

JATO ASSURES TURTLE RECORD

Official Navy photographers made a pictorial record as the Truculent Turtle, a Lockheed Neptune P2V land based patrol bomber powered by two Wright Duplex Cyclone engines, took off from Perth, Australia, in October to establish a nonstop record of 11,236 miles to Columbus, O., in 55 hours and 18 minutes. Com. T. D. Davies, of Cleveland, O. ordered the plane equipped with four Jato units (jet assisted take-off) which enabled him to take off with an 85,500pound load, the greatest load ever airborne by a two-motor airplane. The above pictures show the Turtle taking off at Perth. It had Jato units attached to both sides of its rear fuselage, and with each unit developing thrusts equivalent to 330 hp., the big bomber was helped to rise easily into the air for its record-breaking trip.

HERE is a woman who tells how happy she is when she is washing dishes at a kitchen sink. And she means every word of it. She has two college degrees. One is Master of Arts from Columbia University.

She is Borghild Dahl, a woman of Norwegian parents, born in Minnesota. She was born with bad eyesight, but she had

a desire to accomplish something worth while in the world. She tells about all this in her remarkable book called, "I wanted to See." As a child she could not see to jump rope with other children. She wanted to play hopscotch with other children, but she could not see the markings. So after the other children had gone, she got down on the ground crawled along, her eyes closer to the marks. Then, the next day, she could play.

She went to the Mayo Clinic for an op-Dale Carnegie eration, for she had only one-fifteenth vision in one eye. This helped her. But

28 years afterward she had to go back for another operation. She was helped and after some of her vision had been restored she said that the loveliest experience, she had ever had in her life was to lie down and watch dawn come out of the blackness of the night. "It was perfectly thrilling !" she says.

She started in the laborious process of again learning to read. And she learned to read in Mother Goose. And the story was the one about Bobby Shafto. The print was large, but it took her a long time to read the story. "When I got through, I thought I had accomplished a miracle."

When the second operation was performed, she was able to see 40 times as well as she had ever been able to see in her life. So that is what she means when she says she loves to stand at the kitchen sink and wash dishes. "Through the window I can see a flock of sparrows flying in the air. Oh! they are very beautiful. How much I have to be thankful for."

And indeed she has. She can go around once more without a Seeing Eye dog, she can make a living for herself, she does not have to depend on anyone. She is now called upon to lecture, and also she teaches.

Thousands of Texas farm and ranch operators must soon bring out their pencils and record books and start figuring income tax reports.

All farmers with a gross income of \$500 or more arc required to file a return. C. H. Bates, farm management specialist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, reminds the farmer that he has this choice in paying income tax: he can file a declaration of his estimated 1946 net income by January 15, followed by a final return by March 15, or. he can make a final return by January 15, in which case he does not have to file a declaration.

While a record number of farmers will pay income taxes for 1946, the average tax bill will be less than in 1545 due to a reduc
