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PRESIDENT TRUMAN'S OPPORTUNITIES (The Panhandle Herald)

The Nation has received well the accession of Harry S Truman to the office of vice president of the United States. A check of his ten years as United States senator from Missouri shows that he has obtained a much better background to serve as president than most persons had believed possible.

Willingness of President Roosevelt to have him as a run ning mate in 1944 was an indication that Truman was the oughly qualified to serve as his successor.

Truman's record shows that he is progressive and wants to make a public official who will do what is best for our citi-

Indications are that the people of all parties want to give him an opportunity to make a good president. The people are interested in having everything done possible to bring about lasting peace after the close of World War II.

Although it may be Truman's wish to follow much as Of this amount 11 million is in cash possible in the footsteps of President Roosevelt, such a goal will be impractical. Truman must be true to himself, if he is to stamp himself as a leader.

Hi s long experience in the U. S. senate should give him. a leadership in that organization that was not enjoyed in recent years by President Roosevelt. It is doubtful if Truman would take a hand in a program to purge Democratic senators or to attempt to pack the Supreme Court as his predecessor did.

Roosevelt died just as victory was coming in World War II. Like Lincoln, he did not live to go through the reconstruction period that must follow this great war.

President Truman is the leader of the Democratic party The party had built around Roosevelt for four terms and most persons had feared the time when Democrats would have to nominate a successor.

Death has solved that problem. Truman will serve almost four years. Undoubtedly his record will make him the perfect nominee in 1948. Democrats will rally around him and there will not be a fight in the National convention that had been ex

Just as death of President McKinley made Theodore Roosevelt the logical nominee in 1904 and death of President larding made Calvin Coolidge the only choice in 1924, so the mocrats in 1948 will enter their National convention with ly President Truman as the ideal standard bearer.

The long period of adjustment under Truman should put Democratic party in good shape for the campaign in 1948. voters have much to be thankful for the Democratic party.





This USDA leaflet discusses a ogram set up by the Bureau of airy Industry. Twelve pasture ots were planted with various isses and clovers, each plot gettingdifferent seeding. The amount of ilk given by cows pastured on each of the plots was recorded daily.

Using the milk price in that region, t was easy to figure how many dollars worth of milk was produced on each type of mixture. Some very harn differences were found.

milk per acre, with a production

value of \$142 per acre, after deduct-

ing cost of fertilizer, grain supple-

ment, mowing cost, etc. The point is simply thismaybe there is a better mixture of grasses than the one now in your permanent pasture, which will bring more milk per acre. I suggest you look into this, by a visit with your county agent. He can tell you what mixtures have proved best in your county.



The best way to handle an accident or a fire or something of the sort, is to prevent it before it happens. And the best way to control flies is not after they start pestering, but before they hatch.

Sprays may make more comfort for you and the cows at milking time. but Wisconsin points out in Extension Folder 88 that most sprays have very little to do with actual control of the number of flies around the barn.

Fly control starts in the places where flies breed. Houseflies and stable flies breed in manure and moist, rotting bedding material. The best thing to do, particularly at this time of year and on through summer, is to get manure applied to your land as soon and as often as possible.

Some new sprays may be available to farmers soon, using DDT, which will be a big help in controlling flies. Meantime, I know you'll find some interesting ideas in Folder 88, which you can get by writing the Extension Service, University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wisc.\*
