## FHA Announces 1947 Crop and Home Loan Plan

Loans are now being made to finance 1947 crop production, and for home operation, according to the local office of the Farmers Home Administration. Robert C. Land, FHA supervisor for Hall County, and W. D. Young, FHA field supervisor, have offices in the old Hall County National Bank building.

These loans are to be made with additional security or with just the crops as security, depending upon the conditions, it was said.

Loans to finance production or purchase livestock feed are also made by the agency.

## Coach Curtis Kelley Gives Resignation To School Board

Coach Curtis Kelley tendered his resignation as a member of the faculty of Memphis High School to the school board this week. In making the announcement, he stated that the resignation would become effective April 1.

In an interview, Coach Kelley said that in all probability he will remain in the coaching field, but that no definite plans had been made at this time.

Kelley came to Memphis in the spring of 1945, and has coached here for the past two years. He handled all phases of athletics in the school the first year, and during the 1946-47 term he has coached boxing and football. He had spent one year coaching prior to coming to Memphis.

During the past two years, Kelley has been active in civic affairs outside his teaching and coaching duties. As a member of the Memphis Lions club he was in charge of that organization's athletic activities. Last summer he was in charge of the recreation program on a city-wide basis.

Coach and Mrs. Kelley and young daughter will leave Memphis as soon as definite plans for the future are completed, he said.

## Former Memphian Dies Saturday

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Cummings received a telegram Saturday informing them of the death of their old friend, W. Lee Williams of San Antonio, a Memphis resident until 1939.

Mr. Williams lived in Memphis for 10 or 15 years, and he was connected with a land company at that time. He had been retired for about four years and was around 75 years old. He and Mrs. Williams celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in December.

## Spare That "Spare" Is Housewives Cry

The OPA announced Wednesday that spare stamp No. 11 will become valid on April 1 for 10 pounds of sugar.

This is the first stamp ever issued with the 10-pound value. Stamp No. 53, which is good for five pounds, will expire on March 31, instead of April 30.

The expiration date of the five-pound stamp was moved up, OPA said "in order to avoid confusion which might be caused by outstanding stamps of both five and 10-pound values."

## Clarendon School Burns Wednesday

Fire, originating from unknown causes, early Wednesday morning virtually destroyed one unit of Clarendon's high school plant, and seriously disrupted school work for the rest of the term.

The north wing of the building, housing the home economics, vocational agriculture departments, football and boxing storage rooms and the band room, was destroyed. Band uniforms valued at \$3,000 and band equipment worth \$2,000 were destroyed, according to reports.

This is the second time in six years that the building has been badly damaged, the first time by a cyclone in June of 1941.

The Public Library Service Demonstration Bill, introduced in congress January 6 by Senator

Lister Hill of Alabama and Senator George D. Aiken of Vermont, has passed its first and second readings and was referred to the Senate Committee on Labor and Public Welfare, which is under the chairmanship of Senator Robert Taft of Ohio.

The House Committee on Education and Labor has not yet been completed, although Congressman Fred A. Hartley Jr. of New Jersey, has been named chairman.

The bill provides: \$25,000 per year for five years as an outright gift to Texas, with no danger of federal control, to set up rural library demonstrations. Demonstrations would work like this:

a. Through outside funds, areas without service are given an example of library possibilities.

b. Demonstration periods usually extend over a period of one to two years.

c. Areas are comprised of: one county—two or more counties—portions of two or more counties—a number of cities or towns in one or more counties, depending on social, economic, geographic, and other features.

d. Outside funds are discontinued at the end of specified period.

The bill also provides \$25,000 to \$75,000 in addition to the outright grant for Texas if the state legislature is willing to appropriate money for state aid to match increased federal allocations.

These price reductions, which will save the users of our products approximately \$20,000,000 a year, will become effective before April 1, and will apply to a selected list of tractor, farm equipment, motor truck, and industrial power equipment. Since we lose money on a few of our products, and barely break even on some others, these reductions will not apply to our entire line. Reductions will be made individually on products. Some will be cut more than others. Exact details will be announced as soon as possible.  
Our ability to maintain this lower level of prices will depend in part on what happens to the prices and flow of materials that we buy from other producers. Because we believe price reductions are vital, we are willing to assume the risks involved.

These price reductions had not gone up as much or as fast as many others

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## Editorial

### LUXURIES VS NECESSITIES

An authority on large-scale merchandising recently made this sage observation: "At the end of the first world war consumers seemed to have the money to purchase all the luxuries and then they complained they could not afford the necessities. That seems to be the situation today." He cites the case of a woman who recently bought a very expensive fur coat—and then complained bitterly at an increase in the price of soap which could not add more than five dollars a year to her living expenses.

There are signs that this "silk shirt" attitude is diminishing. A good many of the "anything-at-any-price" buyers have finally run out of cash, and others are beginning to realize that spendthrift policies are not good for either individuals or the nation. And it is to the credit of retail merchandising that, for the most part, it is not trying to encourage reckless spending—nor is it attempting to profit unduly by charging all the traffic will bear.

The chain stores long ago announced a policy of holding prices to the lowest possible level, whether or not governmental controls existed. The majority of independent stores have pursued a similar policy. And the inexorable laws of competition are taking care of the occasional merchant who wants to exploit the unwary purchaser. Under the competitive system, prices find their own natural level, whether that level be high or low. In any event, it will be the level established by the costs and conditions of the time.

### THE CHIMERA OF LOWER RATES

The electric rates charged consumers in the City and County of Sacramento, California, should be reduced by \$228,000 per year. That is the sum which the private utility serving the region paid property taxes—and which was lost on December 31 when a tax-exempt municipal utility district took over the taxing private company.

In the words of the Sacramento Union, the private utility in question, "served the district well for 50 years, and is entitled to its collective thanks." But despite that, the people of Sacramento decided to try an experiment in socialization, and one of their oldest, largest and most dependable taxpayers was chosen for the sacrifice.

Now experience will prove whether the operators of the municipal district have the experience and the know-how that is needed to properly operate so large a venture. Time and time again rates have not been reduced. And when they are reduced, the total saved is almost invariably substantially less than the tax loss to the community that results when taxpaying private enterprise goes out, and socialized tax-exempt enterprise comes in.

The people of Sacramento may be optimistic as to the future of their municipal system. But they shouldn't be surprised if it turns out to be the expensive luxury when all costs, including taxes, are figured.

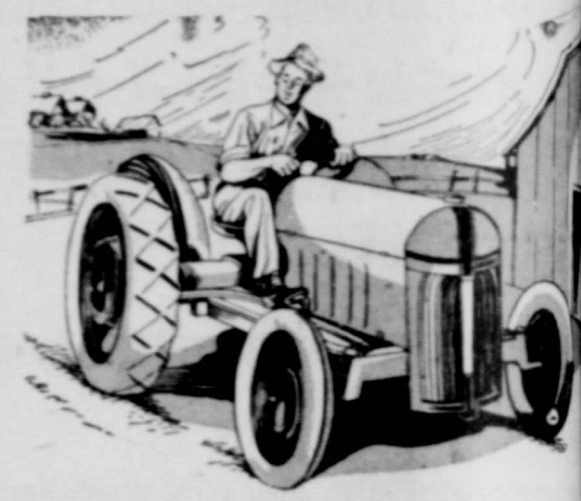

**Tire Men Set Strike For Sunday**  
CLEVELAND, March 17. (AP)—Next Sunday at midnight, a strike by 100,000 members of the United Rubber Workers, CIO, against the "big four" of the industry, as negotiations for a wage increase collapsed.  
The "big four"—Goodyear, Goodrich, Firestone and U. S. Rubber—have 42 plants in 20 states, scattered from coast to coast. Last year they produced a record total of 70,000,000 tires.
