

Since regulations forbid the forwarding of treasury checks beyond the address appearing thereon, they are returned to the place of separation if the address given by the soldier has been changed since the information originally given," Major General W. H. Kasten, chief of finance, U. S. Army, explained.

"Until mustering-out pay has been received in full," he emphasized, "it is imperative that the soldier keep the separation center or station informed of any change of address.

Experimenters Favor Soil Substitute for Seed Box

Amateur gardeners who plan to start seeds early this year will be interested in a substitute for soil which can be used in seed starters. This is vermiculite, a form of mica which is mined in Montana, then subjected to 2,000 degrees of heat. This expands the material twelve times, and makes it light and highly absorbent.

suitable for filling a flat. It should be passed through a sieve, just as soil is, to separate the finer particles, which should be placed on top, in which to sow the seed.

Sow the seeds a little deeper than with soil. The vermiculite will hold water longer than soil, and needs watering less often. The automatic wick method of watering may be used, or the flat may be

of a crime wave, Director Homer Garrison of the state department

of public safety declared recently. The crime rate in Texas cities and towns, Garrison said, jumped 18 per cent in 1945-and this increase was superimposed upon a substantial increase in the pre-

vious year. Forty-six police departments, representing 4,873,000 inhabitants, last year reported a total of 46,898 major offenses to the department of public safety.

That total included 284 murders, a gain of 9.65 per cent; 115 omicides, up 6.48 per cent; 234 rape cases, a gain of 23.16 per cent; 972 robberies, up 20.30 per cent; 10,862 burglaries, a gain of 22.54 per cent; 28,154 thefts, a 313 automobile thefts, up 20.11 per cent.

The increase in rural crime will be even greater than that in cities. Garrison said.

To secure your 1946 License Plate you must present your Texas Certificate of Title (this is the photographed copy) and also the registration receipt you received from the county office. The Texas Highway Department has notified all county tax collectors to require each car and truck owner to bring the photographed copy before the 1946 plate can be issued.

If you do not have this you should make application for your Title immediately.

If you are to continue to drive your car, the 1946 plate must be on your car by

Midnight, April 1

By law your county tax collector is compelled to abide by these orders. Your cooperation and your immediate attention to the matter of securing a Texas Certificate of Title will be greatly appreciated and will save you a costly delay in time.



The Amarillo Times: Industry is seeking to modernize equipment in order to offset the dilemna caused by increased costs as pre sented by wage rises on the one hand, and on the other, limits placed on price of goods produced. It has been estimated that over \$9,000,000,000 will be spent this year in plant improvements, more than twice the figure for war years, but less than what was expenued in the boom year of 1929. Unions as a whole are opposed to mechanical improvements, fearing a resultant decrease in needed working hours. Management claims that, following this same line of reasoning, unions are inelined to dischourage rather than to encourage individual worker efficiency. 

Speaking of children and their susceptibility to tuberculosis, Dr. George W. Cox, state health ofculosis.

"Babies and young children pick up the germs of tuberculosis just as readily as they pick up the germs of measles, whooping cough, or any of the so-called children's diseases. But tuberculosis is different in certain particulars. Unlike most diseases, it has more than one form. Babies who get tuberculosis may not show the symptoms we associate with the disease in older people. But the disease in most cases develops rapidly and is likely to end fatally. 
