He is Rev. Bedford W. Smith, one of the hardest working and most conscientious ministers in these parts.

"Although everyone knows that Lew Ayres was a conscientious objector, he worked with me as my chaplain's assistant for 20 months, part of the time in the Southern California desert on maneuvers and the rest of the time in the Pacific, from Hollandia in Dutch New Guinea on up to the Philippines," recalls Rev. Smith.

Many incidents are cited by the Memphis minister to support his assertion that the movie star was a "conscientious worker at his job as well as a conscientious objector to war."

"Before going over, Lew vol-untarily asked that his rank be reduced from sergeant to private first-class so that another soldier could get the promotion because he needed the extra money so bad," Mr. Smith says. "Lew was very popular with the soldiers and he didn't drink or smoke, being a clean fellow in all of his habits. Paul began his Epistles about the year 52; the Gospels were begun three years later. Mark's Gospel was the first written, and John's the last. Matthew, Mark, and Luke are known as the Synoptics because their Gospels are much alike, even to phraseology. John's Gospel is different from the others, both in its narratives and the purpose of the author.




BLOOD PRESSURE BOTH HIGH AND LOW

In The Lap Of Congress

A report made by the U. S. Chamber of Commerce had this to say about the electric power situation: "In two sections of the country, the Tennessee Valley and the Pacific Northwest, public power has driven private capital out of new plant construction. These regions today find themselves right back in the lap of Congress, where they must plead their need for development, project by project, before appropriation committees

These appropriation committees are accountable to people of all sections of the country whose tax money they spend. They will want equitable distribution among all Congressional Districts, and it will be no surprise if representatives of other areas are a bit lackadaisical in caring for complaints about 'power shortages' in those areas now, allegedly, dependent on Congress.

When any region gives the government a monopoly of an essential service, or when it permits the threat of continuing socialization to prevent private development, it is simply asking for trouble. Its progress or lack of it depends upon the whims of Congress, which may change drastically from session to session. It is placed in the position of a mendicant, asking for alms.

Ambitious plans are now in the blueprint stage for establishing more power monopolies based on the TVA model. in other areas. If those plans go through, these areas will also find themselves "in the lap of Congress." The private power industry, which always did a superb job of handling the demand in the past, will be powerless. Even if it is not entirely no investor will risk his money when the prospect of socialization is imminent. "Public power" is one way of depriving the public of power it would otherwise have! Power shortages seem to be by-products of political power monopolies.





and in his public appearances here in Washington appears to be in an amiable mood, full of the forgiving spirit of the holiday season, those closest to the President declare there has been no softening in his determination to push through his entire program pledged to the people in his campaign.

These observers declare the President doesn't want to "punish" anybody but at the same time he will not tolerate opposition from within his own party on the program he has sought for more than two years to extend, amplify and create new legislation which he regards as for the best interest of the masses of the people.

For this reason it is apparent that some of the moss-grown congressional rules must be eliminated. So the President is looking toward his leadership in the senate, notably vicepresident-elect Alben Barkley, to eliminate the filibuster menace in the senate, and to speaker-elect Sam Rayburn to clip the wings of the powerful rules committee. . . .

Fast action on some few measures and months of hearings over others will be the rule in the new congress. For instance, export control expires at the end of February. Immediate attempt to strengthen this control to prevent some of the fraud practiced under present law will get priority. The economic recovery administration and its program must be renewed in April.

The reciprocal trade agreements do not expire until June but there will be an attempt to repeal the 80th congress' provisions and extend the law for three years.

A new set-up, almost immediately, for the house un-American activities committee is in the cards. Congress man J. Hardin Peterson of Florida, a committee member, wants to make t a joint senate-house committee. Rent control runs out at the end of March and a new rent control extension law will be one of the early actions.
