

"These versions of what causes cancer are all old wives tales,' and the more we of the American Cancer Society can do to discredit hese false notions and bring the rue facts about the disease to the nament. cople of this state, the sooner it will be that Texas conquers can-

"Cancer is not caused by a rerm or infection. It is neither ontagious or infectious. Nor is ancer necessarily herititary. Evilence indicates that children may nherit a certain degree of suscepibility which should make them nore alert to warning signals. But here is no reason to assume that hildren will inevitably die of caner because one or more parents lie of the disease."

The American Cancer Society official pointed out that cancer results when certain body cells rebel against the orderly process of growth and start off on a rampage of lawless expansion, de-struction, and death. What causes this wild and restructive growth is not known.

"Until we do find the causes of eancer and develop additional methods of treatment," he conluded, "we must fight cancer with what we now know.

Most of the inhabitants are Roman Catholics in religion. In the early days of the settlement of Canada the Roman Catholic Church secured many large grants of land throughout Canada and particularly the rich lands along the St. Lawrence river. 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




