FIRE SPREADS FAST: TRUCKS SHOULD SPEED, BILL VARDEMAN THINKS

Bill Vardeman, fireman deluxe and good fellow extraordinary, was up in the air a bit this week!

He sat down to his desk and took up his pen to write an article for the paper. "Firemen go to blazes slow

That was the heading. "Memphis, almost everybody, including the police, thinks the fire trucks speed wildly on a trip to a blaze," he wrote. Then be added:

"But that's only an illusion." Bill wrote on:

"Actually, we found from a survey, that city fire trucks seldom go over 35 miles an hour. They don't have to because most fire stations are within a half mile of a fire.

"Since most engines don't speed excessively, it is vital that home-owners act the instant a blaze is discovered. It is also essential that they know how to summon the fire department quickly."

To carry his point a little further and more conclusively, Bill added weight to his warning by saying:

"Fires often increase 50 times in size within the matter

of eight minutes." We believe Bill Vardeman has something for all of us to think about.

He should take up that pen more often as the public can never learn too much about how to help put out fires.



ANCIENT BIBLE-Lee Ford, Memphis cafe operator, is shown checking his Bible, which has been in his family for 155 years, or since it was printed in Edinburg, Scotland, in 1793. Lee says his father had the Bible in his possession for 40 years, inheriting it from his parents. Lee has had it for 35 years now, since the death of his father, James A. Ford. That accounts for 75 years. The ancient book has several pages of records of births of various members of the family down through the years, the first name being that of one Nathanial Moore, born December 18, 1857. The big Bible has several extra books that are not included in the modern version now in use. This copy carries the notation on the fly leaf that it was "Printed by Mark and Charles Kerr, His Majesty's Printers." Lee Ford has loaned the Bible to his friend, Rev. T. E. Why Wait On Providence?

The flat truth about out state's extravagant and cruel political pension system was laid down here Thursday in the frankest talk the writer has ever heard a state official make.

James Land, assistant director of the state department of public welfare, told the Rotary club that the Texas pension system can't even pretend to be effective. Texas has more pensioners than any state in the union, but gives none of them enough pension to live on.

Mr. Land outlined some of the contributory factors, such as inadequate medical care, too little conservation of the soil, too few workers covered by social security, and low per capita

But he conceded that the one great flaw in our system is precisely the thing we were discussing here last week: The Texas pension system was not and it not designed to be effective.

It was designed to win the votes of the old people-all of them, if possible. And by now our legislators are afraid to initiate the changes which could make our pension system closed meetings are automatically boards, it will be very much worthequitable and effective.

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

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


