### Wilson W. Ballew Dies In Amarillo

Wilson W. Ballew of Amarillo, one of the Panhandle's earliest automobile dealers, and brother-in-law of Andrew Womack of Memphis, died last Thursday in an Amarillo hospital. Mr. Ballew had suffered from a heart condition for several years. He was 55 years old.

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon in Amarillo. An early-day automobile enthusiast, Mr. Ballew entered Amarillo's infant automobile industry in 1921. He was connected with a garage in Clarendon prior to this time.

He was a member of the Polk Street Methodist Church and of the Woodmen of the World lodge. In past years, he was active in the Elks.

Survivors include the widow, a son, Wilson L. Ballew, a daughter, Mrs. Vivian Penry, all of Amarillo; four brothers, Donald and Elba Ballew of Clarendon, Earl Ballew, Amarillo, and Fred Ballew, Plainview; a sister, Mrs. Carl Gillian, Lubbock; and his brother-in-law, Andrew Womack of Memphis.

Fifteen to twenty lights will be turned on this week in the north-west residential section, and a similar number will be turned on in the east residential section next week, just as soon as the work crew can get to them, Wilson said.

## City Gets New Truck, Street And Cemetery Work Is Speeded

A new city truck was put into operation Monday morning, Mayor C. C. Hodges announces. The new truck, which has a hydraulic dump bed with a gravel capacity of over four yards, has speeded up street work considerably, he said.

One of the two city trucks may now be kept on gravel hauling work at all times. With the new tractor and hydraulic loader, a truck is loaded in six to eight minutes, and men to shovel are no longer necessary, as both loading and dumping are now done mechanically. A truck now loads gravel at the pit, unloads on the street work location and returns for another load in a few minutes. Before the new equipment was obtained only seven or eight loads per day were possible, Hodges said.

The Grand Champion title went to a 970 pound whiteface fed by Carroll Fowler of Lakeview, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Fowler. Fowler, consistent winner of 4-H awards, won this title last year. The calf brought \$425 at the auction when it was purchased by the West Texas Cottonoil Mill of Memphis. The award was \$30.

The Reserve Champion of the show was a dry-lot fed calf raised by Jimmy Bownds, son of Mrs. Hester Bownds of Memphis. The calf, weighing 1,075 pounds, brought \$412.50 when it was purchased by the First National Bank of Memphis. The Reserve Champion award was \$20.

First place in the coveted showmanship award, offered for the first time this year, was won by John Luther Byars of Lakeview. Harold Rampy of Lakeview won second. First place was awarded \$15, second place \$10.

Another 1947 innovation was the crowning of the 4-H and FFA king and queen. Martha Pearl Davenport and Harold Rampy, both of Lakeview, were selected for this honor by fellow club members Friday night, at a banquet given by Clyde Milam at Pound's Cafe.

## Estimate 300 Coyotes Killed In Precinct 3

The February coyote campaign in Precinct 3 has ended, and reports have shown that it has been very effective, Judge John Russell reported this week.

Jack Boney, stock farmer near Parnell, said that he and other farmers in the precinct had counted 129 dead coyotes, and since only a small part of the poisoned area had been covered he thought an estimate of 300 dead wolves would be very conservative.

Poisoning was started after several reports had been made of rabid coyotes in Precinct 3. The commissioners' court, working with the county agent's office, obtained a representative of the Livestock Sanitary Commission to put out poison during February. The commission would only put out poison in Precinct 3, since that was the only precinct reporting rabid coyotes.

The coyote bounty of \$2 per scalp, stopped while the poisoning was in progress, has been restored, Judge Russell said.

The Saturday Evening Post recently published an editorial which should be read and remembered by every coal miner in the United States. Entitled, "Will Coal Price Itself Out of the Market?" it deals with a simple and incontrovertible economic truth which Mr. Lewis' followers seem to have forgotten.

The Post says, "Demand for any commodity for which substitutes exist can never be considered fixed or taken for granted." Coal is our primary source of industrial energy—but other sources, such as oil and natural gas, can be employed for many of the same purposes. Coal, in other words, is a competitive commodity—and it must seek its markets in the face of growing competition.

The Post cites a few thought-provoking statistics. Not so many years ago, all railroad locomotives were coal fired. During 1945, on the other hand, the Class 1 railways installed 534 diesel and electric locomotives—as against only 109 powered with steam. A similar situation exists in the field of home heating. In 1940, 39 per cent of all FHA-financed homes used coal. By comparison, of the first 629,000 permits issued for home building under the veterans' priority plan, but 27 per cent specified the use of coal—and the balance specified other fuels.

Some of these changes are evolutionary in nature, and to be expected. What they do, however, is to point to the possible economic consequences of an industry when the cost of producing its product rises disproportionately. To quote the Post once more, "It is certainly no service to the miners to make extravagant demands which can only result in such drastic increases in cost as to price coal out of its market and coal miners out of jobs." The primary interest of labor, in any field, is the preservation of profitable, progressive industry capable of providing continuous employment. Beyond a certain point, higher wages can only result from increased production or more efficient production—if the industry in question is to survive. That is the hard truth, difficult as it may be for some labor leaders to accept.
