Prospects for Hall County's heat crop to materialize into dollars and cents were greatly increased when a slow rain Tues-day night and Wednesday morning netted a total of 1.07 inches, according to a report from J. J.

The rain apparently was general over a large area. Other counties surrounding Hall reported about the same amount of loisture to indicate that the rain will be beneficial to all of this part of the Panhandle.

The rain came in with a high wind and a drop of temperature late Tuesday afternoon and night. The temperature fell to a low of 40 degrees, following a number of days which had generally been warm and pleasant.

When Shale Is Hit At Depth of 5,985

Equipment Being Removed This Week; Contractors Announce No New Tests

Once again hopes for oil in this area fell to a low level as it was announced that the Humble Oil company test well near Swearingen in Collingsworth County was abandoned last week.

Drilling was halted at a depth of 5,985 feet when the drill came in contact with blue shale, the next thing to granite, Paul Cunningham, representing the drilling contractors, said.

The drilling equipment was torn down Monday, and removal of the derrick started Tuesday. Almost all of the structure has now been removed.

The test was begun early in January, and the drilling contractors, Gardner Bros. of Odessa. were scheduled to go down to 5,-500 feet. When that depth was reached, the drilling continued, however, until the shale was hit. The test was on section 58,
