

Applications for payment on Clay Pigeons-If October, November, and December milk, cream, and butter re- You Take Carload ceipts may be turned in after January 1, Lynn L. McKown, secretary of the Hall County ACA, said this week. Approximately \$10,000 in subsidy payments will be given out in the next 60 days, Mr. McKown said.

The rates of pay for the three months will be 17 cents per pound for butterfat, and 70 cents per hundred-weight for whole milk. These rates are slightly higher than that previously paid. The old rates were 13 cents for butter-

fat, and 55 cents for whole milk. Any debts to the AAA, Commodity Credit Corporation, or the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation will be subtracted from the subsidy payments, Mr. McKown pointed out. If the debt is not nore than the subsidy payment, he said, then enough money will be deducted to cover the debt.

All receipts for the payments, which are acceptable from Janpary 1 through February 28, must be in the producer's name, as it is on file in the ACA office, and all applications for payment must be filed and signed by the producer.
