Task Force chairmen are Jim Adams, president of the Texas Division of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, and John Cater, president of MCorp
'This 67-member Task Force reflects the commitment and enthusiasm of Texans ready, willing and able to re-energize our state's economy," Clements said.
"Task Force members not only represent a cross-section of Texas, but also bring to the table a wide range of business interests and expertise. These men and women, proven leaders in their fields, will join to develop workable recommendations that can impact the Texas economy.

"Many of these people have already taken a thorough look at problem areas and developed solutions which we need to consider in making our own recommendations and action agendas.

According to Adams, the Task Force will recommend and support legislation in the upcoming 1988 session as appropriate.

'Yes , we'll develop long term plans also, but we recognize the need among Texans for short-term solutions from which momentum can be gained.'
Adams said the Task Force will also look at the role of the Governor's office and various state agencies, and their impact on business development. Where roadblocks to increasing jobs are identified, he said, the Task force will work toward changes in programs and structures.

## Borden Captures Third at Sands Tourney

The Borden Lady Coyotes were the two time defending champions of the Sands Tournament but third time was not charm as Borden dropped their first game of the season in settling for third place in their second tournament. After defeating Forsan on Thursday 58-45, they lost a close four point game, 33-37, to Wilson Friday. They then defeated rival Klondike for third on Saturday by a 42-33 count.
In the first game against Forsan, Borden shot a decent 52 percent from the field as eight people got into the scoring column, six shooting better than 50 percent. Elana Himes led all scorers with 18 points followed by Kelli Williams with 12, Lisha Sternadel with 10, Kate Phinizy with 8, Tammy Johnson and Kristi Stone with 3 each, and Ralynn Key and Elvira Balague with 2 apiece. Kristi, Ralynn, and Elvira all shot 100 percent followed by Elana with 73 percent hitting 8 of 11 . Kelli led in free throw percentage with 100 percent hitting 4 of 4 followed by Lisha who hit 4 of 6 for 67 percent. Elanaled in steals with 7 and Kate had 3. Elana also led in rebounds with 13 and Lisha had 4. Killi, Ralynn, Tammy, and Lisha all had 2 assists. Borden held a slim 10-8 first quarter lead but then shot a blazing 91 percent from the field the second quarter to hold a second quarter to $32-17$ half-time lead.
As hot as the nets were on Thursday, they were as cold on Friday. In the first half, Borden could only manage to hit five of twenty-one from the field, falling behind by only a point 13-14. Borden held Wilson down with good defense but could never gain any momentum on offense as shots continually bounced out. In the low scoring contest, only four people contest, only four people and Elana had 12. Lisha hit 6 and Lynn had 2. Lynn led in field goal percentage with 100 percent and Lisha hit 60
percent, making 3 of 5 . Kelli led in free throw percentage hitting 7 of 7 for 100 percent. Kate and Kelli each had 2 assists, Elana led in steals with 5 and in rebounds with 12. Lynn was next in rebounds with 6 and Kate and Kelli were second in steals with 3.
Then in the third place game, Borden outscored Klondike in each of the first three quarters, 10-5, 12-10, and $10-4$ as they, secured their 10th win of the season 42-33. Field goal percentage was again down but was made up for at the line, connecting on 14 of 19 free throws, compared to Klondike's 11 of 26 . Elana and Kelli continued their double figure scoring attack as they hit for 16 and 12 points respectively. Linda Sternadel made 4 as did Elvira Balague. They were followed by Tammy, Kate, and Lisha with 2 each. Elana and Linda led in field goal percentage with 67 percent, Linda hitting 2 of 3 and Elana with 8 of 12. Kelliagain led in free throw percentage with 100 percent, this time hitting 8 of 8 . She was 19 of 19 for the tournament and has now hit 27 in a row through six games. Kate and Elvira also hit 100 percent making 2 of 2. Tammy was 2 of 3 for 67 percent. Kate led in assists with 4 and Tammy had 3. Elana led in rebounds with 8 and Kelli was close behind with 7. Kelli also led in steals with 4 and Lynn had 3.
At the tournament's conclusion. sophomore Elana Himes was selected to the All-Tournament team. Congratulations go out to her on her fine achievement. Wilson, the team that defeated Borden in the semi-finals, went on to defeat Water Valley in the finals. The game went into eight overtimes and took two and a half hours to play!
The Lady Coyotes record now stands at 10-1 for the season. They play in the Borden Tournament this

Thursday, December 18 against Westbrook. Game time is at 6:30. Coach May and the Lady Coyotes would like to thank everyone who has been traveling and supporting them this year and ask for your continued support. ECONOMIST PREDICTS BETTER PRICES

Agricultural income may increase slightly in 1987 from the depressed level of recent years, according to two Texas Agricultural Extension Service economists.
'Higher livestock pricxses, reduced production expenses and large government payments are expected to support a moderate rise in farm and ranch income," says Dr. Carl Anderson.

Several very positive factors for cattlemen are in prospect for 1987, says Dr. Ernie Davis. Cattle numbers will be lower in 1987. In fact, the U.S. herd likely will drop to 100 or 101 million head. That could mean the smallest cattle numbers nationawide since 1961.
As beef production becomes more alighned with consumer demand, cattle prices should improve. At somewhere between 68 to 72 pounds of beef per person (retail weight basis), beef supply and demand This will stimulate cattle prices to
profitable levels tor the first time since 1979

This may not occur in 1987. however, as beef production is being estimated at 73.6 pounds per person for the year," Davis said.

A longer temm bright spot in the cattle business is the Beef Research and Promotion program, beef and dairy producers will participate in the $\$ 1$-per head checkoff.

With these resources, the beef industry should be able to respond better to consumer needs and with new beef products, Davis said
On the downside, Davis believes tax reform and high retail marketing margins will give cattlemen problems in the near term. New ways to attract research and development capital to improve production efficiency will have to be found.

Despite the sour notes, it appears that cattle and hog prices will rise above this year even with continued increases in poultry output.

## Beware of Coffee Lighteners

Although powdered non-dairy coffee lighteners can boast that they contain no cholesterol, they may still help elevate blood cholesterol levels.

The coconut oil commonly used in these products is even more saturated than the fat in cream. The more saturated the fat, the more it works to raise blood cholesteral.
Even the small amounts used in coffee can make a difference. For example, a person who eats 2000 calories a day should be getting ten percent or less of those calories from saturated fat. Thatamounts to about 22 grams a day.
Four cups of coffee, each with a level tablespoon of lightener, will contain nearly eight grams of saturated fat, or more than a third of the day's allotment.
Powdered non-dairy coffee creamers are often used in the workplace because they require no refrigeration. As an alternative, bring a box of nonfat dry milk powder to lighten coffee at the office. It contains very little fat, virtually no cholesterol and does not require refrigeration.
At home or when eating out, low-fat evapora ted milk, low-fat or skim milk are also alternatives to the non-dairy creamers.

People who do not like the taste produced with low-fat milks can use whole milk. It contains more fat and cholesterlol than low-fat or skim milk but is better for people on cholesterol lowering diets than the highly saturated powdered coffee lighteners.
The liquid non-dairy creamers made from soybean oil contain less saturated fat than the powdered coffee lighterners, but they have as much total fat. They are also substantially higher in fat than whole milk.

When you shop for liquid non-dairy creamers, check the ingredient label to make sure the product does not contain coconut oil.

Persons who have been told by their doctors to reduce their cholesterol intake should be particularly cautious in their selection of coffee creamers.

## Ten Commandments of Firearm Safety

Accidents with firearms don't just happen. They are caused by ignorance, carelessness or disregard for safety rules.
With hunting season at hand, now is a good time to review firearm safety rules, says Dennis Poole, county Extension agent.

He lists these "Ten Commandments of Firearm Safety:'

1. Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. 2. Watch that muzzle! Be able to control the direction of the muzzle even if you should stumble.
2. nBe sure the barrel and action are clear of obstructions and that youhave only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying.
3. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger;
know identifying features of the game you hunt.
4. Unload guns when not in use. Take down or have actions open; guns should be carried in cases to the shooting area.
5. Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid all horseplay with a firearm.
6. Never climb a fence or tree or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.
7. Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface orwater; at target practice be sure yoour your backstop is adequate. 9. Store guns and ammunition separately beyond the reach of children and careless adults.
10 . Avoid alcoholic beverages before or during shooting.
