Due to the heavy demand by the public for material of this type, each purchaser will be limited to the amount of scrap lumber he may purchase.



With a total of 5,906 cases of numps having been reported in Texas in the first 17 weeks of his year, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, has issued a statement stressing the fact that the contagion factor exists before symptoms appear, and urging strict isolation of all patients, in order to control the spread of this disease.

Mumps is transmitted by direct contact with an infected persand with articles freshly soiled b the secretions or discharges from the mouth or nose of persons hav ing the disease. It takes from 12 to 26 days for mumps to manifest itself after the infection takes place. The disease can be

In its first 95 days, the strike at plants of the J. I. Case Co. prevented manufacture of approximately 57,500 new farm machines - tractors, combines, balers, plows, planters, disc harrows, etc.

IT ALSO STOPPED PRODUCTION OF RE-PLACEMENT PARTS.

The strike was called because the company rejected the union's demand for a 30 percent wage increase, the closed-all-union shop, the check-off, payment of union representatives for time spent on union business, and preference in overtime work for union officials.
