runaway cars, the northbound Zephyr last Friday night was involved in a near-disastrous wreck, which sent 21 persons to local hospitals but with none seriously injured.

The crash was at a point a mile east of Memphis and atop a 50-foot embankment. Passengers and trainmen alike were thankful that none of the passenger coaches of the streamlined train, which was rounding a curve at a 70-mile an hour clip, was toppled into the creek bed below.

The first flag raised at Chateau Supply in Europe

A thumbnail summary of food
