#### **Hog and Cattle Prices are Firm** In Southwest

Most southwest farm products, except vegetables, eggs and cotton, held firm during the past week, the War Food Administra- a husband?" the spinster says. tion reports.

In contrast to the trend at most other markets, Chicago cattle continued downward under heavy receipts. Southwest cattle prices went up only 25 to 50 cents during the week despite lighter of ferings, indicating the meat rationing and price control as well as set aside requirements, exercised a restraint to keep prices in above at Denver and Fort Worth, but daily tops throughout the one. Southwest generally rang the bell around \$12.50 to \$13.50 per cwt. on medium and good grades.

Most hog prices remained at the ceiling under an active demand, but southwest markets reported a definitely lower trend on feeder pigs and on hogs that produce soft pork. Lighter offerings during the week morrored to some extent recent favorable changes in price control programs. week's receipts were only half the volume for the corresponding week last year, reflecting smaller hog numbers in relation to feed supplies this year.

Despite heavy receipts at southwest and midwest markets, sheep prices held full steady and lambs gained 25 to 50 cents per cwt. Kansas City reported the heaviest run for any week since last March. National Stockyards paid \$15.00 to \$15.35 for southwest fed lambs at the close of the week Southwest wools sold in moderate volume on the Boston market.





# MOOS OF THE MOMENT

of the Kraft Dairy Farm Service



If you think that cartoon is just another funny picture, draw up an easy chair alongside of me and I'll prove that it makes sense. A well planned pasture system really puts dollars in the dairyman's pockets.

To prove how true that is, an extension bulletin I read recently reports a survey made in seven dairy areas. This survey showed that onefrom pastures, but that this third cost only one-seventh of the total feed bill.

In addition to your permanent pasture, you need temporary pastures to provide forage from the earliest possible date in spring to the latest date in the fall.

Emergency pastures take up the slack in mid-summer when perma-nent pasture burns. They also give you grazing in the fall which will postpone barn feeding.

I have just received a new pasture handbook from the Extension Service at the University of Illinois. Urbana, Ill. It is Bulletin 505 which covers rotation pastures in detail.

One of the many interesting things it contains is a table showing the total number of days of pasturing from various pasture crops. It will help you plan the best pasture system for your herd.

Your county agent also can assist you greatly since he knows what crops will do best in your own county. In addition here are some other booklets to get: Extension Circular 193, University of Missouri, Columbia, Mo., and Extension Bulletin B-69, Texas A&M College, College Station, Texas.\*



I'm strong for the younger genera-tion and I'm quite sure that if the younger generation is strong, the future will be brighter. Certainly the future of dairying hinges on raising strong, healthy calves.

The proper feeding and manage ment of calves is a most important job. Give them a good start in life and you've taken a big step in improving your dairy herd.


A rule of thumb says to feed calves a pound of milk per day for each ten pounds of body weight. How-ever, if your milk is high in butterfat, feed slightly less than that amount. If using a commercial calf starter, follow the manufacturer's directions. Calves, the same as small children, can get tummy aches if they get too much or the wrong kind of food.

Calves should be encouraged

ten days to two weeks. Coarsely ground oats and corn mixed with about 20% wheat bran is a good starting grain ration.

At two weeks, give the calf handful of choice, green leafy hay. At eight weeks, the calf should be off milk and needs up to 4 lbs. of grain concentrate, plus all the good regular heifer ration at 16 weeks.

For further details on calf feeding, I suggest you get Bulletin 377 from the Extension Service, University of Missouri, Columbia, Mo., and Circular 308, Extension Service, University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wisc.



Here it is near the end of lanuary and I haven't mentioned cooling milk yet-one of my favorite subject of conversation. If the temperature is sliding way down there as you read this, it may sound funny to talk about coving milk, but it should be done after every milking.

Bacteria don't seem to pr much attention to what t thermometer reads outside th milkhouse. As long as the milk temperature holds from 60 to 80, bacteria multiply rapidly. The only way to protect your milk

is to get its temperature down near 50 as fast as possible. The USDA figures millions of pounds of milk are spoiled every year because of lack of proper cooling. That's bad any year, but it's worse this year. You know we are asked to produce 120 billions of pounds of
