# **Prospects Good** For Bumper Crop Of Fruit in Texas

Prospects for a bumper fruit crop are good over all parts of Texas, according to C. R. Heaton, horticulturist of the Texas A. and M. Colege extension service.

But, like the farmer who was addened by his wonderful potato Peacock said. crop because there were no culls for the hogs. Heaton says the it was explained, for the classes, heavy load of fruit is using up recreation, fellowship, and fun. so much plant food that there is a slow groth of limbs and twigs.

Next year's fruit crop, he points out, will be borne on the new wood now forming.

Since there will be lots of fruit on the market anyhow, Heaton recommends that fruit be thinned out from 4 to 6 inches. He suggests leaving the better quality fruit, removing the fruit that has been damaged by hail, brown rot, peach scab, or curculio. This will throw some strength to the new growth of limbs and twigs and Sunday afternoon. will result in a high percentage of large quality fruit.

Many sandy soils are short on nitrogen and a top dressing of a pound of nitrate of sod or ammnium sulphate per tree in late May or early June will help hold fruit and promote groth. If the trees show they need it-by light colored or slow wood growth-a 200 pound per acre application of a balanced
