





Here's Right Way **To Preserve Eggs**

Fresh eggs, now seasonally abundant, can be frozen successfully for future use if a few simple steps are followed in preparation and packaging. Gwendolyne Jones, specialist in food preservation for the A. and M. College extension service, offers the fol-lowing suggestions to homenakers


Use fresh clean eggs. Break hem into a clean bowl and beat or churn them thoroughly until the yolks are broken and well mixed with the whites. Beating prevents gumminess of the yolk during storage. However, be careful not to whip in air. Whites may be separated from the yolks and packaged without churning, but the yolks should be slightly. If eggs are to be used for cakes or sweets, add one tea-

spoon sugar, corn syrup, or honey for each cup. If they are to be used for scrambled eggs or salad dressing, add one teaspoon salt for each cup.

Plain tin is the most desirable container for eggs. Air-tight and leak proof paper cartons also may be used. Freeze in small amounts so that they can be used soon

Hormone Chemical May Put Bindweed Where It Belongs

The bindweed has become one the most pernicious pests against which farmers of the Southwest have to contend. A hormone chemical has been developed to control and eradicate this pest. It is known as 2,4-D, and agricultural experts agree that it is the best method yet devised for control of the weed, which in the past has claimed the productivity of thousands of acres of rich farming lands.

Though not entirely fool-proof the action of 2.4-D is far supe rior to routine techniques in kill-

methods was spraying with sodium chlorate. However, the cost of this method is significantly higher than that of 3,4-D. Some years ago a survey indicated solium chlorate spray costs \$30 to \$40 an acre. Estimates on the 2,4-D method

run between \$4 and \$6 an acre, depending upon the type of solution used.

Another factor which tended to ncrease cost of sodium chlorate was a recommendation that sevral plowings a year be made on infested land as an aid to the killing effects of the spray.

The sodium chlorate method has inherent potentialities which makes its use less desirable than 2,4-D. or one thing, the sodium reatment is a fire hazard, particularly in hot dry weather. Stubble treated with sodium chlorate and matted grasses may catch fire on extremely hot days.





To help prevent feed waste in the face of today's shortages, its "secret" weapons. The visitlivestock authorities today urged ing pitcher threw over a "ball,' a special effort this month to com-bat enterities in the state's swine herds.

Hogs afflicted with "necro" are unable to utilize feed properly and do not gain weight in proportion to the feed consumed, even though they may otherwise appear to be in normal health, the American Foundation for Animal Health pointed out.

Farmers were urged to take these three steps to combat enteritis among their swine:

"1. When new feeder pigs are purchased, segregate them from the home herd until they are proved free of disease.

"2. When pigs develop digestive troubles, variations in temperature or loss of weight, move well animals away from them, and obtain a veterinary diagnosis at once. This diagnosis is extremely important because the symp-
