Hospital Need in This Area Placed Before Bradley

The apparent need for a veterans hospital within the next two years at some point in the lower East Panhandle area was admitted by Gen. Omar Bradley, director of the Veterans Administration, reported Horace Tarver and W. C. Davis to Chamber of Commerce directors Monday, following their return from Washington.

This admission, with the statement from General Bradley, that hospital facilities in Texas are to be increased by 1,500 beds by 1948, considerably brightened the prospects for a hospital here, possibly within the next two years, in the minds of the local representatives.

Hospitals in the future, said Mr. Tarver, president of the Memphis Chamber of Commerce, are to be built strictly in accordance with the need of veterans, General Bradley told them.

"A survey which the Veterans Administration has," he declared, shows there are 200,000 veterans Memphis, which is usually accepted as an area for a hospital, and General Bradley told us that we For that reason I am optimistic more so than ever, despite the fact that we got no promise of an mediate hospital."

Both Mr. Tarver and Mr. Davis, who represented the American Legion, were warm in their praise of General Bradley's attitude to ward the future location of hospi

"His only thought," said Mr. Tarver, "seems to be to do what is best for veterans who will need medical care. He outlined to us or a map the location of existing fac ilities, and said definitely that somewhere in the triangle with Amarillo, Muskogee and Spring as the corners, that anoth er hospital will be needed. He said by 1948 the Veterans Admin istration expects to increase its hospital beds by 1,500 in Texas. This is equivalent to 10 hospitals of the size of the Amarillo institu-
