The farmer must grow into the business of diversified farming. Start on a small scale and learn as he goes. In this way he can increase his knowledge, as well as his income.

He can establish and maintain a firm financial position, by using the diversified method of farming.

Safety—SUGGESTIONS

Editor's Note: The following is a list of safety suggestions and helpful hints for drivers, published in the interest of the present campaign of the department of public safety to have each driver equipped with an operator's license.

The present law requires each person who makes application for an operator's license to pass an examination. The examination is given to determine whether drivers know the laws and rules of traffic, whether the person has the proper eyesight, whether the person knows the highway signs and what they mean, whether the

person can handle a car skillfully, etc.

A written test is given, and is followed by a practical driving test. Before the practical driving test is given, the vehicle is first checked for brakes, etc., and the test will not be given in a defective car.

In the test itself, the examiner will not attempt to trick the person taking the test. The driver should carry out correctly the instructions of the examiner, but should also ascertain that the way is clear before carrying out the things the examiner tells him to do.

A state highway patrolman is in Memphis each Saturday, and the first and third Monday mornings of each month, to give the tests. He may be contacted in the office of the justice of the peace in the courthouse.

Editorial

AIRPORT DREAM TO BE A REALITY

IT IS INDEED gratifying to see that the taxpayers of Memphis are overwhelmingly ready and willing for an airport to become a reality instead of a dream for this city.

The vote giving the city council the green light by a 13 to 1 majority indicates clearly that the citizens of Memphis are becoming air minded in a big way now that the war is over. Perhaps those veterans, many of whom were in the air arm of the armed forces, had much to do with it.

It is true, of course, that many of the voters were young men and women, but it is also true that many of those who voted Friday are past middle age. Some of the older people who cast ballots were overheard to say: "Maybe I don't intend to fly, but I don't want to stand in the way of those who do." And even some of the younger voters were overheard to make similar remarks.

The Democrat, as readers have already become aware, is highly in favor of an airport for Memphis. It is realized, of course, that \$15,000 will not be a sufficient amount to buy the land and buy an airport comparable to those in large cities. It is further realized that Memphis does not need an airport of such proportions.

But Memphis does need to get in on the ground floor of aviation, even if the space allotted to this city on that floor is small. Years ago, Memphis citizens found that they were glad the city was located on a railway line. Still later they were glad that this city was located on a well-traveled highway. Passenger traffic is important, but freight traffic is even more important.

In the years ahead, and perhaps not many years at that, air travel and air freight are to become extremely important. If this city has no place for planes to land, **NO PLANES WILL LAND.**

For that reason, Memphis had to have an airport. And now that dream will materialize soon into a reality. There are 234 people (those who voted for the airport bonds) that we want to congratulate.



Hedley Man With Occupation Army Sent to Sendai, Japan

Staff Sergeant Joel A. Plunk Hedley is at present a member of the 85th military government company, whose purpose it is to assure that the policies of the occupation army are being adhered to, and its requirements are being met in the presence of Miyagi and Iwate.

Sgt. Plunk is one of about 70 men who serve under Lt. Col. Thomas M. Sessions, commander of the 85th military government in Sendai, seat of IX Corps Headquarters and home of 220,000 Japanese.

Nearly every facet of Japanese life is under the supervision of the government in fulfilling its mission. It inspects schools, factories, and mines, supervises programs of health and welfare, observes political activities, checks collection and distribution, investigates suspected infractions of occupational directives and checks prices of commodities, as well as being responsible for the procurement of all supplies and for the Japanese that are necessary to the occupation army.

The 85th military government company's quarters are in a building formerly used by an insurance firm. The company boasts a PX, barber, tailor, and a canteen. Games available to the men are ping pong, billiards, volleyball, and badminton. Venues can be obtained for organized recreation, such as hunting and fishing trips. And best of all, this is done by Japanese personnel.

Sgt. Plunk is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Plunk of Hedley, Texas, who entered the army in September, 1914, trained at Camp Hood, Texas, and sailed for overseas in November, 1945. At present he is working in the section that handles the procuring of real estate from the Japanese.

June 30 is the last date on which discharged army men may return to the service with their former rating, recruiters in Memphis said this week.

To re-enlist, the recruiters said, apply at the Memphis post office where the recruiters will be stationed for the remainder of this week. The recruiters here are with the army air corps.

Re-enlistments are being taken on the following bases: (1) If you have been out less than 90 days and you enlist now, you can retain your grade and obtain an enlistment bonus; (2) if you have been out more than 90 days and were discharged on or after May 12, 1945, and enlist now, you can enlist in a grade commensurate with your training and experience; and (3) officers, warrant officers, and flight officers, who are not eligible to enlist in the first grade under previous regulations and enlist now, can enlist in a grade commensurate with their training and experience.
