

ANDERSON CALLS FOR RECOUNT

Rich Anderson has asked for a recount of the votes cast in the November 4 election. He has mailed a petition to Austin asking for a manual recount in Reeves county where they vote by punch card ballots and are counted by computer.

Anderson was in Pecos two weeks ago to discuss the election with campaign workers and "they all advised me to ask for a recount," he

"They told of all kinds of allegations involving voting irregularities," Anderson said, but did not elaborate. He did add that it was enough to make him seriously consider a manual recount in that county.

"Machine error is highly possible," Anderson said.


He cited an article in the

Nov. 26 issue of the Austin American Statesman which quotes a Pennsylvania election specialist as telling the House Committee on Elections that computerized vote counting machines such as are used here "can be wildly wrong."

In the Dallas mayoralty race of 1985, Anderson pointed out, a recount changed votes in 62.8 percent of the 250 voting precincts.

There are dozens of ways to tamper with the computer system," Anderson quoted the article as also saying.

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

In the first game against Sterling City, it was the defense that held tough as they held Sterling to just 8 Ihalf time piints and only 14 entering the last quarter. Borden started out cold from the floor and only held an 8-4 first stanza lead before things warmed up. In the 41-29 victory, a balanced scoring attack was more than the Lady Eagles could overcome as Borden had nine players score, none in double figures. Borden hit a decent 44 percent from the field. In the first half, Elana Himes intimidated and dominated as she hit 15 of her game high 17 points in the first two quarters and had 8 of her game high 11 rebounds. Lisha Sternadel nearly matched Elana's scoring output as she had 16 points but she completely took Loraine out of their offense as she came up with a game high 9 steals. A fine defensive performance was turned in by Kelli Williams as she was assigned the duty of stopping Loraine's Beverly Griffin who was averaging nearly 30 points per game. Griffin was held to three field goals, all coming when Borden dropped into a zone. Kristi Stone added 6 points followed by Kelli with 5. 

USE CHRISTMAS LIGHTS SAFELY

In many families, using the same Christmas tree decorations year after year is a tradition. When it comes to Christmas tree lights, however, this could be an unsafe practice.

When you unpack stored lights, take the time to check each set. Inspect the bulbs to make sure they operate and then remove the plus from the socket and inspect the wires.

Check the string of lights from one end to the other, looking for cracked insulation or bare and broken wires, especially where the wire enters a light socket.

If you find cracked insulation, bare wires or cracked sockets, discard the lights, no matter how much you like them. They could be a fire hazard.

Also check the plug to make sure the connections are good. One way to tell without getting a shock is to plug the set into the add-on connector or a second set of lights and plug that set into the socket.

All strings of lights are not the same. Lights may be wired in a series or in parallel circuits. If a bulb goes out on a series circuit, all the lights go off. In a two wire parallel set, the remaining lights continue to burn when one burns out.

If you have minature Christmas tree lights on a parallel circuit, replace any burned out lamps with a bulb of the proper voltage size. Although the other lamps will continue to work if you do

not replace burned out bulbs, they will be subjects to increased electrical power, shortened life and could become a fire hazard in your home.

When you decorate your tree, do not connect more than 200 miniature lights or more than 50 large lamps together through one string or cord.

Large lamp sets should not be connected through miniature lamp sets and indoor lights should not be used outdoors.

Use extension cords that are capable of transmitting the current to the lights without overloading the cord, triggering circuit breakers or blowing protective fuses.

A circuit breaker or fuse which blows when you connect the lights is signaling something is electrically wrong. Do not use that string of lights until you know the extent of the problem and can correct it. If you are in doubt, throw the set away.

If you are buying new miniature Christmas tree lights, look for certification on the package, such as an Underwriter's Laboratory or "UL" label, that shows the set meets the performance specifications of an independent testing laboratory. These sets will have passed a series of performance tests designed to eliminate hazards.

Once you put the lights on the tree, safety precautions are still necessary. Remember to always turn the lights off when you leave home or go to bed.

HUNTERS CAN DONATE VENISON TO SALVATION harvest is greatly

A new program has been initiated by the Salvation Army in Texas to receive donations of venison at 45 Corps Community Centers to be used in feeding indigent families and transients across the state.

"Hunters who have harvested more venison than their family needs are encouraged to donate the extra meat to the nearest Salvation Army Center," says Dr. Fred Cross, community development specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "The centers will accept deer field dressed to fully processed, but the more fully processed carcasses would be most appreciated to reduce operating costs."

Hunting is an important tool in game management and conservation, notes Cross. But many deer hunters often are reluctant to

harvest does. Increased doe harvest is greatly needed in certain areas of the state to bring deer populations more in line with food supplies, and this venison could be donated to The Salvation Army.

Cross reminds hunters to be sure to adhere to regulations in the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Hunting Guide concerning a legible hunter's document, tags or permits when donating a deer carcass. Guides are available from all hunting license dealers.



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
