# Proposed Constitutional Amendments

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**  
H. J. R. No. 49  
proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1-4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof.

"Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting FOR or AGAINST said proposed amendment."  
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

**S. J. R. No. 5**  
**A JOINT RESOLUTION**  
proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization of the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund (under existing law); provided, however, that one-fourth (1-4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each county and the percentage allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1946, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

**"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE";** and  
**"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE."**

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.  
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.  
Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**  
H. J. R. No. 10  
proposing an amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of the Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of the Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows:  
"Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5 per cent) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."  
"Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (five per cent) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of one Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, (being the 5th day thereof\*) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

**"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas;"** and  
**"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas."**

Each voter shall scratch one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.  
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

### Geo. Cox Urges Women to Take Up Study of Nursing

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, is appealing to young women high school graduates to seriously consider the public health profession as a career.

Public health nursing offers many opportunities for women in careers which are highly remunerative and satisfying. Demands for professional nurses now exceed the supply in public health and other fields of work," Dr. Cox said.

"Possibilities of travel, variety of experience, income, and other advantages of the profession compare favorably with those open to women in other careers."

Education for nursing is available in 37 schools in Texas and in classes, which open about September 1. All schools still have vacancies. Applicants should be graduates of high school or have college credit, with a record of good scholastic standing, be in good physical condition, and of good moral character. An interest in people and their problems, also ability to work well with one's hands is necessary.

Prerequisite training in public health nursing includes a 36-month course including vacations, physical, surgical, obstetric, pediatric, psychiatric and community disease nursing are studied. Completion of courses entitles the individual to the diploma of the school and to take state examinations leading to the R. N. certification.

Details regarding nursing education can be secured from hospitals, physicians, nurses' organizations and local health departments, as well as the Texas state department of health.

### New Magazine, Texas Week, to Give State Activities; On Sale August 9

For the first time in its journalistic history, Texas will have its own weekly newsmagazine when "Texas Week," published at Austin, makes its initial appearance on newsstands throughout the state, August 9.

Mundell, Amarillo, staff photographer; Robert "Windy" Winn, staff artist; Vance Johnson, Washington correspondent; Clifford Maitland Sage, Dallas, book editor; and a corps of field correspondents.

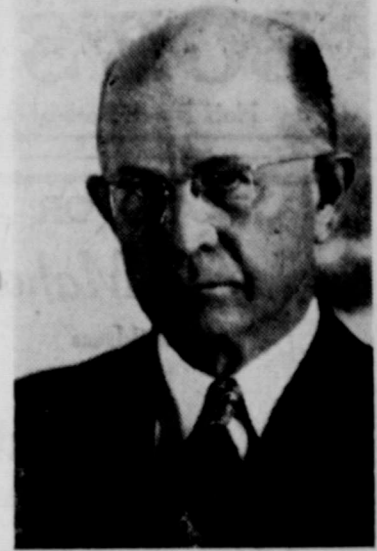

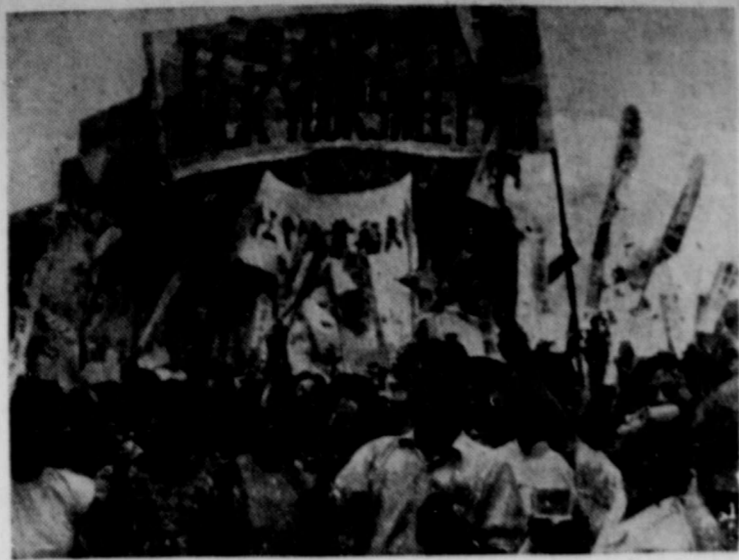

### Building of Soil Not Long Process, Agronomist Says

The notion that soil building is always a long and tedious process is being refuted these days by Dr. Roy L. Donahue, associate professor of agronomy for Texas A. and M. College. One season is sufficient, he thinks, to prove the dollars-and-cents value of a good soils program.

Donahue, supervisor of the extension service farm unit demonstration program, cites the case of Fred P. Swann of Smith County. Swann reports: "One day I run my cattle on the phosphated pasture and the next day they are grazed on the non-phosphated part. Each day they are on the phosphated pasture I get about 10 gallons more milk." Swann adds that where he applied ammonium nitrate on his phosphated pasture, the grass stayed greener than where he did not use it.

Another Smith County demonstrator, J. H. Mills, is building land with the use of barnyard manure, hairy vetch, phosphate, and ammonium nitrate. In 1944 he produced 60 bushels of corn on land that has been in cultivation about 100 years and has been considered worn out for twenty years. M. L. Gary of the same county reported to County Agricultural Agent W. M. Young that phosphate has increased his seed yields 100 per cent. He harvested oats, vetch, and clover for seed.

Gary grows his oats on deep sandy land and gets 25 to 40 bushels per acre annually.

Reports from Titus County are similar. L. M. Blanchett says phosphate applied on his sericea lespediza meadow increased the quality and amount of hay. "In 1945, I harvested one and one-half tons of hay per acre, while I made only one-third ton per acre on the check plot where I

applied no phosphate. "Another Titus County demonstrator, Willard Cameron, made so much hay he turned one meadow over to a neighbor.
